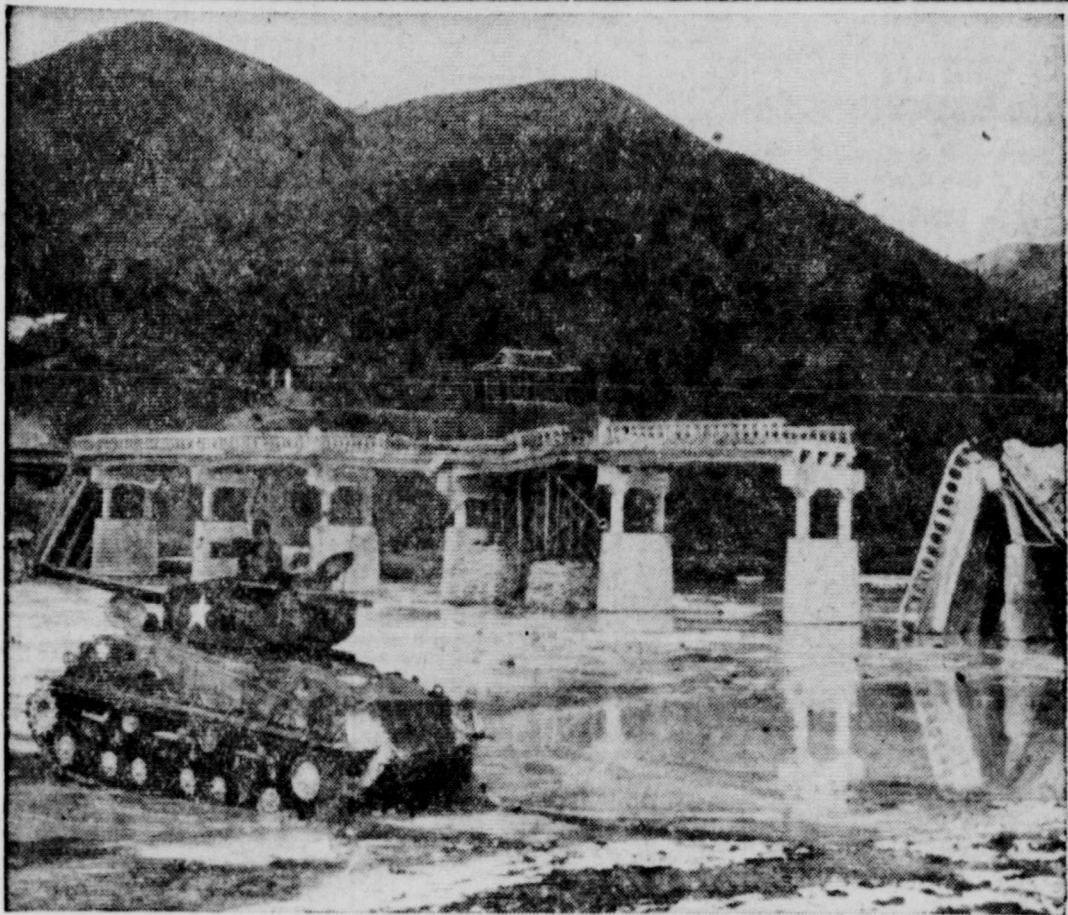

Civil Service To Hold Job Exams

Civil service examinations were announced today for filling the positions of patrol inspector (trainee) in the Immigration and Naturalization Service of the Department of Justice, and for aeronautical research intern in science and engineering for duty in field establishment of the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics.

The patrol inspector (trainee) positions, which pay \$3,100 a year, are located in the southwestern part of the United States. Persons appointed to these jobs are promoted at the end of 1 year of satisfactory service to the position of patrol inspector, which pays \$3,825 a year. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test designed to measure their general aptitude for learning and adjusting to the duties of the position. They may also be required to appear for an oral interview.

Full information and application forms may be obtained from the Commission's Local Secretary Sam B. King, located at Cisco Post Office.

MRS. C. H. FEE, PROMINENT IN CITY FOR MANY YEARS, DIES

Mrs. Charles H. Fee, prominent in Cisco church, club and civic activities for more than 50 years, died at 7 a. m. today in a local hospital after a serious illness of some two weeks.

Funeral services will be conducted at 4 p. m. Thursday at the First Presbyterian Church with Rev. H. Grady James, pastor, officiating. Interment will be in Oakwood cemetery under the direction of Thomas Funeral Home.

Mrs. Fee, who had been in comparative ill health for about a year, had been a member of the Presbyterian church here for more than half a century. She was a leader in organizing the 20th Century Club here in April, 1898, and served as its first president. She was active in the club and its only living charter member when she died.

She was a charter member of the Cisco Garden Club and other organizations and had long been active in many civic enterprises throughout the years. Her late husband, C. H. Fee, who died on Oct. 21, 1945, was one of the founders of the First National Bank and a prominent business and civic leader.

Mrs. Fee was born in Hodgenville, Kentucky, on September 22, 1867. She came to Texas as the age of 14 years and settled with her family in Denton County. She came to this section as a teacher in the Ranger schools. Moving to Cisco in 1885, she was married to Mr. Fee in November, 1888.

Surviving Mrs. Fee are two sons and one daughter. The sons are George P. Fee, Cisco rancher and oil man, and Bob Fee, Colorado City lumberman and rancher. The daughter is Mrs. Alex Spears, prominent resident of Cisco.

Also surviving are seven grand children: Charles A. Spears and Mrs. Sterling Drumwright, Cisco; Mrs. William C. Marshall, Dallas; Miss Linda Fee, Abilene; George P. Fee, Jr., Guam; and Bob Fee, Jr., and Charles Roland Fee, Colorado City.

Four great grand children also survive, including Sterling Drumwright, Jr., John Alex Spears, Bradford Fee Spears and Betsy Halsell Spears, all of Cisco.

Chance For Navy Commission Open To College Men

College students who want to hang up a Naval Reserve Commission alongside their college sheepskin in the next few years now are being offered that opportunity.

The Navy's Reserve Officer Candidate program, open to male and female students now in freshman, sophomore or junior classes, offers an officer's commission in exchange for two summers of Navy training. During the regular 9 months of the academic year, the student continues regular work toward a diploma, at an accredited junior or senior college or university.

The Eighth Naval District has been assigned a limited quota of 285 male and 39 female candidates from its 5 states for 1951.

The applicant must be a member of the Naval Reserve at the time of application, in order to be eligible for the program.

Inspector-instructors, and commanding officers of all Organized and Volunteer unit will accept and process applications. March 19, 1951 is the deadline for applications through district headquarters in New Orleans.

In connection with specialized Navy summer training for successful applicants, known as "ROC" students, Navy headquarters also announced that reservists in certain categories may be granted active duty in 1951 at the ROC training schools.

Approximately 8 weeks of extended training duty is available to officers in Lieutenant (jg) to Commander grades, qualified as instructors in navigation, naval orientation, weapons, leadership, seamanship, communications or administration.

Enlisted men to serve in their ratings, not as instructors, also may request assignment to the schools. All applications should be made through Navy channels to reach the Bureau of Personnel before March 15.

Hickok Plans 2nd Silas Hill Well

At least six Cisco area oil wells were in various stages of completion work today to highlight developments in this West Central Texas section.

Two miles north of Cisco, completion work was underway in the Benson-Montin No. 1 E. B. Hayes. The casing was perforated Monday in the Lake sand. Oil and gas were both present in the hole during cleaning out operations. The hydrafrac treatment was to be given the well today.

Two miles southeast of Cisco, the Hickok Producing and Developing Company No. 1 Silas Hill has been completed as a gas well with a potential of three and a half million cubic feet per day. Hickok will move equipment 1320 feet due west to drill his No. 2 Silas Hill, it was reported today.

In the Bankline-Owens pool, five miles northeast of Cisco, several wells were in the completion stage. S. D. Johnson's No. 1 Mize set pipe Tuesday in the Lake sand and will be completed after the cement sets. Johnson will move to drill his No. 1 George P. Fee on a 40-acre lease due west of his No. 1 Mize.

Jess Hickey and Son No. 1 Taylor and Hickey and Son No. 1 I. N. Hart were both to be completed this week in the Lake sand. The Blumquist et al No. 1 Mrs. Sam Hart was also awaiting final completion in the prolific Lake sand.

Bankline Oil Company's No. 4 C. E. Reynolds was due to be given the hydrafrac treatment today. Drilled to the Duffer lode, the operators decided to complete in the Lake sand. Bankline was drilling today in their No. 2 C. E. Reynolds.

Potential figures were expected to be available soon on the Kupp and Dickson No. 2 Otto Chance, completed over the week-end as a good producer.

Five miles southwest of Cisco, the Senate Oil Company No. 1 Speegle Estate, wildcat oil test, has been plugged and abandoned as a failure.

Senator Opposes Bill To Divert County's Share Of Gas Tax Funds

AUSTIN, Feb. 20.—A strong stand against the Graham Bill to divert from the counties their share of the state gasoline tax was expressed today by Senator Wayne Wagonseller of Stoneburg.

Senator Wagonseller said the bill, which now is in a House committee, would seriously endanger the economies of many counties by taking away from them more

than \$200,000 a year they otherwise would receive.

Records in the County and District Road Bond Indebtedness Board show that the ten counties in the proposed 22nd Senatorial District last year received \$314,992 from the surplus fund and this year will get \$355,936, Senator Wagonseller said.

The House committee on Highways and Roads voted the Gra-

ham Bill out of the committee with a recommendation that it do not pass. However, by a suspension of the House Rules, the disputed bill was revived and sent to an entirely new committee and, therefore, is very much alive.

"If this Bill ever passes the House and is sent to the Senate, I will do all in my power to defeat it," the Senator declared. "Not only would it seriously cripple the county governments, but it also would slow down the rural road program all over the State."

Senator Wagonseller pointed out that the Graham Bill would kill the \$15,000,000 annual allocation now made to the State Highway Department for farm-to-market road construction.

"Proponents of the bill contend that in the years to come the Department will get back up to that \$15,000,000 annual level, but what I want to see are more rural roads built now, not just a dozen years from now," the Senator explained.

The Senator attended the House committee hearing on the bill and heard it thoroughly discussed by witnesses before the committee.

"If I had needed convincing before, then the testimony at that hearing would have convinced me beyond any doubt that the Graham Bill should not pass," Senator Wagonseller said.

The Senator listed the amounts which the counties in his proposed district will receive in 1951 from the road bond assumption surplus as follows: Denton, \$53,120; Jack, \$26,200; Montague, \$39,462; Palo Pinto, \$28,161; Parker, \$38,009; Wise, \$41,727; Clay, \$37,557; Stephens, \$21,947; Eastland, \$40,690 and Calahan, \$29,043.

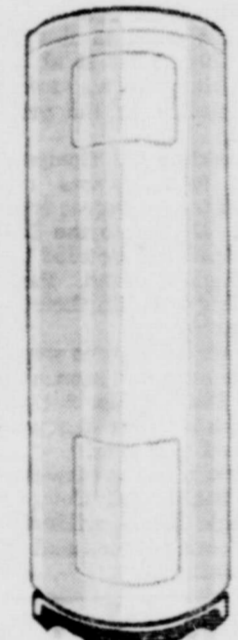

THE MIRACLE of GAS GAS WATER HEATERS

No other water heaters have as quick recovery rate as the automatic gas water heater. And this is especially important with the increasing use of automatic washers in homes because automatic washers consume hot water faster than any other type.

Installation of adequately-sized automatic gas water heaters as recommended by the Water Heating Committee of the American Gas Association can best be cited by a specific example.

A typical new automatic gas water heater with storage capacity of 30-gallons, will heat 42 gallons of water per hour through a temperature rise of 60 degrees. This same heater would heat 24 gallons of water per hour through a temperature rise of 100 degrees — e. g.: from 40 to 140 degrees.

A typical 30-gallon automatic gas water heater can provide an adequate supply of hot water for the average small family including 2 hours of continuous operation of an automatic clothes washer.

The amount of water that can be drawn from storage without any appreciable drop in temperature is about 80% of the storage capacity. The balance is not available because of the mixing of incoming water with the hot water in storage. e. g.: a heater of 30-gallon storage tank and recovery capacity of 24 gallons per hour (through a 100 degree rise) can produce 48 gallons in a maximum hour, starting with a tank full of hot water, 24 coming from storage and 24 from the recovery capacity. For every hour thereafter this gas heater will deliver 24 gallons of hot water.

1950's developments showed improved models of automatic storage, instantaneous and multi-coil water heaters. Obvious were improvements to give longer life of inside tanks and easier servicing. The almost universal adoption of magnesium rods to reduce the rate of tank corrosion was evident on most of the less expensive types of water heaters.

More manufacturers are producing table-size heaters to fit in with kitchen appliances or to line up with laundry room installations. Of table surface height they come in 20, 30 and 40-gallon capacity with automatic controls and quick recovery rate. One manufacturer's 40-gallon capacity table top water heater is constructed to fit in the same casing as is used for the same 30-gallon size.

Table top automatic gas heaters offer greater flexibility in unit location and when a flue is available they can be connected or they may be placed so that the flue products will be picked up by the regular kitchen ventilation system.

A table top model is now available to fit into a corner to make full use of hitherto dead space. The top may be of formica or other material to match kitchen or laundry working surfaces. Five-sided, this model has stainless steel banding and automatic dial controls.

Other automatic gas heaters are lined with Monel metal or glass.

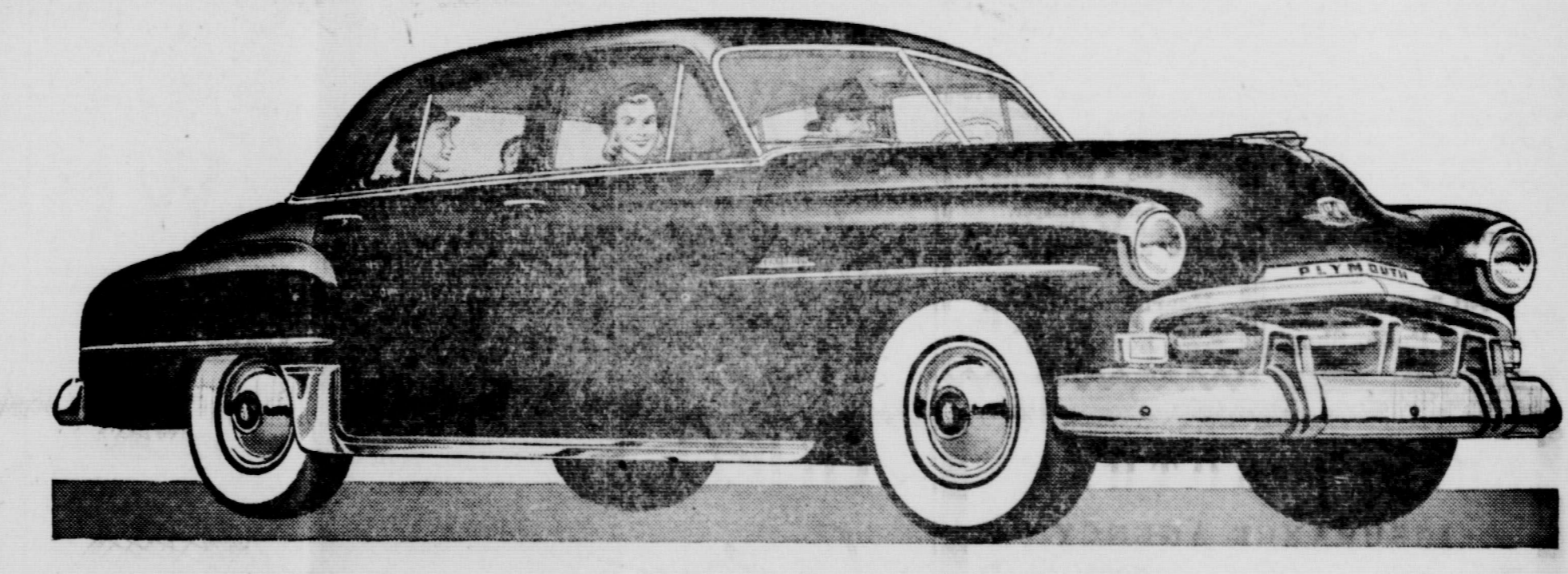
