R. Quincy Lee Dies In New Mexico Accident; Funeral Planned Saturday

A former Cisco man was killed instantly at 8 p. m. Wednesday in an automobile accident which occurred between Buda and Farmington, New Mexico. R. Quincy Lee, 39, died of multiple injuries some ten minutes after arriving at a Farmington hospital. He was riding in the rear seat of the automobile which was struck from behind as it was traveling along the road between the two towns. One other person in the car received undetermined injuries in the accident.

At the time of his death he was working with the Chapel Oil Company with headquarters in Buda, New Mexico. For the past 18 months his home had been in Abilene.

He was born in Caddo on January 23, 1911 and moved to Cisco when a small boy with his parents, the late Senator and Mrs. R. Q. Lee. He attended grade and high school in Cisco graduating from Cisco High School with the class of 1929. He attended the University of Texas and the George Washington University in Washington, D. C.

He was married to Mrs. Lilah Talbert in Cisco in 1938. Mrs. Lee was at their home in Abilene when notified of her husband's death.

Bumper Crop Of Babies Reported

Another bumper crop of babies started life's journey in the United States during 1950. By year's end the number of births totaled 3,700,000, insurance company statisticians estimated. This is only five percent below the all-time high of 1947.

This was the fourth year in succession in which the number of births exceeded 3,500,000. "The sustained high level of births is all the more remarkable since the number of marriages dropped rather sharply between 1946 and 1949," the statisticians comment.

The births during 1950 were at the rate of 24 per 1,000 of the population, including the armed forces overseas.

"The babies born in 1950 have a greater chance of surviving the hazards of infancy than babies of any previous year," the statisticians point out. "Present indications are that infant mortality declined during the year to a new minimum of 29 per 1,000 live births. It will be the first time that the rate has fallen below 30."

Heart Ailments Dangerous Foes, Dr. Cox Warns

AUSTIN, Jan. 4.—What do you know about your heart? Do you know that the three major kinds of heart disease are: Rheumatic heart disease, high blood pressure, and coronary heart disease?

One of childhood's most dangerous foes is rheumatic fever, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. A child is most likely to develop rheumatic fever when he is less than 10 years of age. However, the disease is not confined to children. "In World War II, about 40,000 men in the armed forces developed attacks of rheumatic fever." This disease may damage heart valves and muscle. Any child who has rheumatic fever should have the best medical care, rest, special diet, and be free from anxiety or worry. Just because a person has rheumatic fever, is no sign he will have rheumatic heart trouble. But it's important to keep in close with the family physician.

Coronary heart disease strikes those from middle age groups and up, more than other forms of heart trouble. And, it strikes men more often than women. Moderation in daily living is very important, for if a person worries too much, works too hard, exercises too frequently and hard, and eats too much his heart is overworked. Yes, one of the best checks against overburdening the heart is moderation in all things — and plenty of rest.

High blood pressure is another cause of death. Naturally, the heart has to work harder to pump the blood, when blood pressure is high. An overworked heart needs the care of a physician. Sometimes symptoms of heart trouble aren't so noticeable; that is why a regular physical examination is so important.

Heart disease caused by syphilis, congenital heart disease, and heart trouble resulting from an overactive thyroid gland, are a few other forms of heart disease.

Stop and think about it for a moment. Do you give your heart enough rest?

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Texas Military District Receives Quota For Recalling Army Officers

AUSTIN, Jan. 4.—The Texas quota for the recall to active duty of company grade civilian component officers under the program announced by the Department of the Army this week has been received by the Texas Military District, Colonel C. M. Culp said today.

Under this new program, Guard officers and members of the active or inactive reserve in company grades may volunteer. Part of the quota will be filled from a reservoir of officers who volunteered under previous recall programs but who have not yet been ordered to duty.

The Army expects that the bulk of these company grade officers in the arms and services will enter duty voluntarily as a patriotic duty in a time of national emergency, Colonel Culp stated.

Officers will be ordered to active duty on the following priority basis: Priority 1: Volunteers. Priority 2: Members of the ORC commissioned from the ROTC deferred from Selective Service under an ROTC deferment agreement and who have had less than one year's active federal service

as officers. Priority 3: Members of the ORC commissioned from the ROTC who did not execute a deferment agreement and who have less than one year's active federal service as officers, warrant officers or enlisted men. Priority 4: Members of the Volunteer Reserve. Priority 5: Members of divisional troop program units of the Organized Reserve.

The Army emphasized, however, that officers assigned to divisional units have been placed in last priority and will not be ordered into active duty until efforts to fill quota from other sources failed, and with the provision that the total number of officers taken from such units, including volunteers and ROTC graduates, will not materially impair the mobilization potentiality of the unit.

Officers with four or more dependents will not be ordered to active service if they request exemption because of hardship. WAC officers with dependents under 18 years of age will not be ordered to active duty. However, officers who are drawing pensions, disability allowances or disability compensation from the Government who have been exempt in previous calls, may be selected and ordered into active service provided they are otherwise qualified.

Insofar as possible, Army stated in selecting reserve officers to serve without their consent first consideration will be given to the selection of those with shortest active prior overseas service and with the least number of dependents.

As in previous calls, all officers selected will be ordered to serve for a period of 21 consecutive months or such period as may be authorized by law, unless sooner relieved. Under present instructions they will be given at least 30 days to close their personal affairs unless they desire to report at an earlier date.

It was pointed out by Army officials that volunteering for active duty does not impair reem-

ployment rights under the Selective Service Act of 1948. However those officers who do not object to being ordered to duty but for reasons of their own do not wish to volunteer formally will be considered for recall by the military district headquarters.
