

He talked of the possibilities of universal destruction in the use of Hydrogen power if it got out of control and explained the difficulty of harnessing the power. He stated that the Hydroger bomb would not be possible without the Atom bomb because the Atom Bomb was the only known thing with heat and pow er enough to detonate the H-
