Cox, commenting on the abovenentioned fact, said Thursday there is no doubt that carbon monoxide- associated with gas neaters - is one of the most lethal and least publicized of all the poisonous gases.

Carbon monoxide, the doctor explained, is formed when there ral gas. s not enough oxygen mixed with burning gas, or when the design or operation of gas burning equipment is faulty.

"With a toxicity comparable the gases used in warfare, no nough attention is paid to the deadly effect of prolonged expo sure to carbon monoxide,' veteran health officer said. Some people believe that a single injury, such as a blow in the breast, can cause cancer. Some believe that cancer is hereditary, that parents pass it

on to their children. Many believe that cancer is Amerally incurable, and that there is nothing the individual can do to protect himself and his family.

All these false beliefs and many others are dealt with in the first five of a series of popular pamphlets on cancer, publication of which is announced by John L. Thurston, acting Federal Security Agency adminis-

The pamphlets, which were prepared by the National Cancer Institute of the National Institutes of Health, Public Health Service, emphasize that early cancer is frequently accompanied by warning signs and symptoms, and that persons who can recognize them and get prompt medical attention can usually

The first ofthe publications, Cancer, What to Know, What o Do About It, is an illustraed folder describing the caner process, the known facts about its causes and approved methods of treatment, and lists the most usual signs of possible early cancer. As listed in the

folder, these include: 1. Any lump, especially in she breast. 2. Irregular bleeding or dis-

charge from body opening. 3. Persistent indigestion. 4. Unexplained changes in bo-

wel movements. 5. Unexplained weight loss. 6. Changes in color or size of


