

## RED CROSS DRIVE FUNDS TOTAL \$1,100; COMPLETION IS URGED

Approximately \$1,100 in Red Cross roll call funds had been turned in to Chairman Mrs. Lucile Huffmyer and Treasurer James P. McCracken today as workers continued the drive toward a \$3,000 quota.

Mrs. Huffmyer believed that the city's quota would be completed when all business district committees finish their work and the city school drive results are turned in.

"Our workers are doing a thorough job," Mrs. Huffmyer said. "The general committee is confident that Cisco's quota will be met as soon as final reports are in. We would appreciate completing the job in the near future." Eastland County's quota was \$5,000 with half of its funds to remain in the county for use in local work.

## More Education On VD Urged By Health Officer

AUSTIN, March 16—The more than 2,000 cases of syphilis and 3,000 cases of gonorrhea reported throughout the state since the first of the year signifies the pressing need for continuing public education in the matters of venereal disease, Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, believes.

Dr. Cox appealed for state-wide participation in making "Better Health for Texans" a year-long program. A "Better Health for Texans Week" was officially designated by Governor Allan Shivers last December.

Cox said the response of the public, the press, radio, motion picture theaters, television, and other agencies and individuals during the campaign was excellent.

"But," he said, "the continued stress in reducing the incidence of VD requires the full support of all the public."

The veteran of more than 13 years as state health officer and his department was continuing an "intensified" campaign against venereal infections through all media of mass education—newspapers, radio, feature magazines, and talks to luncheon clubs and civic organizations.

"We've even gone into television to carry our VD warning to the people," Cox asserted. He said his division of public health education had recently produced a color film and a motion picture trailer which were available to loan to television stations through local health agencies.

He said any organization desiring informational pamphlets, posters, and prepared speeches on the subject of VD could get them by writing to the State Department of Health, Austin.

## Water Report Is Sent To National Agency For Study

ABILENE, March 17—A report seeking national acceptance of a proposal that "inadequate municipal water be recognized as a menace to the national welfare and that domestic water be given first use priority and established as a criterion for Federal dam building" has received final approval of the officers and Municipal Water Rights Committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the West Texas Domestic Water Association and was mailed this week to President Truman's new Water Resources Policy Commission.

J. M. Willson, Floydada, president of the WTCC, and Homer D. Grant, Lubbock, president of the WTDWA, indicated jointly had compiled the report at the request of Morris L. Cooke, chairman of the Water Resources Policy Commission. Cooke had addressed a personal request to Willson and Grant early in February for "recommendations on a unified program for maximum use of the water resources of the West Texas region."

An amendment and addition to the Federal Flood Control Act of 1936, patterned after the basic law, is also proposed in the WTCC-WTDWA recommendation which would direct "that the several Federal agencies to which are delegated water development functions on the rivers of the United States shall hereafter conserve and utilize such waters in the following order of priority: first, for domestic and industrial uses; second, for irrigation; third, for flood control; fourth, for navigation; fifth, as a by-product and subordinate to all other uses, for generation of electric power; and providing that the accruing benefits shall exceed the total cost."

The WTCC-WTDWA report and recommendation are based on exhaustive studies made in recent months of the problem on developing municipal water. The recommendation is companion to the findings of the Hoover Commission studies which point out needs for better payable returns on government-financed water projects and the possibility of a greater conservation and utilization of water through a greater upstream development of smaller dams. A majority of the Commission definitely recommended that domestic water be given the first use priority on all federal-financed water projects.

Among detailed sections of the report and recommendation, it is stated that "on domestic water need the overall fact is that of the 300 communities in West Texas, there are less than half a dozen cities which have an adequate domestic water supply and perhaps only two cities in the entire area, namely, San Angelo and Fort Worth, have a sufficient supply to attract industry."

## Johnston Prepares To Drill Another Well East Of City

McElroy Ranch Company was hopeful today that an acidizing operation would make an oil well out of their No. 1 W. A. Ramsey, wildcat oil test in Callahan County some eight miles west of Cisco.

Cemented in the Caddo lime formation, tubing was run in the hole Thursday and, after swabbing operations, gas appeared at the rate of about half a million feet with an oil show without acidizing.

McElroy has moved their drilling rig seven miles northwest to drill a wildcat test in the north half of Section 62, Lunatic Asylum Survey.

## East of Cisco

East of Cisco some two miles, E. C. Johnston was preparing to drill a new hole near one that had to be plugged recently after trouble ruined the casing and never could be repaired. Blackstock Drilling Company was moving in this week for the operation.

Johnston's lease offsets Lake Sand production brought in some three months ago by Hickok Producing Company.

## Bankline Test Spuds

Some five miles east of Cisco, Bankline Oil Company spudded in Thursday in their No. 1 Mrs. Briggs Owens, a wildcat test. C. H. Choate, Cisco drilling contractor, has the contract.

Surface pipe was set early this week and drilling was at 312 feet with rotary equipment early today. Projected depth is 4,200 feet to test the Ellenburger. Location is in Section 46, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

## Dennison Shut In

Lone Star Producing Company's No. 1 J. W. Dennison, five miles southwest of Cisco, has been shut in. It was reported today. Completion of a gasser, Lone Star had no outlet for the gas. Some four miles of pipe line would have been required to utilize the gas.

Lone Star has indicated that the well definitely will not be abandoned and that they will eventually do something with it.

## No. 8 Calloway

North of Cisco, Lone Star was drilling at 2,433 feet early today in their No. 8 Calloway, a Caddo pool test. Operators expect to top the Caddo around 3,200 feet. If good production is found in the Caddo, Lone Star is not expected to drill deeper.

LEGAL NOTICE

RODENT CONTROL ORDINANCE, CITY OF CISCO, 1950

An ordinance to provide for the protection of the public health by controlling or preventing the spread of rat-borne diseases and infections by the elimination of insanitary conditions associated with such diseases, by the extermination of rats, and by ratproofing of structures and maintenance thereof in a rat-proof condition.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

Section 1. That for the purposes of this ordinance the following definitions shall apply:

The term "business buildings," either vacant or occupied, shall mean any structure, whether public or private, that is adapted for occupancy for trans-

action of business, for rendering of professional service, for amusement, for the display, sale or storage of goods, wares, or merchandise, or for the performance of work or labor, including hotels, apartments, buildings, tenement houses, rooming houses, office buildings, public buildings, stores, theaters, markets, restaurants, grain elevators, abattoirs, warehouses, workshops, factories, and all outhouses, sheds, barns, and other structures on premises.

The term "ratproofing" as used herein applies to a form of construction to prevent the ingress of rats into business buildings from the exterior or from one business building or establishment to another. It consists essentially of treatment with material, impervious to rat gnawing, all actual or potential open-

ings, in exterior walls, ground or other floors, basements, roof and foundations, that may be reached by rats from the ground by climbing or by burrowing.

The term "rat eradication" shall mean the elimination or extermination of rats within buildings by any or all of the accepted measures, such as: poisoning, fumigating, trapping, or other methods deemed necessary.

The term "Health Officer" as used herein means the Superintendent, Commissioner or Director of Health or any duly authorized representative.

The term "owner" shall mean the actual owner, agent, or custodian of the business building, whether individual, partnership, or corporation. The lessee shall be construed as the "owner" for the purpose of this ordinance when business buildings agreements hold the lessee responsible for maintenance and repairs.

The term "occupant" as used herein shall mean the individual, partnership, or corporation that uses or occupies any business building or part or fraction thereof, whether the actual owner or tenant. In the case of vacant business buildings or vacant portions thereof, the owner, agent, or custodian shall have the responsibility as occupant. Section 2. That it is hereby ordained that required that all business buildings in the City of Cisco shall be ratproofed, freed of rats, and maintained in a rat proof and rat-free condition to the satisfaction of the Health Officer.

Section 9. That it shall be unlawful under the provisions of

this ordinance for the occupant, owner, contractor, public utility company, plumber or any other person to remove and fail to restore in like condition the ratproofing from any business building for any purpose. Further, that it shall be unlawful for any person or agent to make any new openings that are not closed or sealed against the entrance of rats.

Section 10. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation hereafter to construct, repair, or remodel any buildings, dwellings, stable or market, or other structure whatsoever, unless such construction, repair, remodeling or installation shall render the building or other structure rat-proof, in accordance with the regulations prescribed herein and hereunder. The provisions of this Section apply only to such construction, repairs, remodeling or installation as affect the ratproof condition of any building or other structure.

Section 11. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation hereafter to occupy any new or existing business buildings wherein foodstuffs are to be stored, kept and handled, sold, held or offered for sale without complying with Section 10, of this ordinance; and unless provisions of this Section are complied with, no city permit or license to conduct or carry on such business as defined above will be issued.

Section 12. That all food and feed within the City of Cisco for feeding chickens, cows, pigs, horses, and other animals, shall be stored in a rat-free and ratproof building.

Section 13. That within the corporate limits of the City of Cisco all garbage or refuse consisting of waste animal or vegetable matter upon which rats may feed, and all small dead animals, shall be placed and stored until collected in covered metal containers of a type prescribed by the Health Officer. It is further declared unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to dump or place on any premise, land or water way, any dead animals, or any waste vegetable or animal matter of any kind.

Section 15. That it shall be unlawful for any person to permit to accumulate on any premise, improved or vacant, or on any open lot or alley in the City of Cisco any lumber, boxes, barrels, bottles, cans, containers, or similar materials, that may be permitted to remain thereon unless same shall be placed on open racks that are elevated not less than eighteen (18") inches above the ground, and evenly piled or stacked.

Section 16. PENALTY: Any person, firm, or corporation who shall violate any provision or provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than One hundred & no 100 dollars (\$100.00) or imprisonment of not more than 10 days or both. Each day's violation shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 19. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage, the matter being one of

urgency and necessity and the public welfare requiring it.

PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED on this the 14th day of February 1950.

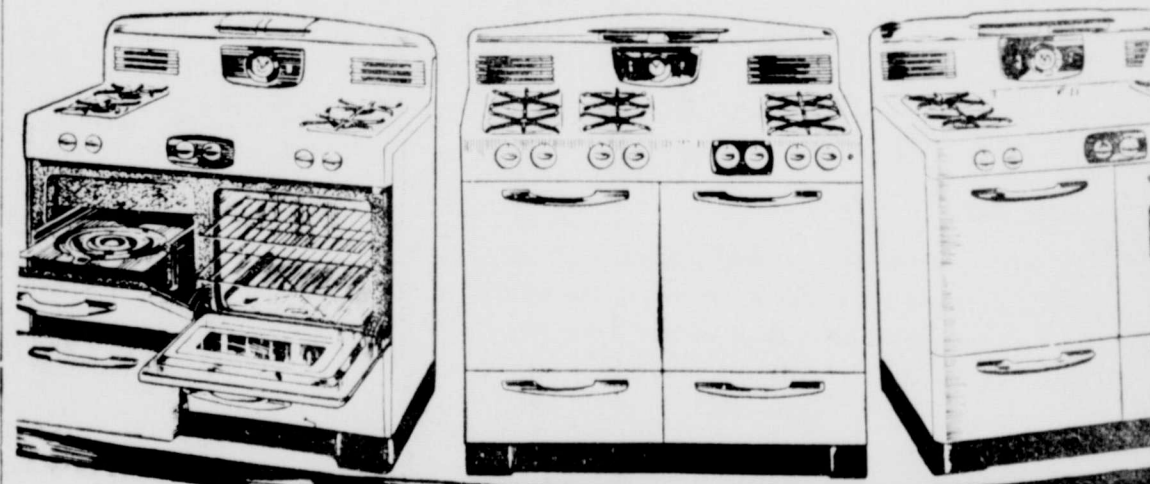
