Regular Physical Exams Seen As Aid For Health

AUSTIN, Dec. 7.—"Health examinations won't prevent old age, but many tens of thousands of persons, whose records of these examinations have been studied, have not only been helped to live longer, but also be sturdier and healthier, and enjoy more comfort and happiness by following the advice of the physicians who have made such examinations," declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Once the individual leaves school, he assumes the responsibility not only for his choice of work and method of living, but also for his continued good health. But he often fails to apply the available methods of preventing disease and prolonging life. Hardly a day passes in which our attention is not called to the untimely death of some prominent person or acquaintance, which may be attributed to a preventable disease. So something should be done in the way of educating the adult group of the population, so they will voluntarily carry out those measures which prolong life and maintain good health.

It is our firm belief that if the diseases of the gastrointestinal tract, which includes the lips, tongue, teeth, mouth, stomach and bowels, are recognized in their early stages, their progress may be curtailed, adequate treatment advised, and many might be prevented.

Today the medical profession realizes that many childhood diseases are now under control and that our present problem must be centered about the adult, encouraging periodic check-ups. It is semi-annual consultation with your physician to get a premium to pay for many years of additional life, freedom from suffering and consequently short periods of hospitalization?

PURCHASE OF AREA PLANTS AND OIL ANNOUNCED BY LONE STAR

E. F. Schidt of Dallas, vice-president of the Lone Star Producing Company has announced the purchase of producing properties, a pressure maintenance plant and a gasoline extraction plant located in Stephens County, 12 miles northeast of Cisco.

The consideration involved in the purchase is in excess of two million dollars, Mr. Schmidt said, and the company began operating the properties on Wednesday, December 6.

The production properties, including oil and gas wells and the pressure maintenance plant formerly owned by Fred Manning, Inc., were purchased from the Malco interests. The gasoline extraction plant was purchased from the Cisco Hydrocarbon Corporation. This plant operates on natural gas and casinghead gas

produced from the Manning properties and other leases in Stephens County. The Lone Star Gas Company has a gas purchase contract for the residue gas.

The oil and gas wells involved in the purchase will be operated as a part of the Lone Star Producing Company's West Central district, of which Francis Urban of Eastland is district production foreman.

Operation of the gasoline plant and pressure maintenance plant will be under the direction of J. A. Bates of Rager, West Texas district superintendent of the gasoline department, with Joe F. Francis, plant superintendent, directly in charge of plant operation. Mr. Francis formerly was superintendent of Lone Star's Brooks gasoline plant at Breckenridge.

Bids Are Called To Build 50 Housing Units For City

Jan 9 Is Set As Bid Opening Date

The Housing Authority of the City of Cisco today called for bids for a contract to construct 50 dwelling units as a part of the government's low-rent housing program. The bids will be opened on Tuesday, January 9, 1951, at 2 p. m.

The 50 units — 26 brick veneer duplex dwellings — will be built on a tract of land the Housing Authority has under option to buy on Highway 80 in East Cisco. The project is expected to cost between \$400,000 and \$500,000.

Anyone interested in bidding for the construction contract may obtain plans and specifications from the Housing Authority in Cisco or from the office of Bentley-Broad and Nelson, architects and engineers, in Dallas. A legal notice concerning the bids appears elsewhere in The Press.

Members of the Housing Authority, of which S. H. Nance is chairman, held a meeting early this week and completed work on the bid order. The authority has been at work on the project for more than a year.

Drought Hampers Winter Crops In Most Of Texas

Development of small grains and winter cover crops was at a practical standstill in Texas this week as critical droughty conditions continued. Except in the northwest crops were out of the fields and the soil in all areas was too dry for fall plowing. In the northwest sledding of bolies was active as cotton harvest neared completion and combining grain sorghums was well along. However harvesting the lodged acreage was slow work.

Light to heavy week-end showers in some southeast and upper coastal counties will temporarily relieve droughty conditions in those favored areas, however, state-wide general rains were needed to bring on small grains and winter legumes, start green pasture feed and relieve the fire hazard to pastures and forests.

Wheat and oat pasture deteriorated further as critical droughty conditions continued over most of the State. Scattered showers and rain in southeastern and coastal counties at the end of the week will start clovers and winter grass in those favored areas; however, state-wide general rains were urgently needed.

Cured range feed was still generally adequate in northern counties but remaining dry food was rapidly being consumed in most southern and eastern areas. Cattle were shrinking in central southern and coastal counties and just about holding their own in northern areas. Supplemental feeding of cake and roughage was increasing. In spite of dry short range and pasture feed, demand for stocker cows and calves continues very strong.

RAN INTO SOME interesting dope the other day on the selection of a name for a business. Here's what the experts say:

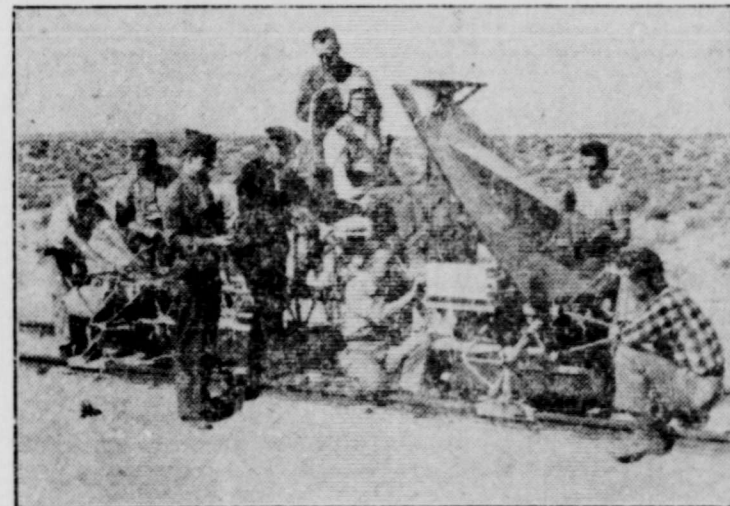

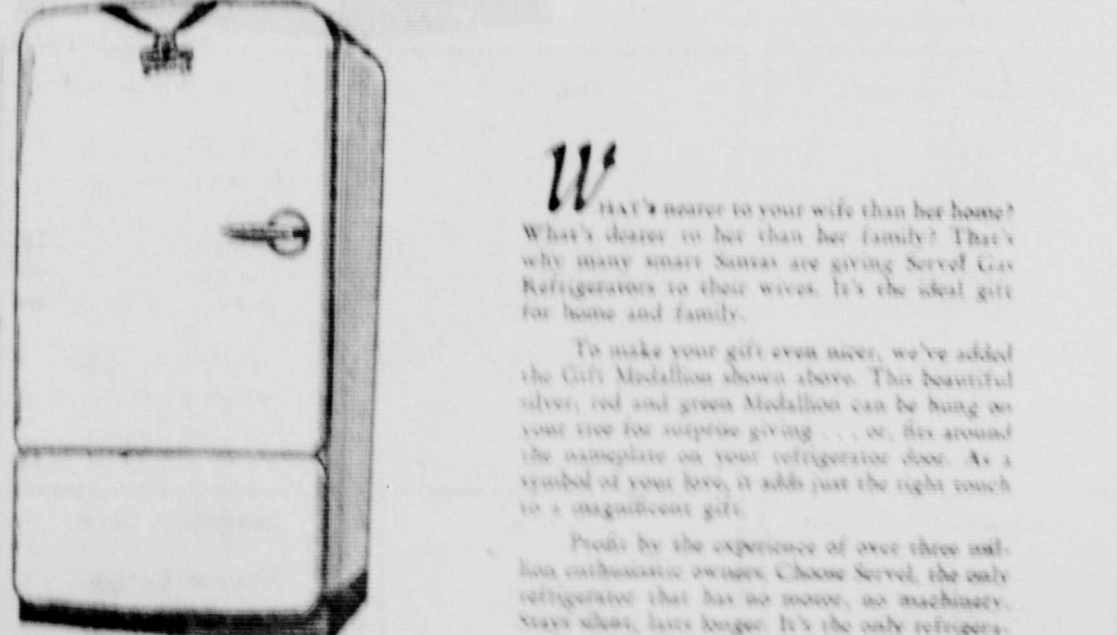

KITCHEN MEMO

FOR a more pleasing blend of flavor combine two kinds of meat when making meat loaf. Veal and lamb complement each other in **Mustroom Veal Loaf** and it will not be hard or crumbly if you follow these proportions. Combine 2 1/2 lbs. ground veal, 1/2 lb. ground lamb, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 1 cup chopped mushrooms, 1 rounded green pepper, 1/2 cup ketchup, 1/2 cup Worcestershire sauce, 1 well-beaten egg. Mix well and shape into loaf. Arrange 4 slices across in pan, place meat loaf over them and top with 2 slices bacon. Bake in moderately heated gas oven at 375°F. about 1 1/2 hrs. Yield 4 portions. Serve with sour cream sauce if you like.

Chill candles in your gas refrigerator for several days before using so they'll burn more slowly.

Griddles on some automatic gas ranges are equipped with heat indicators — important to those cooks who use varied temperatures for top burner griddle cooking.

Crumble a few crisp slices of bacon into pancake batter and use bacon drippings instead of shortening for added flavor.
