### Farm Progress Is Limited Mostly To Harvest Work

Progress was limited mainly to active harvesting operations in the late cotton areas, to a large extent by mechanical means, and to combining of grain sorghums on Texas farms during the past week. Much of the previous week's improved moisture situation was lost by high winds and recurrence of low temperatures which also retarded growth of small grains and winter cover crops. Moisture reserves were low in practically all areas except the northern tier of counties along the Red River.

Wheat and other small grains in those counties made fairly satisfactory growth, but progress of wheat in the important northwestern counties was limited largely to root development. Wheat in scattered areas was furnishing some grazing, but for the most part top growth was slow and much of the late seeded acreage still needed moisture for germination. Pastures continued poor over much of the State and supplemental feeding was general. Irrigated oat pastures in the southern counties showed some improvement as damage from worms diminished.

Conditions were favorable for cotton harvest and was particularly active in the southern High Plains and Low Rolling Plains, with stripper or pickers being used where available. Harvest was still under way in the Trans-Pecos area, and a little cotton still remained in the fields in north-central and Edwards Plateau counties. Grain Sorghum harvest was almost completed in all areas except the southern High Plains where the crop was about three-fourths harvested. In remaining northwestern counties about 80 percent of the crop was out. Peanut and Sweet Potato harvest continued in the few remaining scattered counties. Rice harvest was virtually completed. A light planting of flaxseed was started in the southern counties.

Range pasture feed was poor and roughage scarce over much of the State. Supplemental feeding was increasing in all areas except in south Texas where irrigated oat pastures were supplying good feed, and in counties along the Red River where moisture from earlier rains was bringing small grain along. Cattle depending entirely on dry range feed were losing weight. Many ranchers were culling their stock in proportion to their pasture and feed supplies. Marketing was fairly active.

### Townsite Project Is Due To Begin

Shallow oil production possibilities for the area five miles southwest of Cisco took on new importance today with reports that the Dilcox Investment Company's No. 1 Leverage Estate was being completed with a potential of between 40 and 50 barrels per day.

The well was opened Thursday morning after pipe had been set to about 2,300 feet. Production was through perforations from 2,285 to 2,295 feet and flow was natural with good pressure. The oil was coming from the Strawn sand.

The new producer is three locations south of Wilcox's No. 1 McElreath, completed in the Strawn as a pumper several months ago.

The Wilcox company and Don Choate recently staked location for their No. 1 T. T. Horn in the same general area of Block 3, H & TC Survey.

Slush pits were being dug and equipment was preparing to move in Saturday to drill the E. K. Carey No. 1 Masonic Lodge as a semi-wildcat deep test in the south Cisco townsite. The location is near the old cattle auction barn on Avenue D on a 34-acre tract.

Minerals under the land were given by the late J. E. Luse to the Masonic Lodge of Texas years ago. The permit calls for a 4,000 foot test. Location is 1,380 feet from the north and 932 feet from the west lines of Section 66, Block 3, H&TC Survey. It is west of Lake sand production. Fred Pool Drilling Co. has the contract.

In the Bankline-Owens pool, five miles northeast of Cisco, the B. & R. Oil Company of Breckenridge was rigging up today to drill their No. 2 Taylor. Choate Drilling Co. has the contract.

Bankline Oil Company and the Choate Company apparently had a new oil discovery in Coleman County today. Their No. 1 Ballard had logged a good show in the Morris sand at 2,445 feet in a wildcat test.

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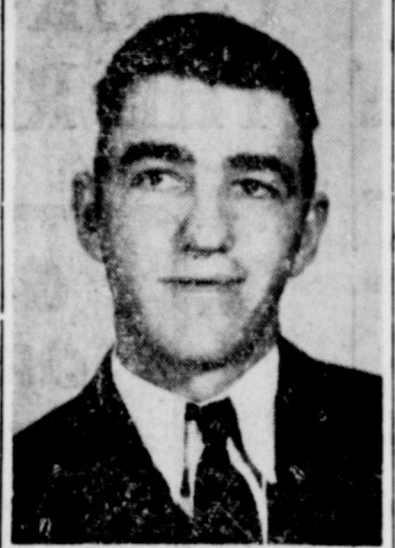
