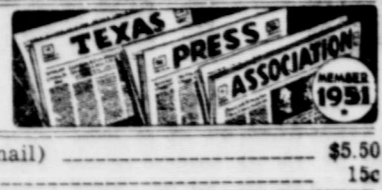
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Growing Season Ends As Freeze Hits Over State

Caution Is Asked As Hunters Ready For Annual Shoot

AUSTIN, Nov. 8. — As the hunting season gets underway Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urged caution in handling firearms.

"It is not enough to deplore the waste of human lives caused by the careless handling of firearms," asserts Dr. Cox.

The State Department of Health gives the following safety suggestions in handling guns: While hunting to be sure that the loaded gun is on safety until ready to fire.

Always unload a gun before attempting to clean it. Always unload guns before taking them into camp or houses.

Fish Specialists Will Be Employed

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced an examination for Fishery Methods and Equipment Specialist to fill positions paying from \$3,100 to \$7,600 a year in the Fish and Wildlife Service of the Department of the Interior.

Persons are needed in these positions for exploratory fishing and for improving methods of fishery operations. The jobs require sea duty in varying localities, chiefly in the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. To qualify, applicants must have had appropriate experience or a combination of such experience and college study in fishery technology, fishery engineering, fishery biology, or related subjects. The age limits, 18 to 62 years, will be waived for veterans.

Further information and application forms may be obtained from the commission's local secretary, Sam B. King, at the Cisco post office.

Sportsmen Asked To Observe Laws In Duck Hunting

AUSTIN, Nov. 9. — The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission credited "the honor and sportsmanship of Texans" for implementing the promising 1951 waterfowl season. And as the scatter gunners prepared to open the annual hunt for ducks and geese at noon Friday, November 9, he appealed to all Texans "to join the vast personal conservation movement."

"Wildlife men everywhere attributed the rally of the waterfowl flocks to the growing conservation movement, of course, along with a sympathetic nudge by nature."

"It is my own observation that no state may claim a greater sensitivity toward this personal

obligation than Texas. For one thing, all appreciate the tremendous pressure on wildlife.

"This mass support of such agencies as Ducks Unlimited and of the state game program, plus a zealous adherence to the sportsmen's code, means better hunting for all."

The Executive Secretary went on to point out that the Game Department is "the mere agency for administering wildlife affairs," adding that "the success of this program pretty well depends on hunters' attitudes."

"This is plainly indicated in the matter of law enforcement," he explained. "Sportsmen everywhere realize that because game must be observed because game laws cannot be enforced completely regardless of how many wardens are assigned to the job."

The Executive Secretary expressed the belief that the comparatively generous 50-day season and the prevailing bag limits would further stimulate sportsmen's cooperation.
