Moran Banker-Rancher Believes Cattle Can Be Fed at Profit in Texas Area

Floyd C. Pool undoubtedly becomes physically weary sometimes as he goes about the business of making a living, but there is little likelihood that he ever becomes bored with his work.

Pool is president of the Moran National Bank, which has a capital stock of \$25,000 and deposits of more than \$600,000. He owns a 2,140-acre ranch that is stocked with registered and well-bred commercial Herefords.

The place was established as a ranch headquarters about 75 years ago, and people still refer to it as the Col. Watters Ranch.

Men who are along in years and knew Watters when they were boys sometimes recall one of Watters' ranching practices. He kept two saddle horses for his personal use.

It was eight years ago that Pool decided to try his hand feeding cattle by using Texas-grown products. He purchased the depot when the station at Sedwick was abandoned, and began to build a barn.

On Nov. 9 Pool put 123 steers in his feedlot. They averaged 783 1/2 pounds. Fifty-three heifers had gone into the feedlot a little earlier and they averaged 791.

Process Studied To Provide Fresher Vegetables for You

U. S. Department of Agriculture is experimenting with a new process that promises to give southwest home makers fresher vegetables.

This new process is called vacuum cooling. It makes practical use of the drop in temperature when the water is evaporated rapidly.

First the vegetables are packed in perforated cellophane bags, then they are placed in a specially built chamber. This chamber is sealed and a vacuum is created. The vacuum is held until the vegetables are cooled to the desired temperature.

This air-conditioning of vegetables preserves their quality during shipment, the Dept. of Agriculture declares.

SEASON'S COLDEST WEATHER DROPS MERCURY TO 14 DEGREES WEDNESDAY

A howling norther roared into Cisco Tuesday night and brought the first real winter weather of the current season. The blast lowered the temperature 61 degrees from the high mark for Tuesday. The official report revealed that the mercury dropped from a high of 75 degrees at noon to a low of 14 Wednesday morning.

The norther was accompanied by high winds, sleet, freezing rain and a small amount of snow and the forecast called for more of the same Wednesday night and Thursday morning with slightly higher temperature Thursday afternoon.

On the same day in 1949 a norther blew into Cisco and for the remainder of the month there was freezing weather and much snow and ice.

Much of the state was in the grip of the norther with snow, sleet and ice reported in most sections.

LOCAL HOUSING UNIT RECEIVES NOTICE OF APPROVAL TUESDAY

The allocation of 70 low rental housing units to Cisco appeared a reality Tuesday when Charles Spears, chairman of the Cisco Housing Authority, received a telegram from Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, advising him that the Washington authority had approved the local group's application for that number of units.

The local housing authority, composed of Spears, S. H. Nance, R. L. Ponsler, Norman Huston and Charles Sandler, had applied for 200 units under the government's housing program, but had not expected the entire application to be approved this year.

Also approved was an advance of \$28,000 to be used in preliminary planning of the project. The final approval only awaits the signing of the authorization by President Truman.

The program was designed for the purpose of assuring comfortable living quarters for all Americans and is a part of the present administration's overall plans for better housing conditions.

A building site has not been selected but federal officials and the local committee will begin a survey as soon as possible in order that the project may get under way.

The plans call for the city to furnish a small per cent of the cost of the units. The part furnished by the city will consist of labor in clearing the building site, installing water and sanitation facilities and other items.

The units will be under the supervision of local authorities who will place one person in charge of the rentals, maintenance and so forth. They will not be built with government money but will be financed by private capital with a government guarantee of the loan.

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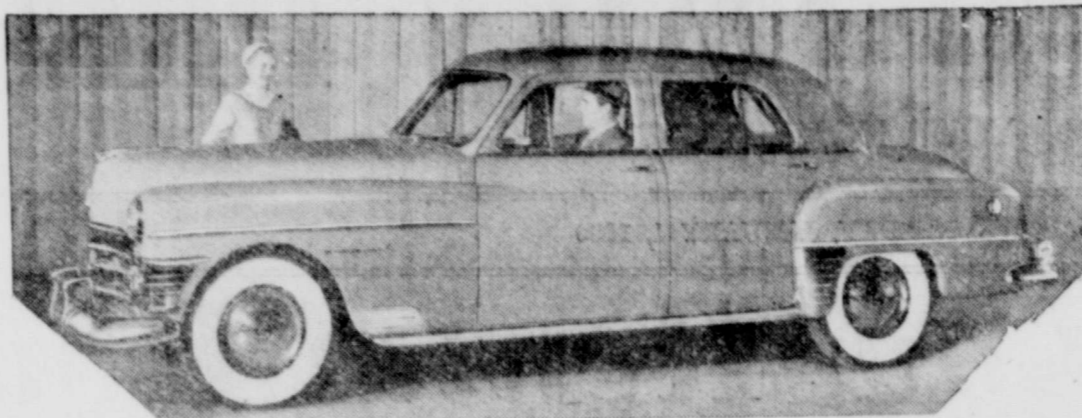
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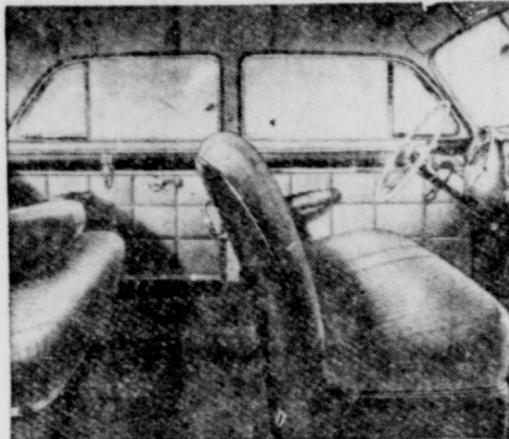

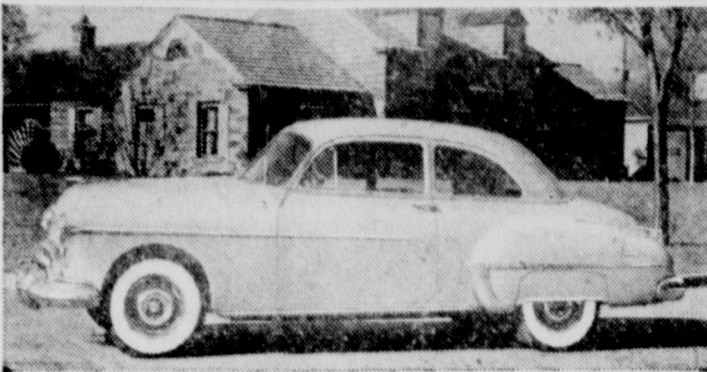
