Navy To Enlarge Training Centers

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 2—Navy recruiting officials here are emphasizing that the current restriction on recruiting is not a "freeze" but a quota system brought on by limited facilities at recruit training centers.

Quotas will be increased as more facilities become available. Eighth Naval District headquarters here announced.

The Navy also pointed out that no quota has been placed on enlistments of persons with enough previous Navy, or other military, service to make recruit training unnecessary.

The recruiting quota for the week ending Feb. 3 is 3,600 recruits, it was announced.
