DON'T FORGET to get your chest x-ray at the West Texas Utilities Company Friday and Saturday and next Tuesday and Wednesday. Two machines are being operated in an anti-tuberculosis drive. It's all free and everybody over 15 years old has been urged to get their chest picture made.

DID YOU EVER stop to think what crime costs this country? We don't know how much in dollars and cents, but it's tremendous. A recent report by the FBI shows that there were 1,763,290 major crimes committed in the United States in 1949.

A major crime was committed every 18 seconds. In an average day, 1,100 places were burglarized; 293 persons were feloniously killed or assaulted. There were 162 robberies; 2,800 other thefts; and 440 cars stolen.

Crime in 1949 was 4.5% above 1948. In rural areas there was an increase of 8.5% and a 4.2% increase in urban communities.

Declines were noted in murder, negligent manslaughter and auto thefts in both urban and rural areas. Most other crimes increased.

The FBI examined 792,029 fingerprint arrest records in 1949. This was 4.3% more than in the previous year.

More than 41% of the arrest records examined were for major violations. Those charged with murder, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny and auto theft constituted 27.7% of the total.

Youth played a predominant part in crimes against property; 27.4% of the persons charged with robbery, embezzlement, burglary, larceny, auto theft, fraud, forgery, counterfeiting, receiving stolen property, and arson were less than 21 years old.

The predominant age among persons arrested was 21. Just think of the money the taxpayers would save if people would be people and not criminals. Read the other day where the Texas prison system was happy because it had accomplished a great deal by lowering the daily cost of the prisoner's upkeep. At the same time the prisoners were getting more for our money.

It's hard to understand how people figure they can be criminals and get away with it.

### Sanitary Methods In Food Handling Urged By Officer

AUSTIN, March 30 — The Texas State Department of Health's program of teaching the food handlers sanitary methods of preparing and serving food continues to be very popular, according to Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer.

It is one method of attack on that great group of respiratory diseases which include influenza, scarlet fever, measles, whooping cough, and the common cold, the viruses of which are spread from person to person by the excretions of the nose and mouth.

Restaurant sanitation programs have become more necessary because of changes which have taken place in our national eating habits. Once it was customary for most people in Texas and in the U. S. to eat three meals a day at their own table. "Eat out" was an unusual and exciting event. Now, all the family, including the baby, eat out.

In this constant mingling of people to eat and drink there exists a vast and complicated arrangement perfectly designed for exchange of saliva via cups, glasses, spoons, forks, and fingers that go in and out of millions of mouths. There are few hours of the day in any community when these vectors of respiratory and other diseases are not busy.

The prime purpose of restaurant sanitation is to have all dishes and utensils sterilized and to have those who handle or serve food understand and practice restaurant sanitation every day and all the time.

The public in every community needs to be concerned about the cleanliness of its public eating places. You can help by demanding cleanliness in the places where you eat.

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Voters of the Cisco Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday and elect three trustees to serve two-year terms. The Fire Station in Cisco will be the only polling place, and voters may cast ballots from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Although some 2,000 residents of the large school district are eligible to vote, observers have forecast a comparatively light vote.

The names of six men will appear on the ballot, in this order: Travis Parmer, W. C. Hogue, Ronald Rhodes, G. R. Nance, Wallace Smith and Homer Ferguson. Of the group, Hogue, Nance, and Ferguson are up for re-election.

O. W. Kean has been named presiding judge with H. A. McCantles, Mrs. C. S. Surles, and J. B. Hagan as clerks. Eligible to vote are all residents of the school district — Cisco and the common district added during the past year — who have poll tax receipts, exemptions, or who have passed the age of 60.

Only 13 absentee ballots were cast in the election. Hold-over members of the school board are Norman Huston, Wesley Smith, J. L. Thornton, and Dr. Paul Woods.

### Local Track Team Enters In Relays

Coach Jack Everett and some 12 members of the Cisco High School track team left Friday for Graham where they are entered in the Possum Kingdom Relays. Everett was pessimistic about the chances of his squad since members have not worked out since fire destroyed all the equipment Tuesday night. The coach went to Dallas Wednesday to purchase new track supplies to wind up the season.

He reported that plans were being formulated to keep up the physical education classes despite the loss of the gymnasium. The classes will be shifted to outside activities as soon as possible. Included in the work will be touch football, soccer, volleyball, track and others.

Basketball will be continued in the old high school gym in the basement of the school following the dismissal of classes in the afternoon.

## INSURANCE COMPANIES READY TO PAY OFF IN FULL IN GYM FIRE

Adjusters for insurance companies notified Cisco school trustees today that they were ready to pay off the full \$50,000 on the Community Gym that was destroyed by fire here Tuesday night. The insurance had been placed with several companies.

Abilene adjusters told W. C. Hogue, board member, that they were convinced the loss would exceed that amount and that they were recommending settlement on

the full face value of the policies. Hogue and Board Members Wesley Smith and Homer Ferguson, appointed as a building committee, inspected a steel and masonry gymnasium at Miles, near San Angelo, Thursday. They were accompanied by Arlin Birt, O. L. Stamey, Coach Buck Overall, and Edward Lee.

President G. R. Nance of the board said the committee was told that a similar building could be erected here for some \$40,000 — cost of the Miles gym. It is a concrete type building with a masonry front.

Nance said the local board will continue studying the situation before making a decision regarding the type of building to be erected. The board voted Wednesday to replace the destroyed structure in the best way possible.

Free gravel for use in a new building was offered to the board by W. B. Starr, resident of the Dan Horn community, Nance said. He added that an electrical contractor has volunteered to handle the wiring work on a new building at cost.

"The board genuinely appreciates these and other expressions of desire to help with a new building," Nance said. "As soon as we know what we can do, we will let everyone know how they can be of assistance."

## Census To Seek Poultry Figures

The United States Bureau of the Census will ask farmers in Eastland County about the number and kind of poultry on their farms as a part of the 1950 Census of Agriculture to be taken in April. Poultry and eggs sold and poultry raised on farms will be reported for the calendar year 1949.

Every decade since 1840 and every five years since 1920, the Bureau of the Census has collected information about farms and farm production. More than 3.4 million farms reported poultry or poultry products sold in 1944 totaling more than \$1 1/2 billion according to the 1945 agricultural census. In 1945, there were 274,504 poultry farms having sales of poultry and poultry products in 1944 exceeding \$770 million or an average of \$2,800 per farm.

Farmers raised 971 million chickens in 1944 which had a total value of \$1,005,759,731. Chicken eggs produced on farms in 1944 amounted to 3,370,577 dozen.

## Control Of Pests Not Easy, But A Clean City Helps

AUSTIN, March 29 — "There is no easy road to the abatement of insects and rodents," says Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer. Frequently people get enthusiastic about the destruction of the insects and believe that if an airplane fly over the town, or a huge fogging machine roll through town spreading an insecticide, the insects will be instantly killed and peace from the nuisance remain forever. This is erroneous and unfortunate, for it creates an unwarranted sense of security, says Dr. Cox.

Before any killing is anticipated, a thorough cleanup of the community should be effected. This means cleaning up the rubbish and garbage and eliminating all insect feeding and breeding places. It might mean the drainage or filling in of wet areas for destruction of the mosquito larvae. When this is done, one will be surprised, according to the health officer, at how few insects will be left to become a nuisance and, perhaps, a public health menace.

Following this, it is suggested that insecticides be sprayed by hand in those places inhabited by the insects. Experience has shown that a 2% to 5% solution of DDT is still the most effective insecticide to use for general sanitation. This is spread to form a thin coat on the surface, where it can remain for future destruction. A spray that will just moisten the surface is sufficient to be effective. Spray only those areas where insects are known to gather, the State Health Department advises.

The revival series will come to a close April 16.

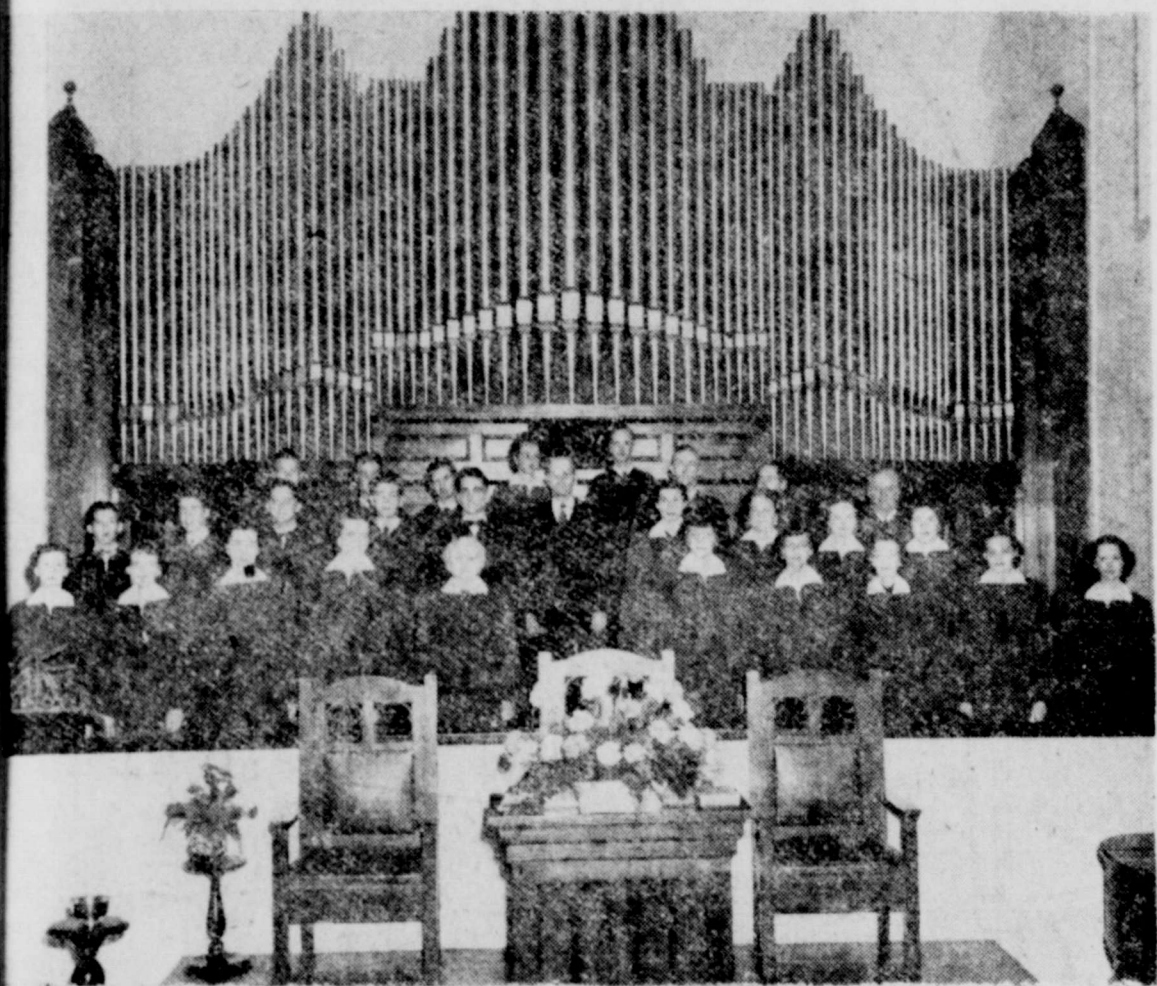
### Methodist Revival To Close Sunday

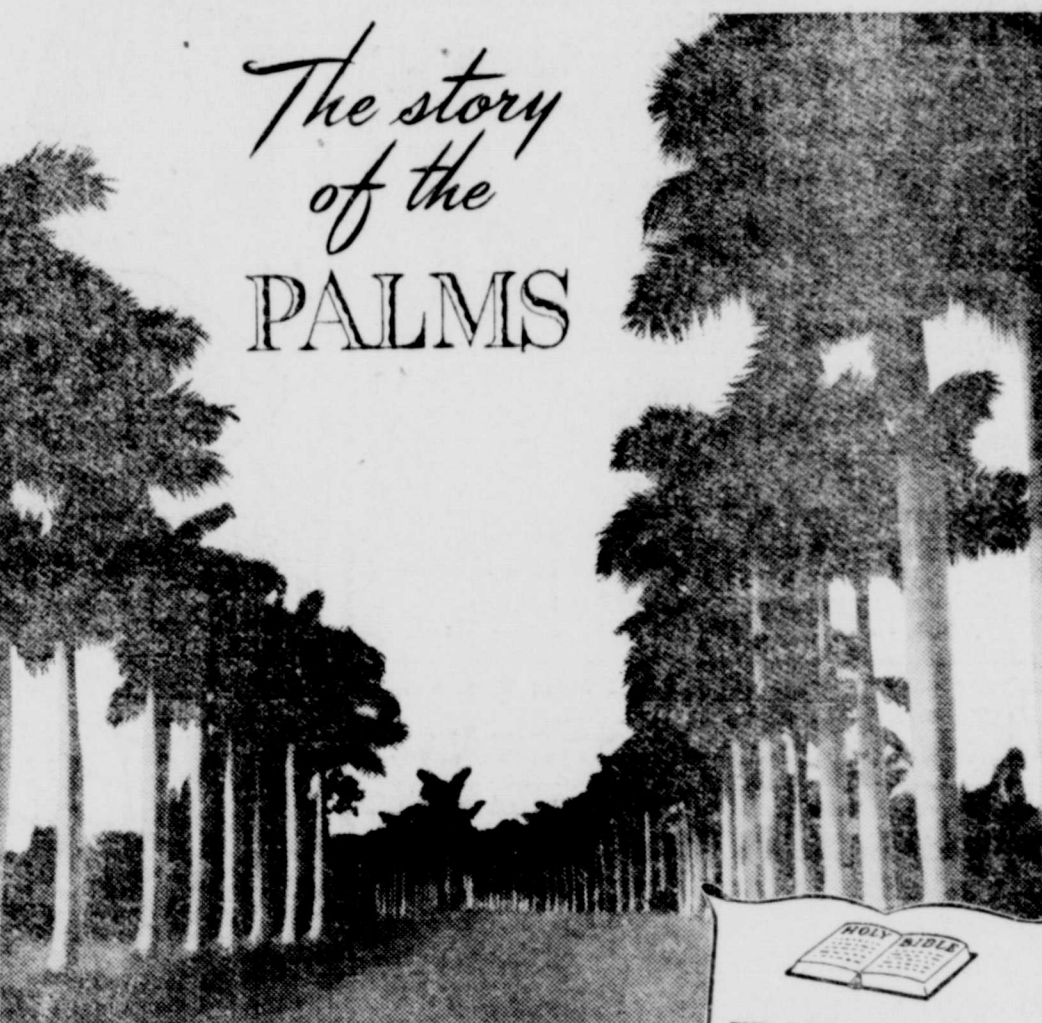

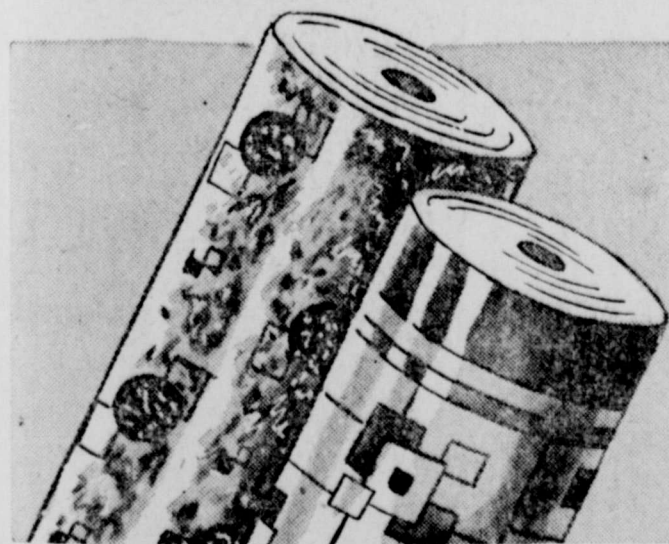

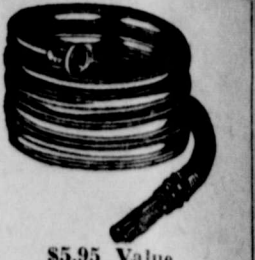
