DALLAS, Dec. 23. - Employers in North Texas today were advised that an explanatory bulletin will be available next week on the revised regulations governing exemption of so-called "white Collar" employees under the Wage and Hour Law adopted in Washington today by Administrator Wm. R. McComb.

Wood, field office upervisor of the U.S. Department of Labor's Dallas office of the Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions, also called attention of employers to the fact that the revised regulations will take effect on January 25, the day on which the Fair Labor Standards Amendments of 1949, applying to the Wage-Hour Law as a whole, take effect.


