Bonus Payment Rules Sent Out By Wage Agency

An extensive set of questions and answers pertaining to its regulations governing the payment of bonuses is being mailed this week to many Chambers of Commerce and Labor Organization offices in the southwest according to Chairman Byron R. Abernethy, Tenth Regional Wage Stabilization Board, Dallas.

These are meant to clarify the Board's intent as to the details of its bonus regulation. The bulletin will be especially helpful at this time to many employers who customarily pay annual bonuses to their employees at Christmas time or at the end of the calendar year.

The bulletin will explain how an employer who has paid bonuses, in accordance with a specific plan or otherwise, may continue to do so. Questions cover bonus payments to those employees under the jurisdiction of WSB.

Fire Inspections Are Started Here

Fire Chief H. O. (Andy) Anderson and Secretary Bill Kendall of the Cisco Fire Department reported Wednesday that the department had begun its annual inspection of business houses and requested the cooperation of the business firms in the inspection.

MIGHTY MIDGETS TRIUMPH BY 28-14 SCORE OVER RISING STAR

The Cisco Junior High School Midgets carried the ball four times and scored three touchdowns in the first quarter of their final game of the regular 1951 schedule to down a heavy but inexperienced Rising Star eleven at Chesley Field Tuesday night by a 28-14 score.

Coach Bill Sledge used his regulars less than half the game and used every man on his squad to take the easiest game of the year. His starters, composed largely of eighth grade boys who were probably playing their last game as Midgets, put on a fine exhibition of running and blocking and displayed their best defensive form.

The Midgets won the toss and elected to receive. Rising Star kicked to the Midget 20 and the ball was run to the Midget 40. On the first play Bill Smith took a handoff from Tommy Reynolds and circled his own right end to score.

Smith took advantage of excellent blocking in making the 60 yard run. Reynolds ran the ball over for the extra point. Cisco kicked off to Rising Star and after three plays netted a minus 16 yards Rising Star was forced to kick. The entire Midget forward wall broke through to block the kick to give them possession of the ball on the visitors 21 yard line.

On the fourth down Rising Star kicked to the Cisco 18. A ground play failed and on the second down Tommy Reynolds tossed a perfect strike to end Edward Bernie who took the ball on the 30 yard line and outran the Rising Star defenders for the remaining 70 yards. The play was good for a total of 82 yards. The first quarter ended with the Midgets ahead 21-0.

Following the kickoff Coach Sledge began sending in his second, third and fourth string players in an effort to hold down the score and to allow his subs to obtain playing experience.

The subs held the visitors scoreless for the second and third quarters but weakened in the fourth to allow them to cross the goal line twice. The first score came early in the fourth when Garvin Moore carried over from the six, climaxing a 70 yard drive. The ball was carried over for the point after touchdown to bring the score to 21-7.

Coach Sledge sent his first team back into the game for a few minutes and they scored following a 70 yard drive. Buck

Whitehead made the final 12 yards on a brilliant run on a fourth down try. Tommy Reynolds carried over for the point after touchdown.

Rising Star struck again late in the game when Donald Duggan took a pass at midfield and ran over to score. The play originated on the visitors 45 yard line.

There were no individual stars for the Midgets. Every man carried out his assignments and the team functioned as a unit, both on offense and defense. The Rising Star team showed inexperience but came through with several good running plays.

Coach Sledge reported that it was possible that the Midgets would go to Rising Star next Tuesday night to play a return match. The game was originally scheduled for November 1 but was postponed due to bad weather.

The starting lineup for Cisco was Price and Bernie at ends, Penn and Collier at tackles, Qualls and Farrow at guards, Walton at center and Smith, Carlisle, Reynolds and Whitehead at backs.

The Rising Star starting lineup was as follows: Ends J. C. Butler and Bert Agnew; tackles, Clay Witt and Jerry Millington; guards, Edwin Schaefer and Jack Shults; center, John Joyce and backs, Joe Butler, Garvin Moore, Gerald Edwards and Donald Duggan.

Coach Scot Russell announced his probably starting lineup after the workout Tuesday afternoon. A light practice session was scheduled for today to complete game plans.

Probable Wrangler starters include Charles Atkinson and Bobby Gibson, ends; Gerald Davis and Eldon Krueger, tackles; Gerald Salter and J. C. Suggs, guards; Walter Knapp, center; Burl Moses Carrol Chambers, Bobby Huffmyer and Gene Eddings, backs.

The Cowboys of Southwest Junior College have announced a probable starting lineup, with player weights, as follows: Robinson, 155 and Fenley, 182, ends; Lee, 182, and Calicoate, 224, tackles; Casey, 168, and Pruitt, 205, guards; Lewis, 177, center; Hale, 165, Simmons, 140, Martin, 150, and Schaefer, 145, backs.

The Cowboys were due to bring a 22-man squad here for the game. The Wrangler band will be out in uniform at the game.

The two teams are regarded as about evenly matched on the basis of their records for the season and a good game has been predicted. Fair and warmer weather has been forecast for the afternoon.
