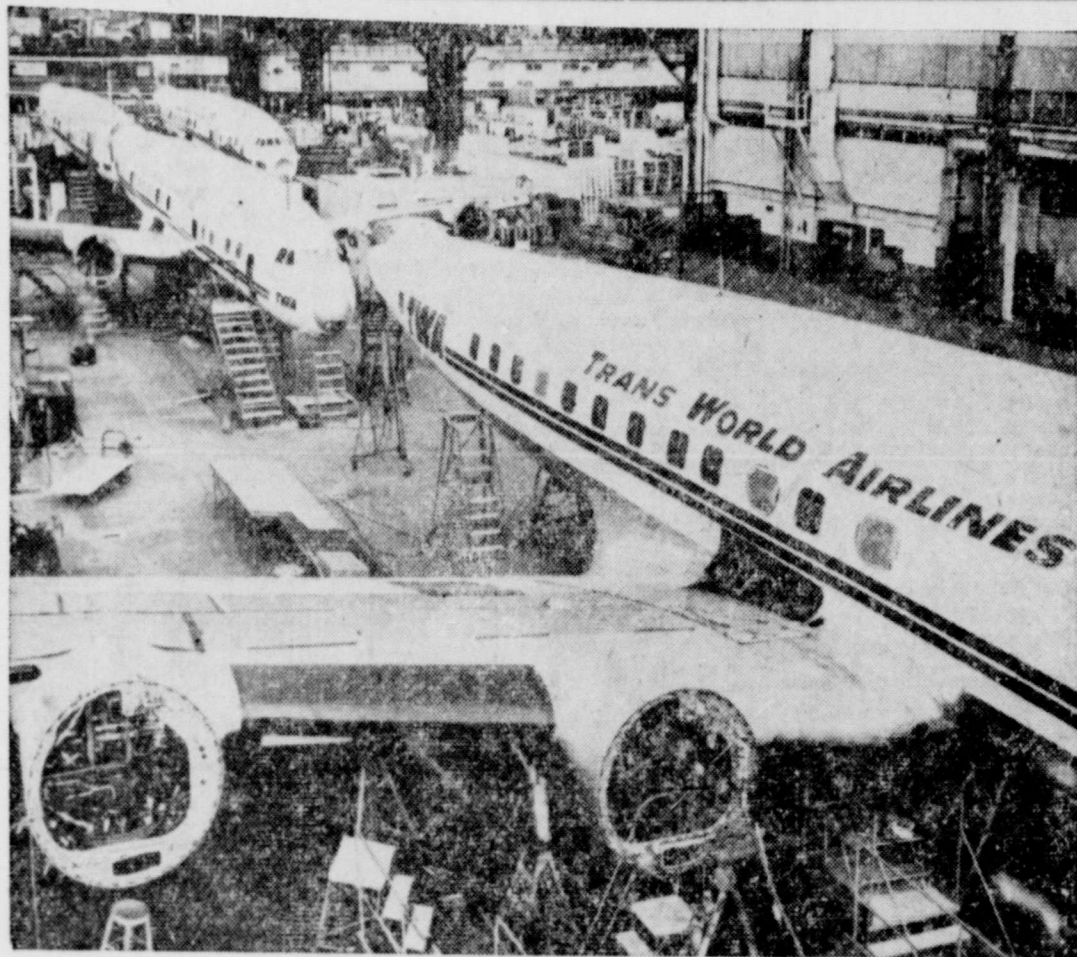

## Fred Husbands, Banquet Speaker, Is One Of State's Top Civic Leaders

Fred H. Husbands, executive vice president and general manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, who will address the annual Chamber banquet here tonight, is one of the top men of his profession in Texas. And he has attained this prominence in ten years.

He was born April 22, 1912, at Greenville, Texas — the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Husbands, now of Tyler. His father was a pioneer Greenville hardware merchant.

He is a member of the Episcopal Church, Masonic Lodge, American Chamber of Commerce Executives Association, Texas Chamber of Commerce Managers Association, Chamber of Commerce Managers Association of West Texas, University of Texas Ex-students Association, Midwestern University Ex-students Association and Sigma Nu Fraternity.

Husbands is a graduate of the University of Texas, 1936, business administration; graduate of East Texas Chamber of Commerce Short Course for C. of C. Executives, and Southwestern Chamber of Commerce Institute.

The first summer after graduating from the University was devoted to managing campaign of E. O. Thompson for railroad commissioner in eight East Tex-

as counties. Then followed seven years with the Humble Oil and Refining Company. He started as a "ditch digger" at Talco, entered the engineering department and got experience in all phases of oil field operations. During a slight recession in the fields he went back to being a roustabout, lease gauger and pumper. He became a district clerk and was put on a roving "trouble-shooter" assignment that led to 11 moves in 18 months from one South Texas field to another. He wound up with service at Gladewater, Longview and Talco.

One day he read a classified ad in the Dallas Morning News. The Manager of the Waco Chamber of Commerce was seeking a man for his staff.

He had become interested in chamber of commerce work mainly because several old family friends of Hunt county had become successful in it. These include Hubert Harrison, a high school and college classmate of his parents, who has been manager of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce many years; Oscar Jones, city manager at Marshall, formerly C-C manager there; Grady Shipp, former manager at Longview and other places and Mrs. Hila Weathers, his aunt, who recently became manager of the Martin County Chamber of Commerce and had served at San Marcos and Crockett.

So, when he saw that "little two or three-line ad" in the Dallas News, he answered it — and got the job on January 20, 1942.

Among other major assignments, he handled industrial, publicity and convention activities.

Upon resignation of L. A. Wilson, manager of the Waco Chamber to go to the Topeka, Kansas, Chamber, Husbands was named General Manager in September, 1943. He was 31 years of age. He filled that position until he was appointed executive vice president and general manager of the WTCC in October, 1950.

### C of C Plays Big Part In Building City, Club Told

"The Chamber of Commerce is the logical head of the commercial life of a community," E. L. Jackson, president of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, told Rotarians at their regular weekly luncheon meeting at the Hotel Victor Thursday.

Mr. Jackson was the speaker at the meeting as the guest Rotarian W. P. Guinn, who introduced him.

He began his talk by reminding Rotarians that everything the citizens of a community did was a group activity and pointed out work in churches, civic clubs, schools, business and others as examples.

"No man lives unto himself — is dependent on others of the community and of the nation," Jackson said. He stressed the importance of leadership and pointed out that the Chamber of Commerce was the leader of the commercial life of the town.

He issued a plea to citizens to quit "selling the community short" and to get behind the leaders who were giving of their time and money to make the town a better place in which to live.

Mr. Jackson explained the purpose of the Chamber of Commerce Work Clinic being held this week and said that from such clinics many valuable ideas had been presented that helped the leaders formulate plans of work for the upbuilding of the town.

"A town," Mr. Jackson said, "is good, bad or indifferent as the people of the town are good, bad or indifferent with reference to a desire to improve the conditions of the community."

He concluded his talk by saying that prospective business measured the town as to its progressiveness before making a decision to locate.

Visitors at the meeting were Rotarian Bob Gilchrist of Abilene and Ralph Duncan of Abilene, Percy Warwick and Bill Sweeney of Cisco and the Rev. Warren Hutgren of Corpus Christi.

MINERAL WELLS, March 28. — Two hundred and fifty Legionnaires of the 33 American Legion Posts in the 17th congressional district are expected to meet here Saturday and Sunday, March 29 and 30, for their annual spring convention.

William McCraw of Dallas, former Texas Attorney General and a Past State Legion Commander, will be the principal speaker at the joint Legion and Auxiliary session Sunday morning, according to 17th District Commander Eugene L. Jackson of Cisco. State Representative Jack Cox of Breckenridge will also address the convention, Jackson said. Cox is the district's Americanism chairman.

### CITY HAS GAIN OF OVER 300 VOTERS; COUNTY IS UP 1,000

From figures released this week by Tax Collector-Assessor Stanley Webb it was revealed that 319 more Cisco voters were eligible to go to the polls this year to cast votes in city, county, state and national elections than were eligible in 1950 and the increase for the county was almost 1,000.

Poll taxes paid in Cisco in 1950 for voting numbered 1,389 as against 1,806 for this year and the total for the county was 5,788 for 1950 as compared with 6,742 for this year. Eastland showed a gain of 238 potential voters while Ranger showed an increase of 292.

Mr. Webb gave the following figures on voting potential by precincts:

### Carey Test Tops Sand, Will Core Through Horizon

Another good oil well for the Cisco area was in prospect today after the L. A. Warren et al No. 1 Mrs. Maurine Royall flowed oil from the Lake sand on a drill stem test. The well is located one-eighth of a mile west of the city limits boundary.

The sand was topped Thursday night at 3,493 feet. After drilling five feet into the pay section, the tools were opened for a drill stem test. Gas appeared at the surface in five minutes. In 15 minutes, oil began flowing.

Oil men called the test "an outstanding prospect," expressing the belief that it would be one of the area's largest wells.

Plans called for electric survey to be run and pipe to be cemented in the hole late today. Completion work will begin after the cement sets for 72 hours.

The Warren interests have a block of some 380 acres in the area of the well. Official location was given as 330 feet from the west and 2,120 feet from north lines of the southeast quarter in Section 64, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Any plans for further drilling in the area will await completion of the well.

In the south Cisco pool, the E. K. Carey Drilling No. 1 Estes-House had topped the Lake sand pay horizon early today. Top of the sand was 3,425 feet — slightly higher than in nearby wells. A core barrel was installed and operators planned to core through the Lake sand section. No drill stem test had been run. The well is located just west of the Rising Star highway south of the city limits boundary.

Further west in the same pool area, the Curtis McFadden Company No. 1 Myrick-Maxwell Heirs was drilling at about 2,800 feet today. Earlier reports that drilling was below 3,000 feet were in error.

LETTERS... CHRISTIANITY VS. SOCIALISM

Editor: It has been reported the churches of America have a combined membership of 70,000,000. This number of persons equals about one and one-half times the number of persons ever to have voted in a presidential election. When communism, socialism, welfare-state, fascism or nazism must, if their social and economic ends are to be achieved, violate the christian concept of human rights it seems strange indeed that our present government has been in power for nineteen years after having shown its ultimate objective is a welfare-state. It has become progressively more socialistic and centralized each year of its tenure in office. Those at the head of government claim to be member of the Democratic Party. We either believe in our Constitutional Republic and, therefore, are willing to protect it or we do not believe in it and will join with others in its destruction... by slow degrees. We should STOP thinking of government as all powerful... as being free of doing any wrong. We must also STOP thinking of government other than as an instrument of our choosing for defending the inherent rights of its citizens to be free, to enjoy life, liberty and property, honestly earned. Our government surely was not proposed as an instrument for destroying our rights. No... the purpose of government is for ONE PURPOSE ONLY - to defend those rights declared as God given in our Declaration of Independence. In the nature of the universe, the rights of man to life, to freedom, is as natural as the freedom and brilliance of

WTCC URGES OPPOSITION FOR BILL PENDING IN CONGRESS

ABILENE, March 28. — Many people could make a pretty good living without working if the Moody-Dingell bill, now pending in Congress, should be enacted, according to information gathered by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, which is urging its members to insist that their congressmen oppose the measure.

Combined state-federal payments "would in many instances produce a weekly check closely approaching the amount of take-home pay which the individual would have if working full time," the Senate Finance Committee was told by a representative of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, the WTCC was informed.

The American Federation of Labor has declared the bill should be broadened to provide federal payment of travel expenses of unemployed workers and their families, and household effects, moving in search of new employment.

Tagging the bill a defense measure is a subterfuge, said the WTCC statement. While it "masquerades" as a temporary solution for transient unemployed, its actual provisions do not limit it to states in which there is unemployment caused by defense production changeovers, it was pointed out.

The bill is titled "The Defense Unemployment Compensation Act of 1952." It would authorize the federal government to match up to 50 per cent of a state's weekly unemployment payments when the governor and U. S. Secretary of Labor found an employment distress area in the state. The Secretary of Labor has endorsed the bill.

Sponsors of the measure estimate it would cost the federal government \$200 million annually. Others declare the cost eventually would be \$1 billion a year.

The West Texas chamber's communication to members commented on the measure further as follows:

Each state could increase its benefit amounts to obtain more federal funds. This in turn would increase state unemployment taxes as well as create need for additional federal taxes. How could this vicious circle be stopped?

Once federal matching funds are made available, the state would be forced to raise benefits so high that Texas' merit rating would be abolished.

Because of this merit rating, the average Texas unemployment compensation tax rate last year for 33,000 covered employers was six-tenths of one per cent, one of the lowest in the United States. Had the maximum rate been levied would have been exacted from these employers, although the unemployment compensation trust fund surplus.

Federal control would be injected further by a prohibition in the bill against a participating state decreasing its benefit formula in any way from the state law in effect January 1, 1952.

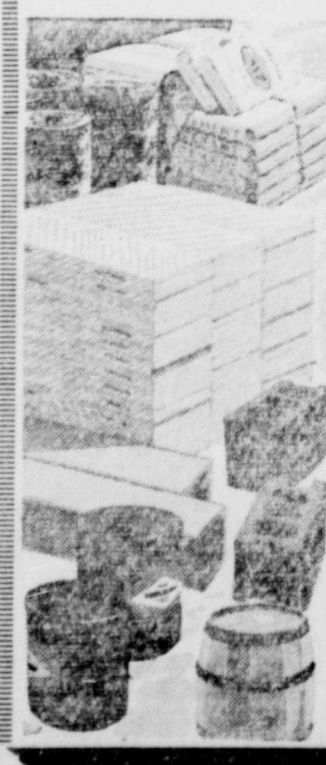
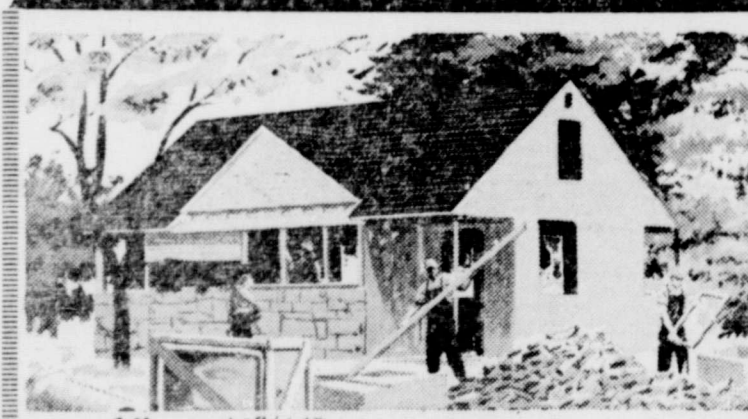
