## Veterans To Apply For Refunds On Life Insurance

Some 16 million servicemen and veterans of World War II, present and former holders of National Service Life Insurance policies, will apply for their share of the \$2,800,000,000 NSLI special dividend beginning on August 29.

The Administrator of Veterans Affairs, Carl R. Gray, Jr., announced that on that date, 70 million application blanks will be ready at every Veterans Administration Office, post office, and at various service organizations throughout the nation.

In making samples of the application cards available to the press and radio, Mr. Gray warned that the cards may not be reproduced for distribution, since they will become a part of the permanent records of the VA and are printed on a special paper and sized to fit computing machines. Any forms other than those distributed by the VA will not be processed.

The veterans administrator said that all the veterans must do is to obtain the application, fill out the card completely and mail it to the Veterans Administration. The form is self-addressed.

In the event a veteran does not know his policy number, application can be identified by military serial number, rank and exact name used during term of service.

Payments will start in January, 1950, therefore it is desirable that applicants furnish the VA with a permanent mailing address. If your address changes, notify your postmaster of your forwarding address. Do not send the VA any change of addresses for insurance after you have mailed your application. Any change of address made to the VA in connection with application will also cause delay in payment of dividend to you.

The VA Office, 105 N. E. 1st Street, Mineral Wells, will have the application forms August 29 and will assist veterans in completing them. Be sure to bring your insurance C number or numbers, if known. If you do not have your insurance number, bring your discharge with you.

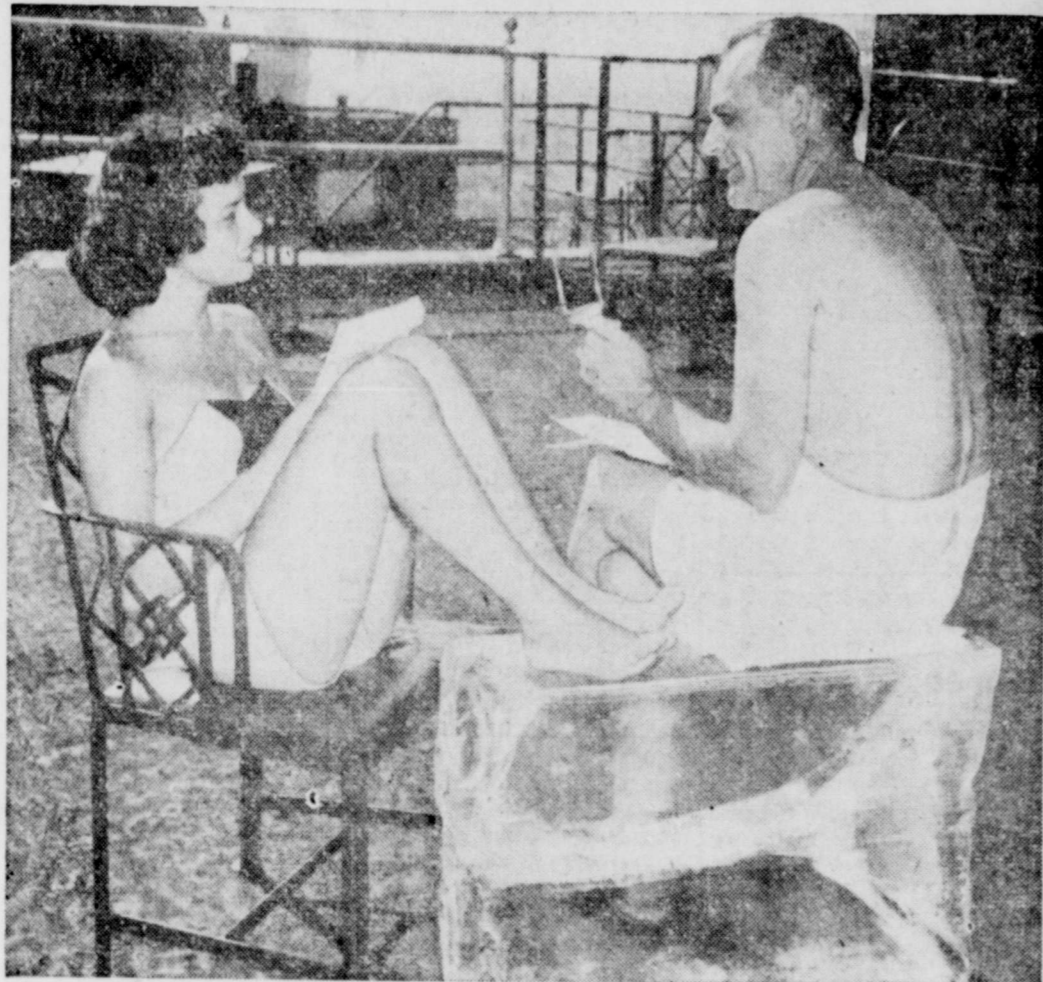

## Coaches Everett And Overall Working On Development Of Fast Charging Offensive Team

Sore muscles, aching backs and "charley horses" dominated the Cisco High School grid camp at Chesley Field Tuesday, as some forty candidates for posts on the Lobo team turned out for the second day of limbering up exercises.

With more emphasis on a hard plunging offensive machine this season, Coaches Jack Everett and Buck Overall are stepping the squadmen through twice-a-day training sessions. The program will be carried into effect until the opening of school September 6.

Black board discussions and light workouts are the order of the morning drills. At that time, the Lobos undergo quizzes of fundamentals of football taught in sessions the day before. In the afternoon, squadmen undergo three hours of straining headknocking exercises and coaches were anticipating a brick hard Lobo eleven when the season opens with Nacoma here September 9.

The coaches are seeing that defensive steps are not overlooked. Boasting one of the district's smallest lines, Everett and Overall plan to spend much time on blocking, tackling and charging.

## Cisco Junior College Plant Undergoes Extensive Repairs

### Proposed Ranger Eastland Dam To Cost \$500,000

An expenditure of approximately \$500,000 will be necessary for the erection of the proposed joint Eastland-Ranger dam on the junction of the Colony Creek and Leon River, S. E. Freese, Fort Worth engineer, has advised Eastland Chamber of Commerce officials.

Freese, of the Freese and Nichols engineering firm, said results of a preliminary survey conducted at the site recently, indicated the project "is very feasible — both from financial and water supply standpoints."

The proposed dam, to supply water needs of Eastland, Ranger and other Eastland County communities, would impound 600,000 acre feet of water and would back almost up to the Texas Electric Power Plant, Freese said.

Cost of the preliminary survey was under-written by the Brazos River Reclamation and the Conservation Board.

H. J. Tanner, secretary of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, said this week he was highly encouraged by the estimated cost for the proposed dam as it had been felt if the cost was around a million dollars, it would be too big a project for Eastland and Ranger to undertake.

Freese, who now is on a tour through West Texas, said he would return to Eastland Friday to discuss in detail the survey results.

## ABC CLUB DIRECTORS REPORT THAT TOURNAMENT WAS FINANCIAL SUCCESS

Financial reports of the City's Second Annual Softball Tournament were heard Tuesday by the ABC Club directorate at their final meeting of the year at the Victor Hotel.

Club Secretary Glen Boyd, who presented the report, said the tournament attracted more than 3,000 persons to ABC Field during its five day run, and a total of \$594.63 had been collected at the gate and concession stand.

President M. F. Underwood, in a brief talk before the board, praised the accomplishments of Boyd, who directed the tournament as its chairman, and commended Grounds Chairman H. O. Anderson "and a host of other individuals who helped us bring about a successful season and tournament."

The directors turned down a proposal that softball activity be continued until the opening of school. Representatives of the City's league teams had requested President Underwood to bring the proposal before the directors for a decision.

The directors, Underwood said, felt interest in the softball program had subsided with the climax of the tournament, and that the field, at least parts of it, was being used as the Cisco Lobos training site.

In other business, the directors passed a proposal that arrangements be made soon to begin an improvement project at the park, which would include modern seating facilities, fence advertising and re-fencing of the infield. A committee was appointed to investigate the matter, Underwood said.

The club, the directors were told, is making plans to launch its winter program as soon as adequate arrangements with school heads can be made. This will include a junior basketball tournament, beginning some time in January.

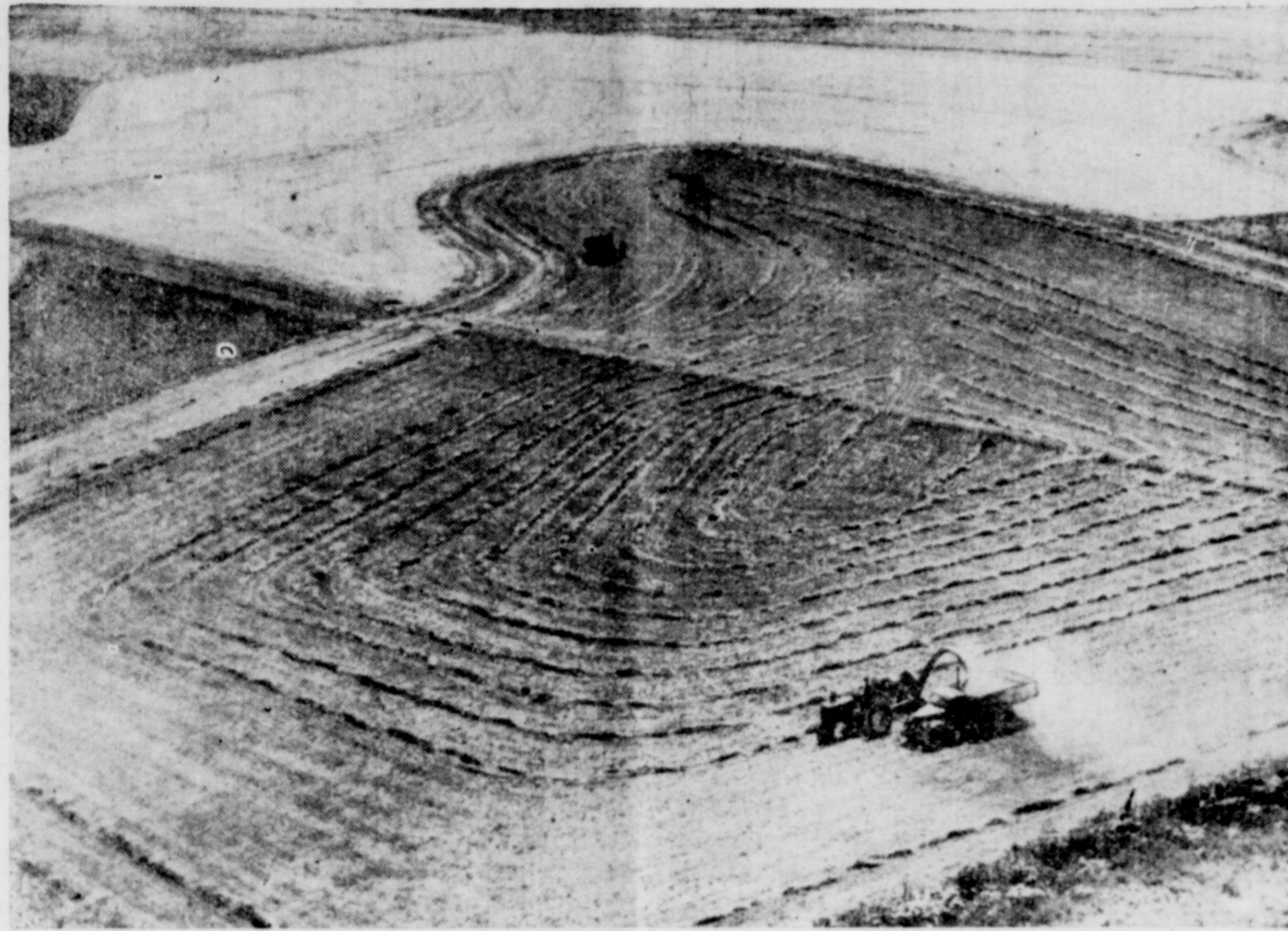

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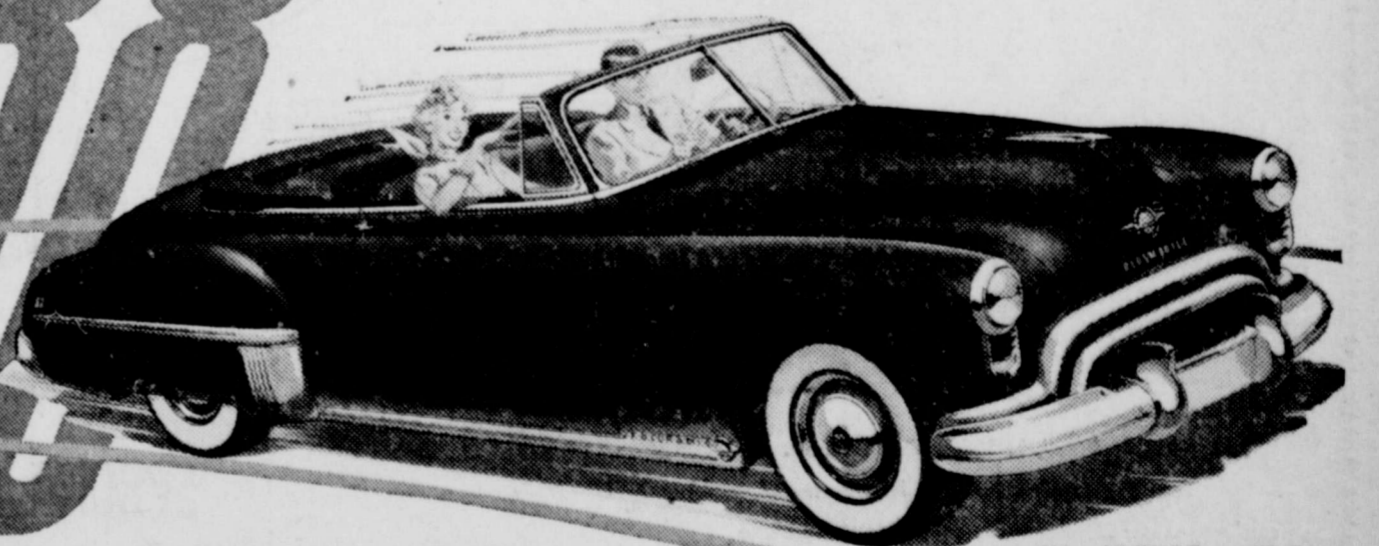

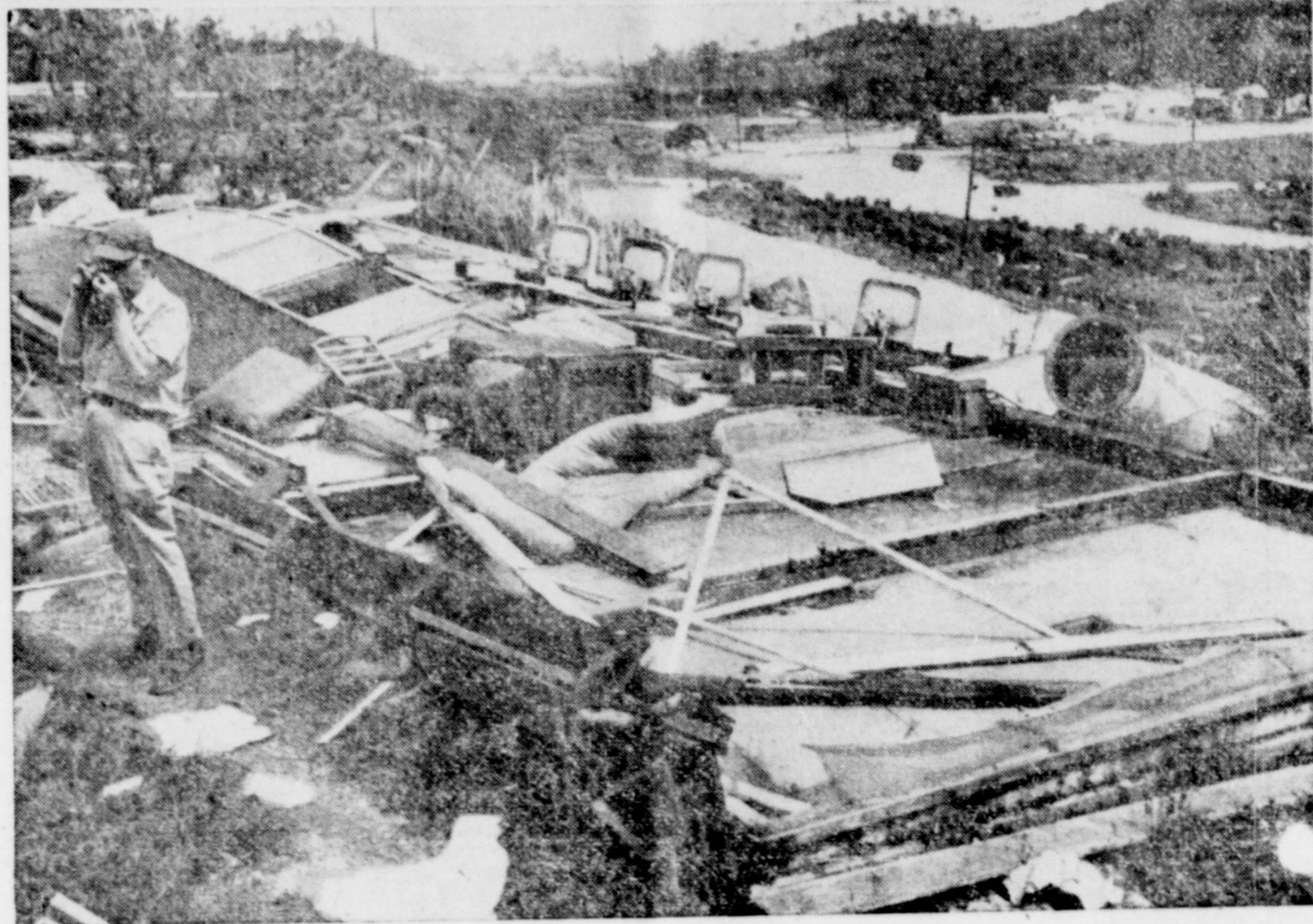
