Funeral services for Mrs. Jennie Stephens, 92-year old pioneer Eastland County woman and mother of Mrs. D. L. Dunaway of Cisco, were held at 3 p. m. Monday in Thomas Funeral Chapel with Rev. Garrett, Primitive Baptist minister of Abilene in charge. Mrs. Stephens died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. M. L. McKinley in Wichita Falls on February 10 after a lengthy illness. A native of Alabama where she was born on October 20, 1858, she came to Texas in 1880 and moved to Hamilton County where she met and married William Varney (Bud) Stephens. Mr. Stephens died in 1925. They moved to Eastland County in 1884 and settled near Cisco on what is now the Arch Birt farm. They lived in the area until Mr. Stephens' death and Mrs. Stephens continued to live here until she went to Wichita Falls to be with her daughter. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. McKinley and Mrs. Dunaway; four sons, E. M. Stephens of Buckhorn, New Mexico, G. C. Stephens of Sierra Blanca, W. C. Stephens of Sipe Springs and F. M. Stephens of Eunice, New Mexico. Also surviving are 27 grandchildren, 36 great grandchildren, two great grandchildren. Burial was in the Dothan cemetery with Thomas Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

## Testing Continues In Speegle Wildcat

Cisco area oil play, increasing in tempo for several months, had moved to within two miles of the city limits today after the Benson-Montin No. 1 E. B. Hayes wildcat test just north of town, appeared certain of being a good producer.

The well drilled into the Lake Sand over the week-end. Two sections of the sand were found, and a drill stem test in the upper structure showed recovery of 30 feet of oil with strong pressure. Water showed in tests of the lower section. Pipe was set Sunday in the hole with completion work scheduled to begin about Thursday.

Leasing and trading in the area was brisk following the developments. It was understood that Benson and Montin, Oklahoma City oil operators, have several hundred acres of land in the area and their plans call for continuous development.

Southwest of Cisco, the Senate Oil Company's No. 1 Speegle Estate was still testing. Tests in the Caddo lime continued to show strong gas pressure. It was reported that the flow recovery was decreasing in the amount of water coming from the hole and that the oil content of the stream was increasing.

A mile north of Cisco, Wapler Bros. No. 2 George Fee was drilling at 2,900 feet today. Location is just back of the Fee ranch home. Lake sand pay is expected in this test.

In the Bankline-Owens pool, Kulp and Dixon No. 2 Otto Chance was to drill cement plug today to complete in the Lake sand.

A new development for the pool is the S. D. Johnson No. 1 S. B. Mize, some six miles northeast of Cisco. Location is on a 135-acre lease in section 59, block 4, H&TC survey.

Another new project for the county is the W. B. Ulmer, Lynch and Allen Co. No. 1 Beula B. Butler, three miles southeast of Eastland. It is scheduled for 4,000 feet. Location is in the Nancy Ussury Survey.

Texas will have at least 1,950,000 children of school age by 1960 if the present migration and birthrate trends continue, according to E. L. Galyean, director of research of the Association.

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## Special Services Officers Needed

AUSTIN, Feb. 13.—To meet a shortage of Special Services Officers in its current expansion program, the Army this week announced a program to commission qualified persons as Second Lieutenants in the Officers Reserve Corps. Colonel C. M. Culp, Chief of the Texas Military District, stated today.

These appointments will be limited to applicants who are qualified by military or civilian experience as special services officers, theatrical entertainment directors or athletic directors.

The offer is open to members of the Enlisted Reserve Corps, former officers, warrant officers and enlisted men of the regular army and enlisted reservists now serving on active duty. Applicants must be between the ages of 21 and 28 and be able to pass a physical examination for active duty.

Colonel Culp said that applicants who qualify and are accepted will be commissioned in the Adjutant General Corps of the Reserve and assigned special services duties. They may request extended active duty at the time they apply for the commission, however, this is not required.

Qualified individuals are requested to contact local Organized Reserve Unit instructors for detailed information and assistance in preparing their applications.

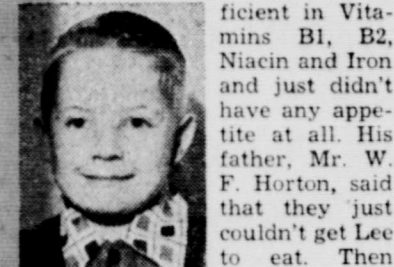

Mr. Korbobo said one should follow three basic principals of design in landscaping a home. First, frame your home with trees and shrubs; second, keep it simple. And, third, as a good citizen, one should design the public area of his property (that part which is seen by the public) to satisfy the public.

He illustrated his subject, "Frame Your Home With Trees and Shrubs," by employing a large felt backdrop upon which he placed colored felt objects of miniature trees, shrubs, and also flower beds, showing the effects of good and bad landscape designs.

"Keep the lawns in the front yard open and free from small ornamental flower beds," he said, "and in passing along the street, there should be at least one place where the public can have an open view of your home. Enhance that view by framing it like picture, with the use of trees and shrubs."

"The front door should be the focal point of a foundation planting so that attention is drawn down to it. By that," he said, "avoid using tall spectacular plants but rather employ a few dignified specimens, in keeping with the scale of your home, for either side of the door."

"Plants are used at the corners of a building principally to blend with the building into its natural surroundings. This is done by concealing the inverted 'T' formed where the vertical building line meets the horizontal ground line. Many times only one plant is needed to serve this purpose. Patience in waiting for this one plant to grow large enough to fulfill its purpose is of utmost importance. For larger homes more than one plant may be needed. The general rule in such a situation is to plant a taller-growing variety near the corner of the house and some lower-growing sorts at its base to complete the group."

"Border and screen plantings are used for various reasons. Screens can be used to partly or completely conceal undesirable objects such as garages, refuse dumps, busy streets, highways, and billboards. Border plantings also separate your property from your neighbor's and thereby give desired privacy. They can be used to segregate one area from another on the same property. On farms, they segregate the home grounds from the farm property. Many times these boundary plantings are broken at advantageous places to frame some particular point of interest in the district landscape. On the average city property, however, the border plantings act mainly as a barrier or an enclosure. If space is available, border plantings should have tall plants in the rear 'faced' with smaller ones in the front."

"Small trees may be used at the corners of a very large house to soften the architectural lines. Where the home and the front yard are both small, the same small trees might be used on the lawn instead of large shade trees. In such a case, they would be used to 'frame the home.'"

"Many factors must be considered when choosing shade trees. The first two are WHY and then WHERE do you want them. After these two questions are answered in your mind you may begin to consider just which trees you will buy. Keep in mind such items as shallow, heavy feeding roots, dense foliage, the branching habits, size, color of bark, falling seed pods and fruit, insect pests diseases, rate of the growth, color of foliage in fall, and hardness."

"In the back or private area of your grounds, place flowers so that they will have a background behind them."

Mr. Korbobo stressed using plants, shrubbery and trees which are hardy and suitable to your particular climate conditions.

"Another thing," he said, "You can't fool the public. If you are planning on building a home, build a walk direct to the door. If you have curved and fancy walks they will take a short-cut and beat a direct path to your door anyway." "Another thing which is seldom done and should be stressed," he pointed out, "all walks should be four feet wide so two people can walk abreast and not in 'Indian' fashion."

After the lecture, Mr. Korbobo answered many questions in the open discussion.

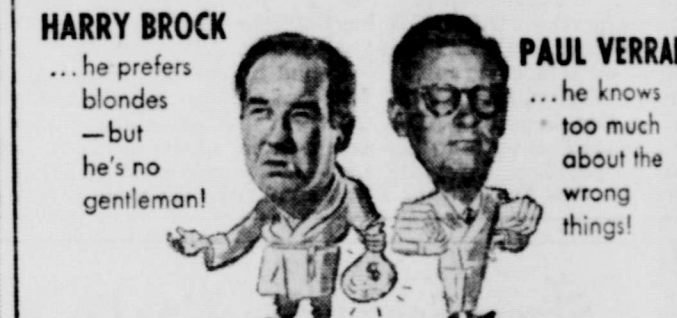

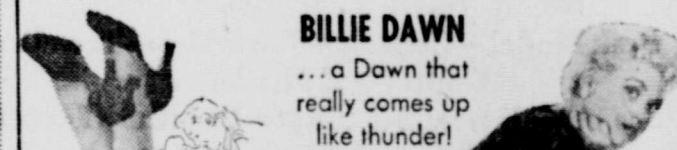
