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Letters

Editor: Neither Communism nor Democracy exists on the earth today. It is true that we have two very undesirable systems—Sovietism and Americanism, dominating the earth today. Does any thinking American doubt that American citizens are in bondage just as completely as are the peoples of the Soviet Union? When I hear supposedly intelligent Americans bleating about our Economic System providing a higher standard of living for a greater majority than any other known system, I think of Bill Smith whipping his wife with trace chains while Tom Jones whipped his wife with rawhide thongs, and Tom was extolled as an ideal husband while Bill was ridiculed as a beast. To use some of my Tennessee hillbilly phraseology—Why do otherwise seemingly intelligent Americans waste their time bating the air about Communism while the devil has the world by the tail and a downhill pull? And, to use a scriptural phrase—Why do we not cast the beam out of our own eye so that we can see clearly how to pick the mote out of the eye of the Soviet Union? We boast of our educational advantages and our high culture and supinely submit ourselves

to be bound in slavery by the most unjust and damnable monetary (sic) system the world has ever known.

To use the language of the street, if we Americans had half mule sense and one eye, we ought to see that we are driving at breakneck speed to the diminution bowwows.

All right, I'll accept the challenge. What is the first thing we should do? Change our Monetary System and Banking Laws to a system fair to all our Citizens. The whole of our circulating medium should stem from the people as a whole—the Government. Our Banking System should be made a Civil Service Commission of the Government. The value of our dollar should be predicated upon our national Products at parity prices, so that its purchasing power would remain the same. What about our National Debt? Turnover F. it to somebody, they should have that privilege, but no person should be allowed to draw out his neighbor's money and loan it to anybody.

If more loan money is required, the Government should loan it from the community funds—the public and charge a reasonable interest, using that interest in defraying expenses of the Government. Of course, proper restrictions should be placed on those in charge of the Loan Department. Any obligation of Government, of whatever nature would be liquidated by a deposit slip in the Bank of the Government, subject to check. Now, what is the next step?

Swap our outmoded oxcart of exploitation and competition for a streamlined train of cooperation, and bury our Individualism in the Commandment—"Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." THEN, we will have PEACE AND FORTUNITY. W. I. GHORMLEY

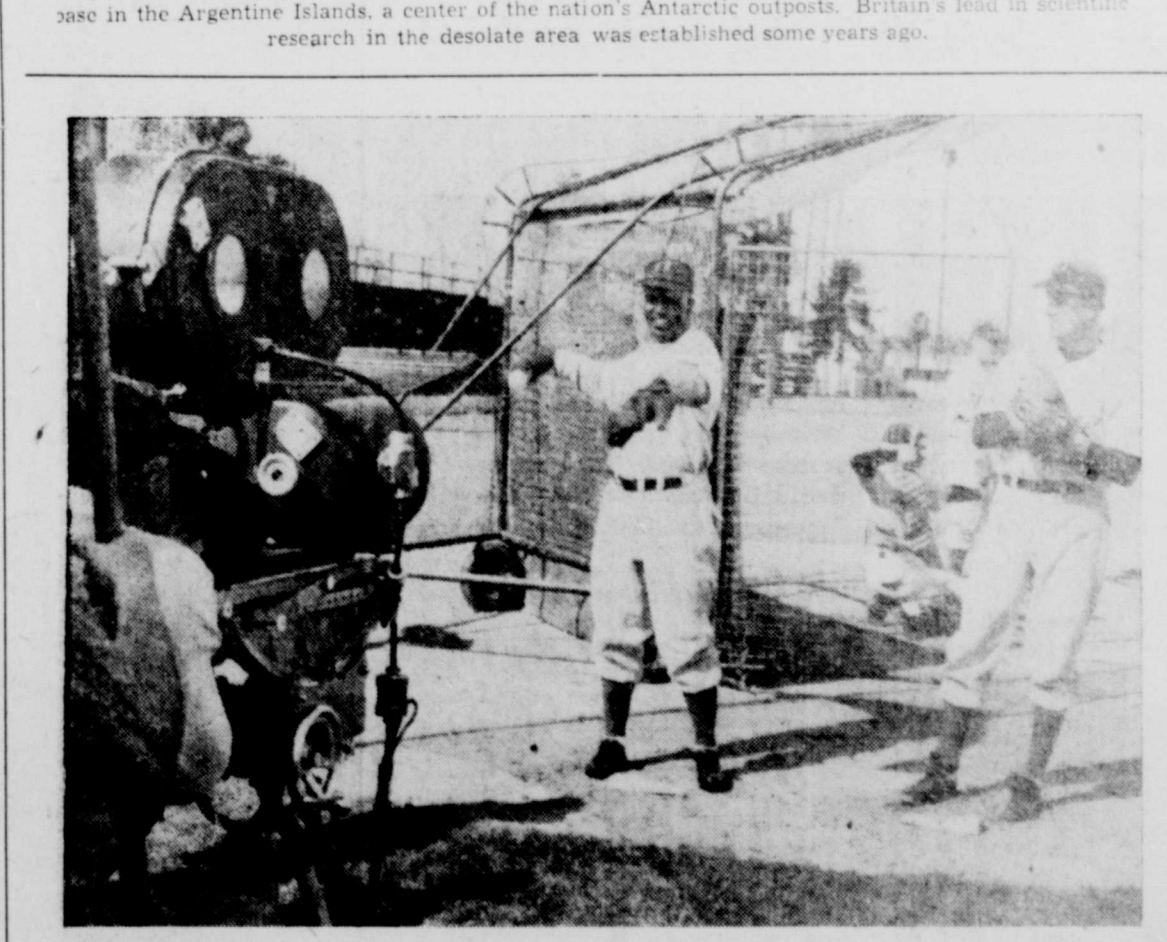

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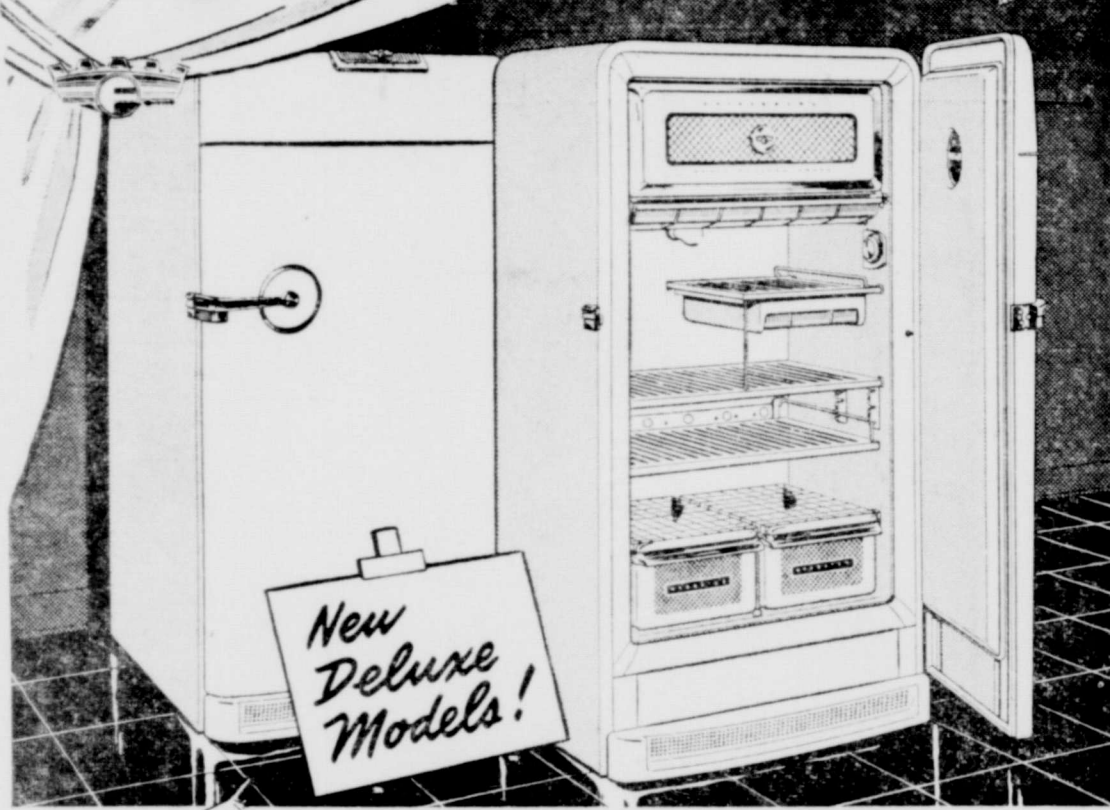
