API Gives Oil Runs For Week

The American Petroleum Institute estimates that the daily average production of crude oil and lease condensate for the week ending December 17, 1949 was 5,000,150 barrels of which 60,450 barrels were lease condensate mixed crude oil losing its identity as such. See tables below for details of crude oil and condensate separately.

Reports received from refining companies indicate that the industry as a whole ran to stills on a Bureau of Mines basis approximately 5,331,000 barrels of crude oil daily and produced 18,329,000 barrels of gasoline; 2,555,000 barrels of kerosene; 7,263,000 barrels of distillate fuel 108,450,000 barrels of finished and unfinished gasoline; 22,267,000 barrels of kerosene; 82,450,000 barrels of distillate fuel oil and 62,786,000 barrels of residual fuel on December 17, 1949.

TEXAS JUNIOR VEGETABLE GROWERS WIN FOUR NATIONAL CONTEST AWARDS

Four junior vegetable growers from the Lone Star State were announced today as winners of state awards in the 1949 Production-Marketing contest of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association as the organization concluded its fifteenth annual four-day convention in Washington, D. C.

State-wide honors were captured by Doris Marie Prater, 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Prater, Lubbock; Lydia Krahl, 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe J. Krahl, Gainesville; Mary Ann Johnson, 14, of Farmersville, and Novaleen Franklin, 14-year-old daughter of H. G. Franklin, Abilene. Each received cash awards from the \$6,000 scholarship fund provided each year by A & P Food Stores to encourage better vegetable production and marketing by farm youth.

Club and county fair competition, having taken 10 blue ribbons at the county fair in September and two more firsts in the Panhandle South Plains Exhibition in October.

An honor student in the junior class in high school, Miss Prater also has been active in church and community affairs and has been a leader in her 4-H Club, having served as chapter president in 1948 and county delegate in 1949.

Miss Krahl, a high school senior, already has established herself as a horticulturist by introducing to Texas the New Guinea butter-vine, a vegetable heretofore grown only in the Northern states. Her prize-winning garden, covering a plot 50 by 150 feet on her parents' 243-acre Cooke County farm, grossed produce valued at almost \$200 on an investment of only \$40 for seed, fertilizer and labor.

Mary Ann Johnson, a high school freshman, has been active in 4-H Club work for the past four years, but this was her first garden project. Covering an area of approximately one-third acre on her parents' 143-acre Hunt County farm, this young farm-ette's prize-winning garden produced 22 vegetable crops valued at \$160, of which almost \$100 was clear profit.

Young Miss Franklin is also a high school freshman and has worked with her local 4-H Club for five years. Her prize-winning project covered an area of 40 by 90 feet on her father's 360-acre Taylor County farm and grossed almost \$50 on a cash investment of less than \$3. She raised a wide variety of vegetables, most of which were canned for home consumption.

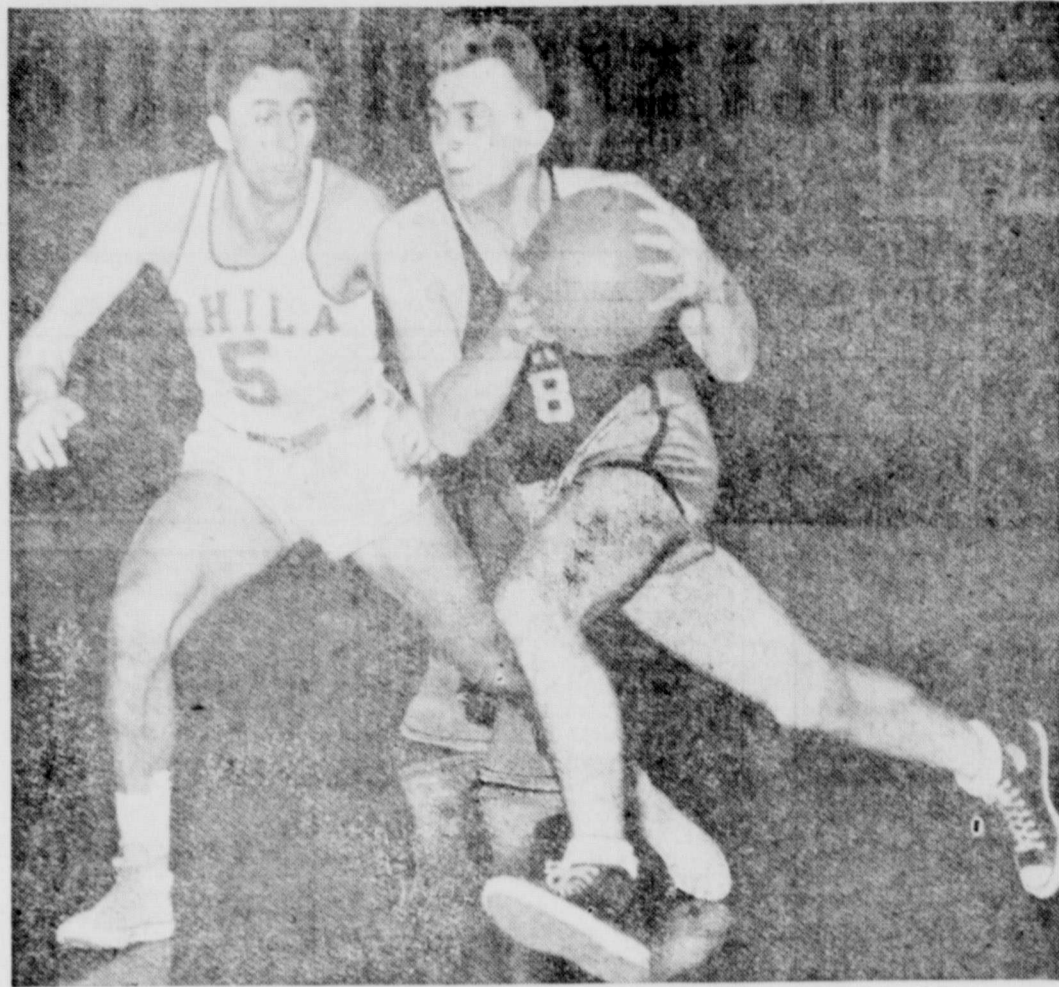

KITCHEN MEMO

Complete oven meals are efficient time-savers and can include every course from soup to dessert. When cooking your oven meals, use an *Oven-Made Vegetable Soup*. Most other recipes in the complete oven meal won't take as long as three hours' cooking as does this soup but slide it into the oven ahead of the other dishes. Put 2 lbs. beef knuckles into dutch oven or tight-lidded pan. Cover with 2 qts. water, set on oven rack, turn thermostat to 350°. Cook for 2 hrs. Then mix in 1 cup carrots, 1/2 cup cabbage, 1 cup potatoes, diced, 1 medium-sized onion, 1 stalk celery, diced, 1 tbsp. salt. Cook an additional hour. Note: Tomatoes, turnips or rutabagas may be added to the soup. It may also be cooked over a low flame on the top burner if you're not baking.

Old powder puffs are flexible and soft enough to make excellent silver polishers and for applying cleaner to mirrors.

Added comfort for cold bathrooms is a gas space heater now made in white to match bathroom fixtures.

When a hot dish sticks to cloth, pour hot water around it and in a few minutes you can pick up the dish without marring the cloth.

Equal parts of finely crushed cornflakes and flour will make a crisp crust for fish. Keep the flame turned low because you don't need as high heat to brown the crust.

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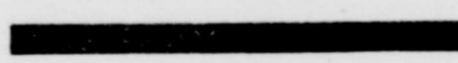

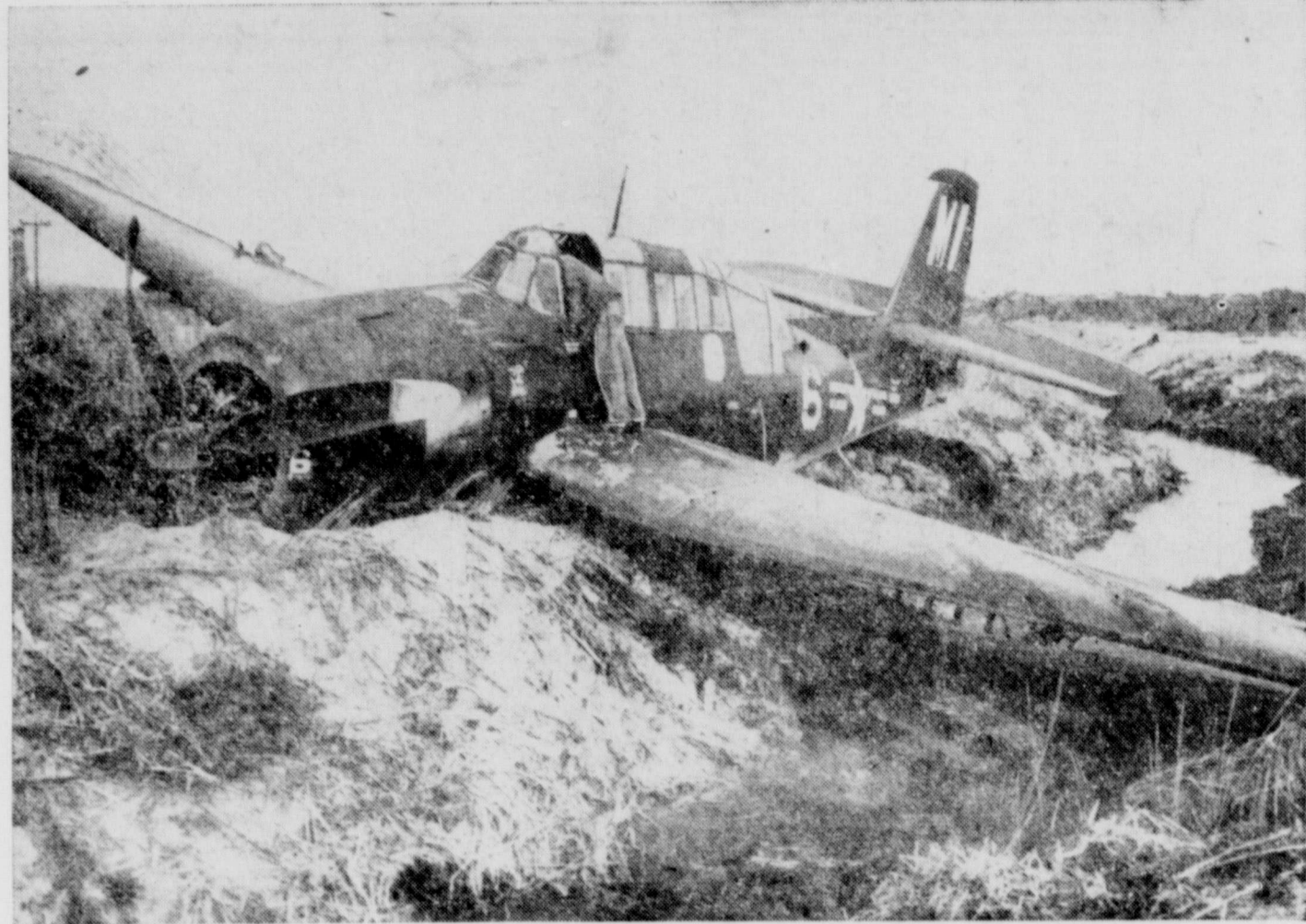

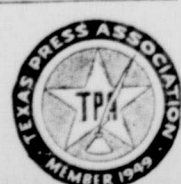
