East Cisco Baptists Start On New Church Building

LOCAL LUNCH ROOM SUPERVISOR ATTENDS MEETING IN FORT WORTH

Mrs. J. L. Pippen, supervisor of the Cisco Public School lunchroom program, attended an all-day meeting of Texas Lunch Room Managers and Supervisors in Fort Worth last week. The meeting was held under the sponsorship of the Texas State Teachers Association meeting in convention at the same time.

Problems pertaining to the management and supervision of a successful lunch room were discussed and much value was obtained by those attending.

Speakers included M. F. Thur-

mond, head of the lunch room division in Austin, Dr. Lamb of Texas Tech, Mrs. Nabice of the Department of Agriculture Distributing Agency and others.

The value of a hot meal to the mental development and development of the child was stressed in the talks. Dr. Lamb stated that actual experiments had been made on groups of students to learn their mental response to a balanced meal and in every case progress in their work had been noted.

Mr. Thurmond stated that the object of the program was a well developed child, mentally and physically and that the end could only be met by the cooperation of parents, teachers, and school officials.

Mrs. Pippen reported that during the month of September an average of 300 meals per day were served to West Ward students and that in October the figure was 306. An average of 150 students a day eat at junior high and over 100 eat daily at the high school. Wednesday before Thanksgiving, the three lunch rooms served over 700 students turkey and all the trimmings. The meals were served at the regular price of 25 cents and ice cream and candy were given the students as extra treats.

The supervisor thanked the West Ward P-TA, Superintendent Arlin Bint, the school board and local business men for making the new West Ward lunch room possible and providing more room and better facilities for serving students a well balanced meal at a low cost.

Scout Pow Wow Held In Cisco

Local Scouters were hosts on Monday night to the regular monthly district Scout Pow Wow for the Comanche Trail Council. The meeting was held at the First Presbyterian Church following a dinner at the Victoria Hotel dining room.

Steve Potts, field Scout executive from Brownwood, was in charge of the meeting.

Scouters from Breckenridge, Brownwood, Cisco, Eastland, and Ranger attended the meeting and took part in the program.

Construction work began today on a new building for the congregation of the East Cisco Baptist Church. The new structure, plans for which were approved by the church last Sunday, will be erected north of the building that was destroyed by fire and facing 11th Street.

Contractors Finley and Garrett began running concrete today on the foundation for the new building, which is expected to cost between \$30,000 and \$40,000. It will provide auditorium space and Sunday School accommodations for 500 persons and will be two stories.

The present education building which suffered only slight damages in the recent fire, will be connected to the education part of the new building by a breeze way. The structure will either be rock or brick veneer. Floors will be of tile covered concrete.

The church has not as yet completed an insurance settlement on the structure that burned. It was insured for \$10,000. The congregation has already contributed more than \$1,000 to a new building fund.

The First Baptist Church contributed \$300 from its treasury and made up some \$400 in a special collection for the East Cisco church. It was reported that an Eastland man sent the church a check for \$250.

Members of the building committee are Don Rupe, chairman, J. C. Pelfrey, secretary, J. D. Hall, W. L. Lewis, W. R. Ivie and Roy Marcontel.

The finance committee is composed of H. H. Harnelson, chairman, Claud McBeth, secretary, Cliff Jones, Carlton Holder, and John Whisenant.

U. S. AND MEXICO BEATING FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE THREAT TO CATTLE

Nearly 4,000 Mexicans and Americans are winning the desperate battle to wipe out foot and mouth disease, the scourge that once threatened our great cattle industry. How this cam-

paign, launched in Mexico two and a half years ago against seemingly hopeless odds, has been brought within sight of victory is told by Francis Sill Wickwire in the December Rea-

der's Digest. The article is condensed from Collier's.

At the outset, the epidemic was within 250 miles of our border; if it should cross it would cost the U. S. an estimated million dollars a week to defeat it. Now, at half that cost, foot and mouth has been pushed back 100 miles.

Killing infected animals was held to be the only course, at the start of the campaign. Authorities realized this would mean not only the collapse of Mexico's agriculture but the fomenting of ill will and even active hostility on the part of Mexican peasants who did not understand the true nature of the disease.

After more than a million cattle had been slaughtered, a vaccine was developed from infected animals. The vaccine does not cure but does make a healthy animal immune for four months. Three inoculations are given every susceptible animal in an infected area. In this way the disease will be gradually starved out, the author says. To date more than 13,000,000 head have been inoculated at least once. Large areas have been cleaned up, and no new outbreaks have occurred in territory treated by the crews.

The campaign has been so successful that today American prestige in Mexico is higher than ever, the article says.

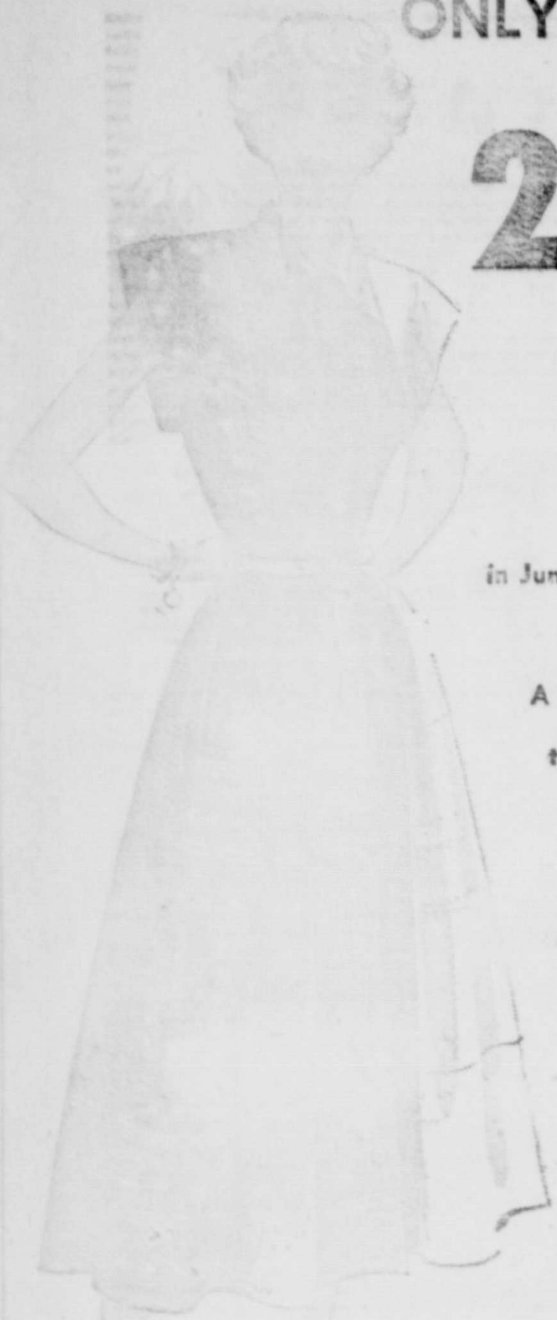

Civil Service Warns Against Training School

The Civil Service Commission has issued a warning to the public concerning so-called Civil Service Schools, according to Sam B. King, local Civil Service secretary. Many of these schools grossly exaggerate opportunities for employment in the Federal Civil Service, and many give the impression they are connected with the government, Mr. King said.

Mr. King stated that the Commission wants to make clear to the public that no civil service school has any connection with the Civil Service Commission or any other branch of the government; the Commission has no agents who sell "Civil Service" courses; no school can properly promise success in passing civil service examinations; no school is given advance information regarding exam-

inations to be announced, nor any other information which is not available to the general public. It is not necessary to take a course with any so-called civil service school to compete in or learn about any of the Commission's examinations. Such information can always be obtained free at your local post office, Mr. King said.

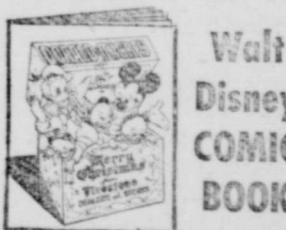

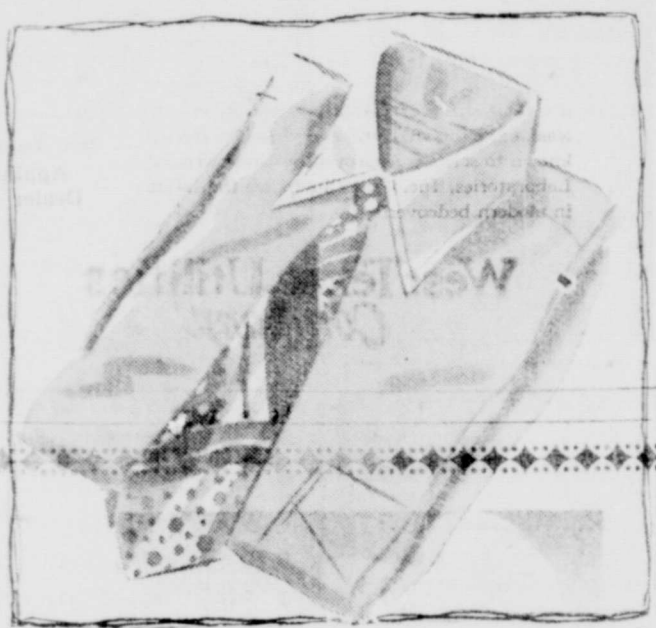

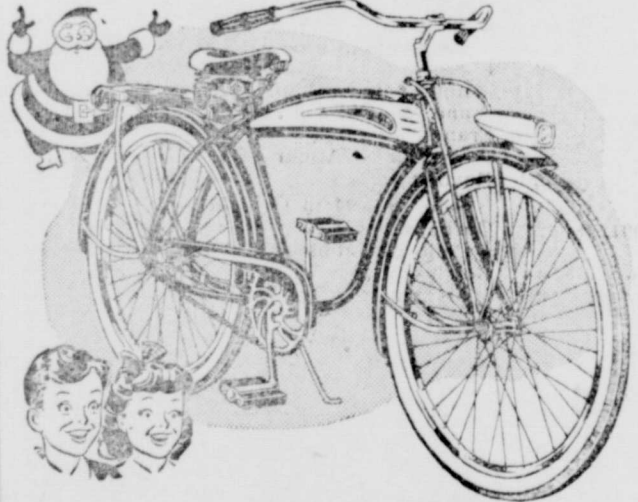

credit granters will be glad to approve a limited account for you if you have a job. Being a stranger in town is no bar to credit buying, if you have had accounts in good shape at your previous residence. The Merchants Credit Association has ready access to the files of 1500 communities in North America, through its membership in the Associated Credit Bureaus of America.

As for the 'wary' customer, he has been needlessly frightened away from charge accounts and views the whole system incorrectly. Perhaps this type has

known someone who got in over his head, with unpleasant consequences. This customer doesn't realize that such incidents are the exceptions rather than the rule, that stores don't want to alienate customers and their friends by harsh collection practices — except in the most unusual cases.

Most people know the value of a good credit record. They like the convenience of charge accounts, and pay promptly to have these privileges, she said.

Discussing 1949's all-time high in credit, Mrs. Huffmyer said the figures meant nothing unless compared with savings and income. "While it's true," she sta-

ted, "that credit outstanding by the end of 1949 is expected to be near the \$18 billion, a recent survey of income habits and outlook indicates a possible \$200 billion disposable personal income for 1950!"

When you take all these things into consideration, she said, it seems then that stores and credit customers alike need only to buy carefully or sell wisely — a good idea at any time. So, if your ration of debt to income is within reason, you need not worry about charging presents for Christmas. And in most cases you'll find your credit application will get a warm welcome.
