New Cigarette Tax Hike Becomes Effective Wednesday In All Texas

Today was the last day that Texas smokers could buy cigarettes without paying the new penny a pack tax.

The tax becomes effective on Wednesday, March 1. The new tax, passed by the special session of the Legislature provides for a 33 1-3% increase on cigarettes.

Dee Bland, state tax supervisor with offices in Abilene, Monday received the final information on the new tax bill from Robert S. Calvert, comptroller. Bland pointed out that the tax becomes effective for wholesalers, retailers, and distributors Wednesday.

"Every retail dealer and each wholesaler having cigarettes to which stamps of the old denominations are affixed in quantities of 2,000 or more on March 1 shall immediately inventory his stock and file a report of such inventory to the comptroller, Robert S. Calvert," Bland said.

Life Expectation Shows Increase

The expectation of life at birth among American wage-earners and their families reached an all-time high of 67.8 years in 1949, an increase of about .6 of a year from 1948, according to the statisticians for an insurance company. It was the sixth year in succession to show a gain.

This is based upon the company's experience with its millions of industrial policyholders who are a large sample of the wage-earner population. Because of the marked improvement in mortality, these wage earners now enjoy life expectancy equal to that of the nation as a whole, whereas in 1911 their expectancy was six years less than that of the general population.

The 1949 death rate of 6.4 per 1,000 for the insured group was the lowest on record, 14 percent lower than it was 10 years ago, and only one half of the death rate recorded for 1911.

Health conditions in 1949 were generally favorable, the statisticians report. Neither the heat wave in mid-summer nor the epidemic of acute poliomyelitis materially affected the mortality as a whole.

Important factors in the improved mortality have been the sharp drop in pneumonia deaths in recent years and the long-term decline in tuberculosis deaths.

Contract Let On Baird Creek Dam

Callahan County water control and improvement District No. 1 granted a contract for construction of a dam on Mexia Creek, a mile and a half from Baird, to J. W. Mosley of Grapevine, it was reported here today.

Lee Loper, secretary of the water board, said that Mosley's bid was for \$128,075 and called for 75 working days. Nine other contractors also submitted bids to the water board.

Contract let by the water board is for construction of the dam only, Loper said. City officials will let contracts for the pipe line.

Travis Parmer Is Candidate For School Trustee

Travis Parmer, resident of the Friendship Community, authorized The Press today to announce that he is a candidate for election to the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District. The election will be held April 1.

Mr. Parmer, who is 35 years of age, has one child in high school here. He served three terms on the board of trustees of the Friendship Community before that district became a part of the Cisco district.

A resident of the district for 32 years, he has been a farmer for 18 years and owns 640 acres of land. He lives four miles west of Cisco.

All That's Said About Texas Is True, Story Says

According to Stanley Walker, noted author and native Texan, everything that's said about Texas is true. In the March issue of Harper's Magazine, Walker confesses that "much depends on the eyes with which one sees Texas," but that if you look far enough you can find almost anything. The state's diversity is more significant than its colossal size, he says, pointing to the contrasts in people as well as in sections of the state.

To compare an eroded farm in the East Texas piney woods, he continues, with a prosperous West Texas Hereford ranch is to compare different worlds. Yet both are Texas. Likewise, the differences in the inhabitants of these two worlds makes for a heterogeneous quality that is hard to beat.

Culturally, Walker says, Texas is making strides. In previous years most of its troubles including the lack of culture, have been due to poverty. Today the state is solvent and booming. It can now afford new schools, good roads, state institutions and ventures into the arts. Walker declares that Texas is essentially conservative, mild mannered, quiet and cautious, and that native sons who make spectacles of themselves when visiting in foreign parts are by no means heroes. The modern Texan respects protocol, wants to do the correct thing and is alarmed by breaches of etiquette.

Included in the article are many anecdotes about Texas, one of the most famous of which is about the man who after much enthusiastic praise of the wonders of the state ended by saying, "All Texas needs is more water and a little better class of people." To which a friend replied, "Why, man, that's all hell needs."

Three Cisco High School students suffered injuries as the pickup truck in which they were riding overturned on a curve just east of the Joy Drive-In on Highway 80 at 9 p. m. Sunday night.

Two other youths, R. W. McCauley, Jr., 14, and James Ray Thurman, 14, were in the truck but sustained only minor cuts and bruises.

Gallagher was taken to Fort Worth today for the attention of bone specialists. Tabor remained in Graham hospital where further medical examination was being made of his back injury.

Waddell, who was hospitalized here, was expected to be released today. McCauley and Thurman were not hospitalized.

The boys were enroute to Eastland at the time of the accident. State Highway Patrolman Oscar Avery of Eastland investigated the mishap and said the driver apparently lost control of the truck.

LONE STAR TO SEEK CADDO OIL IN DENNISON; PLAN NEW WELL

Lone Star Producing Co. is expected to seek oil in the Caddo line in their J. W. Dennison No. 1, wildcat oil test five miles southwest of Cisco, after a failure in lower formations, it was reported today. The Caddo test was expected Wednesday.

Testing the Ranger formation, a drill stem test after perforation resulted in a small gas show with considerable salt water. Workmen were squeezing off the water for further testing. Perforation was at 3,600 feet.

Lone Star was moving in today to begin drilling in the near future on their No. 1 Calloway, 11 miles north of Cisco in the Caddo pool. The new test is an offset to the No. 1 Calloway recently plugged.

The No. 1 Calloway was an Ellenburger producer for several months before being abandoned due to excessive water. Nearby wells produce from the Caddo. The No. 8 is expected to seek Caddo production initially.

Two miles southeast of Cisco, the Johnston No. 1 Eppler was awaiting further completion work after a cementing job due to a hole in the casing caused when wedged tools were pulled free.

The cement plug was expected to be drilled in the next day

Cisco citizens were watching with considerable interest today as Eastland voters decided the parking meter question. Voters there began marking ballots at 8 a. m. and the polls were slated to remain open until 7 p. m.

Both supporters and opponents of the meters were busy in Eastland during the past week. Eastland newspapers carried considerable advertising from both sides.

Eastland business men regarded the fact that Cisco has called an election for April 4 as a "complication." They raised these points:

1. If Eastland votes out its meters, Cisco will almost surely follow suit.

2. If Eastland keeps its meters, Cisco will be encouraged to keep its meters.

3. If Eastland keeps its meters and Cisco votes out its meters a new agitation almost surely will arise there to get them out.

Meanwhile, Ranger apparently was sitting on the sidelines watching the battles rage.

Most of the agitation to vote the meters out in Eastland came from business men who felt that they were harmful to business, it was understood.

So far, there has been little activity for or against the meters in Cisco. Outcome of the Eastland election, particularly if the meters are voted out, will doubtless have some influence on the Cisco vote in April.

It was generally conceded that "Cisco is watching the Eastland election with interest."

Foreign Service Workers Sought By Federal Body

Foreign Service stenographers and code clerks are being recruited in Dallas for overseas employment with the Dept. of State. Representatives of the Dept. of State will be in Dallas from February 27 through 4th March interviewing men and women for these positions. Stenographers employed in these positions are required to take dictation at 100 words per minute and to type at 50 words per minute. Code clerks should have a minimum typing speed of 45 words and should have had previous cryptographic experience.

Candidates for these positions must be between the ages of 21 and 35 years, single, and must have been American citizens for at least five years. Applicants must be willing to accept assignment to any foreign post. A rigid physical examination will be given persons selected since living conditions may be in some foreign assignments extremely difficult.

The salary for these positions is \$2850 per annum plus customary allowances. Travel expenses are paid for persons appointed to these positions, from their residence to the assigned post in a foreign country. Persons selected for the positions will be required to serve abroad for a continuous period of at least two years before becoming eligible for home leave. After two years service, 60 days annual leave may be taken in the U. S. and travel expenses to home and return is paid by the State Dept. A liberal retirement plan covers all members of the Foreign Service.

Persons desiring further information concerning the positions should contact Mrs. Grace Greife or Miss Sari Joan Houston who will interview and test applicants for these positions at the Adolphus Hotel in Dallas from February 27 through March 4.
