Parking Violations Light On First Day Of Meter Use; Tampering Evident

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal announced that the first day of operations of the parking meters in Cisco resulted in the issuance of approximately 20 tickets for parking violation and revealed that there was considerable tampering with the meters...

Mr. Rosenthal was joined by police officials in issuing a warning against tampering with the meters in any way and cited instances in which slugs, wires and other items had been used in place of coins.

Officers pointed out that arrest and conviction on tampering charges could carry a severe penalty under present laws and that heavy fines could be assessed in each violation.

The type meters in use allow for the use of both pennies and nickels. 12 minutes is allowed for each penny used and parking

Easy For Mothers To Attend Denton College

DENTON, August 2, (SpI)—Texas State College for Women plans to make it easy for mothers to be a college student.

Beginning with the next fall session, opening Sept. 19, the college will set aside one of the smaller dormitories for mothers with children. Women who want to come to school can now bring Junior along.

Tried experimentally in the summer sessions, the plan is being put into effect permanently now in response to a demand from mothers who wish to attend during the regular term.

Two Cisco men were burned, one seriously, in a butane flash fire which occurred shortly before 7 p. m. Monday at the Cisco Hydro-Carbon Company plant twelve miles north of here. The blaze, which engulfed a transport truck the two men had been re-loading with gas, was believed to have been caused by static electricity.

Witnesses said the truck had been drained, and that gas had accumulated about the truck. In Graham Hospital this morning were D. A. Morrow, 29, a loader at the plant, and Arthur Taylor, 24, a transport driver for the Graves Butane Company of Cisco.

Hospital attendants said Morrow, who received burns about the face and lower limbs of his body, was in a serious condition. He sustained the burns when he attempted to shut off the loading valve from the storage tanks on the dock. Taylor received minor burns, but is being held for treatment, they said.

According to reports, Taylor was burned about the face and hands when he unhitched the cab from the trailer and drove it to a safe distance away from the blazing trailer. Plant employees, who had sent a car into Cisco with Morrow, did not know Taylor had been injured until he climbed from the cab and began to help extinguish the blaze.

The fire destroyed the trailer, and partially damaged the loading dock. Units from the Cisco fire department were summoned to the scene. They were later joined by a fire fighting crew from Moran, who assisted in extinguishing the blaze.

Taylor, who has been working for the Graves Butane Company almost three years, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Taylor, 308 West Third Street. Morrow is married and has been living in Cisco for the past several years.

County Officers Face Possible Salary Increase

An increase of from five to ten per cent in salary was in prospect for Eastland County officials and employees when the question comes up for voting at a meeting of the Commissioners Court next week.

The increases are permitted by a new Texas legislature act, which permits increases of 25 per cent in salaries of elected office holders and 35 per cent in the salaries of appointed county employees, County Judge Lewis Crossley said.

Major county officials now are receiving \$3,675 per year Crossley explained. The increase from \$3,500 during the depression era to the present salary rate came after the county got into a different salary bracket under state laws applying to total county valuations.

Crossley added that several county courts had granted salary increases to officials and employees amounting to ten per cent, but he knew of no counties that had granted the maximum 25 and 35 per cent increases.

A ten per cent increase in Eastland County was considered by the court, he said, but he doubted if such a proposal would be approved, because of the lack of money in the county's general fund which is used to pay such an increase.

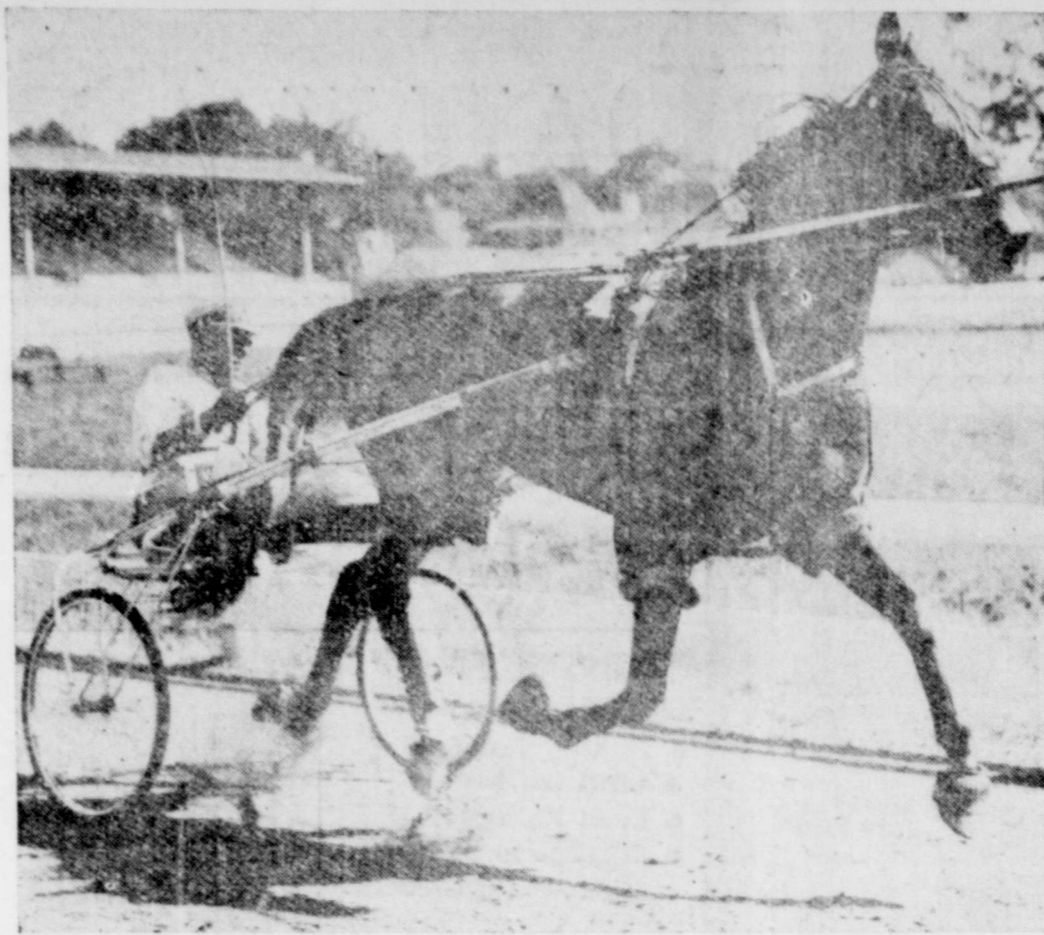

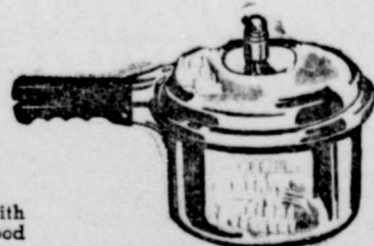
