COMMUNITY CHOIR READY FOR CHRISTMAS ORATORIO SUNDAY

The Community Chorus of Cisco will present the "Christmas Oratorio" by Camille Saint-Saens, on Sunday afternoon, Dec. 17, at 3:15 o'clock at the First Methodist Church in Cisco. It is the first performance of the Community Chorus, which was organized this fall under the direction of Robert Clinton, music director at Cisco Junior College.

The choir comprises approximately 110 members, some from the high school and college choruses, and from the different church choirs in Cisco as well as others who do not belong to any organized choir but who enjoy singing.

Guest soloists for the performance are Mary Jo Thomas, soprano from Denton; Janelle Patterson, mezzo-soprano from Eastland; Marion French, contralto from Eastland; Jack Chambliss, tenor from Cisco, and Alfred Skoog, baritone from Borger.

Miss Thomas is at present a junior student at North Texas State College in Denton, majoring in music education, where she is studying voice with Barbara Stevenson. Miss Thomas was a member of the girl's quartet, "The Swinglet," that won the Texas College Capers Contest in 1944 and sang on a four weeks' radio series over Station WFAA, Dallas. Also, in 1944, she toured with a USO Hospital Unit. Miss Thomas sang professionally for four years in a girl's quartet known as "The Moonmaids," with Vaughn Monroe's orchestra.

At present she is a member of the NTSC A Cappella Choir, a member of the Grand Chorus, and a member of the Madrigal Group. Miss Patterson, a freshman student at NTSC, is at present a member of the Girl's Choir, and is studying voice with D. Ralph Appelman. Previously, she studied voice two years with Robert Clinton.

Wisdom Is Better Than Weapons, Is Message To Lions

"Wisdom is Better than Weapons of War" was the topic of a short address by Rev. Ralph T. Wootton, pastor of the First Baptist Church, at the weekly luncheon meeting Wednesday of the Cisco Lions Club. Austin Flint was program chairman.

Rev. Wootton used the quotation from the Bible (Ecc. 9:18) in reference to the current war situation. Noting that the nation was comparatively unarmed, he urged that faith and confidence - such as David had when he stood before Goliath - were paramount needs.

"David did not disdain any outward helps," Rev. Wootton said. "His was a wide-awake faith. But David did put more emphasis on the spiritual than he did on the material. He was thus practically unarmed, but such faith unarmed is armed more than triple steel, and a sling in its hand is more fatal than a sword."

"We must learn the lesson, 'Ye cannot serve God and Mammon.' If we are to have God's strength infused for victory, we must cast away our idols and come back to Him with all our hearts."

The club's annual Christmas luncheon will be held next Wednesday. All members were asked to bring a small gift for distribution to underprivileged children.

Luncheon guests included Randy Steffen, Cisco, and Frank Adams, Clayton, New Mexico.

Pearson Speaks On Tax Problem At Rotary Meet

Increased revenue and increased taxation will be the number one problem facing the 52nd Texas Legislature when it convenes in Austin in January, Judge L. R. Pearson, representative-elect, told members of the Cisco Rotary Club Thursday at their regular weekly meeting at the Hotel Victor dining room.

The number two problem will be the redistricting of the state, which is mandatory following each federal census. Other problems sure to come up, Pearson said, were the proposed truck weight limit change, the raising of the War Veterans Farm and Ranch Loan Fund from its present \$25 million dollars limit, the Negro question, old age assistance, statewide prohibition and the hearing of committee reports of the proposed new water code, the revision of the penal code and the revising of Texas election laws.

Judge Pearson explained each of the problems and stated that increases in taxation could be expected to offset the loss of the state ad valorem taxes and increased costs.

The program was arranged by Rotarian J. J. Callaway, who introduced the speaker and paid him a tribute as an able representative.

Visitors included Rotarians Frank Pruitt, H. E. Strickland and Dr. R. A. Collins of Abilene; Jack Frost, Dick Wesson and Rev. J. M. Bailey of Eastland and A. L. Duff of Seminole. Other visitors were A. Z. Orlick and Bob Cluel of Cisco.

LOBO FOOTBALL TEAM CITED AS ONE OF BEST EVER TO BATTLE

"The glory that was Athens, and the splendor that was Rome," was in 1927, "the glory that was the Lobos, and the splendor that was Cisco's."

The Gusher, a newspaper publication of 1927-28, reveals the startling stories of how Cisco played and defeated their rivals in conference play.

"Sportsmanship-then victory" was the motto of the Big Dam Fighting Lobos. It seems they took this into consideration with every game they played.

Their first game of the season in 27 was with Gorman on Friday September 17th, at Chesley Field. They were pleased with the final score which was 71-0. Their second game, a victory also, was

with Mineral Wells on September 24. They conquered the Resorters 69-0.

On October 1, the Lobos went to El Paso to score another victory. The game ended with the score standing 13-6. The Gusher, the best ever. "The Lobo Tiger game brought about one of Cisco's greatest high school friendships," said the Gusher.

Friday, October 7, meant another "big" game for the Big Dam Fighting Lobos as they ran over Merkel Tigers with a 74-0 victory.

They displayed their fighting spirit October 21 to lick the Daniel Baylor College reserves 12-7.

Back on home field again the Lobos opened up with all they had on the San Angelo Bobcats to come out with heads held high over a 34-0 win. This was the Lobos' first conference game that year.

Their second conference game was with their old rival-Breckenridge. On November 4 the Big Dam Lobos met and defeated the Buckaroos by a score of 53-6. This was one of the largest scores ever made in an oilbelt championship game.

They took another step toward state championship when they broke through the Ranger line and ended the game with a score of 22-0.

The Lobos last play for the district championship was with the Eastland Mavericks. They won over their "hereditary enemies" by a long margin of 27-0.

The play for district for the Big Dam Lobos was with the Abilene Eagles. The coach of the Lobos, W. B. Chapman, received telegrams from every point in Texas, and also some out of state, wishing them luck and hoping they would beat Abilene. But the Lobos couldn't stand up to the Eagle "pecking" and they came home with heads hanging low as the final score was 27-0 for Abilene.

Perhaps you wonder who the

men were who played on the Big Dam Fighting Lobo team in '27. Once more they pass in review: Bill Smith, Warren Eddleman, Charles Caldwell, Britton Pippin, Edwin Bates, Allen Boone, Willard Miller, Joe Lea Moore, Geo. Van Horn, Garland Keyes, Ollie Lou Little, Ernest Jobe, Harold Pippin, Louis Miller, Raymond Meadows, Ross Cotton, Wesley Smith, Wilson Wheatley, Louis Swank, Bert Ezzell, Hoyt Slatton, David Waters, Grady Coats, James King, Hal Wagon, O. C. Ray, and Ernest Johnson.

Everybody in Cisco backed the thirty-one Big Dam Fighting Lobos as they started on the field to win or lose another game. Ten thousand paid admissions was the customary crowd. Special trains ran for out-of-town guests then as regularly as the buses carry the hand and players now.

Yes, those were the "good old days" when even the mighty Buckaroos bowed humbly to the Lobos to a 53-6 tempo!

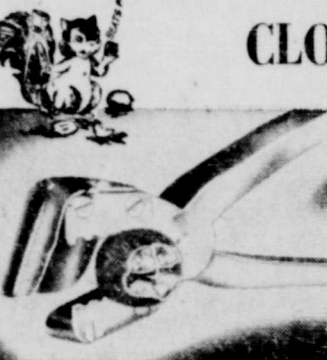

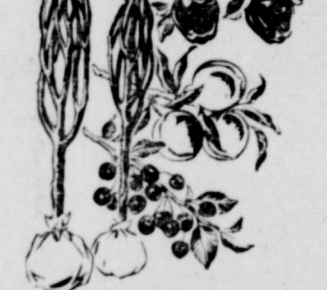
