

Control Spending For Lower Costs, Urges Legislator

(Special to the Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 17—People who oppose increased taxes are using the wrong approach, Representative T. M. Collicie, Eastland, believes.

Instead of concentrating their opposition upon a gross receipts tax or any other kind of higher levy, Collicie said, "The people should center their efforts upon keeping down bigger appropriations."

Collicie is a member of the House Committee on Revenue Taxation. Members of the committee have agreed to hold all proposed revenue-raising bills in suspense until it can be told how much money will be needed to meet requirements of the major appropriation bills.

When an appropriation bill is for hearing there are always delegations asking for more money — more money for everything conceivable. Then when a bill comes up a lot of the people don't want heavier taxes. It just doesn't make sense. They won't work. If we have to get appropriations we surely get more money. And to have more money, taxes have to be raised or levied on new sources. My thought is that appropriations should be reduced and then wouldn't need additional money. If the people will stop thinking along these lines I believe they will come to the same conclusion. Economy must start at home because we'll do what people want."

Baird Telephone Rate Hike Asked

Frank Bearden appeared before the Baird City Council at their regular meeting last Thursday night and made application for an increase in telephone rates of the Home Telephone and Electric Company, operating in the city of Baird.

Proposed Changes In Gas Laws Will Be Hearing Subject

AUSTIN, Feb. 17—Bills proposing new state laws on the price of natural gas and proration of natural gas production will be given public hearing in the Texas legislature Feb. 23.

The hearing will be before members of the House of Representatives Oil, Gas and Mining Committee on bills by Representatives John E. Morrison, Jr., Chillicothe, and R. E. (Peppy) Blount, Big Spring.

Blount's bill and one of Morrison's seeks to define "waste" in natural gas production and thereby establish a minimum of 10 cents per 1,000 cubic feet at the well mouth. Gas sold below that price would be declared "waste" and would be prohibited, the bill provides.

Morrison's other measure is to require proration of natural gas production in the same manner that oil production now is prorated by the Texas Railroad Commission.

Because so much discussion has developed about natural gas prices, the Texas Railroad Commission has called a public hearing for March 9 to hear arguments to whether present statutes already provide that authority.

Hunting Bill To Effect County

AUSTIN, Feb. 17—Hunting and fishing regulations would be made especially for Eastland and seven nearby counties under terms of a bill pending in the Texas legislature.

Counties in which the regulations by the State Game, Fish & Oyster Commission would replace general state laws are: Eastland, Callahan, Palo Pinto, Young, Stephens, Erath, Comanche and Mills.

The bill would permit the Commission to set certain seasons and also to change hunting rules as they presently prohibit killing doves. Any changes would be based upon scientific study. The bill is pending before the House of Representatives Game and Fisheries Committee.

Oil Reports ...

Several Cisco area oil wells were in the process of completion Saturday, and a half dozen or more rigs were running on others.

In the Bankline - Owens field northeast of Cisco, the Kupp and Dickson No. 2 Otto Chance was due to be turned into tanks Saturday afternoon. It was expected to be good for at least 1200 barrels per day. Their No. 3 Chance was drilling at 2,500 feet.

Bankline Oil Company's No. 4 C. E. Reynolds set pipe for completion in the Lake sand. Carried to the Duffer lime, the well showed gas in 63 minutes with 110 feet of oil mud in a drill stem test. The operators elected to complete in the Lake where 13 feet of sand was cored. Bankline was moving to location for the No. 2 C. E. Reynolds.

The G. L. Blumquist et al No. 1 Mrs. S. G. Hart set pipe after coring eight feet of Lake sand. A good well was expected.

Southeast of Cisco the Oil Associates No. 1 J. R. Bacon, recently completed as an Ellenberger well, is now making about 60 barrels per day, it was reported. The oil is being taken out in trucks as no pipe line is available.

Drilling Equipment Is Stolen Near Here

The theft of between \$2,000 and \$2,500 in drilling equipment from the Cree and Archer Drilling Co. near Cisco has been reported to Frank Tucker, Eastland County sheriff. Tucker reported that the Company was offering a reward in the amount of 10 per cent of the value of lost equipment for its recovery.

Included in the stolen tools were two four inch bits, rope, sockets, elevators, wrenches, jacks and tubing.

(Special to the Press) AUSTIN, Feb. 17—A resolution to limit a president's tenure in office to two elective terms is expected to be ratified by the Texas House of Representatives early this week.

Some people feel that the amendment is aimed at the late President Roosevelt," Collie asserted. "That is not true. This is simply an attempt to get back to democracy — it is a clincher for democracy. With so much power concentrated in Washington today it is possible for a president to dictate his own election. That is not the spirit of democracy, and that is why I feel that presidential terms should be limited to two elective terms." Three Southern states are among the 30 states that have already ratified the amendment. They are Mississippi, Louisiana and Virginia. There is a strong possibility, Collie said, that Arkansas and North Carolina also will adopt the resolution. Collie said that the Texas House possibly will consider the resolution either Monday or Tuesday, and he expressed confidence that it would be adopted. A similar resolution is also eligible for action in the Texas Senate, having received favorable committee action.

1548 In County Receive Benefits From State Funds (Special to the Press) AUSTIN, Feb. 17—Proposed changes in Texas' public welfare program is a topic of interest to many people who benefit from the grants in Eastland County. Pending before the Texas legislature are several resolutions to amend the constitution to allow more liberal old age pensions and

to expand the pension program in general. One of these would remove the present maximum which is \$1,500 a month, matching by the Federal government. Another proposal would provide pensions for 18-year olds who are physically handicapped. Latest reports of the Texas Department of Public Welfare show that there are 1,548 persons in Eastland County who receive a total of \$51,318.00 in old age pension payments with an average of \$33.15 per person per month. There are 44 families with 120 children who get \$1,926.00 total a month, averaging \$43.77 a family and \$16.05 per child. The other welfare division is
