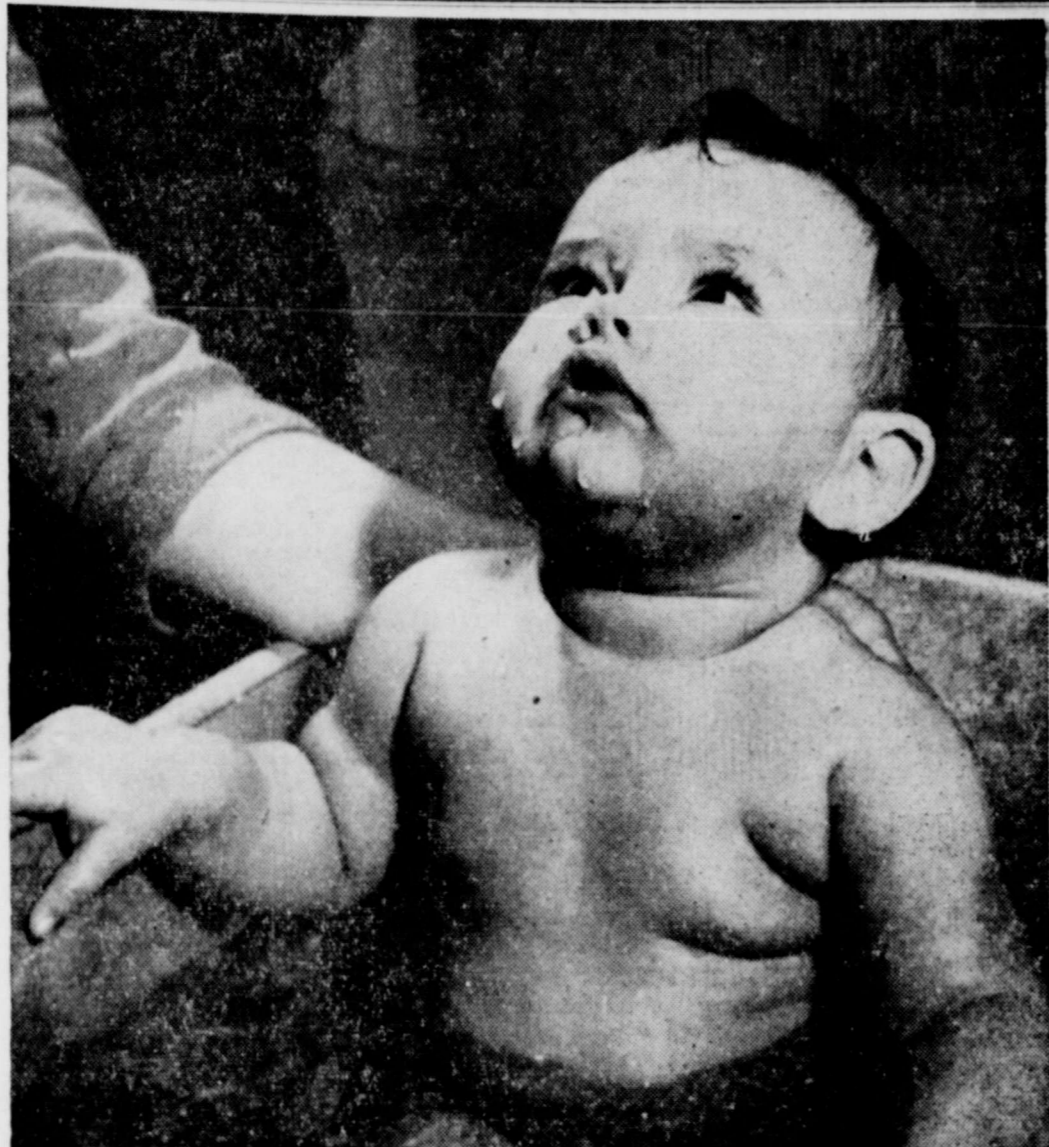

CISCO BUSINESS MAN DIES IN ROAD ACCIDENT LATE SATURDAY

Lawrence Leroy Trapp, 43 year old Cisco filling station operator, died in a Breckenridge hospital at 11:30 p. m. Saturday of injuries received in a traffic accident a few minutes earlier at Dead Man's Curve on the Cisco-Breckenridge highway.

Trapp, who was riding alone at the time of the accident, received the fatal injuries when his car struck a tree after skidding from the slick pavement after negotiating the double curve. There were no witnesses and Mr. Trapp was found in the automobile shortly after the accident by passers by. He had been to Fort Worth to a football game and had returned to Cisco before going to Breckenridge.

He had been a resident of Cisco for three years, coming here from Houston as an employee of Humble Pipe Line Company. He quit the company and took over the operation of a Humble station on Avenue D more than two years ago. Mr. Trapp was born in Van Zandt County on February 18, 1908, and was married to Miss Pearl Sellers in Mineola on May 12, 1926.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Monday at Thomas Chapel with Rev. Paul Stephens and Rev. J. C. Pelfrey officiating. The body was placed on an east bound train for Mineola where a second service was to be held Tuesday. Burial will be in the Mineola Cemetery.

Survivors include Mrs. Trapp, a son, Roy Glenn Trapp, who is in the U. S. Navy, stationed at San Diego; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. Trapp of Mineola and three sisters, Mrs. Hazel Matthews of Lufkin, Mrs. Dorothy Hayes of Oak Lawn, California and Mrs. Lela Bailey of Williams, California. Pallbearers were Johnnie Cousins, A. L. Santa Claus Will Be Here Dec. 8th

Several thousand Cisco area residents attended the third annual Treasure Hunt here Monday night to officially open the 1951 Christmas season. The Treasure Hunt was called a success despite a light rain that fell most of the day and night.

The Press, cooperating with some 72 Cisco business firms in sponsoring the Treasure Hunt, gave out 8,500 tickets. The tickets were free and the hunters matched the numbers with gift item numbers to claim nearly \$1,000 worth of merchandise awards.

Monday night was the occasion for turning on the city's Christmas lights. The overhead madrellions feature the street decorations. Store windows were decorated to add to the holiday atmosphere.

The next event in the plans for the Christmas season will take place on Saturday night, Dec. 8, when Santa Claus and real Alaskan reindeer come here for a parade and visit with Cisco area kiddies.

The Cisco Junior College and High School choirs will be in town the same night for a program of Christmas carols. A platform will be arranged for the students. Santa's visit and parade will follow the program.

"The need for buying Defense Bonds still exists," he said. "With our country engaged in a gigantic preparedness program, these bonds form an important economic link in our defense."

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NEW PROCEDURE ADOPTED FOR TRAINING ORGANIZED RESERVE

AUSTIN, Nov. 27.—A new procedure for training units of the Army Organized Reserve Corps in Texas has been adopted and is being put into effect throughout the state. Col. C. M. Culp, Chief of the Texas Military District, announced today. The plan has the dual purpose of improving the effectiveness of instruction now being given reservists at their home armories and affording a large number of Volunteer reservists an opportunity to take a more active part in the reserve program. Col. Culp stated. Fourth Army headquarters at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, has given approval to the new training procedure and recommended its use in the other four military districts under its jurisdiction. Col. Paul B. Malone, Jr., Senior Army Instructor for Texas, is author of the plan and will supervise its operation in the 17 Organized Reserve Instructor areas of the state through a system of inspector-adviser teams. Functioning in connection with the Organized Reserve Corps Training Programs prepared and distributed by the Office of Chief of Fields Forces of the Army earlier this year, armory training will be rehearsed before senior officers of the Volunteer Reserve, Col Malone explained. Here is how it will work. In each instructor area senior reserve officers from the various branches of the Army will be formed into inspector-adviser teams to rehearse all instruction before it is presented. Instruction is usually presented in Reserve units by members of the unit. The member who is selected to give instruction for a particular subject will prepare his lesson plan two periods in advance and make all arrangements for conducting the class. At least one training period before this scheduled appearance he will go before an inspector-adviser and give a dress rehearsal of the instruction he intends to present. Members of the inspector-adviser teams will suggest changes, deletion or additions to the instruction. Each phase of the subject matter to be covered will be rehearsed and approved by the advisory team before it is presented to the unit. In addition to observing the pre-class rehearsal, the inspector-advisers will sit in on the classes and check the manner and effectiveness of the presentation and make a written report to the Army Organized Reserve Instructor and the unit commander. These reports will be used as a basis for planning improvements in the unit's training methods and procedure. In the letter recommending that other military districts adopt a similar system, Fourth Army headquarters said that the plan presents a compilation of principles and procedures designed to increase the effectiveness of ORC training and in addition furnishes a uniform system for critique of instruction.

In the letter recommending that other military districts adopt a similar system, Fourth Army headquarters said that the plan presents a compilation of principles and procedures designed to increase the effectiveness of ORC training and in addition furnishes a uniform system for critique of instruction.

Civil Service To Hold Job Exams

The Civil Service Commission today announced examinations for Aeronautical Research Intern and Aeronautical Research Scientist for filling positions in laboratories of the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics at various locations throughout the country. The salary for the Intern positions is \$3,410 a year; for Aeronautical Research Scientist positions from \$4,205 to \$10,800 a year.

To qualify for the Intern positions, applicants must have completed a full 4-year college course leading to a bachelor's degree with major study in physics, chemistry, electronics, metallurgy, engineering physics, naval architecture, or an appropriate branch of engineering. Applications will be accepted from senior students who expect to complete the required courses within 9 months of the date of filing application. No written test is required. The age limits of 18 to 35 years are waived for persons entitled to veterans preference.

For the Aeronautical Research Scientist positions, applicants must have completed a 4-year college course leading to a bachelor's degree with major study in an appropriate field of engineering, the physical sciences, mathematics, or other related fields of science. They must have had appropriate professional scientific or engineering experience which has demonstrated ability to do research work. Pertinent graduate study may be submitted for all of the required experience through grade GS-11 (\$5,940 a year) and for part of that required for the higher grade levels. No written test is required.

Further information and application forms may be obtained from the Commission's local secretary, Sam Kink, at the Cisco Post Office.

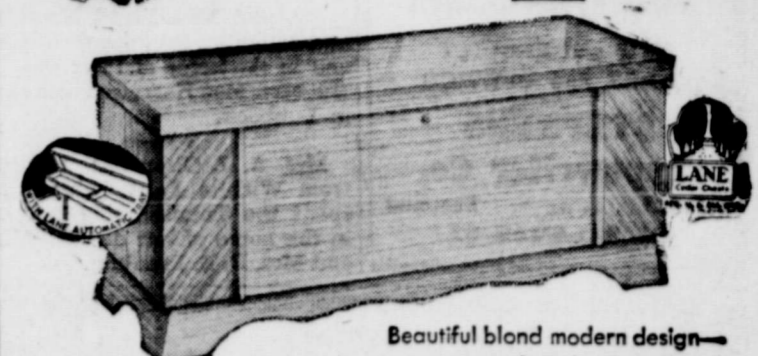

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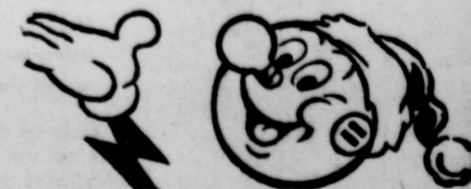
