The Gay Philosopher

THE FOLLOWING story concerns a weekly newspaper publisher named Joe Cook. He is a Shivers partner at Mission, and he is well known in Cisco, and his wife is a member of the McCannies family. We are reprinting the story because it will be of considerable interest here.

MISSION — Envy the editor of a weekly newspaper. For him there is no daily deadline. He has nearly a week to accumulate news stories and arrange about, say Thursday, he gathers them off the hook — and the rest is up to the printer. The editor is short of copy, he can always toss in a fishing hunting story; he is notoriously addicted to fishing and hunting and usually dominoes. He can eat late breakfasts, wear his clothes, hobnob at length on the street corner and thumb his nose at the monster called time. A happy picture — and you can throw it in the wastebasket. Joe Cook's wastebasket is handy at the moment.

Deadlines Loom

For years, Joe has been busy enough getting out of the Mission Times. And now the official business of the National Editorial Assn. — an organization devoted to the interest and problems of 5,600 weeklies, semi-weeklies and small town dailies in 48 states — passes over his desk. Besides and immense correspondence, Cook's job as president of the NEA calls for frequent trips to all parts of the country. And there is the Thursday deadline of the Mission Times always to be met.

"Only the magic carpet of air travel permits me to hold the NEA presidency for a year in the tip of Texas," Cook said Thursday. "I have had to be out of town 21 of the past 36 days — use air mail for correspondence and air travel for all trips." He glanced admiringly at a photograph on the wall. "Mrs. Cook has to be a most patient and understanding wife — and she certainly is," he said. "For instance, in August I worked until midnight at my office and was in my Chicago office the next morning. Later that month I put my paper to bed on a Wednesday night, found up some last minute details Thursday morning and Friday morning was speaking to the Florida Press Assn. at Lake Wales. I was back Monday morning for another week's work at my desk.

Columnist, Too

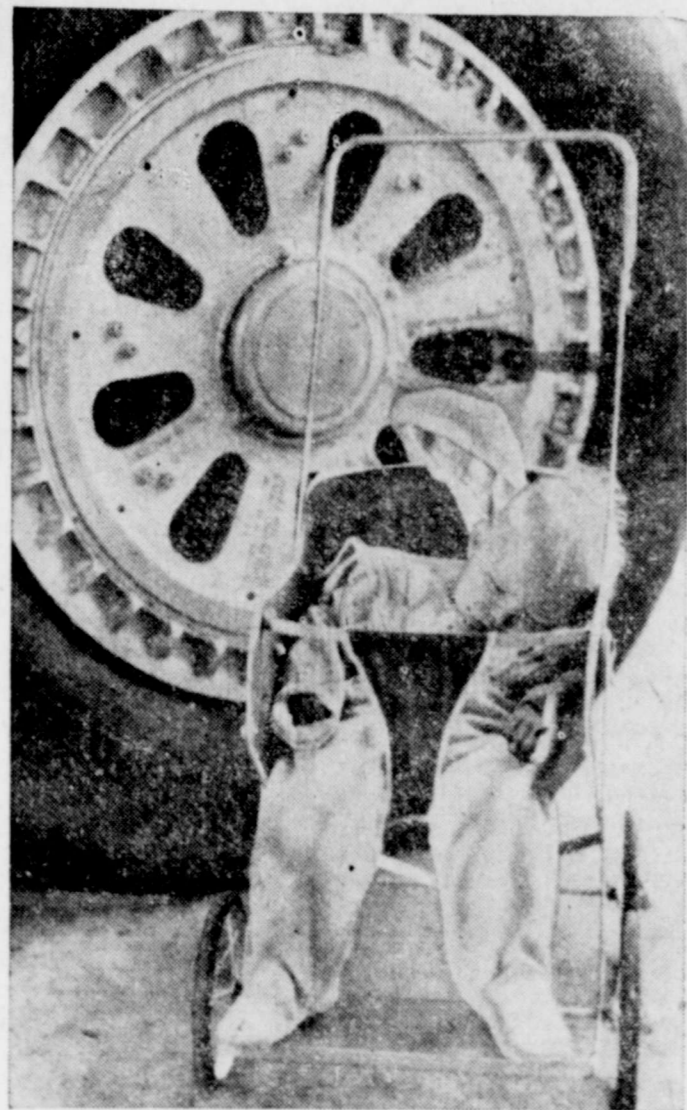
"In September I worked in the office until midmorning on Tuesday and was in New York at 10:30 that night and at the New York office at 9 a. m. the next day. Then I took an afternoon train and was in Providence, R. I., that night for conferences on convention arrangements. The next night I was at Efferson, N. H., to speak to the New Hampshire Weekly Publishers' Assn. I was at Wakefield, Mass., two days later to attend a session of the Massachusetts Press Assn. The next morning I had breakfast in New York City and was back in Mission in time for dinner that evening. "I wrote a column called 'The East Ward for the National Publisher, our trade magazine and serve in an advisory capacity on the publication."

Joe looked at a pile of correspondence on his desk, then at some page proofs and then at his watch.

"Well, the Times must get to bed in time, whether I do or not," he said. Now take a forked pencil and sliding rule and figure out a fishing trip for Joe.

JOHN MCCANLIES SEEKING CAREER AS OFFICER IN UNITED STATES AIR FORCE

PERRIN AIR FORCE BASE TEX. — The story of John McCannies born in Cisco, 22 years ago, is the typical yarn of many a Texas youth these days who has selected the United States Air Force as a challenging career with wide opportunities for service in the ranks of the men who man the Air Force.

John is something of a half pint in size, but he did manage to win a football letter at Cisco High School in 1942. He worked a paper route for the Cisco Daily Press and part time he worked for Westfall's Service Station pumping gas.

After a year at Cisco Junior College he joined the Navy and won the stripes of an aviation machinist mate. He was a gunner. When the war was finished he picked up where he'd left off at the Junior College and competed the two-year course. He headed west to seek his fortune. But he came back to Texas without a fortune, but a valuable idea and a plan.

His best girl in Ft. Worth thought so, too. John with a knack for aircraft and aeronautical engineering enlisted in the Air Force as an aviation cadet and was assigned to Perrin two months ago to begin the basic business of winning wings and becoming an officer-pilot in the world's finest Air Force.

John McCannies tells his own story: "This is the life," he said, "I'm learning aviation right from the beginning. About weather, navigation and the theories of flight and flying. And I know that I'm learning to fly in the best trainer, the T-6 Texan, which name suits me fine.

"I've had 20 hours of dual instruction with a might fine instructor. He says we're a team. Seems like he's had to work

mighty hard with me. It'll be a day when I solo! Then I'll go on to log about 175 hours and get to know the Texan inside and out.

"If I keep on the beam after six months at Perrin, there's a chance I may be selected for single-engine advance training

in the F-30 Shooting Star. There'll be navigation hops, day and night, and flying with instruments and formation tactics.

"We work hard," he continued, "but there's time for play. On weekends we have dances and parties, amateur shows and plenty of good times with some of the finest people I've ever met from all over the country.

Mayor Issues Statement On City Parking Meters

Following reports that there was being circulated in Cisco a petition asking the removal of parking meters in the downtown area, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal issued a statement Saturday as follows:

"To the Citizens of Cisco: Information has reached this office to the effect that a petition is being circulated requesting the removal of parking meters in Cisco.

"For the information of all concerned, the meters were installed, without cost to the city, for a trial period of six months and at the end of that period, if it is the will of the voters the meters will be removed without cost to the city.

"The meters were installed by contract to the City of Cisco at a rate of \$4 per meter, 358 meters were installed with the city furnishing the labor and concrete required to complete the installation. A sizable profit was made.

"The meters are averaging approximately \$250 per week and 50 per cent of this is given to the meter company as payment and 50 per cent retained by the city.

"The meters as installed have allowed parking space for shoppers at all times and at the same time were a great help in regulating traffic. There are rumors afloat that merchants are complaining of loss of business due to the meters. This, I think, is erroneous as news and statistics show that business is off all over the country.

Approximately \$110,000 more in state and county property taxes will be collected in Eastland County during the next year, based on 100 per cent collection, according to figures compiled last week.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Neil Day revealed that the county tax valuation, with all figures in, is \$24,321,390, compared with only \$20,538,610 a year ago.

A large part of the increase was due to new oil development in the county as of January 1, and to increased valuations of oil and utility companies after the county contracted with Thomas Y. Pickett of Dallas to serve as valuation engineer for such properties.

However, the larger anticipated tax collection also is based on a higher state tax rate. The county rate is 60 cents on the \$100 valuation, the same as a year ago, but the state rate went up for the current year from 42 cents to 72 cents.

Thus the higher tax bill for the county will affect the average taxpayer only to the extent that the state rate has increased 30 cents for each \$100 of valuation.

Day said all tax statements for property on the rendered rolls had been prepared.

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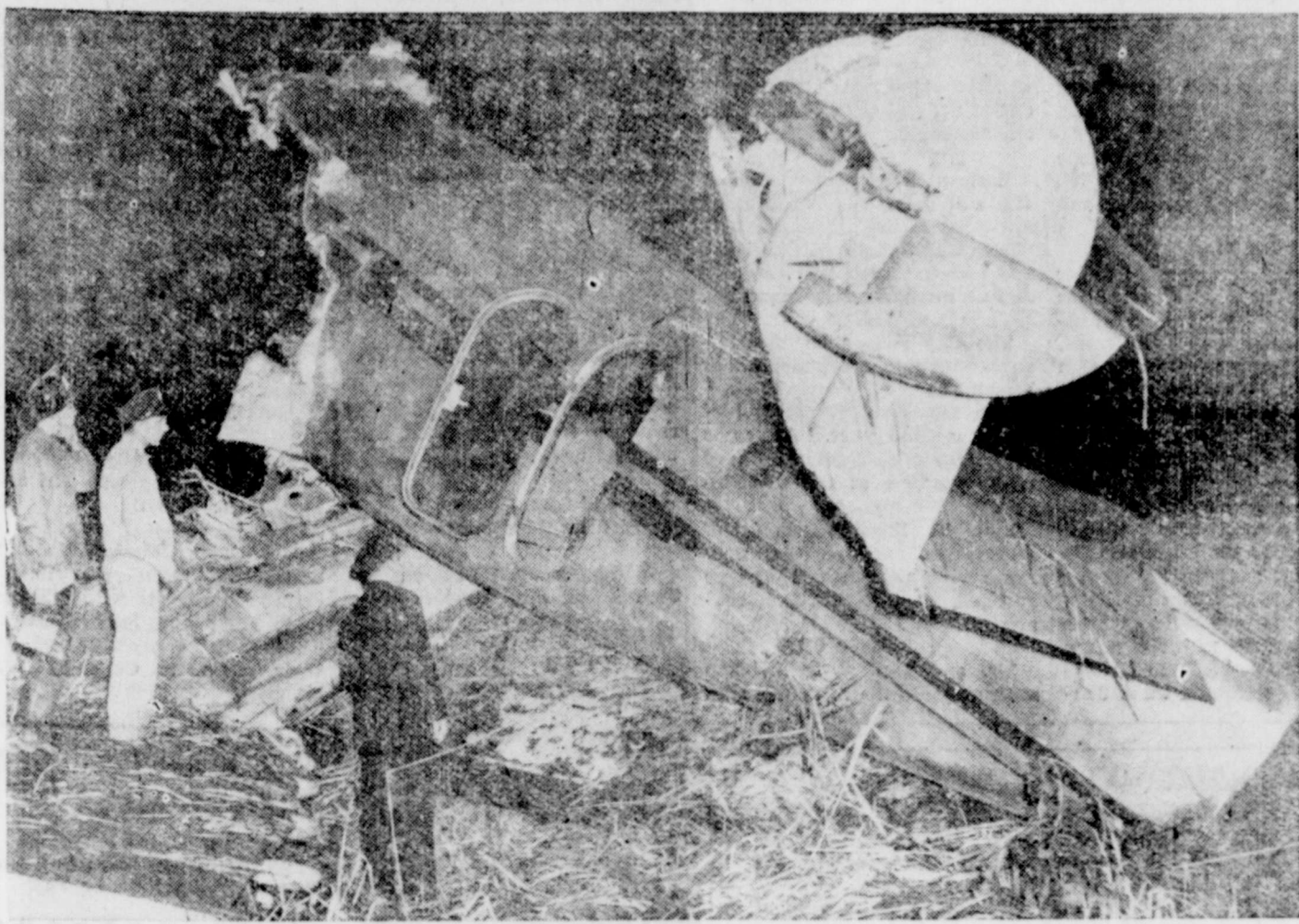

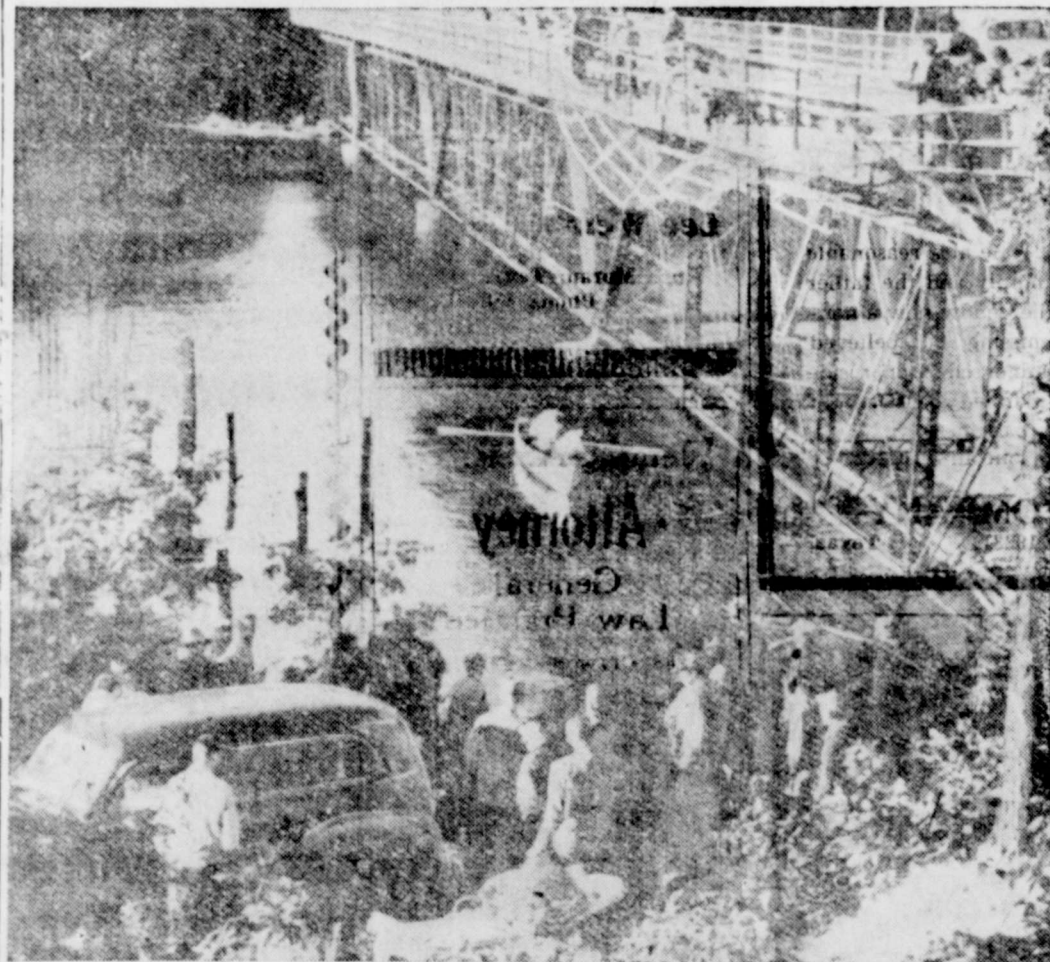

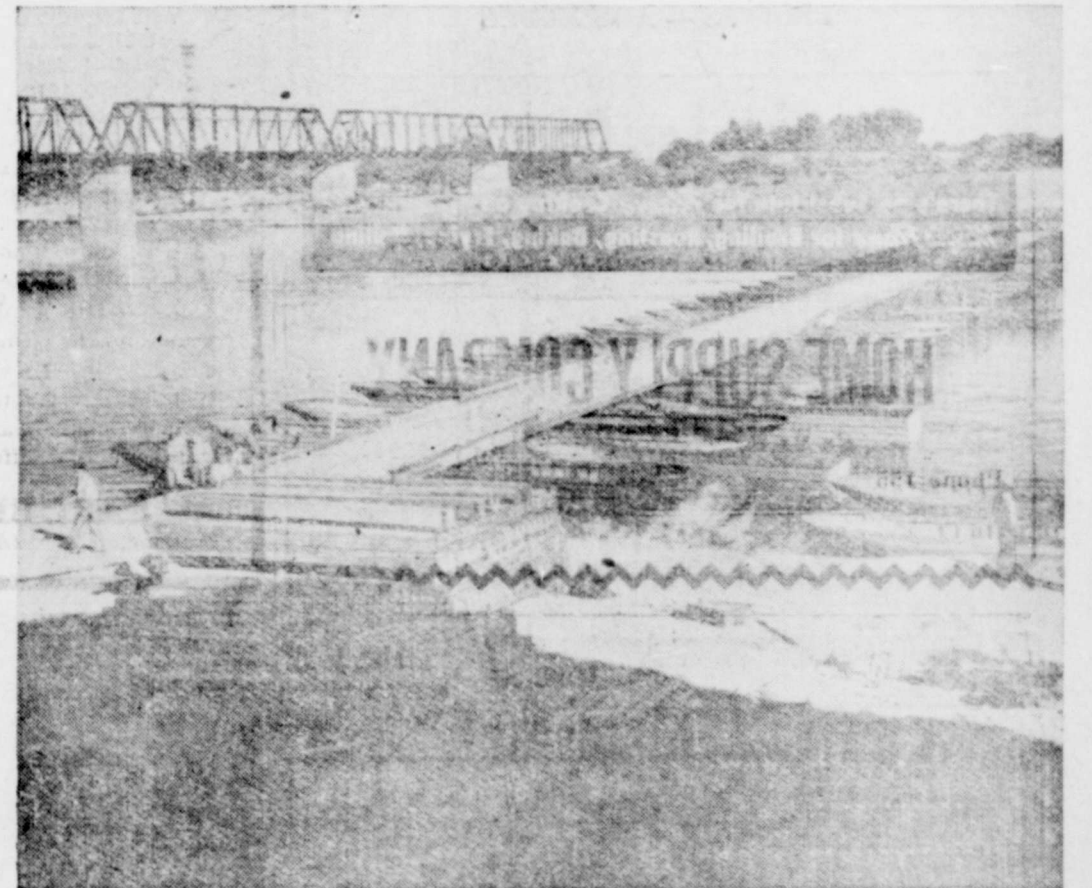
