## Trustees Accept New Gym Building From Contractor

Secretary Clyde Karkalits reported that the new structure now has a debt of only \$3,700 against it. The gym was built by the Starley Construction Co. of Breckenridge.

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## Loss Is Covered Partly By \$35,000 Insurance Policy

Fire of undetermined origin caused extensive damages to the East Ward School building, located at Avenue A and East 10th Street, shortly before midnight Wednesday. Damages to the brick building and equipment was expected to run high.

The blaze left the structure unfit for use by the 66 students enrolled in the first four grades there. Also occupying the building were a Naval Reserve unit, a Cisco Junior College Electronics Class and a kindergarten class taught by Mrs. F. B. Clampitt.

Supt. Arlin Birt reported early Thursday that the four remaining days of school before Christmas would be dismissed for the 66 students and that arrangements would be worked out soon for their future class work. Arrangements also were to be made for the students to have their Christmas parties and to participate in the school's annual Christmas program at the gym next week.

The fire alarm was turned in at 11 p. m. The blaze was discovered by residents of the area, and they summoned firemen. Fire Chief H. O. Anderson said the blaze apparently started between the ceiling of the lower story and the floor of the top story, as the fire was confined largely to the middle of the building. Smoke and water damage was extensive.

Equipment used by the Naval Reserve radio unit and the Cisco Junior College Electronics Class was damaged considerably. It was valued at several thousand dollars.

School officials said the building was insured for \$35,000. An estimate of the damages was not immediately available, awaiting inspection by insurance adjusters and school officials.

Firement, hampered at first by heavy smoke, were praised for their work in bringing the blaze under control. They kept equipment at the school until about 4 a. m. Thursday.

TEXAS JUNIOR VEGETABLE GROWERS WIN FOUR AWARDS IN NATIONAL COMPETITION

TEXAS junior vegetable growers were named winners of two sectional and two state awards in the 1936 production-marketing contest of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association at the NJVGA concluded its sixteenth annual four-day convention at New Orleans, La., today.

Sectional honors went to Lawanda Vinson, 12, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. Vinson, Tuscola, and Max Thomason, 17, son of Mr. J. W. Thomason, Jacksonville. Each received a \$100 prize from the \$6,000 scholarship fund provided each year by A & P Food Stores to encourage better production and marketing of vegetables by farm youth.

State-wide honors went to Syble J. Wall, Chireno, and Mildred Gregson, Amherst. Also announced by John Hutchinson, Department of Horticulture, Texas A & M College, and state NJVGA leader, was the awarding of the national championship and the top \$500 scholarship to James L. McBee, 19-year-old grower of Phillip, West Virginia.

Twelve-year-old Lawanda, one of the two sectional winners, grew seventeen varieties of vegetables on her 150 by 100 yard plot at Tuscola. She picked all of her vegetables by hand early in the morning, and hoed her own potatoes just at the time when pressing would loosen the skin.

She decided on a garden so she could have fresh vegetables all through the year and sold those that weren't used by the family. She grew her own tomato and pepper plants in seed boxes. Lack of rain made her job harder and required much hoeing for this slim Texas girl. Besides the 144 hours she managed to put into her gardening and canning, she also found time for school basketball, volleyball, and baseball.

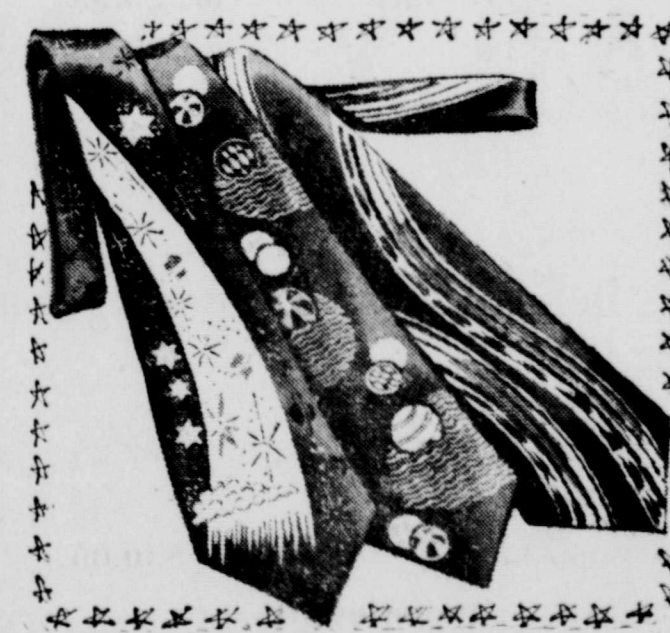

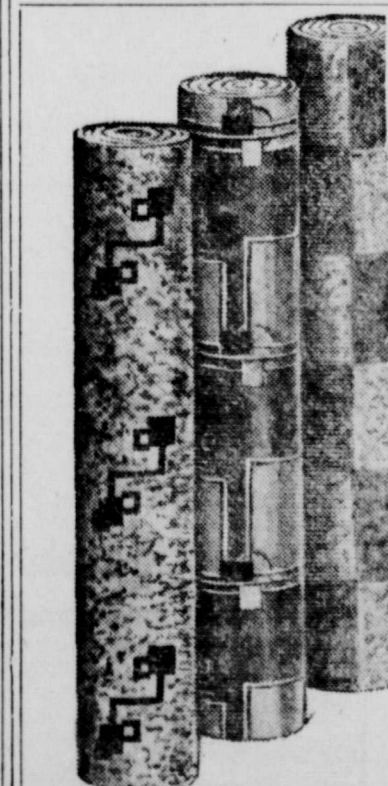

## Serum Is Urged For Preventing Whooping Cough

AUSTIN, Dec. 14.—"Your child can be protected from whooping cough by the use of anti-serum available for the immunization of youngsters," according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, as he advised parents not to take this communicable disease lightly.

"Since whooping cough is particularly dangerous for babies the need for early protection against it is undisputed. Research has shown that preventive treatment may safely and effectively be given at the age of two months or earlier. Older children who have been previously immunized should receive booster doses of the vaccine."

Pointing out that Texas has had over 10,700 cases of whooping cough so far this year, Dr. Cox reminded parents that whooping cough is sometimes fatal to young children. It may also leave the lungs and other affected parts permanently damaged.

"In an effort to control whooping cough emphasis is placed upon the great importance of calling the family physician at any time when a child is not in normal health. If the first signs of a cold do not disappear after a few days of good home care, including rest in bed and isolation from other children, the physician should be called as the cold in itself may be dangerous. The physician will prescribe proper treatment and report any cases of communicable disease to the public health officer."
