Location Staked To Drill Test On Speegle Property

A new oil drilling program for the area five miles southwest of Cisco was in prospect today with reports that Lone Star Producing Company has farmed out a block of some 1,400 acres of the leases to the Senate Oil Company of Dallas. The block lies immediately west of Lone Star's No. 1 J. W. Dennison, completed several months ago as a small Caddo lime oil produced. It was understood that Lone Star kept the Dennison well, farming out the balance of their holdings in the area. The Senate company has let a contract to the B. H. Gray Drilling Company of Cisco for a wildcat deep test to be drilled as their No. 1 Speegle Estate. Location is one and a fourth miles due west of the Dennison well. Drilling is expected to begin as soon as arrangements are completed. The test is slated to go to the Ellenberger line. It was understood that the Senate company has extensive oil holdings in New Mexico and elsewhere.

Elsewhere in the area, Oil Associates, Inc., was drilling at 2,905 feet early today in their No. 1 J. R. Bacon, a wildcat located four and a half miles southeast of Cisco. The Caddo lime was topped high at 2,847 feet, it was reported. In the Nimrod area, the Fred M. Manning No. 1 M. E. Louderdale was drilling at 2,800 feet in the top of the Caddo lime. A new offset in the Owens pool five and a half miles northeast of Cisco is the O. D. Alsbrook No. 1 D. B. Perdue. Location is 330 feet from the north and east end of section 58, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Permit calls for 3,500 feet wildcat rotary equipment. A large gas well recently was completed on the Perdue property. Cooper and Hemphill, Cisco operators, have been issued a permit to drill their No. 4 J. R. Carlisle as an offset to production. It will be 330 feet from the north and 1,170 feet from the east line of Section 58, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Permit calls for 3,400 feet with rotary equipment. Potential tests on Bankline Oil Company's No. 2 A. V. Clark had been run, showing 142 barrels of 41 gravity oil in 24 hours through a 15-64 choke, with 125 pounds of pressure on the casing and 430 pounds pressure on the tubing. Production was from perforations at 3,276-83 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 490 to 1.

Critical Drought Halts Activity In Most Texas Areas

Activity on most farms and ranches in Texas, was limited to feeding livestock and to odd jobs during the past week. Critical droughty conditions over the entire State was holding field work at a standstill. The near zero temperatures a week earlier now appears to have damaged wheat in some northwest areas. Dry soil and cool weather had already checked development of wheat. As the limited vegetative growth turned brown following the freeze, a heavy run of wheat pasture cattle developed at some northwest markets. General rain was urgently needed in all areas. Shipments of fresh vegetables were light the past week and limited mainly to a few hardy type crops that came through the freeze of the previous week. Both the Laredo and Lower Valley districts salvaged some peppers and tomatoes that went out mostly by trucks to nearby markets. Livestock were showing some shrink in most areas even though supplemental feeding of cake and roughage was further increased. A heavy movement of cattle off northwest wheat pastures developed as browning of wheat top growth followed the near zero temperatures the first week of December. These cattle moved to stalk fields, dry grass and feed lots in the area with a considerable number moving to out-of-state points. Supply of dry cow feed was being rapidly consumed in all areas. Generous rains were urgently needed to revive small grain pastures and bring on winter weeds and grass.

WELFARE AGENCY WANTS NAMES OF NEEDY FOR XMAS BASKETS

The Cisco Welfare Association has a considerable amount of Christmas packages, including clothing, food and toys, for distribution to the needy, beginning Friday, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported today. W. P. Coldwell will be at the fire station for several days to handle the distribution. Mr. Rosenthal said. He asked that the names of needy persons or families be turned in to Mr. Coldwell at the fire station. The packages include items and baskets from several local churches. "We are anxious for everybody to have a good Christmas," Mr. Rosenthal said. "And we will appreciate your cooperation in notifying us of anyone who has apparently been overlooked."

Defense Plants Charge Off Plan Now Available

Every businessman in Texas who is now working on a vital defense order, or who is planning to do defense work should contact the Dallas Regional Office of the Department of Commerce, located at 1114 Commerce Street, to learn the details of the accelerated depreciation opportunity now made available through the Dallas Field Office of the Department of Commerce. Forms of Necessity are now available for distribution to businessmen who have or intend to build for defense manufacturing. These applications, if approved, provide for a 20 percent depreciation charge-off year. This large savings by income tax allowance is tendered to businessmen to help them prepare to do the vital work necessary for the defense of our country. Full particulars of applying for Certificates of Necessity can be obtained from the Dallas Regional Office of the Department of Commerce.

Peanut Growers Favor Retaining Marketing Quotas

Peanut growers' 1951 crop will be limited to 1,771,117 acres under marketing quotas approved by the peanut producers in a 16-state referendum vote announced this week from Washington. The Agriculture Department indicated 48,790 growers favored quotas and 20,120 voted against them. The department more than two months ago set acreage at 1,771,117 acres with a production goal of 650,000 tons, subject to a two-thirds approval vote by the producers. The vote also authorized the government to establish marketing quotas on the 1952-53 crops.

Improvements For County Road Are Planned By State

The State Highway Department has announced plans for surfacing 52 miles of State Highway 16 from the Palo Pinto County line south in Eastland County as a part of the national emergency program recently proclaimed by the President to preserve the investment in existing state highways. The program adopted for Texas calls for 3,100 miles of betterment projects at a cost of \$7,885,000. Work will be done in 179 counties. This program does not include any new construction. It consists of a high type of maintenance, to improve existing roads and forestall their deterioration. By concentrating these funds on the present system of highways, it is hoped that these highways may be made reasonably safe and adequate for traffic they will be called upon to bear during the emergency.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission examinations for filling vacancies in the positions of Medical Technician (general medical technology), Medical X-ray technician, and Medic and X-ray technician at \$2450 to \$3825 per annum for employment with various federal agencies in the state of Texas except the Veterans Administration, and Inspector (strategic materials) at \$3100 to \$5400 per annum for employment with various federal agencies in the state of Texas. Additional information and application forms may be obtained from the post office.

Care Urged In Handling Guns

WASHINGTON, D. C. Dec. 28.—Claude D. Kelley, President, National Wildlife Federation, Washington, D. C., today urged more care and respect towards gun handling. Mr. Kelley said, "With another hunting season in full swing reports of hunting accidents are coming in too rapidly. Each hunting season we have over 500 killed and several thousand more injured by careless handling. These gun accidents can be avoided if we learn and practice the Ten Commandments of Safety in gun handling: 1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. 2. Carry only empty guns, taken down or with the action open. 3. Always be sure that the barrel and action are clear of obstructions. 4. Always be sure to carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle even if you stumble. 5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger. 6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot. 7. Never leave your gun unattended without unloading it first. 8. Never climb a tree or a fence with a loaded gun. 9. Never shoot at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water. 10. Do not mix gunpowder and alcohol. "The above ten rules of safety in gun handling can be condensed into two rules, first, handle every gun as if it were loaded and second, never point the muzzle of your gun toward anything that you do not intend to shoot."

Decline Seen In Death Rate Due To Tuberculosis

Tuberculosis mortality in the United States will decline to a new low in 1950, statisticians predict. So far this year the death rate from the disease shows a decline of 12 per cent from last year's comparable figure. "With the tuberculosis death rate in the population of the United States already well below 30 per 100,000, the prospects are excellent that it will fall below 20 within the next decade," according to the statisticians. "Indeed, the rate may be as low as 15 per 100,000 in 1960 if the decline continues at the pace of the past 5 years. Even now about one fourth of the States have rates below this low level." Uninterrupted improvement in tuberculosis mortality through many years is reflected by the fact that the annual number of deaths has declined by more than 10,000 in the past decade while the population has increased by 19,000,000. Hope that the disease will be reduced to minor proportions, according to the statisticians, rests upon the expansion of facilities for early case finding, prompt and adequate treatment, and medical follow-up of arrested cases. A prime requisite in the fight against tuberculosis is a sufficient number of beds to hospitalize all active cases.

The booklet shows how the extraordinary polio incidence has exhausted Texas' total contributions requiring supplemental allocation of more than \$32,000 from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for care of Texas patients.

"Texas people like the facts straight from the shoulder," said Ed. S. Stewart of Abilene, state March of Dimes chairman for 1951.

General Walter Krueger of San Antonio, co-chairman added "We don't mince words in battle. We in Texas don't mince words in fighting our way out of this cash deficit."

Under "Facts," the pamphlet called "Can Texas Brag," states "The polio virus grows bigger in Texas than in any other state. Texas is making more money on polio than any other state."

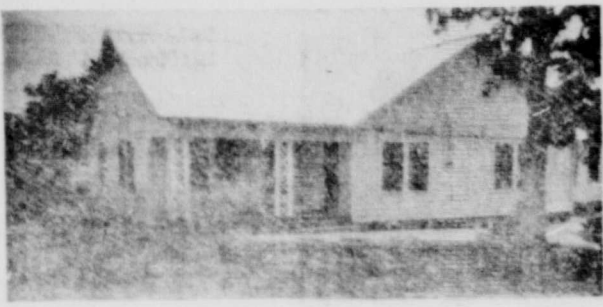

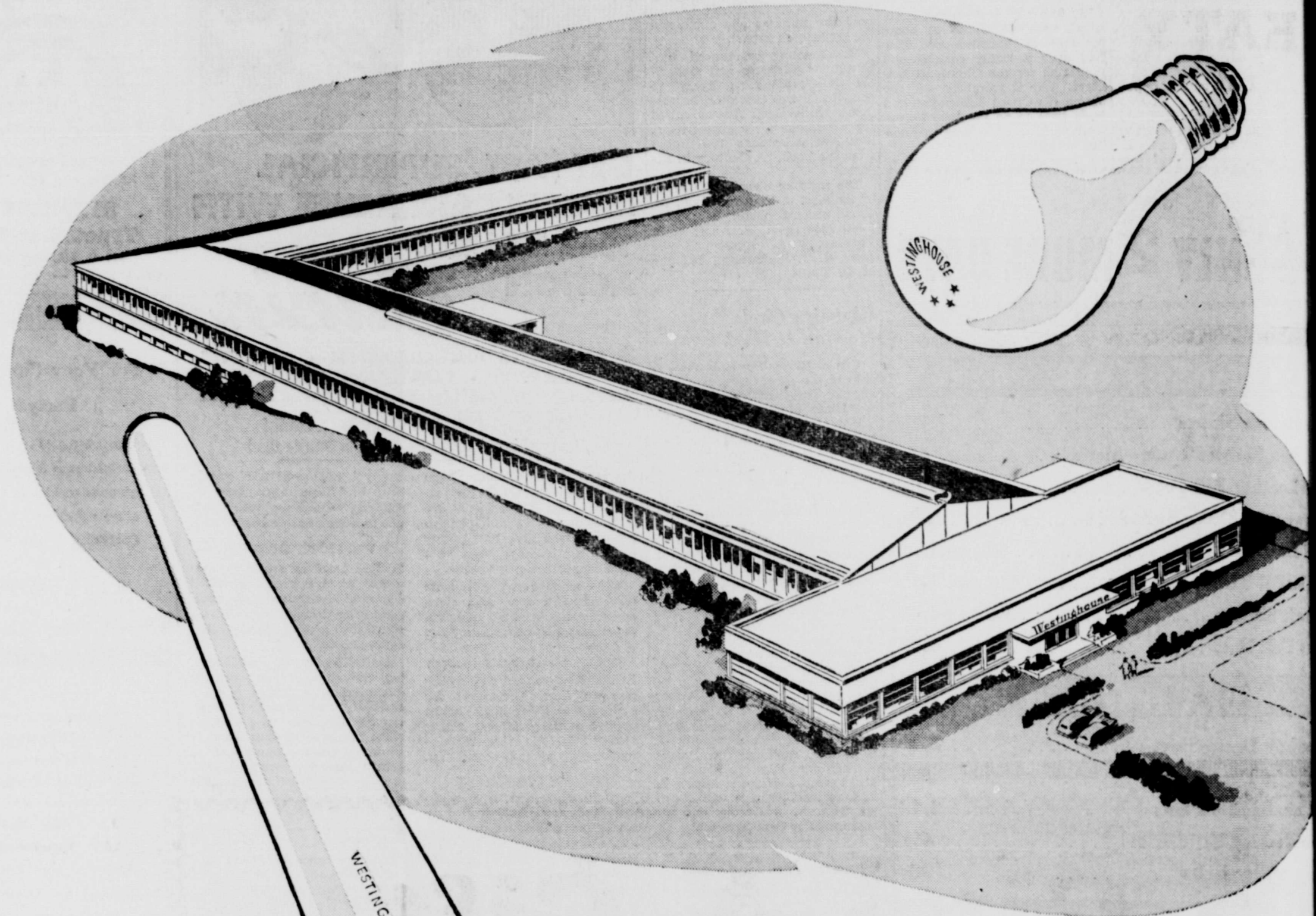

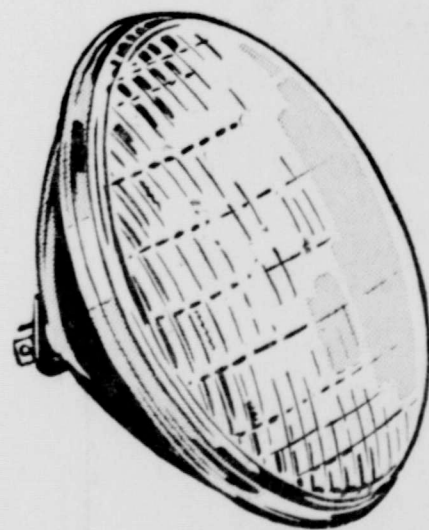

moved from the back of her neck. She is reported doing very well.

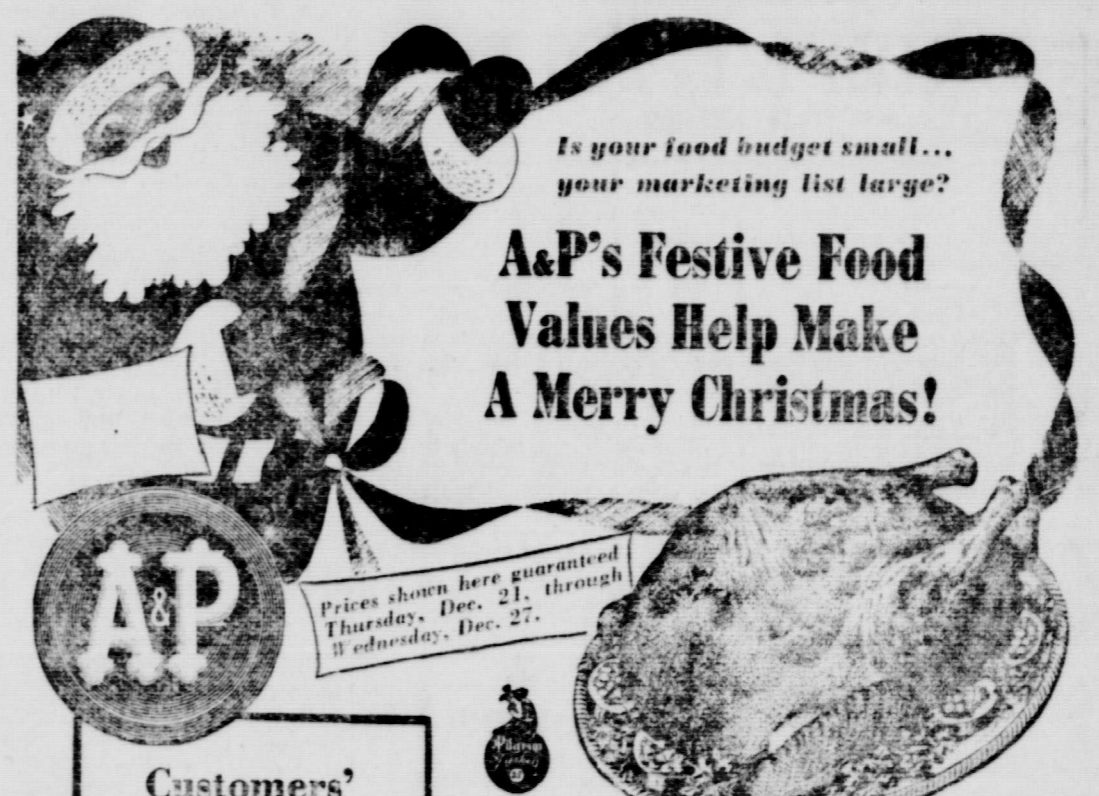
Miss Ruth Mobley has returned from Cisco where she spent several weeks nursing a patient there. Miss Mobley is an experienced and very capable nurse.

Deviled Cheese Snacks

1 1/2 cups shredded dried beef 1 teaspoon bottled mustard
4 slices bread 16 thin strips American cheese (3 1/2 x 1/2 in.)
1 tablespoon fat 1 cup fat milk
Cook and stir beef in hot fat over low heat until edges curl. Sprinkle flour over beef; stir in milk slowly. Boil and stir 1 min. Remove from heat; stir in mustard. Cover and let stand. Turn on oven; set at moderately hot (400°). Remove crusts from bread; toast on one side only. Cut each slice in half to form strips. Spread beef mixture on untoasted side of bread. Put a strip of cheese on each. Put on baking sheet. Bake on center rack of oven 5 min., or until cheese is slightly melted. Serve warm. Makes 4 servings.

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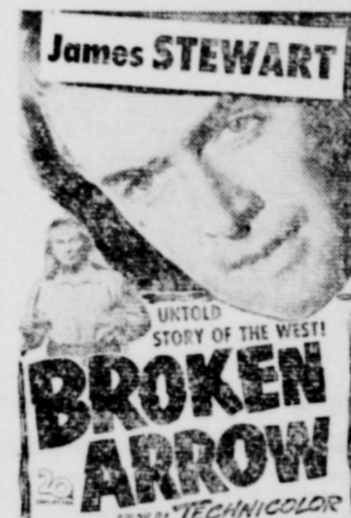
