A delegation of Cisco fans, headed by President O. L. Stamey and Registrar Carlos Turner of Cisco Junior College, attended the game.

Cisco won a place in the tournament by defeating Ranger Junior College in a best-two-out-of-three series after the two teams tied for their sectional championship.

Tonight's winner will be the state champion, and the loser will be the runnerup. The two Monday night losers will meet tonight for third place honors.

ROY FENLEY IS GIVEN CONTRACT TO REBUILD EAST WARD SCHOOL

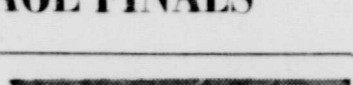
Work on repairing the fire damage at the East Ward School was expected to get under way this week following the letting of the contract at a special meeting of the school board Monday afternoon.

Three Injured As Three Cars Figure In Mishap Monday

Two persons remained in the Graham Hospital Tuesday suffering from painful injuries as the result of a three way automobile crash which occurred at 4:30 p. m. Monday four and one half miles east of Cisco on U. S. Highway 80.

In the hospital receiving treatment for multiple cuts, bruises and shock were Joe C. Hooten and Howard L. Westmoreland, both of Los Angeles, who were riding together in one of the three automobiles figuring in the accident. Released following emergency treatment was Mrs. John M. Cook of Dallas who was riding with her husband in another of the automobiles. She was taken to Abilene where her parents live to recover from multiple injuries.

According to State Highway Patrolman Oscar Avera of Eastland, who investigated the accident, the crash occurred when a 1951 Ford driven by Westmoreland sideswiped a 1940 Ford driven by a Mrs. Christman of Eastland and then plowed head-on into a 1949 Cadillac driven by Cook.

Mrs. Christman and Cook were traveling east on U. S. Highway 80 while Westmoreland was headed west. In the car with Cook were his wife and daughter. Westmoreland and Hooten were in the 1951 Ford and Mrs. Christman was alone in the 1940 Ford. All three cars were almost a total loss. The cars driven by Mrs. Christman and Mr. Cook were thrown off an eight foot embankment while the Westmoreland car remained on the highway. The accident occurred on a section of the highway being worked on.

Charges of assault with motor vehicle were filed against Westmoreland by Patrolman Avera, who stated that the driver was in the wrong lane at the time of the accident happened.

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THE MAN POWER SITUATION

"The relatively low proportion of front-line power in the U. S. military forces is attracting more and more attention," says an article in U. S. News & World Report. "Congress is on the warpath over it. Congressmen want to know why more divisions cannot be made up of messengers, chauffeurs who drive generals, coal shovelers, men in service units of one kind or another. Members of Congress . . . are beginning to ask whether the armed services are wasting man power while demanding force of it."

The crux of the problem can be expressed with a simple set of figures. In the Soviet army, there are nine men in supporting jobs for every 10 men in combat divisions. Proportionately, in other words, the Russians have a lot more gun-carriers than we have. Military men have an answer for this. Russia's supply routes are far shorter than ours. Secretary Marshall has said, "Our greatest drain is in these long hauls we are involved in, and the fact that all our policy is built on fighting outside this country . . . The Soviets have nothing like that at all." This is a geographical fact about which nothing can be done.

News, that casualty and personal records are not kept for Russian soldiers below the rank of captain. When one is killed or wounded, that is the end of the matter, and the family never learns what happened from the government. By our standards, the Russian medical service is cruel and primitive. Apparently the seriously sick and wounded are simply regarded as a needless drain on the army and are left to die. The American army's record in this respect has been magnificent. The most strenuous efforts are given to rescuing those who are incapacitated, and 98.5 per cent of all who reach hospitals live.

So it goes, down a long list of differences. Even so, says U. S. News, "The upshot of it is likely to be that Congress will tell the generals they must squeeze more front-line troops from the man power they already have and the man power they expect to get." This problem, of course, is just one phase of the general military man power problem. The present pool of draft eligibles will be pretty close to dry before very long. The army wants authority to draft 18-year olds, but Congress, apparently disturbed by letters from the constituents, is chary of this. It also doesn't want to take veterans, even those of very short service. It wants many 4-F's to be inducted . . . but here the army opposed. The Reserves are complaining of unfair treatment and discrimination, and this too has awakened Congressional interest and sympathy. A firm solution to the man power problem is needed.

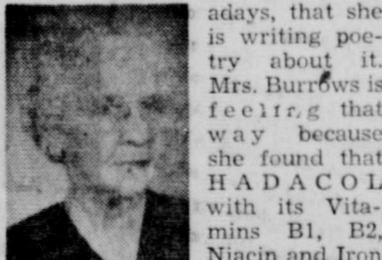

Meat Handlers To Need Certificates From Price Body

FORT WORTH, Feb. 27.—Commercial slaughterers who are not Federally inspected, and persons who have such slaughterers handle livestock for them need to take immediate action to obtain certificates from the Office of Price Stabilization.

John Boyle, meat specialist of the Regional Price Stabilization Office at Dallas, explained that Distribution Order No. 1 affect-

ing slaughter of livestock and distribution of meat requires these slaughterers to obtain price office certificates if they expect to continue slaughtering after April 1. Slaughterers classed as No. 2 and No. 2-A are affected.

Application forms may be obtained by writing the district Office of Price Stabilization recently opened in Fort Worth to serve a 53-county area of West Texas of the regional Office of Price Stabilization in Dallas. The Fort Worth address is 2914 W. Lancaster; the Dallas address, 3306 Main.

All completed application forms should then be mailed to the regional office of Price Stabilization in Dallas not later than March 15 in order to insure receipt of certificates prior to April 1, Mr. Boyle said.

Mr. Boyle pointed out that this request affects only two classes of slaughterers - commercial slaughterers not Federally inspected, and individuals who have such commercial slaughterers perform their slaughtering. On the other hand, Federally inspected slaughterers and persons engaging Federally inspected slaughterers to do their work for them should write the Office of Price Stabilization at Washington for their certificates.

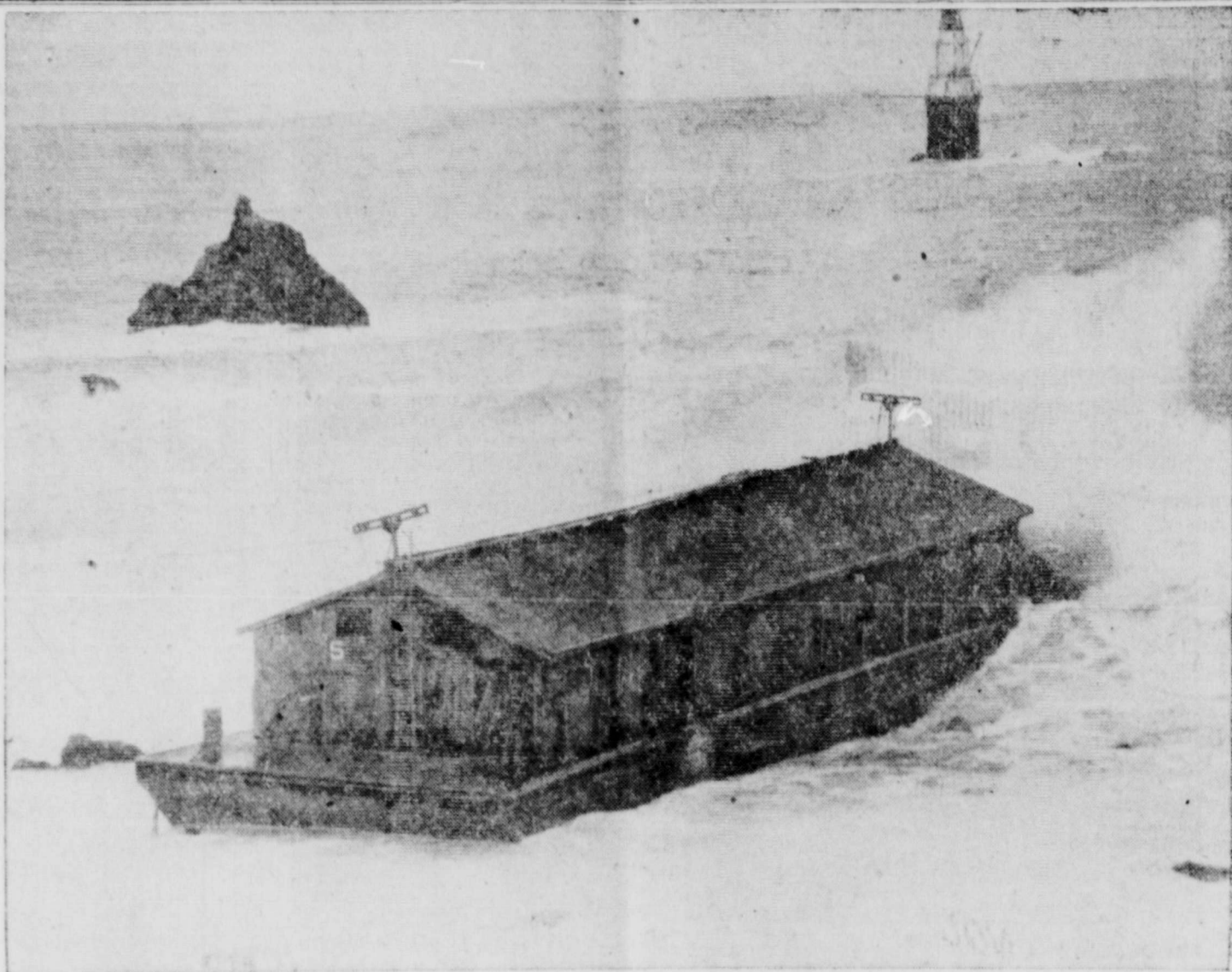
