TABLETS of the TIMES

This week and next a vast young army of 32 million boys and girls will start trooping into classrooms where they will be confronted by 1,200,000 teachers in about 90,000 independent school districts. It will be the greatest legion of young people ever enrolled in elementary and high schools. Nearly every youngster will have in his possession the familiar school tablet and is likely to use between three and 15 of them by the end of the term next spring. This worthy American invention supplanted the slate with its soapstone and grimy erasing rag about 60 years ago, thus revolutionizing the teaching techniques in education. The tablet provides constant edification for students. And sometimes, as illustrated tablet tops here show, it makes a fine historical comment on contemporary affairs.



Topsy was the name of a little girl in fiction who was well-known throughout much of the world nearly a century ago. So famous was she, in fact, that John C. Blair put Topsy's picture on the cover of the first tablet, which he invented at Huntington, Pa., in 1878.

## Texans Provide Water in Ecuador

DALLAS, Sept. 3 — A water purifying machine which was originally designed for Texas farms and ranches is now producing 500,000 gallons of water a day for earthquake sections of Ecuador as a gift from its Texas manufacturer and an international airline. It was the first water purification equipment to reach the country after the earthquake in early August.

The unit which is now purifying water from mountain creek in Ecuador, was donated by Paddock Engineering Company of Texas and cargo space for the 2500 pounds of equipment, including pumps and power sources, was donated by Braniff International Airways which flies to Ecuador through the Houston, Texas gateway and Cuba and Panama.

Thousands of the 36th "Texas" Division veterans are expected at the Annual Reunion at Waco, Texas, September 9, 10 and 11th, announced Charles M. Beacham of Corpus Christi, Texas, current President of the 36th Division Association. Over 70,000 men served in this Texas unit during World War II and thousands of others were veterans of World War I and a few of the Spanish-American War. This famous fighting unit, known as the "T-Patchers" by its distinctive shoulder insignia, saw about 363 days of front line service in Italy, France, Germany and Austria. It fought in seven major campaigns, made two amphibious assaults, -- the famed "Bloody Salerno" landing of September 9th, 1943, and the landing on the southern coast of France on August 15th, 1944. The reunion was selected in commemoration of the Italian landing, the first such operation against the mainland of Europe.
