Support of Seal Sale Is Urged

AUSTIN, Nov. 19—Governor Allan Shivers today issued an official memorandum urging the people of Texas to be generous in their support of the 1949 Christmas Seal sale of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and its affiliated county associations.

The seal sale opens Monday, Nov. 21, and continues through Dec. 25—the period officially designated by Gov. Shivers as Christmas Seal Month.

In issuing his official memorandum the governor said: "The more we support the work of tuberculosis associations the closer we shall be to victory over tuberculosis in Texas. Since the annual Christmas Seal sale constitutes the sole support of state and local associations, we take an active part in the fight against this disease each time we buy and use Christmas seals."

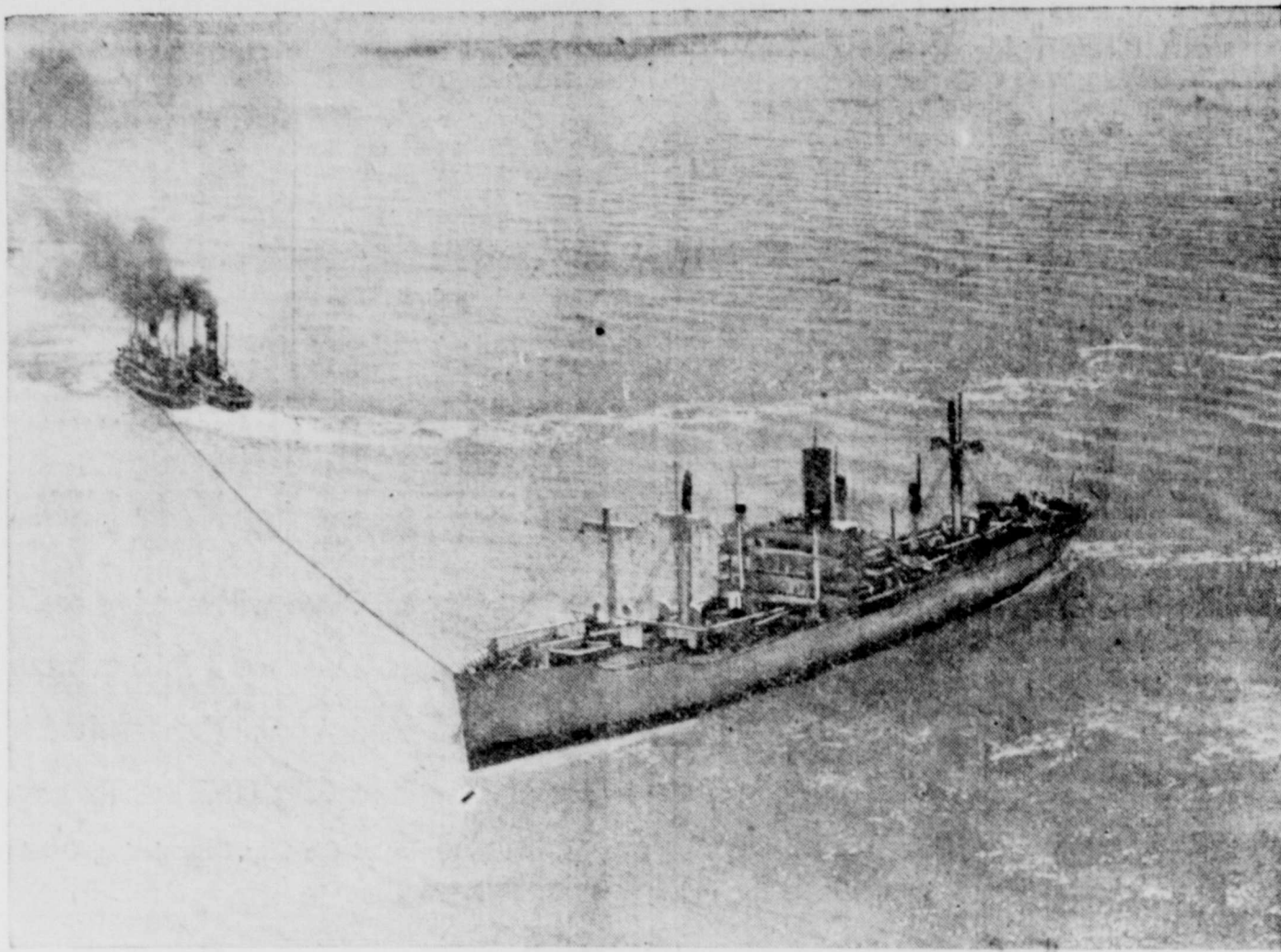

Win Lone Star State 4-H State Championships

Four Texas 4-H State winners in the 1949 Canning, Dress Revue, Field Crops and Food Preparation programs each received an all-expense trip to the 28th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. Brief summaries of their records follow:

State honors in the 1949 National 4-H Canning Achievement program went to Laverne Goertz, of Red Rock. Besides having an outstanding canning record, she has done a good job in other phases of 4-H work, completing 36 projects. She has canned 4,500 quarts of vegetables in the seven years she devoted to her canning project and has won 15 ribbons. Canned products entered at county fairs. Besides preserving vegetables and soup mixtures, she has also canned some fruit juices. This contribution to the family food supply is only one of her projects. She has prepared a variety of healthful meals, and has taken an active part in the 4-H club, serving as president, secretary, and as song leader of the county group. She is the winner of several first place prizes for her work in food preservation. Recognition of her achievements, Laverne was awarded an

her club as leader and president. As a reward for her fine record, Laverne was awarded an educational trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, provided by Servel Home Economics Dept.

State winner in the 1949 National 4-H Field Crops program was Lowie Rice, 17, of Big Spring. He was given an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, provided by International Harvester Co. What Lowie learned about soil preparation, seed treatment and new methods of cultivation enabled him to make an outstanding record. He grows cotton on 4 1/2 acres, and says a successful crop depends upon the selection of seed, care of the soil and the right type of machinery. Although there is not enough moisture in his part of the country to have really successful gardens, he has grown peas, corn, watermelon, and cantaloupe. A 4-H'er for 16 years, Lowie has held almost every

all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, provided by Kerr Glass Mfg. Corp. The winner in 4-H Club work was Leora Callahan, 16, of Bastrop. In the 1949 National 4-H Food Preparation program Leora became an expert planner, having cooked and served more than 2,100 meals in 19 years ranging in age from three to 20 years. She estimates the cost as \$9,200. During one summer when the new house was being built, she cooked for eight carpenters, all on an oil stove. Now she works in a modern, well equipped kitchen. Leora believes planning and management are important in meal preparation. She gave an excellent demonstration to 50 Bastrop County women in the use of a master mix biscuits and desserts. She has completed 21 projects and served in all of these activities are conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA cooperating.

OLYMPIA, DEWEY'S FLAGSHIP, STILL ACTIVE—The old grey fighter, which just 50 years ago returned in triumph from the victory of Manila Bay, lies peacefully at her slip in the Philadelphia Naval Base where she receives homage as an "eagle of the sea" that escaped plucking by the "harpies of the shore." Twenty-eight years ago she brought to the United States the body of the First World War's Unknown Soldier, and a year later was ordered to be scrapped. There was no eloquent Oliver Wendell Holmes to write another "Old Ironsides" that saved the frigate Constitution a century before, but the protests of the patriotic citizens of Olympia, Washington, forced the cancellation of the scrapping order. She's a proud ship still—just as trim and span as on that May morning in 1898 when she led Admiral George Dewey's squadron into Manila Bay. She was rated a light cruiser of 4,500 tons and was commissioned January 2, 1894, and looks young for her 55 years. The illustration is from a photograph made when she participated in the Dewey Day exercises in New York harbor September 29, 1899. Today tens of thousands annually visit the U. S. S. Olympia.

 - 1 cup melted butter
 - 1-2 cup boiling water
- Fry onions slowly in 2 tablespoons butter until tender and clear but not browned. Combine poultry seasoning, sage, salt, celery salt and pepper. Toss lightly with bread. Add onions and mix lightly. Combine butter and water. Add gradually to bread, tossing lightly. Makes enough for 10-12 lb. turkey. Note: If a moister dressing is preferred, add another 1/2 cup water.

GARNISH FOR TURKEY

Cut oranges in half and scoop out center. Notch edges. Fill shells with Gingers Cranberry Sauce made by using 1 cup white and 1 cup brown sugar to 1 lb. cranberries and 1 1/2 cups water. Add 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger. Bring to boil, cover and cook slowly about 10 minutes or until skins are broken. Skim and cool. Serve frosty cold. Makes about 4 cups sauce.
