MR. B. A. BUTLER, who is a famed newspaper man, drove into the new oil field five miles northeast of Cisco the other morning. He made a number of pictures and wrote a story about it.

It is a story that tells the over picture — that The Press has been running almost every day. It occurs to us that you might like to read Mr. Butler's story following.

That is currently the hottest play in the old West Central area boom area has skeptical men excited but, curiously enough, has so far created little more than a rippled interest among the usually excitable public. The Bankline play, between Cisco and Eastland, admittedly the most significant development in this area since the original boom days.

A year ago the average operator familiar with the history of the area wouldn't have dropped dime for his chances of producing there. Today he is glad to pay upwards of \$250.00 per acre for oil money for a chance to make holes there at \$50,000.00 per acre. More than twenty-five producing wells and a drilling program that is steadily expanding the limits of the Lake Sand horizon — historically the most favorable of the Eastland County producing areas — are logic enough in his eyes. It means something even more significant than a new pool, means, say operators, that no territory, no matter how dead may appear to past exploration, can be said with any certainty to be a new completion process or a new completion process awakened undreamed of potential.

That is what happened in the Lake Sand field. The spectacle of this good for 500 or more barrels per day coming in with spontaneous regularity from a zone often drilled as often produced dry during the past 20 years has convinced the most skeptical that the history of flush production in West Central Texas has chapters to be written. It means that many Lake Sand fields and possibly other strata, explored and abandoned in the past, are potential flush horizons waiting for improved methods of drilling and production to add to the record.

Compared to the Bankline development the much publicized former Mississippi play north of Cisco a couple of years ago was significant. Already the Bankline pool covers four square miles and still its limits are undefined. "We've got a hell of a lot to learn about the oil business when it comes to much good territory can get away from us for thirty years."

Ironically, a lot of ignorance about the checkered history of the area and its formations was responsible for whatever light the Bankline development has thrown on the subject. At least that is the view of L. E. Kanne, Californian and manager of the Texas-New Mexico division of the Bankline Company of Los Angeles, California, and Midland, Texas, explained it. "We just didn't know any better than to try," he said. But the decision of the Bankline gamble important money in the area was inspired by considerably more than that blissful addition. It was a cool calculation, backed by the stubborn confidence of Geologist Bob Steel and Kanne that there was oil in the discredited horizons between Cisco and Eastland and particularly in a large structure which geologic examination had closed there.

The most promising location seemed to be on a tract of 2,000 acres held by the British-American Oil Producing Company. Kanne took a farm out of this tract for the Bankline and connected with L. H. Choate, Cisco operator and drilling contractor, for a well on the Briggs Owen block 4, H & TCR survey. The Lake sand was picked up about 3,250 feet with a bleed of some gas. Choate carried the hole to contract depth, backed and perforated 12 feet of section in the Lake horizon. Here another of the factors supporting the Bankline "gamble" entered the picture. A new fracturing process, commercially known as Hydracraft, was introduced.

Cold To Continue Through This Week

Old man Winter moved into Cisco and all of Texas Sunday and from all reports will keep a firm grip on the area for most of the week and possibly longer. After basking in almost summer weather for several days Cisconians were greeted with thermometer readings of seven degrees above the zero mark when they waked up Monday.

The mercury rose only a few degrees during the day and then tumbled to the ten degree mark Tuesday morning. The forecast called for readings in the teens.

The current cold spell caused considerable discomfort to local citizens and caused postponement of several social and sports events.

Attendance at schools were way below normal with some schools reporting almost 50 per cent absenteeism. The Lutheran School was closed Tuesday due to the cold and night classes at Cisco Junior College were dismissed for Tuesday night. Some school buses failed to run Monday and Tuesday.

Most activity in the oil fields in the area was stopped because of freezing drilling mud and freezing engines. Trains and busses in and out of Cisco were running behind schedule and mail was slowed down accordingly.

Stockmen in the area were forced to furnish additional feed for cattle to carry them through the cold weather.

The forecast called for possible moisture in the form of snow or freezing rain and farmers and ranchmen were eying the clouds in hopes that the extended dry spell would be broken.

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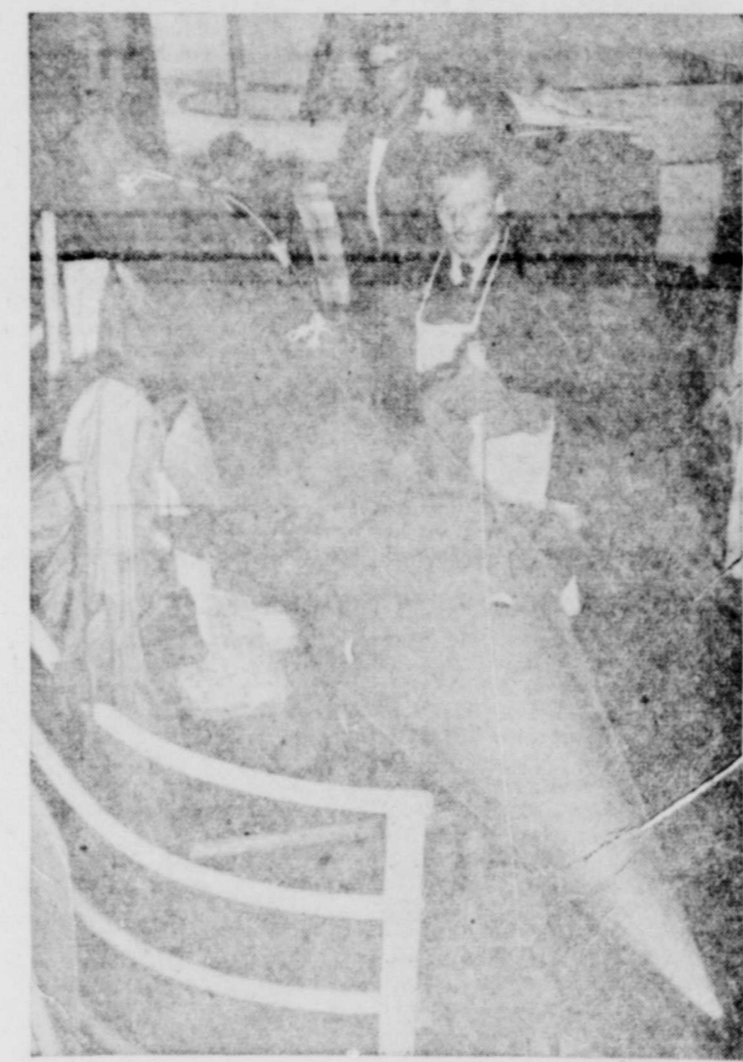

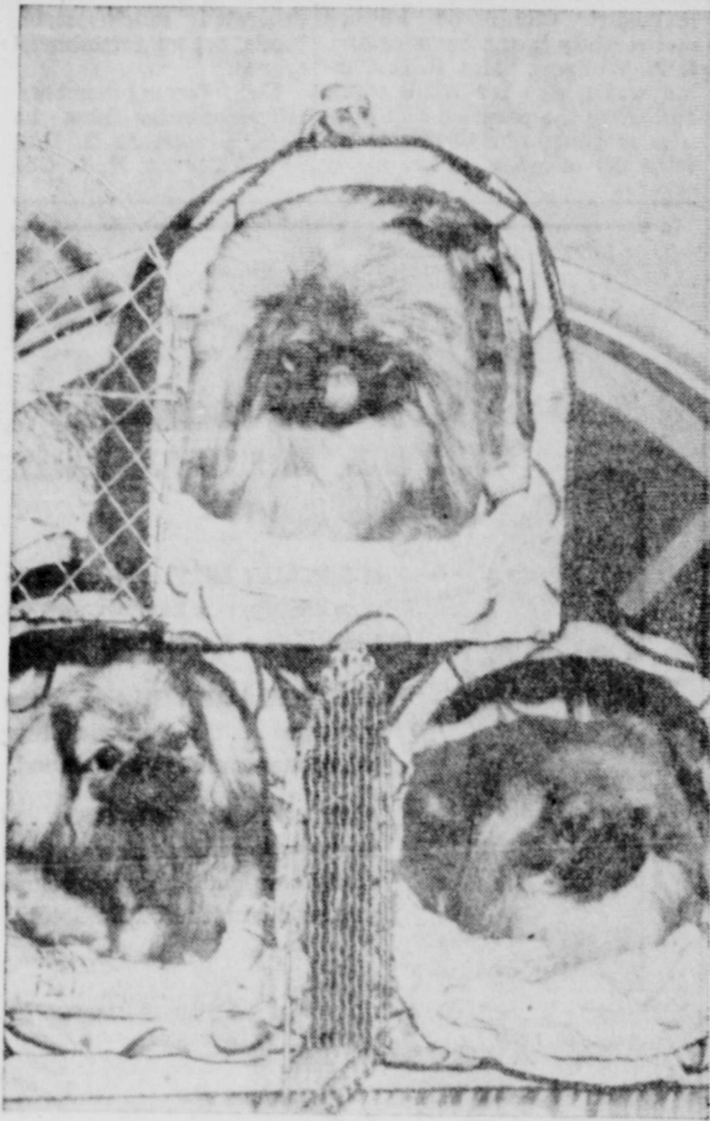

ed into the hole by a Cisco crew of the Haliburton Oil Well Cementing Company. Utilizing the hydraulic principle, this process cracked the sand formation horizontally out beyond the normal seal-off caused by high pressure rotary drilling.

The Lake sand has a history of long-lived but grudging production and Kanne and his people looked for a 40-barrel, or perhaps a 50-barrel well. But the well, opened 24 hours later, flowed 150 barrels in the first three hours.

It stimulated some comment, a local newspaper headline or two. Its behavior was characteristic of the area. Bankline went on to develop the 2,000-acre farm-out jointly with the British-American. One by one new wells were brought in for potentials that caused mild but still skeptical flurries of interest.

Bankline extended its activity to new holdings acquired independently of its discovery partner, and other operators began to push into the area, warily at first, anticipating another brief peak of activity, another fading off along the dwindling edges of a "pimple."

Perversely, neither the saturation nor the sand "pinched out." To the growing amazement of the fraternity it spread in several directions, twice leaping over dry

holes to resume the productive trend with even greater potentials. Some of the new wells, encountering the sand as much as 100 feet below the discovery pick-up, flung oil sixty feet and more through drill stem tests and were completed without benefit of artificial fracturing.

The Briggs Owen No. 1 was finished in May, 1950. Nine months later, in the third week in January, 1951, Bankline turned its nineteenth producer, the Jesse Reynolds No. 4, into one of the shining batteries of tanks which dot the clean, orderly pattern of the field.

Other operators in the field are C. E. Cooper and C. F. Hemphill of Cisco with four producers and one well drilling; B. F. Gilchrist of Wichita Falls with one producer and one drilling; J. P. Lohan et al, whose John Hart No. 1, brought in for an unannounced but reportedly large potential, extended the field three-quarters of a mile west; J. J. Lynn whose Mize No. 1 and Mize No. 2 spread the productive horizon south of the original wells; W. D. Feldman and Bert Fields, both of Dallas, each of whom likewise established extensions south or west with a good well; Kupp and Dickson, drilling their No. 2 Chance after one failure; and C. Andrade of Dallas who is drilling his No. 1 Taylor. In all there were 29 producers and seven drilling wells

in the area at the end of January. The new field has stimulated activity in other areas where sand formations have been logged, and in both Eastland and Cisco there is talk of townsite drilling. There has also been a revival of interest in the Klineer area north of the presence of Lake sand bodies adjacent to the original Mississippi reef formation.

But whether or not the play spreads to new areas, the greatest activity is now concentrated in efforts to get in the path of the Bankline trends which are yet to be defined. In general these trends seem to be north and

south with westward leaning

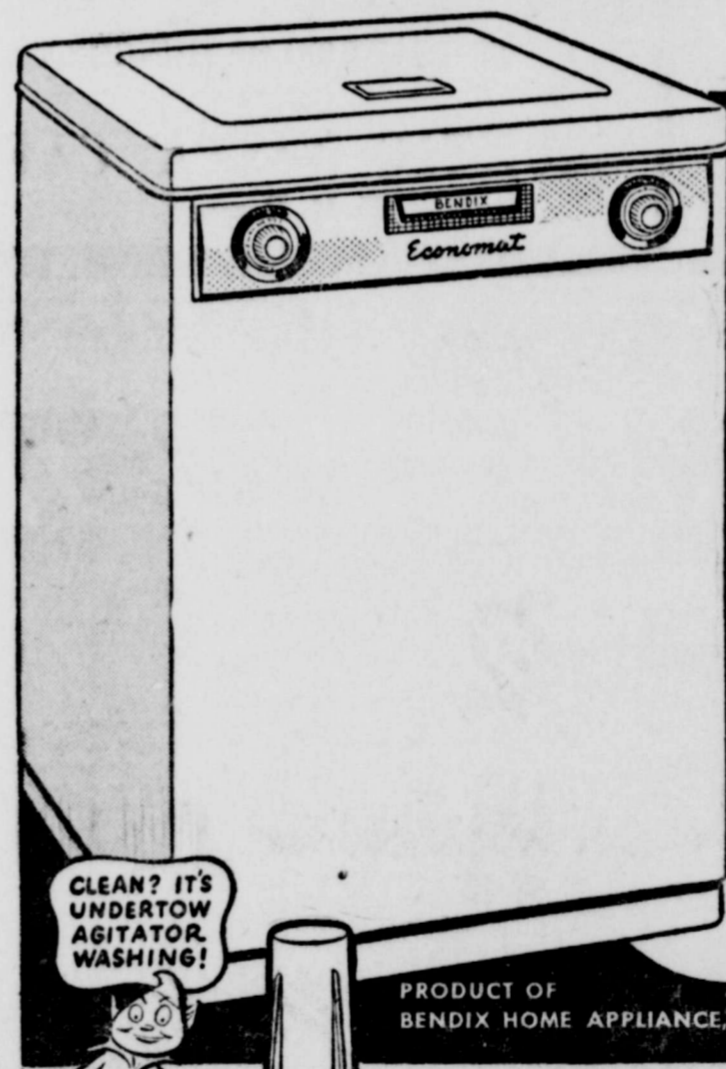
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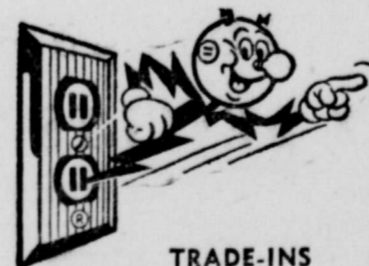
