Completion Work Underway In Oil Prospect South Of Cisco

New Wildcat Set For Area South

Oil Associates, Inc., treated their No. 1 Chambers, deep oil prospect in the Nimrod area ten miles south of Cisco, with 2,500 gallons of acid today in an effort to obtain production from the Ellenberger lime. Earlier in the week a good gas show and a small amount of oil was recovered after treatment with 500 gallons of acid.

Operators hoped today's work would result in an Ellenberger discovery for the area. Oil Associates drilled the well on a farm-out agreement with McElroy Ranch Company.

Nine miles southwest of Cisco, the Elliott and Reed No. 1 W. D. Hopper, another deep test wildcat, was drilling at 3,190 feet. Drilling was still in the Caddo lime, where a good oil and gas show was reported at about 2,850 feet last week.

Six miles southwest of Cisco, Haynes B. Owenby Drilling Company of Dallas has made location for his No. 1 Mrs. Effie Brown, a wildcat to be drilled 330 feet from the north and west lines of the northwest quarter of Section 110, Block 3, H&TC Survey. The permit calls for a 4,000 foot test.

Ten miles north of Cisco, a failure had been recorded in Bankline Oil Company's No. 1 Sam Kimmel. The hole was plugged and abandoned at 4,115 feet after failure to encounter oil or gas.

Bankline Oil Company's No. 2 J. H. Reynolds was due to be given the hydraulic treatment for completion today in the Owens pool five miles northeast of Cisco. The well has 22 feet of the prolific Lake Sand.

Bankline's No. J-1 S. E. Mize, located in the same area, was drilling at 1,025 feet early today.

Cooper and Hemphill Oil Co. of Cisco was moving in to drill their second well on an 80-acre lease in the Owens pool. The new well will be their No. 2 Carlisle and location is 600 feet north of their No. 1 Carlisle, completed recently as an outstanding well. Slush pits have been dug and arrangements were complete for a rig to move in.

In the Putnam area, Bill West and associates were moving in their rig to drill a 600 foot test on the Gaines W. Shultz land.

Fifteen miles northwest of Cisco, Chapman Oil Company's No. 1 Harwell was drilling at near 3,000 feet. It is a wildcat test scheduled to go to the Ellenberger lime.

Hickok Producing and Development Co. was laying gas and water lines today to the drilling site of their No. 1 Silas Hill, a wildcat test located some three miles southeast of Cisco. The spudder was set and drilling operations will probably begin the first of next week. The permit calls for a 4,200 foot test and plans call for close examination of all possible pay sections.

Cold Front Is Due Here Thursday

A blast of cold air which was expected to drop temperatures to the lower 20s Thursday night, was bearing down on the Cisco area from Canada and Alaska. The front was expected to reach Cisco by noon Thursday and reach the coastal areas by Thursday night.

The front was said to be bringing clouds and prospects for rains with the possibility of some snow in the area just north of Cisco.

The cold front will bring an end to balmy weather which has prevailed most of the week. Temperature ranged from a low of 44 to a high of 70 Wednesday.

Warnings were issued for the protection of exposed plumbing, automobile radiators and flowers.

91st District Court Judge Recalls Incidents Of First County Oil Boom

The revival of oil activity around Eastland as the result of the finding of two new pools of oil, fortunately, not brought the outbreak of crime and the flood of litigation which the original oil boom of many years ago produced.

So declares the men who, above all others, know—District Judge George L. Davenport of the 91st District Court for an occupied that position during the rush of long ago. In 1920, when the court was created, he was appointed to the bench by Governor Hobby and has served there ever since.

Those 30 years have been filled with many interesting experiences for he has presided over civil cases involving millions of dollars as well as many dramatic criminal trials, including the Santa Claus bank robbers.

Born in Coryell. Tall and erect, Judge Davenport was born in a little community in Coryell County, near the McLennan County line. Just over the line lived a lad who was a little older. They attended the same country school. If his school-mate ever made a speech, Davenport does not recall it. This lad was destined to become governor of Texas, a orator, meticulous in raiment (the black felt hat, long coat and high collar of the statesman), a model of dignity. His name? Pat. M. Neff.

Davenport's career as a lawyer and judge covers more than half a century. In 1900, he was prosecuting attorney of Eastland County. One man of that era whom he recalls was Jim Miller, dreaded for his skill with a six-gun. But individual who was not daunted by Miller's reputation.

Check Worthless. A Stephens County rancher had sold a considerable number of cattle to Miller and the check proved worthless. The loss would mean ruin to the ranchman. He had Miller arrested and at a preliminary hearing in Eastland the complainant had answered all questions asked by either side and then he said, looking directly at the accused, "I want to close by saying that if I do not get my money, you will not get to try Mr. Miller." He got the money. Later, Miller and several companions were involved in the killing of an officer in Oklahoma and were hanged by a mob.

Judge Davenport was never in and danger during any of the many hard-fought cases over which he presided—"or, at least if I was, I didn't know it," he said. Then, after a moment he continued, "There might have been one time."

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State Lab Given Top Honors For Parasite Work

AUSTIN, Nov. 23. — A delayed report from the United States Public Health Service communicable disease center in Atlanta, Ga., credits the Texas State Health Department Bureau of Laboratories here with top score in national competition in identification of intestinal parasites.

Two grades were awarded during the evaluation studies which are designed to raise the standard of laboratory accuracy. One was for the ability to correctly identify Endamoeba Histolytica, an intestinal parasite; the other for a correct determination of the presence or absence of all intestinal organisms.

The report said the Texas laboratory had tied for first place with three other state health departments in the first test, and had won a clear title to top honors in the second.

Forty-two state and territorial laboratories competed in the year-long evaluation studies of which began in July, 1949. The scores were announced last week.

Laboratories trying Texas in the first test could not be identified. Code numbers known only to the referee laboratories are used to designate the participants in the studies. Texas' code number was 13.

A total of 110 specimens were examined. Twelve specimens were eliminated from the study because even the experts at the referee laboratories could not agree on what organisms they contained.

The communicable disease center gave Texas' laboratory specialists a grade of 98.9 per cent on the first test, and 97.5 per cent on the second. No other laboratory in the United States proved to be so accurate, the report said.

Authorities at the State Department of Health said they have now begun intra-state laboratory evaluation studies, conducted on the same basis as are the national studies. In the intra-state examinations, laboratories operating within the state are tested for accuracy in determining what organisms are contained within a given specimen.

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Increased Grass Yields Noted In Ranching Project

Good range management pays off in increased yields, according to Jesse Reynolds, who operates a ranch near Cisco.

With the help of Soil Conservation technicians, Mr. Reynolds has made clippings and kept records on two adjoining plots for the last four years. One plot is located in an excellent pasture, while the other one is just across the fence in an overgrazed pasture.

He clipped all the grass from both plots in March of each year, and threw it away. Then in November, he clipped them again, and weighed the grass.

The good pasture averaged 2644 pounds of grass per acre. Enough hay to feed a cow for four and one-half months, if she could graze it all. She could get about 80 percent of it, too.

The poor pasture averaged only 802 pounds of grass per acre, or enough hay to feed a cow a little over a month.

"A cow couldn't get at more than 300 pounds of that grass," observed Mr. Reynolds, "because it would be too short for her to reach."

Shepperd To Head 1951 Heart Drive

HOUSTON, November, 23. — John Ben Shepperd, Secretary of State, has accepted the Chairmanship of the 1951 Heart Fund in Texas, it was announced today by Dr. George W. Parson, President of the Texas Heart Association.

Making the announcement at a meeting of the Executive Committee and Board of Directors of the Association in Houston today, Dr. Parson said, "Diseases of the heart and blood vessels are the leading cause of death and disability in the country. The 1951 Heart Fund campaign will be conducted next February to raise the necessary funds to support the greatest effort ever made in medical history to find the answers to unsolved problems of heart disease."

Mr. Shepperd, a past national president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, said, "I accept the Chairmanship because of my deep concern over the fact that heart disease robs us prematurely of too many of our most able and irreplaceable leaders in industry, government, science and other vital fields of endeavor."

Governor Allan Shivers will again serve as Honorary State Chairman of the 1951 Heart Fund. Bruce Barton is National Campaign Chairman.

Navy Has Plenty Of Active Pilots

The Navy announced today that the needs for Naval Aviators for the immediate future have been met, and no more requests for active duty are desired. It is expected that only a limited number of Naval Aviators will be needed during the remainder of the fiscal year, and these will be taken from those who were released from active duty during the past 18 months, or are in an active organized reserve Aviation unit, and who have been assigned for six months or longer, and those who have special qualifications.

Those who have already made application for recall to active duty will be advised of their status as soon as the requirements for Naval Aviators has been determined. In the event that orders to active duty are issued, a normal period of 30 days is allowed between the physical examination, and proceeding to the duty station.

This announcement applies only to Naval Aviation Line Officers and not others.
