## WOODLEY STAKES LOCATION FOR WILDCAT TEST ON FEE RANCH

A new oil test for the Cisco area is the Woodley Petroleum Co. No. 1-M George P. Fee, which will be drilled on the Fee Ranch two and a half miles northeast of Cisco. It will be a 4,000 foot rotary test some two miles west of production in the Bankline-Owens pool.

Location was given as 330 feet from the north and west lines of the southwest quarter of Section 59, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Five miles southeast of Cisco, the Oil Associates, Inc., No. 1, J. R. Bacon was to be performed for completion at 4 p. m. today. The cement plug was drilled early today preparatory to the beginning of completion work. The hole is bottomed in the Ellenberger lime were oil in considerable quantity was indicated on a drill stem test.

Five miles southwest of Cisco, the Senate Oil Company's No. 1 Spoelge Estate was drilling at 3,200 in black Caddo lime early today. Next possible pay zone expected is the Lake sand. No shows were reported in two Caddo drill stem tests over the weekend.

## Light Shows Is Of Little Help On Plains Farms

Deterioration of wheat from drought in the northern High Plains was temporarily checked by light snow this week. However, the fall was light and varied in all that area. Generous and additional moisture was needed in upper coastal and southern-eastern counties will now permit preparing land for spring planting and start winter grass in those favored areas.

In most other areas, last week's very light showers and mists were generally ineffective. In some northern counties, light rains were sufficient to sprout small grains which were "dusted in" during the fall.

Growing conditions were favorable for winter vegetables except for the continued lack of moisture which is being felt in irrigated districts. Prospects for production of winter vegetables from non-irrigated areas are negligible for this season. A cold wave over the week end reached into the lower Rio Grande Valley with freezing temperatures recorded at a number of points. Only hardy type vegetables, however, were growing at the time and no serious damage was expected.

Dry range and pasture supplies were steadily diminishing as the fall and winter drought continued over much of the State. Heavy rains in upper coastal, southeastern and some northern areas will soon bring on much needed green feed. Snow in the northwest temporarily checked deterioration of dormant wheat. Most cattle and sheep were already off wheat pasture in that area. Supplemental feeding of hay, roughage or cottonseed cake was widespread.

Besides his Lubbock interest he will look after farming interests in Lynn and Hale counties and Chinchilla ranching in Plainview.

CAMPAIGN BEGINS TO ENLIST PRIVATE PLANES FOR DEFENSE

A hard-hitting, two-fisted campaign to enlist the services of Texas' 8,600 private airplanes for civil defense and security purposes has started in Houston with a team from the headquarters staff of Civil Air Patrol meeting with airport managers from the Houston area, flying school operators, civilian pilots and plane owners, Red Cross representatives, local civil defense officials, and others interested in aviation and civil defense. Other meetings are scheduled for such cities as Beaumont, Victoria, Corpus

Christi, Brownsville, Laredo and El Paso until the full length of the Texas Gulf coast and the Rio Grande border are covered, according to Dr. E. O. Rushing, head of CAP in Texas.

A special category in CAP membership has been devised for persons whose time is extremely limited, but who wish to be available in the event of a disaster or emergency. Dr. Rushing stated, "Private plane owners and pilots particularly are being invited to join CAP in this category and they will be organized into 'air defense units' of CAP, he said. The units will be set up at all civilian airports. Members of the units are not required to wear uniforms or to engage in full-scale CAP activity. They take part in flight work only, and then only as much as their time will permit. Each air defense unit has a leader, selected by the member-

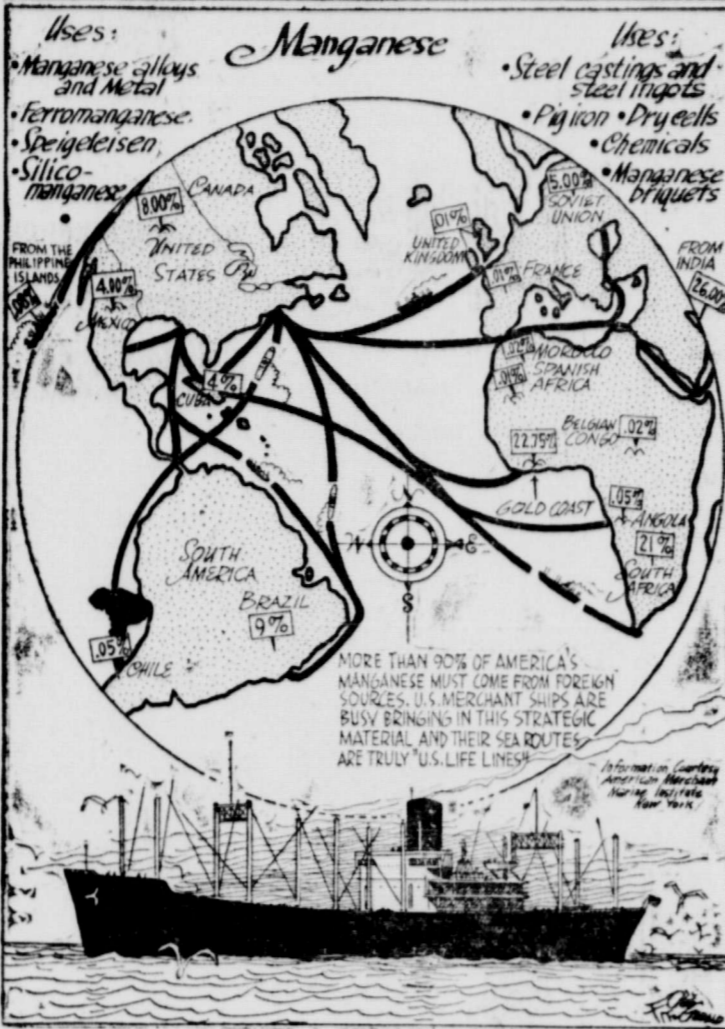
