AN ELECTION TREND

Those who believe — and hope — that corruption and graft in government will be a major issue in forthcoming elections have found much encouragement in what happened in New York and Philadelphia on November 7.

In New York, the issue was absolutely clear-cut. The "reform" candidate for the presidency of the city council — second highest office in the metropolis — was Rudolph Halley, who made his name as counsel for the Fes-singer crime committee.

It is always a mistake to attach too much significance to off-year elections — experience has proven that they often mean nothing as a harbinger of things to come. However, such very pronounced switches in public sentiment as these hardly look like just a passing breeze. In a great many circles, and in both the parties, there is a feeling of certainty that the clean government issue will be dominant in 1952.

Republicans picked up a few in Philadelphia, the Republicans have been in political control of the city for almost 70 years. Recent developments indicated, to put the case mildly, that certain municipal affairs smelled to high heaven. The Democratic candidate, for mayor, Joseph Clark, ran on a platform very similar to Mr. Halley's. He promised to clean things up. He too won decisively.

There was one curious circumstance in the Philadelphia election. The Republican candidate for mayor, and a newcomer to politics, was Dr. Daniel A. Poling, the well-known clergyman and author. Everyone agrees that Dr. Poling is a man of the highest probity and moral character. However, the feeling seemed to be that the only cure for alleged municipal corruption was a complete change of administration and political affiliation of the top officials. A number of leading Republicans

seats in the House, including one in Ohio and one in New Jersey. However, there weren't enough Congressional seats at stake to indicate much of anything in the way of trends.

In the meantime, the question of who's going to run for President next year burns brightly. In Washington, General Eisenhower once more refused to do any political talking. But he certainly didn't say he wouldn't run. He left the door wide open when he told newsmen that if the time ever comes when he feels it his duty to take a political stand, he will do so "positively and definitely."

Senator Morse jumped on the Eisenhower bandwagon when he said that he believed the general "will sweep

the convention when he makes himself available for the Republican nomination." Morse also said he was opposed to the election of either President Truman or Senator Taft.

There is a good deal of speculation to the effect that Mr. Truman does not intend to run again, and that his choice for a successor is Chief Justice Vinson. There is nothing tangible to substantiate that view, but some well informed Washington observers hold it.

Vets Questions Are Answered

Q — My nephew is a veteran of Korea, and was discharged after a shell fragment paralyzed

him from the waist down. Is he eligible for a VA grant for the purchase of a "wheelchair house," or is that benefit limited to World War II veterans?

A — Your nephew may be eligible for the VA "wheelchair housing" grant, provided he meets certain requirements. He should file an application with VA. The benefit is not limited

to World War II veterans.

Q — May I use a GI loan to buy a two-family house with a non-veteran?

A — Yes, so long as your interest will be properly protected in case the non-veteran defaults on his payments.

A — You may, if you have service-connected disability that requires treatment, and you receive prior VA approval for such care.

Q — Is it possible to get GI business loan to buy a house for pleasure purposes, or furniture for my house? A — No. The loan must be used for business purposes.




