Parmer, Nance and Rhodes Win In School Elections; 769 Votes Cast

Poll Shows Most People For A & P

Four out of every five persons who have formed an opinion on the anti-trust case against the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company favor the food chain, Elmo Roper, public opinion analyst, reported today.

"Among those who say they have read about the A&P case, the A&P has won their sympathies by a four to one margin," Roper said. A Roper poll disclosed less than 15% of informed people favor the action to break up A&P.

Another nationwide poll, made last fall, indicated the ratio of people that had an opinion on the same issue at that time was two to one in favor of A&P. Roper said, "Clearly, at this point, the A&P has won the battle of public opinion in the anti-trust case."

"Interestingly enough," Roper said, "we found more women than men were sympathetic to A&P."

Peanut Acreage Bill Signed To Benefit Growers

Signing of controversial cotton and peanut planting bill by President Truman, announced Friday at Key West, Florida, will put \$500,000 in the pockets of Eastland County farmers, business leaders here believed Saturday.

The measure restores for Texas 100,000 peanut acres that had been previously cut off. The increase for cotton will not have any material local effect, it was said, since this country raises very little cotton.

Since Eastland County is the state's second leading peanut county, the local share of 100,000 acres will be large. The increased acreage will be supported in price and it was understood that the harvest would go into peanut oil stock.

Local Boy's Ship In War Games

There are six candidates for the city council. The ballot contains the following names: C. H. (Cliff) Jones, J. W. Slaughter, Joe Britain, Dr. Hugh Chief Brown, O. J. Brown, and James L. Stafford.

Stafford and Dr. Brown are running for reelection. O. O. Odom, whose term expires, did not seek reelection. Holdover members are: James P. McCracken, Don Rupe, and Mayor G. C. Rosenthal.

The election will be held at the city hall from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Fred Grist has been named election judge. Clerks are Mrs. R. B. Carswell, W. W. Fewell, O. J. Russell, Lee Mahaney, Mrs. James Flournoy, and Otto Kean.

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TAXES THAT REDUCE EMPLOYMENT

In a recent issue Collier's published a dramatic double-page spread denouncing repeal of the wartime excise taxes on commodities and services. It showed just how these taxes burden the consumer. And the point was that these taxes "reduce employment — penalize consumption — discourage business."

You pay a wartime excise tax every time you buy a piece of luggage, a bottle of baby oil, some modest jewelry, and many other items which certainly cannot be called luxuries in a nation which prides itself on its high and rising living standards. You also pay them when you make

a long distance telephone call, or send a telegram, or travel on a train or a bus or a plane — services which, in many instances, are absolute necessities. And these taxes, it must be remembered, come right on top of the thousand and one other taxes which business and individuals must pay, and which are part of the cost of everything the consumer buys.

The excise taxes were not primarily to raise revenue. They were designed to discourage avoidable civilian use of goods and services when we were at war, and everything possible had to be sacrificed to our military needs. When they were passed, it was practically universally said that they would be repealed as soon as the war ended. The war did end, years ago — but those taxes are still on the books.

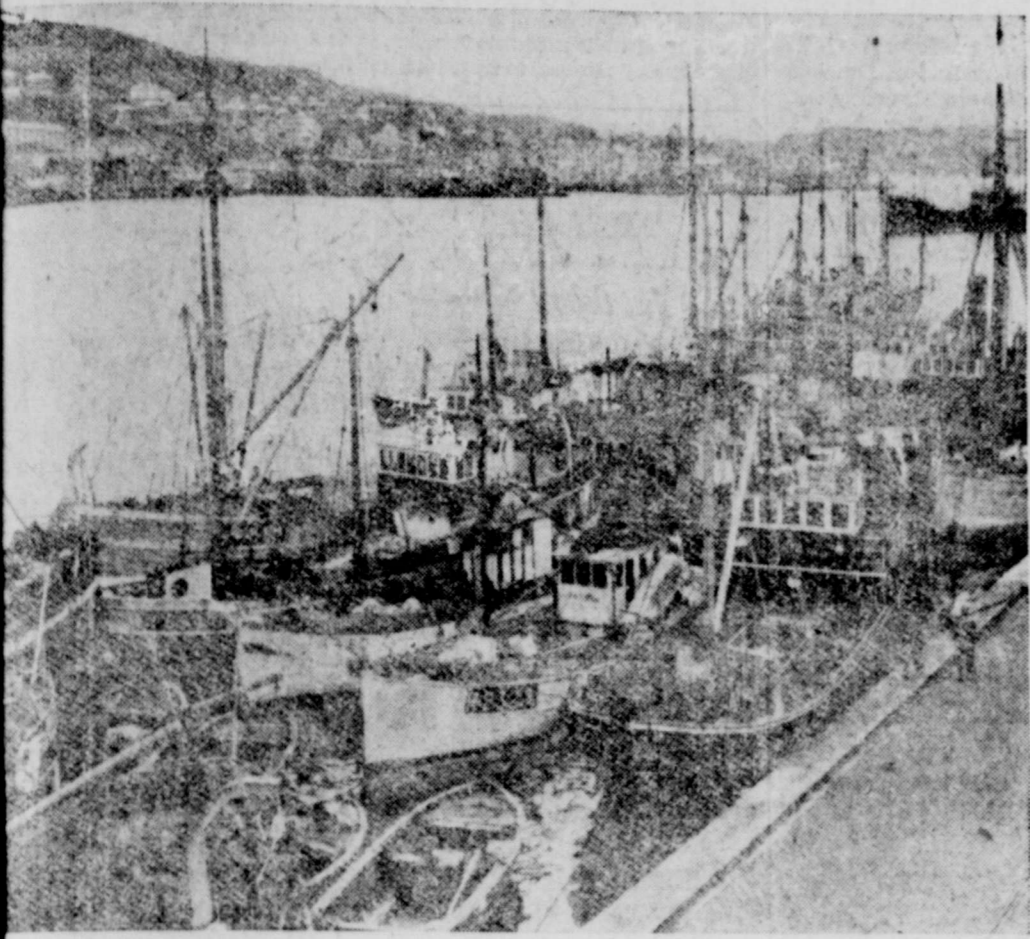

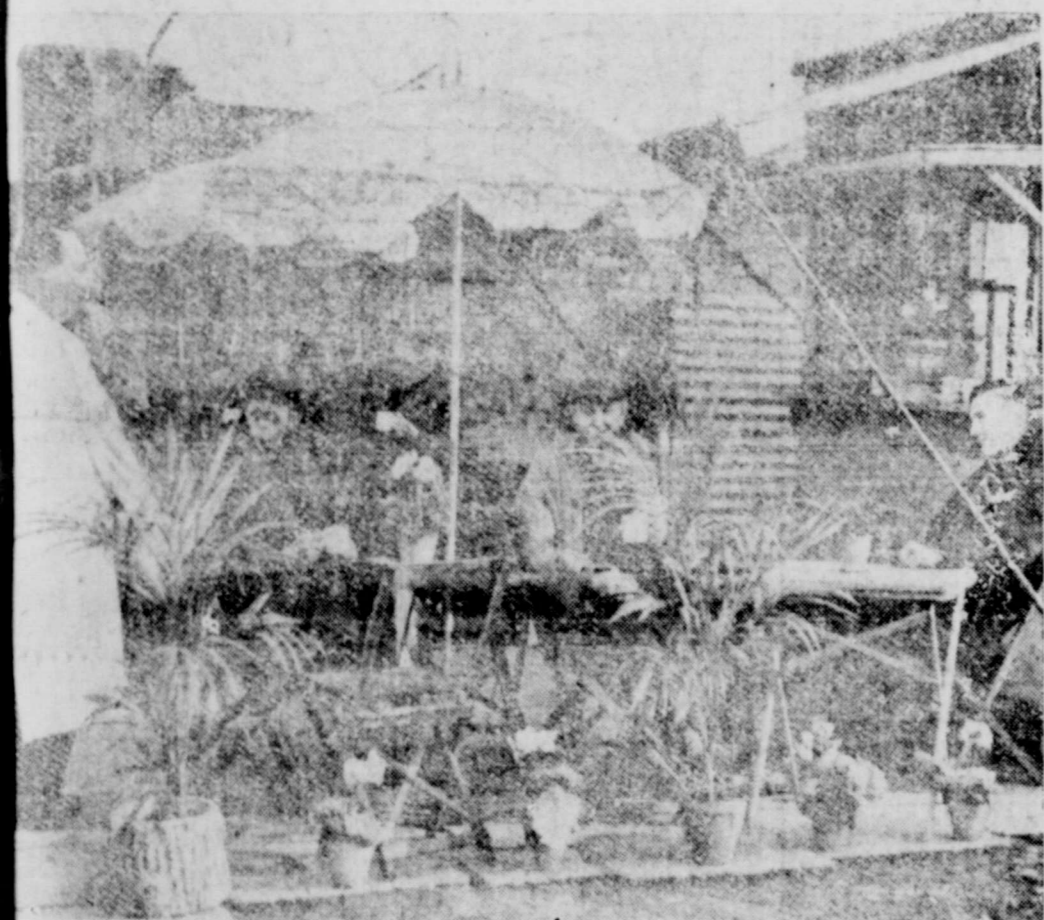

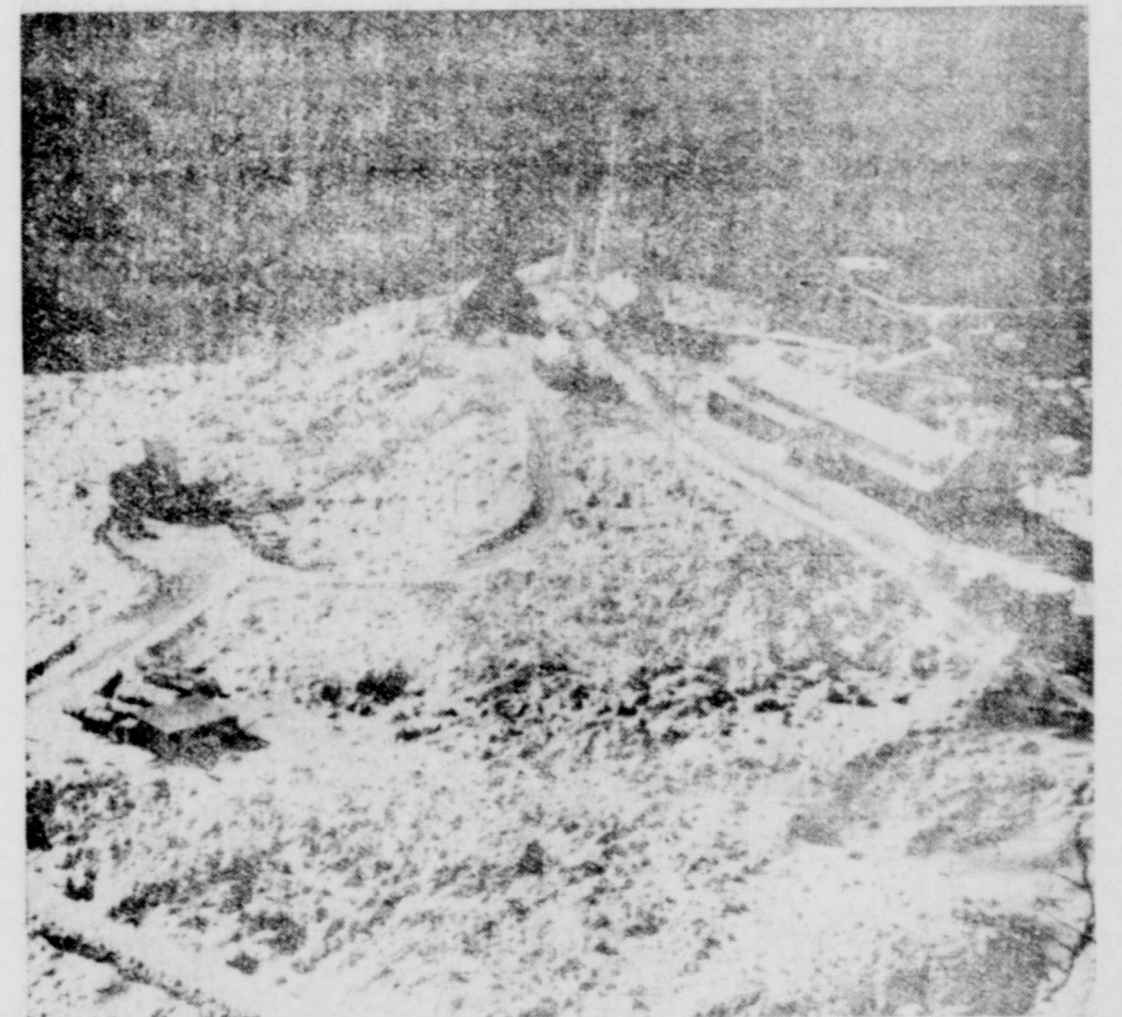
