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Bible Orchards Near City Look To Pecans For Big Money Crop

The Bible Brothers' big fruit and pecan orchards of 240 acres in the Cisco area have been paying dividends over several years. "But it's the pecan culture that we're looking forward to," Homer

A. Bible, 509 West Sixth, Cisco, said. Homer is associated with his brother R. A. Bible, large implement dealer in Abilene.

"We could have sold \$20,000 worth of locally grown apples last

fall if we could have produced them," Bible said. "We gathered around 10,000 bushels of a 15,000 bushel yield, but due to a severe hailstorm in the growing season we lost around 5,000 bushels and the remainder were scarred up by hail storm, causing a heavy depreciation in the selling price."

Apples not blemished by hail sold readily at \$2 to \$2.50 a bushel. The Bible brothers sold 10,000 bushels last year at a much reduced price because of the defoliation. Of the total, 3,000 bushels are sold usually to a large San Antonio wholesaler.

The Bibles also grew some peaches last season. The two orchards contain 3,500 peach trees, Elberta and Fair's Beauty and other species. The Fair's Beauty are preferred, Bible said, because they mature early before the market is cluttered. They are a delicious eating as well as cooking peach.

"But it's the pecans we're expecting to make our orchards really pay off in the future," Bible said. "Our groves presently are not producing good because of being young. But every year the yield is better than that of the preceding year. You know, it takes a

pecan about 15 years after planting really to get into big production.

The Bible brothers acquired the Anderson orchard southeast of Romney, near Cisco, about six years ago. Then, the celebrated John Harlow orchard was taken over nine miles southwest of Cisco. It has 135 acres in peaches, apples, pecans. The Anderson orchard contains 85 acres.

Homer Bible came to the Cisco area April 20, 1919, from Grayson County. He lives in Cisco, where he has oil interests. On the two orchard places he employed 3 orchardists, but 1 has just been taken into the Army. "He was one of the best men in orchard work in the West and I regret very much his leaving," Bible said.

The Bibles pressed many bushels of apples last fall to produce cider, but the cider business has not developed to any marked financial success, he said. However, use of cider is growing. "A glass of cider a day—preferably before breakfast—keeps the doctor away," Bible remarked.

The pecan groves are trifty. The papershell varieties of pecans are grown, including the celebrated Burkett originating in the Cisco area.

"Biggest problem of the orchardist has been to keep down insects," Bible said. "It's a constant job of spraying."

He inclines to the view that many important large orchards in West Texas which "died out" in the last few years did so due to improper cultivation, pruning, and insect and fungi spraying. —By Hamilton Wright in Abilene Reporter News.

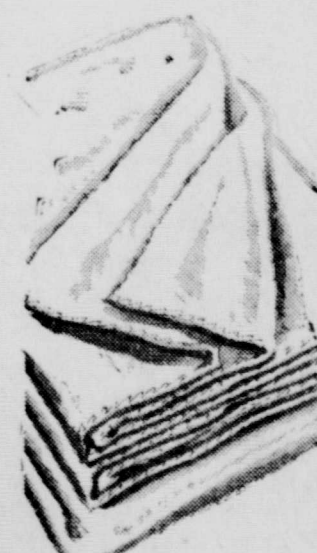

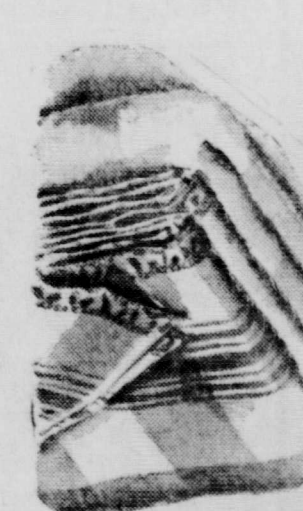

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### Grains Progress In Some Sections After Light Snow

Wheat continued to show signs of limited improvement in some northern High Plains counties this week following the light snow of two weeks earlier, but deterioration continued on the limited acreage brought to a stand in other areas. Earlier freezes and extended drought appear to have almost completely destroyed fall seeded oats and spring seeding has been retarded by dry soils.

Winter grasses and legumes were responding favorably to im-

proved moisture condition in upper coastal and northeast areas. Over most of the State, however, the adverse effects of almost complete absence of rain since October 1 becomes increasingly distressing. All areas are badly in need of soaking rains. Preparation of land for seeding of summer row crops was further delayed and was seriously behind schedule in extreme south Texas where seeding time was being rapidly approached.

The severe norther which struck on the night of January 28 bringing below zero temperatures in the High Plains and freezing temperatures as far south as Eagle Pass and the Winter Garden area, has continued in force up to the present time, dipping into the eastern tip of the lower Rio Grande Valley with a low of 26 degrees recorded at Brownsville and below freezing temperatures most of the night of January 29. Although it is too early to determine the extent of damage resulting from this latest freeze, commercial vegetables and citrus fruits were undoubtedly hurt. There was no snow cover to protect wheat from the severe cold in northwest areas, but it was also too early to determine the extent of possible damage to that crop.

Winter vegetables moved in comparatively small volume, with supplies coming entirely from the irrigated districts. Water for irrigation purposes was critically short and voluntary and enforced rationing was necessary in the west end of the Lower Rio Grande Valley to assure drinking water and essential irrigation in the east end. Planting of spring-crop vegetables in irrigated sections was further curtailed, and in dry land areas of south Texas growers held little hope of getting these crops planted. Trans-

planting of onions was underway in the Kaufman area where recent rains had fallen, but planting was being retarded over most of the north Texas area by dry soils. Seeding of tomatoes to hotbeds was active in east Texas. Harvest of citrus fruits continued with a comparatively light volume moving into fresh market channels.

Winter grasses and clovers made some growth in upper coastal and northeast areas recently favored by rains, but heavy feeding of bundles and concentrates continued throughout the State. Except in parts of South Texas, feed was generally available in ample quantities and cattle and sheep are in fair to good condition. Early lambing was getting underway in northern Plateau counties.

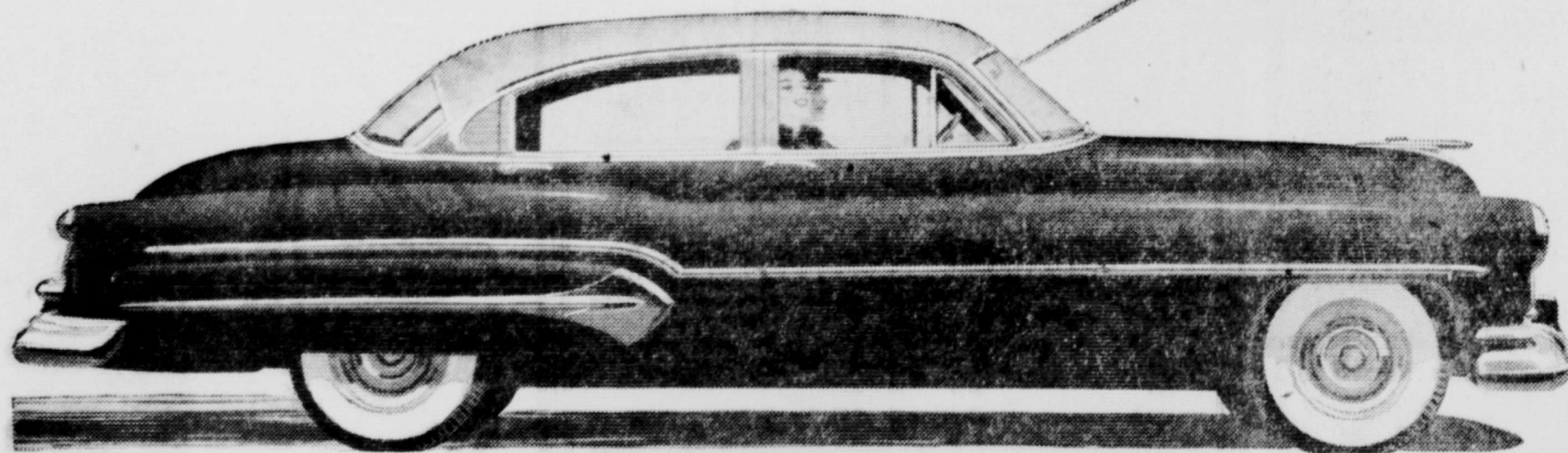
