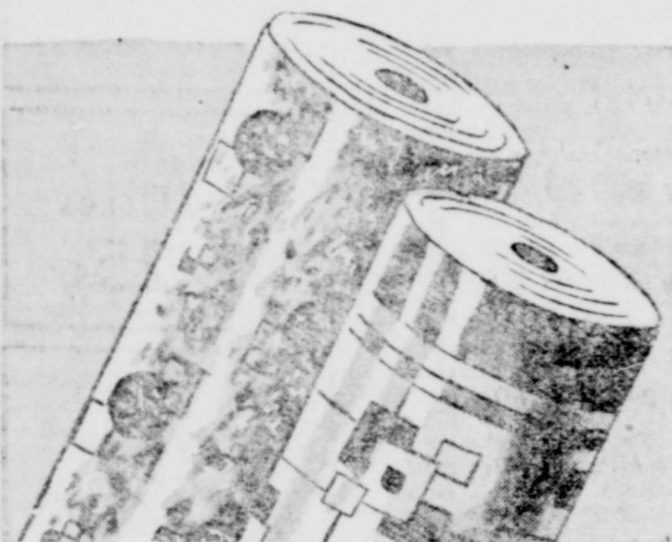

Old Age Assistant Checks Cut 50 Cents

AUSTIN, March 25 — Old age aid to the needy payments will be cut 50 cents below the authorized amount for each person for April.

Reduction of payments was announced the past week end by

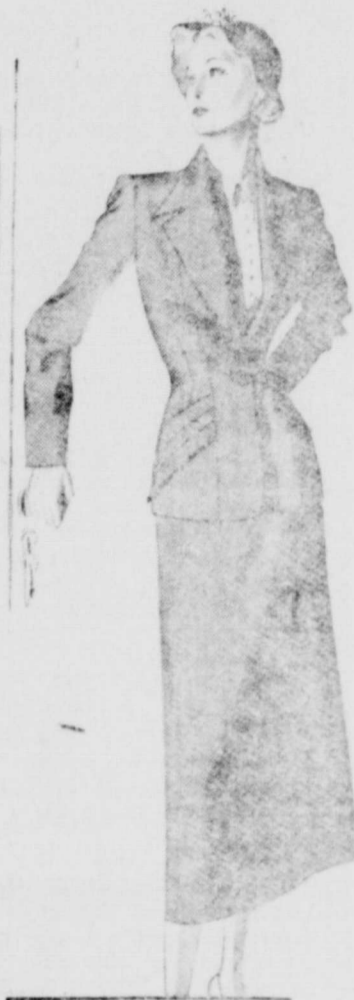
John Winters, director of the State Dept. of Public Welfare. This means that if a person is now authorized to receive \$49 per month, his April check will be only \$39.50, Winters explained.

It will be the first time old age grants have been less than the full authorized amount since September, 1949, and the first time that aid to the needy blind ever has been cut.

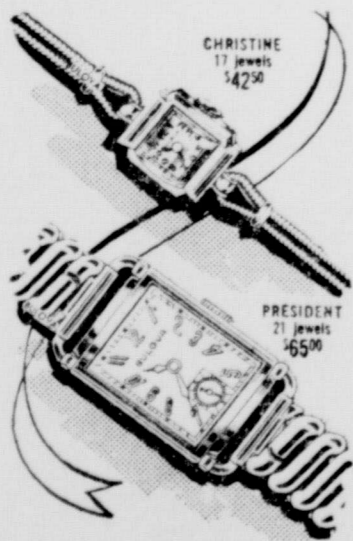

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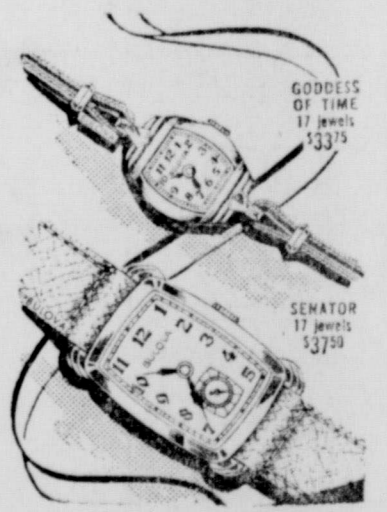
