EASTLAND COUNTY RED CROSS CHAPTER READY FOR CAMPAIGN

With the announcement of Mrs. John Love as 1951 fund-raising chairman, the Eastland County Chapter of the American Red Cross is getting set for its annual campaign to raise funds to cover the year's expenditures. At a recent meeting at the Red Cross office in the Eastland County Courthouse, Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins, chapter chairman, announced Mrs. Love's appointment.

At the first meeting of the planning committee, T. W. Wagner, national field representative, talked to the committee on the need of Red Cross for the coming year. He stated that the Eastland County quota would be \$6000 for this year, the same as last year. He stated that quotas over the country generally had been raised for this year, but Eastland County's quota will not be raised at this time.

Town quotas will be announced by Mrs. Love in the near future. Wagner, who makes his home in Marlin, but who is attached to the St. Louis, Mo. office of the American Red Cross, said the government has asked the Red Cross to increase its services for the nearly 3,500,000 men it expects to have in the armed services during the year. These services will take up about 50 percent of the operating budget. At the present time, there are 40 blood banks operating as Red Cross regional centers to furnish blood and plasma to the armed services. Since the Korean situation developed in June, the Red Cross through these 40 centers has been able to meet the necessary quotas and each day has sent blood and plasma to the battle front and to hospitals for the service men. It will continue to meet these quotas at all times.

Health Officer Reports Measles Nearing Epidemic

AUSTIN, Feb. 15.—Measles in Texas is reaching a mild epidemic stage at present, with outbreaks following closely the main lines of travel across the State, according to information made public today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "The peculiar pattern of this spread of measles re-emphasizes the fact that it is a contagious disease, passed on from one person to another," Dr. Cox said. "Guard against exposure by avoiding contact with measles patients."

Dr. Cox said that measles alone is not necessarily a dangerous disease, but dangerous complications such as streptococcus, mastoiditis, and pneumonia which frequently follow, make it a disease to be carefully nursed, with close attention from a doctor. "Unskilled treatment of a plain case of measles can result in complications which often kill," Dr. Cox warned, "and it is not to be regarded lightly as simply another childhood disease."

Dr. Cox urged parents to carefully watch children exposed, and at the first sign of a temperature, flushed face, sniffles, or watering eyes, advised that the child be put to bed immediately and placed under a doctor's care.

School Baseball Program Is Now Being Organized

AUSTIN, Feb. 15. — The High Schools intending to take part in the Interscholastic League baseball program this spring have accepted until March 1 to send in acceptance cards. Dr. Rhea H. Williams, League athletic director, warned this week.

Cards have already been received from a majority of the schools which competed in baseball last year, plus many schools which did not take part. Dr. Williams said. Tentative listing of teams in district and regional assignments show nearly 100 increase over 1950, when 638 teams competed in four conferences.

The tentative total for 1951 is 723. This undoubtedly will be reduced somewhat, however, by schools which decide not to take part in this year's race. There will be but three conferences, instead of four, in baseball competition, since City and AA schools are being combined for this year's competition.

Under this set-up, the AA class schools will number 92. This represents a loss of one school from the total of City and AA teams which played last year. The loss results from the dropping out of baseball competition of Graham, Mineral Wells, Weatherford and Brownfield from AA to A classification. Off-setting these are the addition to AA of Ennis, Alamo Heights and Harlandale of San Antonio, and W. B. Ray of Corpus Christi.

Conference A totals show a jump from 163 to 204 on the tentative list. Conference B also shows a large gain, from 382 to 427.

MARCH OF DIME FUND TOTAL IS \$740; MOTHER'S EVENT PLANNED

A total of \$740.96 had been turned in to Treasurer James McCracken today for the March of Dimes polio campaign, and leaders said this was considerably short of Cisco's quota. The county hopes to raise \$6,000 in the drive.

The drive was to end officially today, but Cisco has one more event on schedule. And that is the Mother's March of Polio, which is scheduled for next Tuesday night. In this project, a group of cars will tour the city and stop for donations where porch lights are burning.

Some \$250 of the total fund came from a dance at the Cisco Country Club last Monday night. The event was sponsored by the John William Butts Post 123 of the American Legion. A feature of the dance was a floor show arranged under the direction of Kenneth St. Clair, high school band director, and Robert Clinton, head of the college music department. An orchestra composed of Ray Judia, Ken Russ, Dr. Allan Withee, Willard White, Melvin Sandler, Vernon Tilford and Wynn Blackburn provided music.

Schools To Resume Classes Friday As Icy Roads Thaw

Land Preparation Lags In Most Of Drought Sections

The mild open weather favoring outdoor activities, but breaking of land and preparations of seedbeds was further retarded by dry soils over most of the state during the past week. The moisture situation had been somewhat improved in northeast and southeast Texas by precipitation during and immediately following the severe freeze two weeks ago.

Winter cover crops and grasses made favorable response in those areas and some preparation of land was in progress. Recent snows in the northern High Plains provided sufficient surface moisture over about one half of the area to afford some relief, but this moisture was being rapidly dissipated. In all other areas there was no relief from the extended drought.

Wheat was showing signs of some improvement in parts of the north High Plains, but many of the fields appeared to have been damaged by the recent freeze. Deterioration continued in the Low Rolling Plains and northern counties where the freeze had caused further damage to limited stands of drought-weakened wheat. Fall seeded oats and barley were expected to be almost a complete loss.

The light movement of commercial vegetables the past week confirms the severity of the late January and early February hard freeze.

Aided by heavy supplemental feeding, cattle and sheep made rapid recovery from the effects of the cold weather. Death losses at the time of the freeze were not excessive and later losses were light. Winter cover crops and grasses were beginning to grow in southeast and northeast areas, but were providing practically no green feed. Supplies of dry range feed were being rapidly depleted over much of the State. Bundle feed continued plentiful except in south Texas, but the necessity for continual feeding has greatly increased the costs for maintenance of herds.

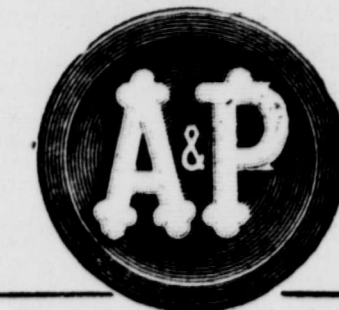

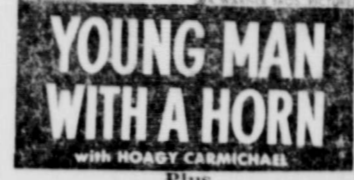

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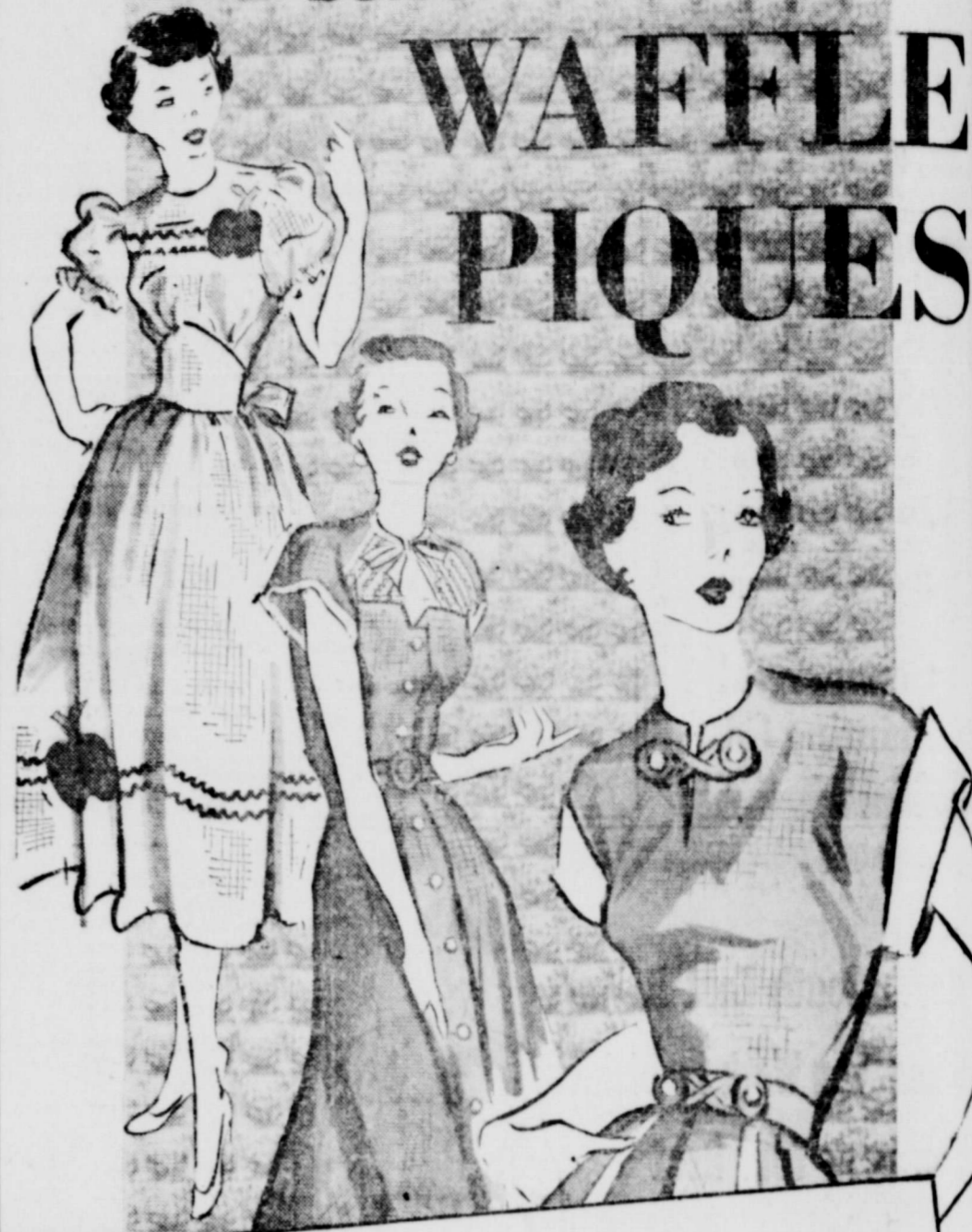
