HIGHLIGHTS Of Next Sunday's Lesson

By P. W. S. "What Is Christian Living?" is the subject of next Sunday's lesson, which is the first in a series designed to promote individual Christian growth. The Scripture text for this lesson is as follows: Matt. 5:13-16, 20; Phil. 1:27-30; 1 Thess. 5:15-23; James 1:2, 26-27. Although one may live a good, clean, honest, moral life before conversion, real Christian living can not begin until after the individual accepts Jesus Christ as personal saviour and Lord.

INFLUENTIAL LIVING

In the Sermon on the Mount, the Master Teacher gave two simple but powerful illustrations concerning the influence of Christian living. He said, "Ye are the salt of the earth..." and "Ye are the light of the world..." Even as salt, that has not lost its flavor, adds to a meal, and causes those who eat to thirst for water, so should the lives of Christians add much to the community in which they live and cause their non-Christian neighbors to thirst for Jesus, "the Water of Life."

Even as lighthouses at sea guide the ships into harbor, so should the light of a Christian's life point lost men to Jesus, "the Haven of Rest." But this kind of living does not come through our effort alone because in Matt. 5:20, Jesus taught that even the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees would not merit heaven — we must have Him as our Saviour.

DIFFERENT LIVING

By this, we do not mean that the Christian is to live with a "holier than thou" attitude, praying, fasting and worshiping to be seen of men, but that our conversation, our ideals, and our amusements should be such that are becoming to Christianity and our church. (Phil. 1:27-30) Profanity, vulgarity, and gossip have no place in a Christian's conversation.

JOYFUL LIVING

"Rejoice evermore," was the message of one who had been put in prison for Christian witnessing as he was writing to a persecuted people (1 Thess. 5:16) Thousands testify to the fact that the Christian life is really the happiest life in the world. When we can prove this to the world, then Christianity will have won a great victory.

Disease Warning Is Sounded By Health Officer

AUSTIN, Sept. 29 — Venereal diseases, notably syphilis and gonorrhea, will probably increase sharply in cities and towns near military centers in the near future, State Health Officer G. W. Cox has predicted. He urged all cities, especially those in which greater numbers of military personnel were expected, to intensify their efforts to control venereal disease.

Experience during World War II, the health official said, indicates that unless civilians become as concerned about the venereal disease problem as are military and public health authorities, there will "most certainly" be a great increase in venereal disease infections among men in uniform and the civilian population as well.

"That doesn't mean all soldiers are destined for VD infection," Dr. Cox declared. "It means that vice conditions, poorly supervised recreational facilities, and an indifferent attitude on the part of the public, are inevitable around military posts and all contribute to higher VD rates."

"These young men were only recently civilians," he pointed out. "They worked or went to school in communities no different than yours or mine." He urged that they be provided with wholesome recreational facilities while "in your town. It will help make their lives in uniform a little less drab and monotonous."

The State Department of Health has been working for years in close cooperation with the military in controlling VD and other diseases affecting men in uniform. "It's a very important part of the civil defense program," he said. "Disease can incapacitate a man quite as effectively as a bullet."
