Frazier Visits Research Farm

GRAY SUMMIT, MISSOURI, Oct. 21.—Several hundred livestock and poultry farmers visited the Ralston Purina Research Farm here this week. Among those in the party was Bart J. Frazier of Cisco.

The 738-acre Purina Research Farm is not a show place where blooded stock and pedigreed birds are put through their paces for the visitors; it is an actual working demonstration and proving grounds for programs under development by Purina. The purpose of the projects is to provide the typical farmer with the information and help he needs to raise the average type of livestock and poultry profitably.

The constant experimenting and tests at the Farm have proved the average farmer, raising average livestock and poultry, can usually produce more meat, more milk and more eggs at a lower cost per animal or bird, and thereby increase his margin of profit.

Social Security Man To Be Here

E. Glen McNatt, field representative of the Abilene social security office, will be at the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco at 2 p. m. Thursday, Oct. 26. He will assist with claims of retired workers, dependents and survivors; take applications for social security cards; and distribute informational leaflets explaining phases of the amended Social Security Act.

Mr. McNatt calls attention to the provision in the amended act permitting greater earnings to retired insured workers. Under the new social security law, a retired worker may have wages in social security covered work up to \$50 a month and still accept his benefit payment check for that month. Heretofore he was restricted to \$14.99 a month wages from such work. Mr. McNatt says that if wages are over \$50, the retired worker should report this fact to the Social Security Administration and not accept his benefit payment for that month. If the individual is over 75, there are no restrictions on the amount of his earnings in any kind of work.

MAYOR ASKS CISCOANS TO JOIN 'CRUSADE FOR FREEDOM' EVENT

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal asked all Cisco to join other communities of the nation Tuesday, October 24, in a United Nations Day "Crusade for Freedom" in a proclamation with the dedication in Berlin, Germany, of the Freedom Bell — symbol of the Crusade for Freedom.

The proclamation follows: "Whereas the Crusade for Freedom has designated Tuesday, October 24 — United Nations Day — for the dedication of the World Freedom Bell, "Whereas thousands of Freedom Scrolls, which have been signed by millions of American citizens, shall on this day be enshrined with the Freedom Bell, which bears the following inscription: "That This World, Under God, Shall Have A New Birth Of Freedom."

"Whereas the Freedom Bell will ring out its message of world freedom and friendship from Berlin, Germany, in the shadow of the Iron Curtain, at exactly 12:03 P. M. (Eastern Standard Time) (1:03 P. M. Cst.) on this day,

"Whereas the National Citizens Committee for United Nations Day has designated this same time, on this same day, for bells to ring throughout the United States on behalf of "peace with freedom through the United Nations,"

"I, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal, of Cisco do hereby ask that at exactly 1:03 p. m. on Tuesday, Oct. 24, 1950, all city departments, schools, churches, plants, organizations and individuals ring whatever bells are at their disposal for a period of five minutes, while the World Freedom Bell rings from Berlin and is broadcast over all stations of the major radio networks.

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers out-played the Indians of Decatur Baptist College in every department except points after touchdowns here Friday night and lost a thrills-packed football conference game by a score of 19-to-20.

It appeared to be a case of being deserted by lady luck as the Wranglers saw potential scoring threats fold up due to miscues. Proving their superiority in all departments, the Wranglers marked up 16 first downs to eight and gained a total of 334 yards to 207.

Olen Lewis of Whiteface, whose Marine Corps reserve unit has been ordered to active duty next week, made his final appearance in a Wrangler uniform. And the speedy, hard-driving half-back was the game's offensive star. He made two of the team's three touchdowns and was a powerhouse on both the offensive and defense.

The Wranglers had a lot of offensive stars, including A. V. Jones of Albany, who showed a lot of drive and broken field running ability; Gene Eddings, the speed merchant; Jim Gray, tackle, Alton Kite, guard; J. Robinson, end, and others.

Platforming is a process that reforms gasoline already produced from crude oil. Initially this gasoline is obtained through a process of distillation, which is a method of boiling it out of the crude oil.

Nimrod Man Will Be Buried In Service Sunday

Funeral services for Luther Allen Hall, 65-year-old Nimrod farmer, will be held in the Nimrod church at 3 p. m. Sunday with Rev. C. L. Casey officiating. Mr. Hall died at 9:25 p. m. Friday in a Gorman hospital. He had been ill for some time.

He was a native Texan, being born in the state on August 6, 1885. He had been a resident of the Nimrod community for the past five years, moving there from Fort Worth. He was married to Miss Beulah Johnson in Nimrod on June 3, 1906. Mrs. Hall died on Oct. 27, 1949.

Survivors include three sons, Rufus Hall and Buford Hall of Lubbock, and Buford Hall of Meridian. Also surviving are a brother, W. H. Hall of Cisco, and a sister, Mrs. Dottie Marshall of Lorraine, and five grandchildren.

Internal Revenue Collections Up

AUSTIN, Oct. 21.—Federal internal revenue collections in Texas for July and August amounted to \$170,041,309, a 14-per-cent gain from a year earlier, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Employment taxes for the first two months of the current fiscal year surpassed the 1949 comparative level by 57 per cent.

Income and withholding taxes were up 23 and 8 per cent, respectively. Revenue collections in the first (South Texas) District from July 1 through August 31 totaled \$81,232,536, or 1 per cent below the like period last year. Income taxes dropped 18 per cent, while other categories increased from 4 to 60 per cent.

The Second (North Texas) District took in \$88,808,773 during July and August, up 31 per cent from July and August 1949 collections. Income taxes were up 73 per cent; employment, 54 per cent; and withholding taxes, 13 per cent.
