Final Plans For Convention Made

More than 300 Legionnaires are expected to urge voters to approve an amendment to tthe state constitution which would help veterans of the Korean War buy farms and ranches, E. L. Jackson of Cisco, the Legion's 17th District Commander, said today in announcing final plans for the 17th District convention here Saturday and Sunday,

November 3 and 4. The amendment, fourth on the ballot in the November 13 election, would add \$75 million to the veterans land program fund and extend benefits to veterans with service after 1945, either at

nome or abroad. A resolution asking the voters' support will be brought before the convention by the resolutions committee, Jackson said, and added that approval is certain since the 1951 State Convention in San Antonio mandated all Legionnaires to work acively for adoption of the new

"The Legion is not asking for bonus or a handout of any kind," Jackson said. "This is simply a fine program for GI's who dream of owning and farm-ing their own land. More than 4,000 Texas veterans of World War II are good, useful citizens because of loans made under the program," he said.

Veterans with service subsequent to 1945 would be eligible or the first time to make loans from the fund. The amendment would authorize the state to isue bonds bearing 3 per cent interest and allow World War II and Korean War veterans to buy land up to \$15,000 with a 5 per cent down payment. The loans would be paid off over a

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

When Senator Taft threw his hopes, and fervently, that he will hat into the ring, he simply made | come to a decision and announce official what everyone has ex- himself as available before it pected for a long time. It is no secret that Senator Taft had hoped to be made the Republican Presidential nominee on previous occasions, but circumstances of various kinds conspired against him. Following his overwhelming victory in his last Senatorial race, Taft and his supporters really got down to cases in preparation for the 1952 nominating convention. More important groundwork, by far, has been done on his behalf than for any other possible candidate. The Taft organization is large, efficient, well-financed, and politically experienced and astute. It recognizes that there is much strong opposition to their man within the Republican camp and it is doing everything possible to minimize it. Some leading Republicans who were once anti-Taft have been converted. The principal opposition to him is led by Governors Dewey, Duff, and Stassen. The first two are all for Eisenhower. Governor Stassen, it seems, has hopes on his own behalf.

Senator Taft's new book on foreign policy is an able effort to dispel the idea that he is an isolationist - which has been one of the main arguments made against his possible candidacy. He is a biting critic of the Truman foreign policy and of the conduct of the Korean war. But he realizes America's preeminent position as leader of the anticommunist world, and of the responsibilities and commitments that results. His present position certainly cannot be called isolationist. And when he said that he is the only Republican who can make the kind of campaign that can be trusted to unhorse the Administration, he obviously meant it with complete sincerity

General Eisenhower remains the great question mark - he has disappointed his many fol by refusing to take partisan stand, or to indicate whether he would accept the nomination of either party. At a recent news conference in Paris, he said that his present position, as head of the Western military alliance, made it impossible for him to show allegiance to a political party. He said also that he regretted that efforts were being made to put his name on the ballot in states where it is legal to do that without the permission of the person involved. But his camp still






