Arbor Day Will Be Observed In State Jan. 19th.

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 17.—Arbor Day, January 19, was proclaimed by Governor Allan Shivers on Tuesday. He recommended and urged all citizens and particularly the schools of the state to render due observance of Arbor Day with appropriate exercises. Arbor Day is usually observed by planting trees and stressing the importance of forest resources in the life of the state and nation.

In his Arbor Day message, Gov. Shivers said, "The welfare of our state is largely dependent upon its natural resources. Among the vast resources with which Texas is blessed, forests and trees have played an important part in contributing to the well being and the happiness of Texans. The forests provide employment, income, wood products, soil protection, food and shelter for wildlife and recreation."

"Appropriate exercises for Arbor Day are not confined to the planting of trees," A. D. Folweiler, director of the Texas Forest Service, stated today. He added, "Everyone can observe Arbor Day by studying and observing conservation practices, preventing forest fires, and by avoiding carelessness with fire while in the woods or near wooded areas. Caring for growing trees is just as important as planting small trees. Observing Arbor Day in 1951 is especially important since unprecedented demands will be made on the forest resources of the State in the next few years."

Arbor Day was first observed in Nebraska, a treeless state, in 1872. The settlers missed the forests of the eastern states from which they had migrated. The value of observing Arbor Day was first recognized in Texas in 1889 when a law was passed designating its observance on Feb. 22. This law expired in 1925. Texas continued to recognize Washington's Birthday as Arbor Day until 1949 when the State Legislature adopted a resolution designating the third Friday in January as Arbor Day.

Officers Volunteer For Duty With Armed Forces

AUSTIN, Jan. 17.—Volunteers accounted for over 50 percent of the first increment of Army company grade reserve officers selected to apply on the Texas quota for the third recall program that was recently announced by the Department of Defense.

Names of officers to fill the quota will be submitted in three increments, each comprising one third of the total. Nominations for the first third were submitted this week. The second list will be forwarded January 23 and the third on February 1.

Vice President Will Speak For Texans Feb. 9

MINERAL WELLS, Jan. 17.—Twenty prominent Texans have been announced as sponsors for the second annual "Party of the Year," to be held Friday, Feb. 9, at the Baker Hotel here.

The party, a mammoth dinner honoring the women of the Southwest, is expected to be attended by more than 600 people, and will have Vice President Alben Barkley as principal speaker.

Women of the Southwest will be honored through a select group of women who have been outstanding in their respective fields. Many nominations have been received from all parts of Texas. The final selection will be made by a secret committee and will be announced about Feb. 1. Deadline for nominations is Jan. 29. The first annual "Party of the Year" was held at the Baker on Oct. 28, 1949, honoring officials of the State of Texas. More than 800 persons attended.

Guests will pay \$12.50 a plate to attend the Feb. 9 dinner and hear the vice president's address.

National Guard Plans To Drill 6 Extra Periods

Acceleration of training for all units of the 49th Armored Division has been ordered by Major General Albert S. Johnson, division commander.

The National Guard Bureau has authorized twelve additional drills for the current fiscal year to sharpen up skills and specialties of the Texas Tankers. General Johnson says the program must be completed before the first week-end in June since the 49th will go to Fort Hood for two weeks of summer camp on June 10th.

Units of the 49th Armored were previously authorized 48 two-hour drill periods per year. The additional drills will be for six hours each and will be held on week-ends. Subjects to be stressed include qualification in arms, both individual and crew-served, individual and unit tactics, marches and practice bivouacs, tracking missions for anti-aircraft units and specialist trainings.

Unit commanders over the state have been ordered to begin the extra drills immediately. The new program is expected to get underway for the Cisco-Eastland unit the first part of February.

Strength reports arriving at Division headquarters in Dallas from all units of the 49th in 56 Texas cities and towns show a definite gain in enlistments during the past month. Security restrictions do not permit the release of any figures or any comparative percentages.

However, officers in Dallas say that interest in the National Guard has picked up substantially since the first of the year. They add that vacancies and choice assignments are still available in the division. Many individuals are joining the division in preference to being drafted as it permits them to serve in local units with their friends and acquaintances.

Former Assistant County Agent Is Given Promotion

AUSTIN, Jan. 17.—Sam F. von Rosenberg, who served as assistant county agricultural agent of Eastland County in 1939, has been named field director of the Dairy Products Institute of Texas and the American Dairy Association of Texas, with headquarters in Austin.

George M. Clarke, executive vice-president, said von Rosenberg would begin his duties this week. He said von Rosenberg would have charge of developing and expanding in the field the two organizations' programs to obtain greater public understanding and acceptance of dairying and the use of dairy products.

After leaving Eastland County, von Rosenberg served successively as county agent of Mills and Palo Pinto counties. For the past year and a half he has been a dairy specialist with the Texas A & M College Extension Service, where he worked with dairymen and dairy organizations in the State through county agents.

The new field director has been identified with the Texas dairy industry since 1932. During his 18-year career he has served as county agent in three counties (Lee, Mills and Palo Pinto), assistant county agent of Eastland County, and with the Agricultural Adjustment Administration as an adjustment and administrative assistant in Blanco and Coleman Counties.

As a dairy specialist with the Carnation Company during the middle 40's, he developed numerous grade A dairies in Fayette, Colorado, Washington, Lavaca, and Austin Counties and set up a grade A Receiving Station at LaGrange.

Earlier in his career he was in business with his father as a milk producer in South-Central Texas, during which time he

Several Federal Job Exams Slated By Civil Service

The U. S. Civil Service Commission today announced examinations for filling the following positions: Staff Nurse, \$3,100 a year; Psychiatric Head Nurse, \$3,825 a year; Shorthand Reporter, \$3,450 a year; and Military Training Instructor, \$3,100 to \$4,600 a year.

Staff and Psychiatric Head Nurse positions are located in Washington, D. C., and vicinity and in the Panama Canal Zone. To qualify for these positions, applicants must have completed a full 3-year nursing course or a 2-year nursing course plus appropriate nursing experience or pertinent education. Applicants for Psychiatric Head Nurse must have had additional appropriate nursing experience or experience and education. No written test is required.

The Shorthand Reporter positions to be filled are in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. Competitors must take a test consisting of dictation at 175 words a minute for 5 minutes. For positions paying \$3,825 and above, they must also have had appropriate responsible experience.

Military Training Instructors are needed in the Signal School at Fort Monmouth, N. J. No written test is required. To qualify for the positions, applicants must have had experience with mobile, airborne, ground, and fixed communication equipment or systems. For positions paying \$3,825 and higher, experience as an instructor is required. Pertinent education may be substituted for all part of the experience, depending on the grade of position. Persons appointed at \$3,100 a year will be given 6 months' training before being appointed as instructors.

Maximum age limits for the above positions are as follows: For Staff and Psychiatric Head Nurse in the Panama Canal Zone, 35, and in Washington, D. C., and vicinity, 62; for Shorthand Reporter and Military Training Instructor, 62. These age limits are waived for persons entitled to veteran preference. More detailed information about these examinations may be obtained from the Commission's Local Secretary, Sam King, at the Cisco Post Office.

We had a lot of infantile paralysis in this nation last summer. Too much of it. Even one case of polio is too much. Just one kid, robber of his God-given right to run and walk, and have fun, and grow up in health, is one youngster too many to have polio.

But let's face it, and realize that last year was the second worst in the recorder history of the disease in the United States.

At the same time, let's ponder the following and very hopeful fact: Research into infantile paralysis never has presented a brighter front than it does today.

We can think the March of Dimes for a great deal of our reasons for optimism.

During the past 13 years, scientific investigators have come a long way since one Dr. Underwood, an English physician, noted polio's peculiar symptoms in the 18th century.

Poster Boy Lends A Hand



Larry McKenzie, 1951 March of Dimes poster boy, has the honor of contributing the first dime in the nationwide campaign against polio to Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. This year's coin container, designed as a miniature iron lung, bears Larry's picture and the slogan "Lend Me A Hand." Larry was stricken at his family's summer home near Lake Ontario in New York State in August, 1949. His case was serious, with arms, legs, breathing and eyesight at first involved. Now Larry is making a nice comeback, thanks to March of Dimes help.

What the bugs have to do with causing the dust bowl seems to be their destructive action on small grain and other plants which help protect the soil when they're sticking in the ground but leave it exposed when they're eaten, broken off or deteriorated.

By the way, the drought of recent months together with the cold weather, means a greater threat of dust blowing than in a good while. There has already been some around Lamesa. Plus a little in Erath and nearby counties.

Every year lately the Fort Worth stock show has had some new facility or other to show off at the big exposition in late January.

This time it's a new turkey-rabbit-poultry building between the sheep barn and cattle barn number one. Last year it was a new judging barn and sales arena.

This is the last column I'll be writing in this space. My successor at WBAP, W. A. (Doc) Ruhmann, will be taking over and since he knows more farming and ranching than I ever hope to, you should find him a good reading.
