

Sub-Contracts In Project Are Let By Abilene Firm

A proceed order was issued today to the E. M. Lambert and Son Construction Company of Abilene to begin construction work on 52 brick veneer housing units for the City of Cisco, and the contractor planned to begin work at 1 p. m.

Thus, the \$400,000 project was to get underway after being in the planning stages for nearly two years. It is being built under the Public Housing Authority low-rent program and is expected to be completed in some eight months.

John L. Black, construction superintendent for the Lambert company, announced that several sub-contracts have been awarded. These include:

- Abilene Plumbing Company — plumbing work.
Jones and Smallwood, Cisco — electrical work.
Lydick-Hooks Company, Abilene — roofing.
E. F. Smith and Company, Abilene — bulldozer work.

Mr. Lambert, visiting here early Tuesday in connection with the beginning of the project, estimated that about 100 men would be employed during peak construction periods. He said that arrangements were near completion to buy virtually all materials from Cisco firms. He indicated that no painting contract would be let—that Cisco painters would be employed without contract to do the work.

A survey crew was due to begin work at 1 p. m. as the initial step in the project. An office building will be erected in the near future, and various materials will begin moving to the site.

The Cisco Housing Authority issued the proceed order after all details of the contract had cleared the PHA offices in Fort Worth. A PHA engineer to supervise the work here, in Ranger and Dublin was due to move to Cisco Wednesday. An engineer for the architects has already moved here.

The housing authority will open bids late this month for refrigerators and stoves to be used in the houses.

Oldest Resident Dies Sunday; To Hold Rites Today

Cisco's oldest resident, Mrs. Gilbert H. Kinsey, died at her home at 7:15 p. m. Sunday following a short illness. Mrs. Kinsey would have been 96 years of age on February 12.

She had been a resident of Cisco for the past 49 years and had been active until a short time ago when her eyesight began to fail. She was born in Trenton, Tennessee, on February 12, 1855 and never lost her love for the old south. She held a keen memory of some of the events of the Civil War and of the events following the war. She could also recall some of the Indian troubles met by the pioneer people of the country.

Marines To Open Officer School

The Marine Corps has announced its first Officer Candidate Course since World War II, where by college graduates with no military experience may become officers.

Qualified graduates, or seniors in accredited colleges who will receive a baccalaureate degree this spring, other than in medicine, dentistry, or theology, and who will be less than 27 years of age on July 1, may write to the Commandant of the Marine Corps Headquarters U. S. Marine Corps, Washington 25, D. C. for information.

Accepted candidates will be enlisted in the Marine Corps Reserve and sent to an intensive 10 week training course at Parris Island, S. C. this spring and summer. Successful graduates will be commissioned Second Lieutenants in the Marine Corps Reserve and sent to the Marine Corps School, Quantico, Virginia for a comprehensive five months basic officers' course.

Candidates who fail to qualify for a commission will be given the option of discharge from the Marine Corps or assignment to active duty in enlisted status.

A limited number of the graduates of this Officer Candidate Course may be offered commissions as career Marines.

New Bill Would Continue Farm Road Building Without Additional Taxes

AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—A bill designed to continue the present outstanding Farm to Market road building program of the State Highway Department and to do so without additional taxation or bonded indebtedness was introduced in the House of Representatives today by Rep. Callan Graham of Junction.

Rep. Graham stated enactment of the bill will give the state ap-

proximately \$15,000,000 annually for the next biennium for continuation of the Farm to Market Road building made possible by the passage of Senate Bill No. 287 by the 51st Legislature and known as the Colson-Briscoe Bill. This carried an appropriation of \$15,000,000 a year from the clearance fund or general fund.

The bill, said Rep. Graham, is short and simple and has two

main points. First, it establishes procedure for construction and improvement of farm to market roads throughout the next biennium. This section is identical in language with that contained in Senate Bill No. 287.

This means, the legislator explained, that the operation will be identical with the successful program developed during the past two years which the Colson-Briscoe bill made possible.

"The only difference," Rep. Graham said, "is in the source of revenue to accomplish this objective."

Next, the new legislation provides an amendment to the law which has been on the statute books since 1932, commonly known as the Road Bond Assumption Act. When this was passed in 1932, the legislator explained, it set aside one cent of the state gasoline tax income for liquidating the bonded debt that had been created and expended for construction by counties upon roads that became a part of the state highway system.

State Highway Department records were cited by Rep. Graham which showed that this road bond fund has now reached the point where, for the fiscal year ending September 1, 1930, there was \$14,600,000 in revenues derived from one cent of the State gasoline tax over and above the requirements of the bonds being liquidated by the fund.

"Under the present law," Rep. Graham said, "half of the above amount or \$7,300,000 was distributed among the various Texas counties, as provided by law, for use of the County Commissioner's Courts. The other half was allocated to the State Highway Department and set up in a special account to be used for construction of farm to market roads."

Concerning the amount distributed to County Commissioner's Courts, Rep. Graham stated that the Amendment Act provides that first call upon these funds shall be for liquidation of debts incurred prior to January 2, 1939

for purchase of highway rights of way.

"Very little of this debt still remains and the amount used for this purpose is inconsequential," Rep. Graham stated.

The second call upon these funds was for debt service on obligations made by counties prior to January 2, 1939 for construction of country roads. This included both county bonds and warrants.


