### Retail Sales For 1950 Up In State

AUSTIN, Jan. 26—Texas retail sales for 1950 totaled \$6,704,900,000 (billion), up 3 per cent as compared with 1949, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported. Total durable goods sales for 1950 advanced 21 per cent, but nondurable goods sales slid 1 per cent.

Retail sales in all 31 reporting cities showed 1950 increases as compared with 1949.

Largest sales increases during 1950 were in Wichita Falls, 39 per cent; Lubbock, 38 per cent; Plainview, 24 per cent; San Angelo, 23 per cent; Austin, 22 per cent; Abilene, 21 per cent; and El Paso and Mineral Wells, 19 per cent.

December sales of Texas retailers totaled \$694,100,000, a 24-per cent increase over November. Durable goods sales advanced 19 per cent in December from November, as compared with a 27-per cent increase in sales in nondurable goods.

All cities reported monthly increases in December. McAllen creases in December. McAllen led with a 66-per cent advance; followed by Marshall, 64 per cent; Plainview, 61 per cent; San Angelo, 54 per cent; Denison, 52 per cent; Brownwood, 49 per cent; and Port Arthur, 45 per cent.

### Coaches Opposed To Proposed Rule On Gifts Of Fans

BEAUMONT, Jan. 26.—Professional pride is the strongest stimulus behind the Texas High School coaches opposition to the proposed Coaches Gift Rule in the UIL, according to Grady Hester, president of the Coaches Association. "We feel that some of the implications behind the rule are a slap at the integrity of our profession," Hester said.

He was referring to the argument that some proponents of the rule were using that if the coach accepted a gift from downtown admirers that he might feel his oyalty to them than his administrative superiors and the school board. "Such statements carry the hinky-veiled implication that we are susceptible to bribery, and we don't appreciate it," continued the Association's elected leader.

He further pointed out that the practice of rewarding meritorious service is the very basis of our free enterprise system, and that since we are now fighting a war outside our borders to preserve that system that it might be well to do something about preserving it at home.

"One of the finest practices in our school system is rewarding superintendents for years of faithful services," he also pointed out. "Sometimes these gifts range upward to nice homes. In too many instances the superintendent doesn't get it until he retires. Of course this rule is worded so as to touch him, but the coach who accepts anything valued at over a hundred dollars will find his school suspended from the League. The trouble with the pore ole' coach is that he seldom gets to stay at any one place long enough to retire. He has to either move on or get fired before he reaches 65."

The Coaches Association, which carries over 1500 members on its roster, is opposing the rule on the grounds that it is discriminatory legislation and that its passage will set a precedent that will further endanger an already hazardous profession.

## Seven Oil Rigs Are Running In Field Northeast Of City

Seven drilling rigs were busy today in the Bankline-Owens oil field some five miles northeast of Cisco, indicating the ever-increasing importance of the pool. And the field, which now has 31 flowing wells, has prospects for a good many more wells.

Bankline Oil Company, discoverers of the field, began drilling their 22nd well today after setting 235 feet of surface pipe in their No. 4 C. E. Reynolds. Bankline's 21st well — the No. 4 J. H. Reynolds — has been cemented and will be drilled in soon. Choate Drilling Company has drilled all of the Bankline wells.

Bob Gilenist Drilling Company's No. 2 Ayers flowed on the drill stem test this week to assure the pool of another good well. Located in Section 49, of Block 4, H&TC Survey, the well was cemented Wednesday and will be drilled in early next week.

Another of the wells — the

Cooper and Hemphill No. 4 Carlisle — was drilling at about 3,100 feet today, nearing the pay horizon.

Woodley Petroleum Co. No. 1 George P. Fee was drilling at 2,960 feet. This well, the western most location, was expected to top the Caddo Lime formation tonight.

Lohan Drilling Company's No. 1 John Hart had completed cleaning out and tank building preparatory to being drilled in late today. Lohan, who took a block of leases under a farmout agreement with Hickok Producing and Development Company, is expected to drill other wells in the near future.

Kupp and Dickson No. 2 Chance is a new well drilling in the field. Another new well is the J. M. Hickey and Sons No. 1 Hart.

Savage Bros. et al of Overton have announced their No. 2 D. B. Perdue to be an offset to the Clark lease production in the

field. It is 750 feet from the north and 100 feet from the east lines of the southeast quarter of Section 53, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Savage and Crossman recently drilled a large gas well on the Perdue. It was reported that Savage Bros. had bought out the interests of Crossman in the lease and planned further development.

Outcome of the Senate Oil Company's No. 1 Speegle Estate, wildcat test five miles southwest of Cisco, was expected to be known this week. Bottomed below 3,900 in the Ellenberger, electric logs were to be run this afternoon to determine any completion possibilities. No shows had been reported.

Four and a half miles southeast of Cisco, the Oil Associations No. 1 J. R. Bacon was expected to begin pumping soon after being shut in several days for installing equipment.

Only a few special events have been planned to date. We have been advised that the Legion will have a March of Dimes Dance January 30.

Each unit of the school system will conduct its own campaign as they see fit. All Clubs and business organizations will handle their own contributions within the organization.

On Tuesday evening, February 5, a special program of entertainment, "The Country Store show" will be held. Place will be announced later. Management and committees for this event will be arranged Monday, January 29.

Friday night, February 9th, "The Mothers March on Polio" with the theme, "Keep a light shining" will be held throughout the entire city. For particulars watch the Daily Press.

The local theatre is cooperating 100% with the campaign. The statistics for the past year relative to Polio in Eastland County are somewhat alarming and we hope in next Tuesday's edition of the Press to give them as a matter of reference.

It is sincerely hoped that all citizens will think seriously of the need of successfully securing our quota which is based on the small amount of 25c per capita.

### Junior Historian Offers Prizes To Texas Students

AUSTIN, Jan. 26 — Texas high school students may be able to win prizes for writing down the stories Grandma used to tell.

The Junior Historian, published by the Texas State Historical Association at the University of Texas, is sponsoring a writing contest open to regular Junior Historian chapter members and to any Texas high school student who becomes a member-at-large by subscribing to the magazine.

Contestants may write on any topic in Texas history, but Dr. H. Bailey Carroll, Historical Association director, advises students to select a subject concerning some aspect of their own local history. Every locality contains an abundance of interesting historical facts, he pointed out.

Suggested subjects are cattle, cattle trails, cowboy amusements, books, Indians, sheep and goats, the packing industry, oil booms, farming, lumbering, business enterprises, early industries, newspapers, transportation, wild life, description of scenic places, home life, or architecture.

First prize will be \$100; second prize, \$75; third prize, \$50; and six other prizes will be given. Part of each award will be made in current Texas books. Closing date for the contest is April 1.

Three additional prizes are offered through the Junior Historian by the Texas Folklore Society for the best folktales or legends or stories of national history.

Also, three prizes totaling \$35 are offered for articles concerning former Governor James Stephen Hogg.

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## Junior College ROTC Units Could Fill Big Military Training Need

AUSTIN, Jan. 20.—Junior College ROTC units could do much to help meet military training needs, Dr. C. C. Colvert, University of Texas professor and junior college education authority, asserts. The junior colleges can have successful reserve corps units if Congress will allocate funds for such training, he maintains. About 35 U. S. junior colleges now have

federally-sponsored military training programs. Reserve corps or similar training programs are probably the only means to keep many junior colleges from closing because of enrollment drops, Dr. Colvert says. The plan the American Association of Junior Colleges advocates offers a solution to the manpower problem, he declares. That plan aims to give young men a

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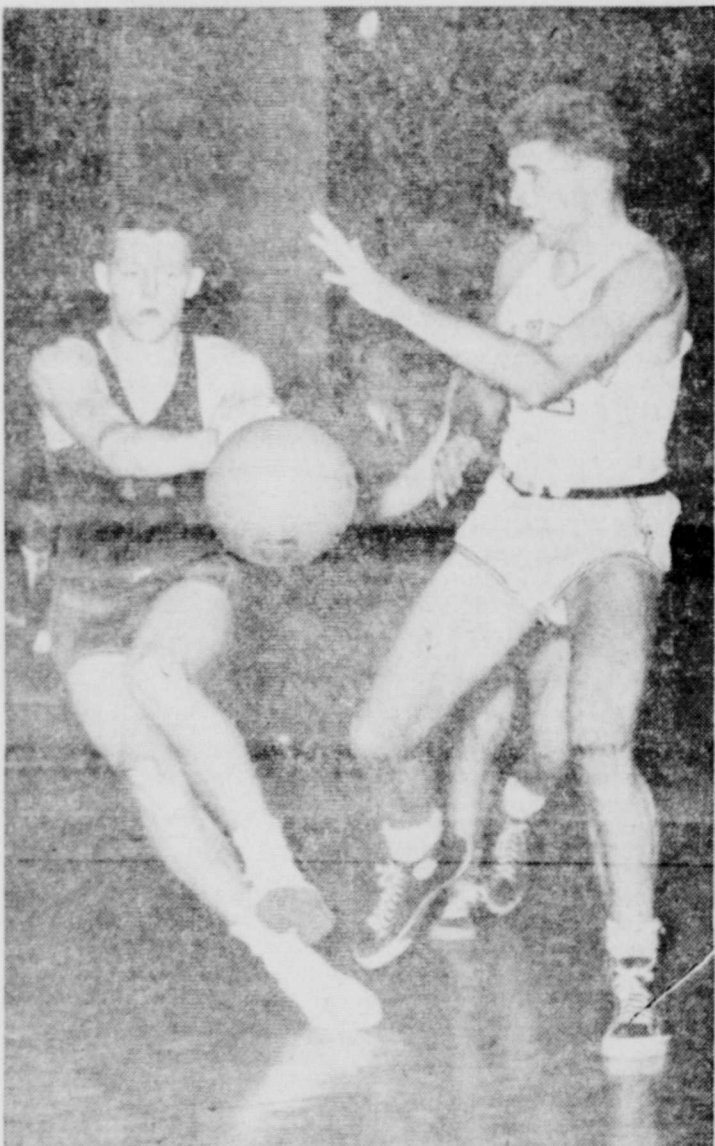

choice, except under total mobilization, in the ways they may obtain proper military training. Under the plan, youths at the age of 18 or on high school graduation would know they would have to receive at least a year of military training or its equivalent. Each youth could choose one of five alternatives: enlist in any branch of the regular services; enter a basic training program for one year continuous training; enlist in the National Guard, continuing with civilian employment or education and getting military training at the same time; apply for admission to a service academy and, if successful, obtain his college education and military training concurrently; or apply for admission to a senior or junior college, or technical institute which has a military training program. There he would receive his education and military training together just as he would if he were attending a military school or service academy. Every college would have the privilege of deciding whether or not it wanted military training. Also, any young man not wishing to take such training with his education could take his military training before going to college. Such a plan would supply trained young men for defense at not too great a cost to the federal government, Dr. Colvert remarked.

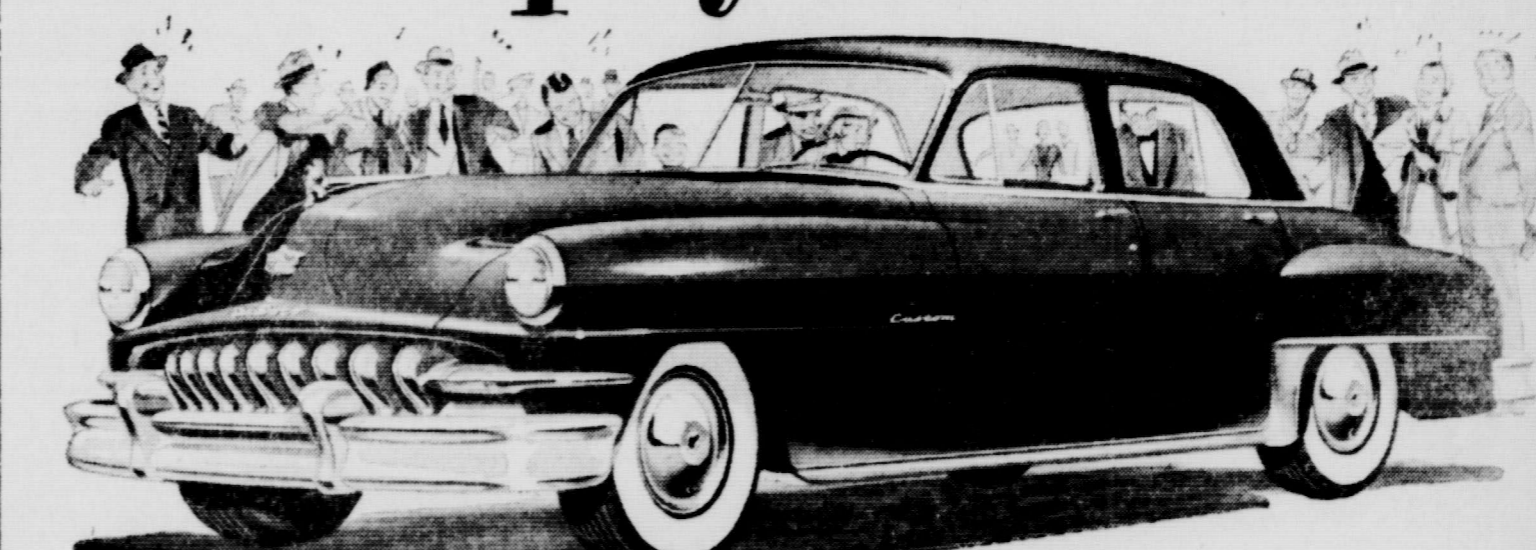



### 46 Texas Women Are Nominated As Party Honorees

MINERAL WELLS, Jan. 24 — Texas citizens have nominated 46 prominent women of their state as possible honorees at the second annual "Party of the Year" to be held Feb. 9 at the Baker Hotel here. Fred Brown, of the hotel, announced Wednesday.

The 1951 "Party of the Year" will be a mammoth dinner honoring women of the Southwest. Vice President Alben Barkley will be principal speaker. More than 600 persons will pay \$12.50 a plate to attend, Brown said.

Within the next week a secret selection committee of women and men will narrow the list down to the names of four women who will represent all women of the Southwest. Deadline for nominations is Jan. 29. Names of the four honorees will be announced Feb. 1.

to date are women outstanding in the fields of law, government, publishing, education, literature, industry and social service.

Approximately 50 per cent of the nominations have come from men, who are taking an extraordinary interest in this party and showing enthusiasm over the idea of honoring Southwestern women for their accomplishments.

In making their nominations, Texas men, who have traditionally been strong for their womenfolk, give high praise to women who shoulder their civic and social responsibilities and exercise their Constitutional rights.

Typical of comments being received is one from Neville G. Penrose, prominent oil producer

of Fort Worth, who said, "In my opinion, the abilities and qualifications of the average women who participates in civic and government affairs are much higher than those of the average man who participates. For this reason, I believe in recruiting more women to join in these activities, and in supporting and encouraging those few who are so engaged."

The first annual "Party of the Year" was held in October, 1949, and honored officials of the State of Texas. This year's dinner will be held in the hotel's huge pavilion. Dinner will begin at 7 p. m., and will be presided by a hospitality hour at 5:30 p. m.
