

## COOPERATIVE WORK PROVIDES BEST YULETIDE DECORATIONS

Thanks to the cooperative spirit of most Cisco business men, the Christmas decoration committee was able to point proudly this week to the results of its efforts to make Cisco the most attractively decorated town in this section of the state this Christmas season.

Utilizing the medallions in aluminum foil which were used for the first time last year with such striking results, and adding additional streamers of colored lights, the committee was able to present an even better effect than last year's highly praised decorations. This was achieved by increasing the number of streamers per block and by more impressive installations along 8th street and the overpass and along South D Avenue.

The committee gave much of the credit for the fine display to the three Cisco electrical contractors who installed the decorations. They are T. R. Smallwood, M. H. Jones and E. E. Edwards, who took the contract

for installing and removing the decorations at a low figure as their contribution to the program.

Arrangements for the decorations and the Parade program, in which Old Santa will appear on the afternoon of December 16, were made by the general committee consisting of E. L. Jackson, Austin Flint, Homer Ferguson, Anton White, Edward Lee and A. G. Sander.

The parade is under the direction of Bob Elliott.

Financing of the program was made possible by contributions by a fund of \$250.00 contributed by professional men and women and by a fund of \$250.00 contributed by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. As in the past, the electricity for lighting the displays is being furnished by the West Texas Utilities Company, without charge. In addition to this contribution, which amounts to \$150.00 or more, the utilities company has made a donation of \$25.00 to be used for parade prizes.

Contributions from individuals are being received by a committee headed by Charles Graham. Solicitors include E. G. Damron, Sterling Drumwright, James S. Duff, Bob Elliott, Homer Ferguson, W. R. Huestis, A. G. Sander and Charles Sandler.

Mr. Graham expressed the thanks of the committee to those who responded to the request for funds. He also asked that all who have promised contributions or intend to make contributions send them in as early as possible in order that all bills may be paid in full by the tenth of the month.

The following is a list of those contributions which have been received so far. Those who contributed are received later on will be published in subsequent issues of the Cisco Daily Press, he said.

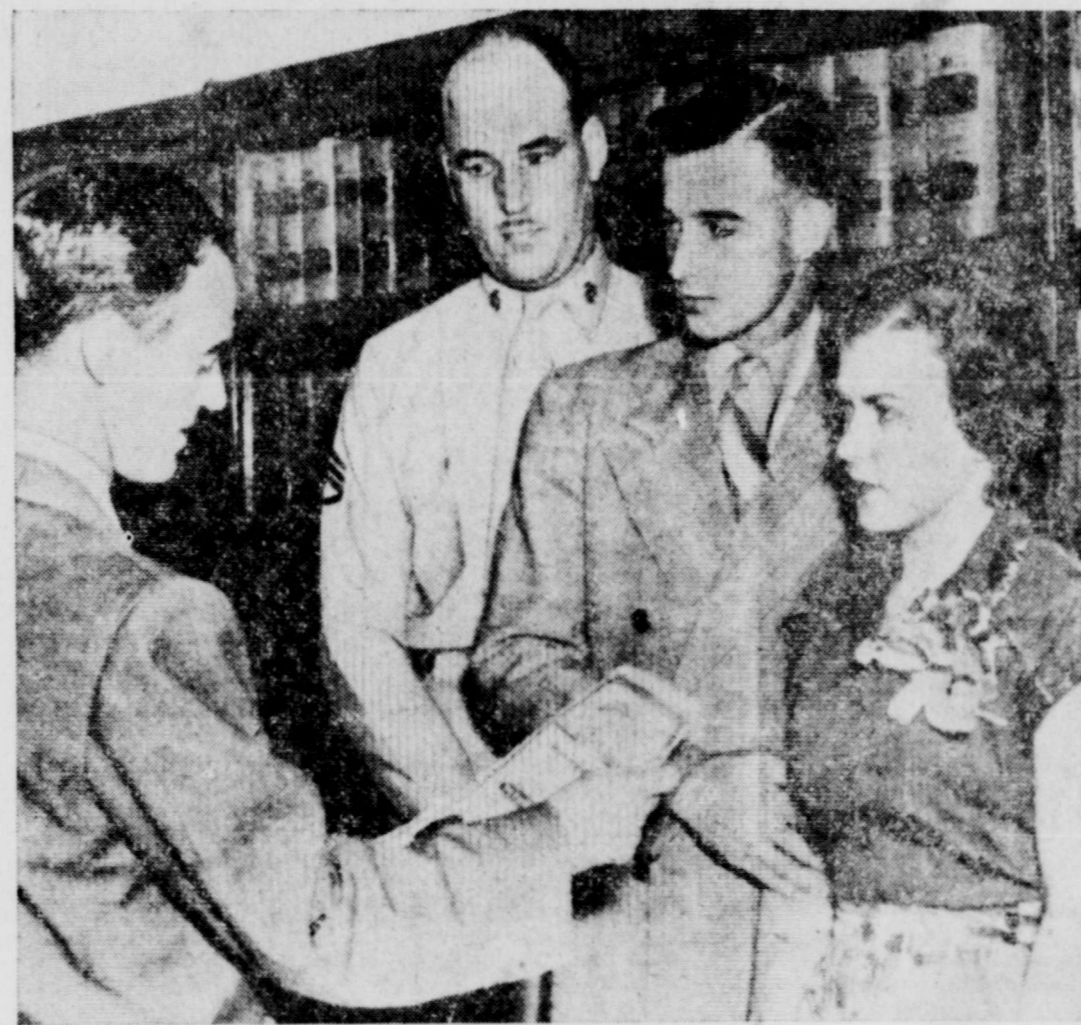

## Domestic Help Is Now Subject To Social Security

"Do you have a maid?" Not so very many households these days can answer yes, but those who do have a maid or any other household worker will need a copy of a brief booklet bearing that question as a title. Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security office, began distributing this booklet today. This colorful leaflet sets out, in a few sentences, just how the lady of the house, or any employer of domestic help in or around the home, may tell whether or not the worker is brought under the new social security law which becomes effective on January 1.

The work of those regularly employed in private homes will be credited to social security, and the employer will be responsible for reporting wages, along with social security taxes, to the collector of internal revenue.

The title of the pamphlet does not stop with "Do You Have a Maid?" but continues "— or a laundress? — a cook? — chauffeur? — gardener? Any of these or any other persons employed regularly for work in or around a private household, may come under the new law, and Mr. Fisher urges their employers to request a free copy of the new booklet.

A simple test in the booklet, in terms of amount of wages paid and regularity of employment, will tell whether a maid or cook or laundress will get the protection of social security — and whether the housewife should start making reports next year. If so, there's a postage-paid postal card in the government-issued booklet which the housewife should mail in for instructions.

Copies of the booklet are available at all post offices, social security offices and internal revenue offices.

The social security manager said he is arranging with women's groups to furnish supplies of the booklet for their members.

For the domestic worker's own information about her new social security protection, a special leaflet is available at the social security office. Mr. Fisher pointed out that the regularly employed domestic worker will need a social security number card after January 1, 1951.

The "Do You Have a Maid?" booklet does not apply to domestic work on farms operated for profit. Such work is covered by other provisions in the new social security law.

Mr. Elliott reminded civic groups and business firms that three cash prizes are being offered by the chamber of commerce for the best floats in the parade. The Cisco Roundup Club has been invited to enter their horses.

## New Device Will Register Atomic Radiation In Air

AUSTIN, Dec. 2 — Development of the first simple and inexpensive device to measure the extent of exposure of individuals to atomic radiation capable of mass production to meet both military and possible civil defense needs was announced today by the Department of the Army.

Designated by the Army Signal Corps as a self-developing photographic dosimeter, the device is small and light, may be hung around one's neck like a soldier's "dog tag," yet will measure very slight to fatal doses of radioactivity.

A reading can be obtained from the dosimeter one minute after exposure, without recourse to a photographic laboratory or the use of supplementary equipment.

706 Girls' Basketball Teams Will Compete This Year Under League

AUSTIN, Dec. 2.—Final and official assignments to districts and conferences were announced this week for 706 girls' basketball teams competing under the University Interscholastic League plan. Dr. Rhea H. Williams, League director of athletics, released the lists for Conferences A and B in this sport which is being sponsored for the first time by the League during the coming season.

Assignments outside as far as possible with district alignments of the boys' basketball A and B conferences. In the Class B lineup, the district numbers differ from the boys' district numbers but the schools making up districts are the same in both cases. The League aim is, Dr. Williams explained, to enable school authorities to keep at a minimum travel expenses and school time loss.

Conference A lists 175 schools in eight regions. Assignments within the conference are set up on a 32 district basis, but only 29 districts will be active this year, three having voted to delay participation one year. Conference B contains 81 districts, in eight regions, and 562 teams.

Both conferences will proceed through district and regional elimination, as in boys' basketball, to a state championship tournament. The tournament will be held March 8, 9 and 10 in Gregory Gymnasium at the University of Texas, one week after the boys' championship play-off.

This first total of 706 teams came as a surprise to League officials, Dr. Williams stated. When League sponsorship of girls' basketball was requested last year by schoolmen, it was believed that first-year membership might be no more than 300, and that development of the program would take several years. The initial membership indicates, Dr. Williams declared, a growing interest in this sport and a high regard for development of the Texas girls' basketball plan of competition. Dr. Williams pointed out that in its first year, League girls' basketball was within 384 of having as many teams competing as the boys' basketball program, which is the nation's largest and most school-boy hoop loop.

Boys' girls will compete in Region II, District 8-A, and they will play Comanche, DeLeon, Dublin, Eastland, Hamilton and Tarrant. In Class B basketball, Region II, District 12 includes Carbon, Desdemona, Gorman, Olden, Santo, Scranton, Strawn and Tolar. District 13 includes Baird, Denton Valley, Clyde, Cross Plains, Eula, Moran, Putnam and Rising Star.

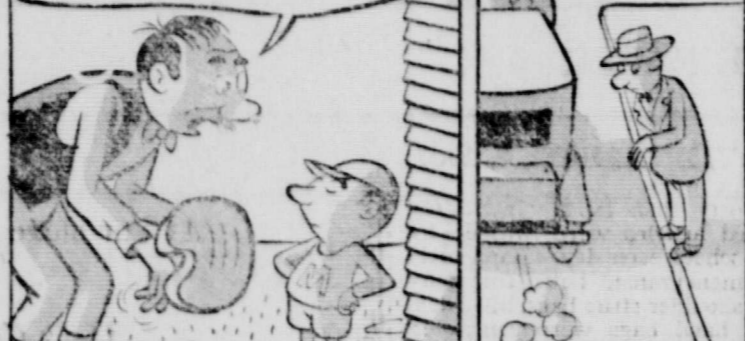

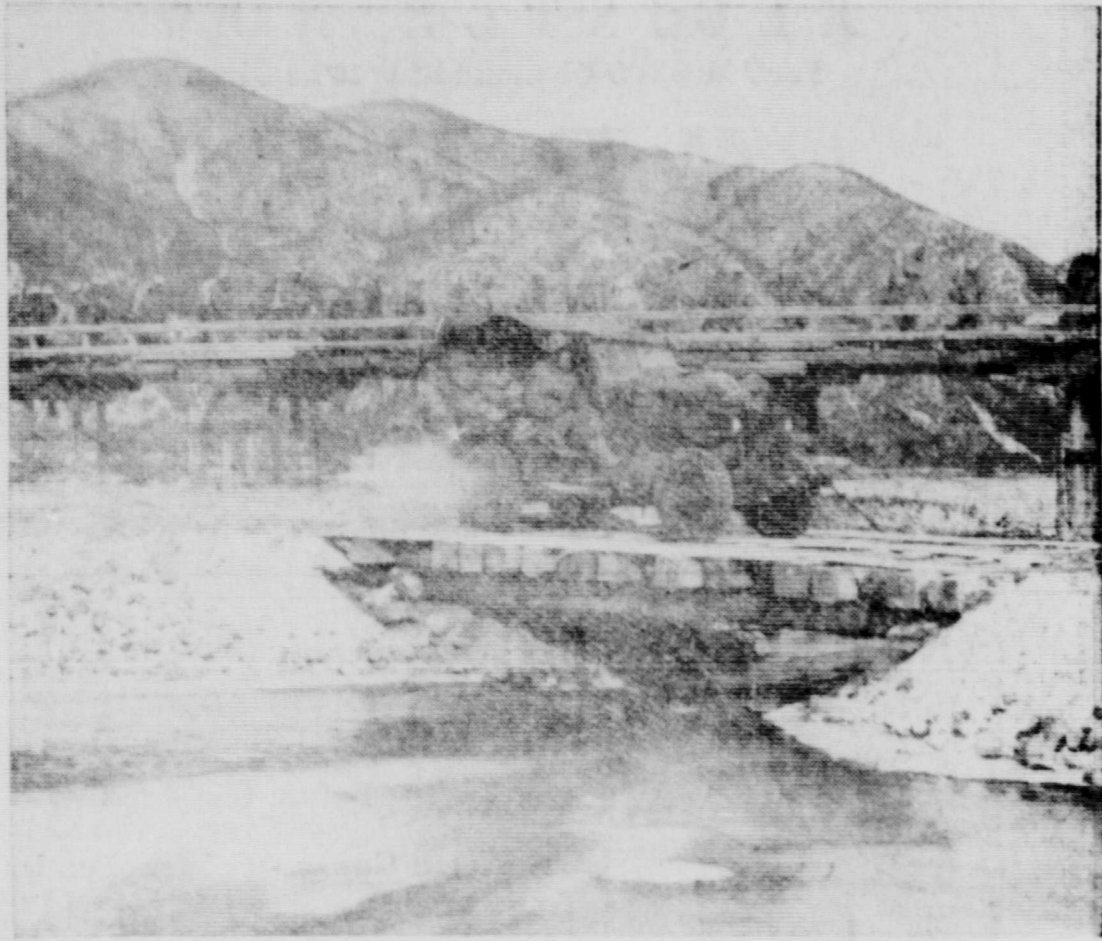

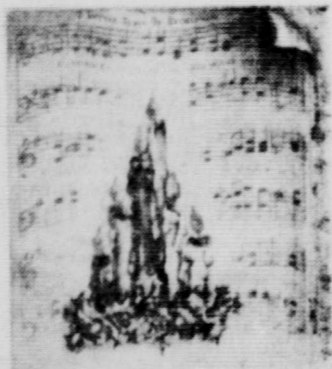

Regardless of whether they were soldiers, sailors, marines or coast guard, they all speak the same language.

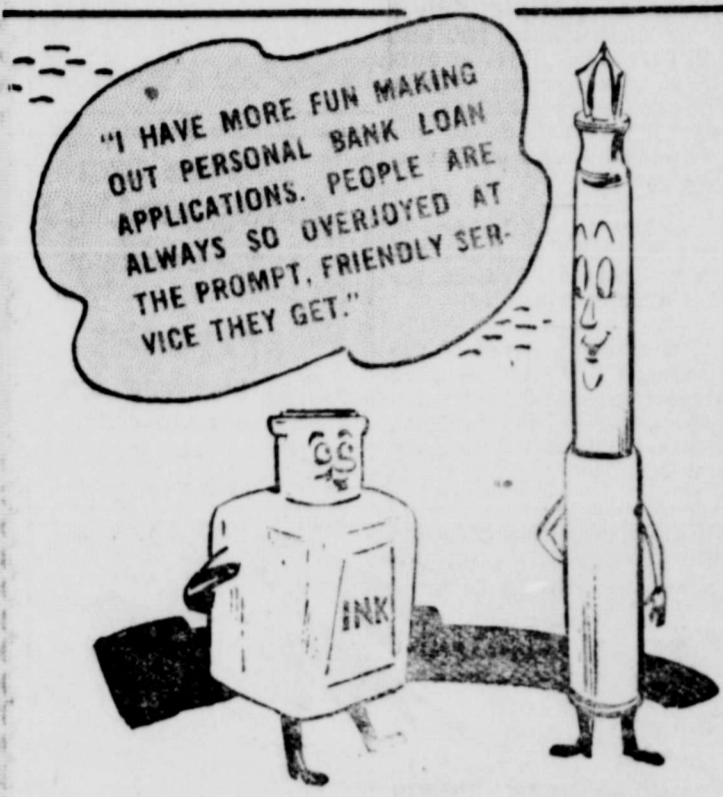
United, they represent the largest group of citizens in this United States, and with proper leadership, they can be largely responsible for the destiny of this country.

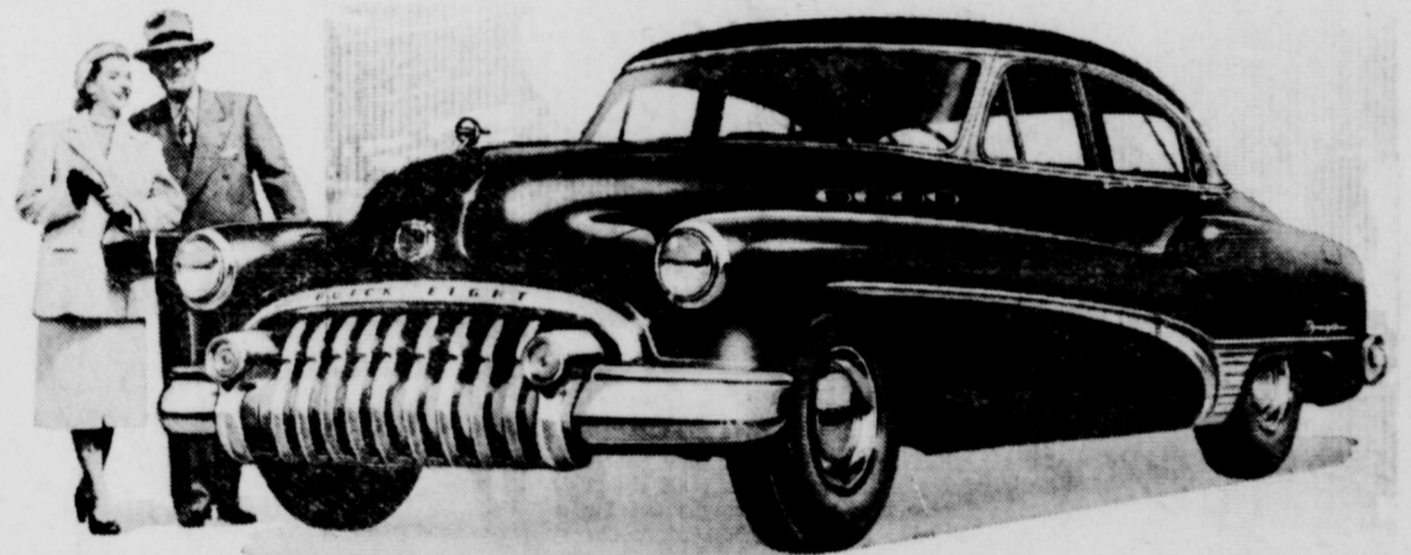

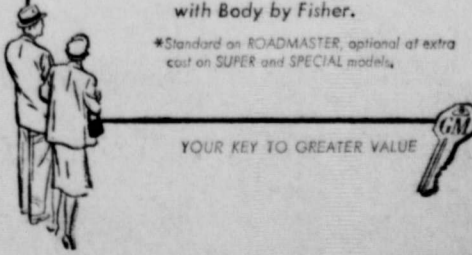

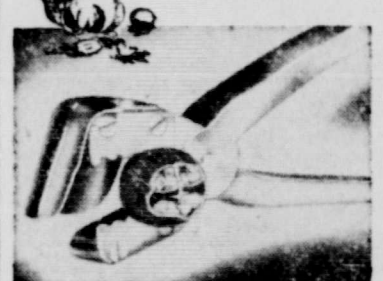
