Texas Scouts will mingle with Scouts from Maine, California, Minnesota, in an inspiring, exciting picture of Scouting ideals in action as the Boy Scouts of America hold their Second National Jamboree marking the Fortieth Anniversary of Scouting in the United States.

Comanche Trail Council will send two troops, of thirty-six Scouts and three Leaders each, as its representatives at this gathering at America's Shrine of Liberty. Scouts to go will be chosen by the Troop to which they belong and all registrations for the Jamboree must be made through the Council office at Brownwood.

The 1950 National Jamboree is the greatest event in the history of the greatest boy's organization in the world, and is a stirring demonstration of the amazing vitality and great accomplishment of the Scouting Movement to further the Scout Crusade to "STRENGTHEN THE ARM OF LIBERTY" which is the national Scout theme for 1949 and 1950.

Sanitation Held Important Factor In Pig's Growth

Spring pigs will reach market weight faster if they're farrowed on clean ground and fed in sanitary lots.

The American Foundation for Animal Health today cited tests which show that well cared for pigs reached a market weight of 210 pounds, a month earlier than pigs retarded by internal parasites.

The test also showed that clean ground raised pigs required a half pound less grain per pound of gain.

In addition to controlling parasites, the Foundation said, sanitary farrowing and feeding practices help prevent a number of infectious diseases and intestinal disorders which account for heavy pig losses every spring.

Other steps urged by the Foundation to produce a profitable spring pig crop include:

- (1) Installation of guard rails in farrowing houses to protect pigs against crushing.
- (2) Furnishing clean earth for the newborn animals, to provide them with iron.
- (3) Check rations against deficiencies of B-complex vitamins; prevent overeating of rich concentrates.
- (4) At the first sign of a disease outbreak, sick animals must be isolated and a prompt diagnosis obtained to make sure of the exact cause of the illness.
- (5) Pigs should be vaccinated against hog cholera and in certain areas against swine erysipelas.

John Cubs Roy Killingsworth and M. S. Cawley were formally initiated into the Cisco Lions Club in an impressive ceremony Wednesday as the feature of the weekly luncheon meeting. E. L. Jackson was in charge.

The initiation formed the basis for a talk on Lionism by Jackson, who reviewed some of the principles on which the club was built. He urged Lions to take advantage of these principles "in being worthwhile to our community." He told of accomplishments of the local club, particularly in providing needy children with eye glasses.

The club voted to donate \$25 to the March of Dimes drive which ends here at noon Saturday. The club had previously taken up a collection that totaled \$32.

Nurses, Electric Positions Open

The U. S. Civil Service has announced examinations for filling the following positions:

Staff nurse-student nurse, physicist, chemist, metallurgist, engineer, field representative (electrical utility management), and rural electrification engineer (distribution and transmission, electric power generation, farm electrification).

The staff nurse positions, which pay \$3,100 a year, are in the Indian Service of the Department of the Interior, located in the U. S., west of the Mississippi River, and in Alaska.

Student nurses are offered a nursing course by St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Washington, D. C. They are paid \$752 for three years, plus quarters, subsistence, laundry, and medical attention. To qualify, applicants must be high school graduates.

The physicist, chemist, metallurgist, and engineer jobs, paying \$3,100 a year, are located in National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics laboratories in Virginia, Ohio, and California. Applicants for these positions must pass a written test and must have had appropriate college education. The maximum age limit is 35 years.

Field representative and rural electrification engineer positions are in the Rural Electrification Administration, Dept. of Agriculture. These positions are in the field service throughout the U. S. Salaries range from \$4,600 to \$5,400.

Detailed information as well as application forms for the above examinations may be obtained from Sam B. King, the Civil Service Commission's local secretary, at the post office.

Women Work At Being Housewife

In Texas housewives today outnumber the women in all other roles combined, by a ratio of more than three to two.

This is the finding of a consumer research director, who is basing her calculations on the results of a nationwide study.

The research reveals that slightly more than 1,494,439 women in Texas over the age of 20 this year will manage homes as opposed to following other pursuits. They will constitute 65% of the 2,297,300 Texas females of adult years expected to be included in the 1950 census.

The Texas average of women engaged in homemaking, 65%, tops the national average of 61%. The percentage for the combined four-state west south central area — Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and Arkansas — is 68% for the 4,400,600 females in the area.

Also disclosed in the report is the fact that Texas women have achieved a current birth rate of 26.7 children per thousand and population. The highest rate in the area is that of Louisiana, which is 27.8.

Health Unit Is Formed In Fort Bend County

AUSTIN, Feb. 9.—Public health in Texas has received another boost with the February 1 formation of the Fort Bend County Public Health Unit.

State Health Officer George W. Cox, in announcing the commission of the Fort Bend Unit, said Dr. John R. Turner, a public health man of long experience in Texas and elsewhere, had been named as director. The budget is set up to include a director, a sanitarian, a public health nurse, and a clerk. Their operations will cover Fort Bend County in its entirety.

Texas now has 49 units, some of them serving more than one county. Altogether, 57 counties within the state have protection of full-time health units.

"We've come a long way toward our goal of raising the standard of public health in Texas to a high plane," Cox asserted. He cautioned, "But we've still a long road ahead of us."

Ideally, a local health unit is designed, according to Dr. Cox, to promote better health among Texans it serves by performing these functions:

1. By investigating causes of communicable diseases; and by tracking down, if possible, the source of the germ.
2. By teaching people, through meetings and personal visits how smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, and other diseases are spread, and how immunization and sanitation will prevent their spread.
3. By making studies of venereal diseases (mainly syphilis and gonorrhea), tuberculosis, poliomyelitis, etc., and providing for patient education concerning the illness affecting them.
4. By making home visits to expectant mothers referred by private physicians, and by holding well-child conferences designed to keep children in tip-top health.
5. By making periodic inspections of food-handling businesses, like dairies, slaughterhouses, grocery stores, and cafes, to make sure that the operators are sticking close to sanitation laws.

Plant Opens New Industry For Cisco Territory

The beginning of a new industry — extraction of the oil from peanuts — was underway in Cisco today, according to an announcement by the Cisco Peanut Company that their newly constructed peanut oil mill had begun trial operations.

Manager Zan Burroughs reported that one unit of the mill was in operation and that the other unit was expected to begin running Thursday or Friday. At least a tank car full of peanut oil was expected to be produced during the trial runs.

The mill, which will be capable of handling from 12 to 14 tons of shelled peanuts daily, is expected to begin full-time operations in about two weeks, providing sufficient peanut stock in available, Burroughs said. Once operations begin, the mill will run continuously — 24 hours a day.

In addition to peanuts purchased locally, Burroughs said it will be necessary to buy large quantities of peanuts from the government to keep the oil mill in operation. The company's shellers will process the peanuts for the oil mill.

After shelling, the nuts will be separated. The best nuts are sold whole to candy makers and others in the foods industry. Broken or "seconds" nuts go to the oil mill. Burroughs expects to market his oil for the present in San Antonio and in Louisiana.

The company will employ some six additional men in the oil mill. Thirteen men are required to run the shelling plant, which has a capacity of some 40 tons per day. The plant was built in 1945 and equipment is valued at about \$60,000.

Burroughs said the company hopes eventually to install machinery to make stock feed from the peanut pulp and a refinery to process the peanut oil.

Iwo Jima Movie Called Tribute To Marine Corps

The most striking scene is the raising of the Stars and Stripes, on a tiny atoll on the shores of Iwo Jima. This and every scene is alive with action and suspense portraying the inner struggles of the men who made the history on Iwo.

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40 YEARS OF SCOUTING

A "good turn" by an unidentified British Boy Scout in 1909 to an American business man who had lost his way in a London fog, led to the incorporation of the Boy Scouts of America in Washington, D. C., 40 years ago Wednesday, Feb. 8. The late William D. Boyce, Chicago publisher, was so impressed with the helpfulness of the British Boy Scout, who declined his tip for the "good turn," that he accompanied the Scout to the office of Sir (later Lord) Robert Baden-Powell, founder of Scouting, learned about the program, and brought a full trunk load of literature back to America. Later he incorporated the organization.

Thus the Boy Scouts of America observe the 40th anniversary. Although it began with a small membership in 1910 it caught on rapidly. By 1916 Boy Scouts had rolled up so creditable a record of service to their communities

self reliance, and kindred virtues." among the nation's top leaders a few years hence.

Today, the Boy Scouts, virtually a cross section of American life, are at the mid-point of a two-year crusade to "Strengthen the Arm of Liberty," by bringing a better Scouting program to more boys under better trained leaders. This worthy effort will have its climax in a great National Jamboree this summer, which will be held fittingly on historic ground — Valley Forge, Penna., where George Washington and his heroic Continental Army helped to lay the foundation for our Republic. 

The only time the anti-trust lawyers made damaging charges against A&P which were false. In the Washington bread case, the charges were proved false. The second time Federal Judge C. C. Wyche directed the jury to bring in a verdict of "not guilty."

He said to the anti-trust lawyers: "I studied this case from the very outset and my opinion there is no testimony from which it can reasonably be inferred that the defendants entered into any conspiracy to depress or lower the price of bread."

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The Dallas Anti-Trust Suit

In 1942 the anti-trust lawyers went out to Dallas, Texas, 1,400 miles from the homes of most of the defendants, and instigated criminal charges against A&P.

About this case one thing was sure.

Their previous experience did not deter the anti-trust lawyers from making more inflammatory and damaging allegations, just as they had done before.

They made practically the same allegations they are making today.

Federal Judge W. H. Atwell ruled that the case should not even be tried. He said that the indictment contained inflammatory statements that he would not permit to be presented to a jury.

Judge Atwell said to the anti-trust lawyers:

"If I thought I was presiding over a court and that I might have to sentence some person because he was a great big fellow, or because he was a Lilliputian, I would feel like resigning. God knows we don't want it ever to occur in America that the size is going to determine whether a man is guilty or innocent."

Judge Atwell also said to the anti-trust lawyers:

"If the indictment is not good then it is better to find out before an expensive trial than it is after an expensive trial. I do not think it is good, and thinking that, it is my duty to sustain the demurrers and motion to quash."

In short, Federal Judge Atwell threw the anti-trust lawyers and their case right out of his court.

So that makes three times that the anti-trust lawyers made damaging allegations against A&P. In two of these cases federal judges said they were all wrong. In the third case a federal judge said the indictment was inflammatory and he would not even permit the case to be tried.

The anti-trust lawyers were not satisfied with the Dallas decision. Neither were they satisfied with the two other decisions in which federal courts administered stinging rebukes to them.

They were still determined to destroy A&P.
