Dario Hernandez Wounded in Iraq

Marine CPL Dario Hernandez of Friona sustained what turned out to be minor injuries in an explosion in Iraq.

Hernandez was riding in a humvee with his squad. They were chasing insurgents in a cemetery in the Al Anbar Province when their vehicle was in contact with an improvised explosive device. The humvee driver suffered serious injuries. CPL Hernandez had what was described as a chest wall contusion.

Family members have been in contact with him and say that he is out of the hospital and expected to make a full recovery. He has returned to his unit. A Purple Heart Medal is currently pending. He serves with the 1st Battalion 7th Marines.

He deployed to Iraq on August 25 and is expected to be in Iraq seven months. Dario is the son of Carmella Hernandez of Friona and his wife is the former Dianna Tirado also of Friona.

An email received at the Star office from Dianna stated, "Dario and I would like to thank our families, friends, and the community of Friona for all the prayers and support that we have received."

2 Brothers Arrested

Tire Spikes And Taser Guns Used in Car Chase

A couple of New Mexico brothers having a stolen car, beer, and marijuana joyride during the wee hours last Friday, October 8, ended up spiked, tasered, and jailed in Parmer County.

The car, a Pontiac Grand Am, had been reported stolen in Portales, New Mexico. It was spotted in Curry County by New Mexico law enforcement. The vehicle fled when an attempt was made to stop it.

The chase entered Parmer County as the two turned onto Highway 60 at the state line, traveling east in the westbound lanes. A New Mexico deputy was in pursuit as the car reached speeds over 90 mph and narrowly missed at least two westbound vehicles, including an 18-wheeler. Fortunately the incident occurred approximately from 2-4 a.m. while traffic was lightest.

Parmer County Sheriff's deputies Wayne Gruben and Andy Stormes, and Bovina police officer Eddie Everhart joined the chase. When the pursuit reached Bovina, the stolen vehicle moved over to the eastbound lanes. Deputy Stormes deployed the department's spike strips near the bridge east of Bovina and flattened the Grand

Am's front and rear passenger side tires.

The suspects continued to drive eastbound eventually losing the tires and showering sparks as they drove on the tire rims, often at speeds as slow as 30 mph. Between Bovina and Friona deputies noticed the two suspects tossing out a couple of boxes of beer and one suspect hanging out of the passenger side window.

Sheriff Randy Gerries was called at home and waited west of town near the grain elevators for the chase. Friona Police Chief Tino Salinaz and Sgt. Joe Lopez were also called out to assist. Westbound traffic out of Friona was temporarily blocked since the fleeing vehicle had been driving on the wrong side of the highway.

When the vehicle reached Gerries position west of Friona, it was showering sparks and almost disabled. Gerries got his Sheriff's car in front of the Grand Am and slowed down until the stolen car finally side-swiped a pickup parked on the shoulder and caught on fire. The Friona Volunteer Fire Department and Friona EMS were dispatched to the scene about 3:00 a.m.

The two brothers ran into a

cotton field where one was dropped with a taser gun. The officers were unable to find the second suspect who had fled in the dark through an adjacent maize field to the railroad tracks and made his way into Friona on foot while they searched the dark wet fields for him.

He knocked on the door of a residence in the 400 block of Woodland and asked for dry clothes and a ride to Portales. The residents said they did not have a car but gave him a dry sweat-suit, then called the police department and gave them a description.

The officers searching the cotton patch were alerted. Sheriff Gerries said they decided not to drive around looking for him because he could hide from them in the dark. Officers positioned themselves near the three convenience stores on the theory he would likely make his way to one of the stores looking for a ride.

The next contact was a short

while later when he knocked on a door at 7th and Grand and again asked for a ride to Portales. The lady at the house told him she needed to go get gasoline first. While the suspect stayed at the residence with the husband, instead of getting gas the lady drove to the police department and officers went to the residence and arrested him.

Gerries said that when confronted the suspect reached for his back pocket and was also dropped by the deputy's taser gun. Turned out he had marijuana in his back pocket.

Sheriff Gerries said the incident was the first time his department had occasion to use both the tire spikes and the taser guns. "We have had tire spikes in all our cars for a couple of years and we have trained with them but this is the first time we have had to use them. I'm glad to know they work very well," he said. The spike strips are made of

triangle shaped spikes so that no matter how you toss it on the road the spikes will be upright. "The strips are on a tether so they can be thrown on the road then pulled off so that only the bad guy's car is spiked," Gerries said.

The tasers are guns that fire tiny electrodes attached to electrical wires that pierce the skin and jolt the suspect with about 6,000 volts of electricity. They are designed to disable a suspect and are not lethal. "This is the first time we've used the tasers in action. They worked especially good in this situation," Gerries said.

The two brothers, both Mexican nationals and from Portales, were Eddie Martinez, 21, and Esteban Martinez, 23. Eddie Martinez was charged with evading arrest with a vehicle and possession of marijuana. Esteban Martinez was charged with evading arrest with a vehicle and DWI. Their cases are pending before the grand jury.

Veteran Parmer County employee Teresa Ancira is the new Parmer County Adult Probation officer.

She took over in August, 2004, after completing a one-week course at a school in San Angelo and earning certification as a Community Supervision Officer.

Mrs. Ancira had worked in the probation office on the sec-

ond floor of the County Courthouse in Farwell as a secretary to Ed McPeak since January 2001. McPeak retired earlier this year.

Mrs. Ancira went to work for the county in 1991 as a Sheriff's Office dispatcher. She worked in the County Clerk's office for 3 1/2 years and the District Clerk's office for 5 1/2 years before taking the job in the probation office. During her tenure she also ran for office as Tax Assessor and Justice of the Peace.

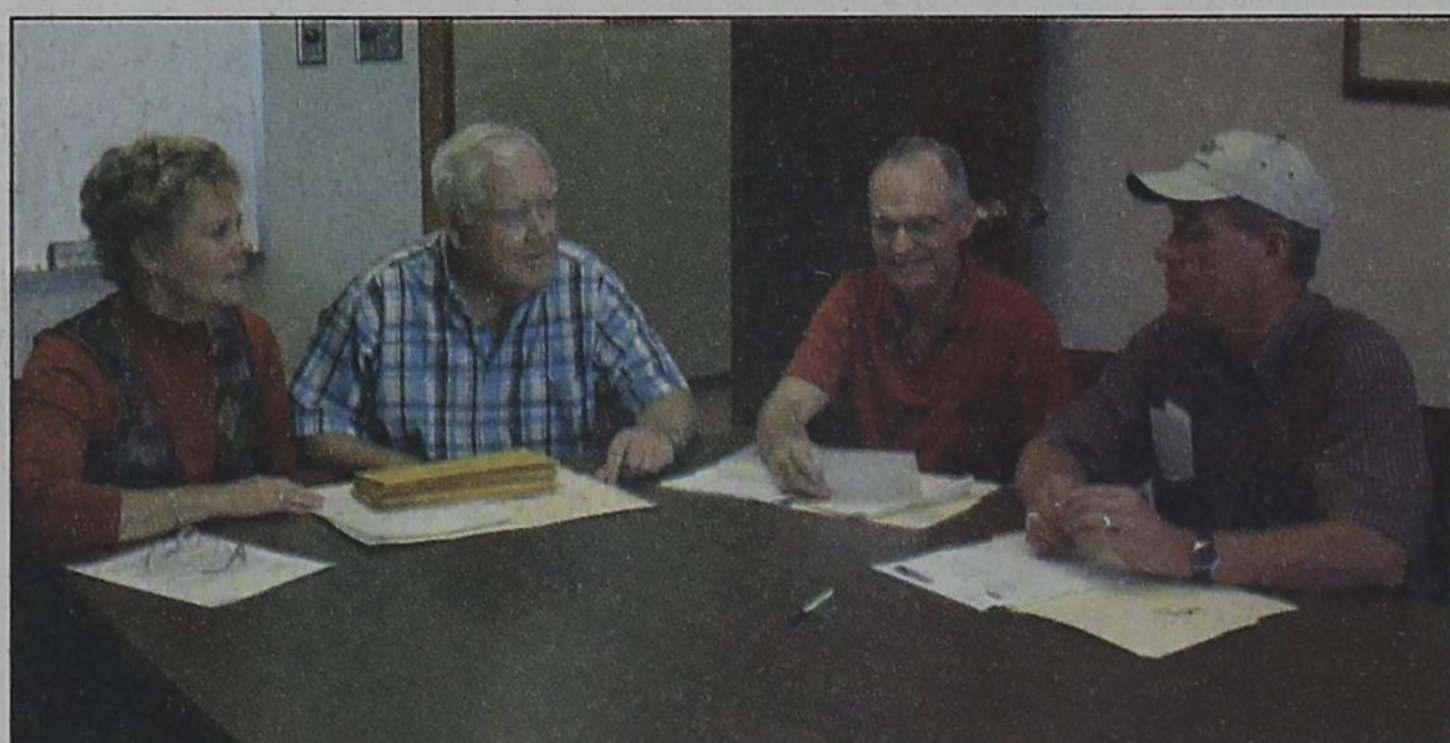
In addition to being busy with her family and job, she attended the Clovis campus of Wayland Baptist University where she earned a degree in human services.

Benefits for the Working Family

With college tuition, medical bills and mortgages to pay, American families cannot afford to pay more in taxes. That's why I persistently fought to pass the Working Families Tax Relief Act to extend tax cuts that were put in place two years ago by Congress. Under this significant piece of legislation, American families will see \$131 billion in tax relief.

Last year I worked with my colleagues and President Bush to pass a \$350 billion jobs and economic growth package to put Americans back to work and stimulate the economy. By putting more money in the pockets of individuals and small businesses, we freed the engines of our economy. Since that bill was signed, the stock market is up, private sector growth is strong, and America's standard of living is on the rise. Homeownership rates reached an all time high and among minorities it is at a new record of 51 percent. Almost two million jobs have been created nationwide since last April and more than 116,000 jobs have been added in Texas. At 5.4 percent, unemployment is below the averages for the 1970s, 1980s, and 1990s.

The Working Families Tax Relief Act covers several key provisions that were facing expiration at the end of this year. Among these is a respite from the well-known marriage tax penalty. In 2001 and 2003, Congress and the President passed sweeping tax cuts that saved 52 million married couples, including 3.6 million Texans, between \$130 to \$600 on their 2003 tax bills. By extending this through 2010, a family of four with an income of \$40,000 will now save more than \$900 on their taxes next year.

In 1997, Congress enacted a \$500 per child tax credit and later doubled it to \$1,000. The bill President Bush signed maintains the full credit for another six years, providing needed relief to parents of over 47 million children.

Furthermore, the Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT) exemptions were continued. The AMT helps cover 13 million Americans that otherwise would not qualify after the January 1st deadline. This measure protects certain taxpayers by exempting from the AMT the first \$58,000 of a married couple's income and \$40,250 for a single individual. The AMT, along with the included 10 percent tax bracket extension, provides significant help to middle and low-income Americans.

Additional benefits were included for military families and American schools. Under this bill, soldiers living in combat zones are provided higher child credit refunds and earned income tax credits. It is the least we can do for our troops sacrificing so much. Elementary and secondary school teachers, among other educators, are eligible for approximately \$250 in deductions for personal payment of classroom expenses. This above-the-line deduction rightly defrays some of the expenditures our children's educators voluntarily make to enhance the quality of each student's education.

I have long believed taxpayers make better use of their money than the government ever could. Time and time again, the American people have proven that to be the case. They know how to handle their money to best provide for themselves, the economy and our country.

It is a great week. Know why? The presidential debates are finally over.

Of course we didn't have to watch the actual debates but even if you didn't all the brouhaha before and after was enough to drive you nuts. The second debate was on a Friday night. Scheduling an important debate against Friday night high school football was a dumb idea.

I figured since Dubya came across as a mean little weasel on the first debate his handlers thought Friday night was a safe bet since most Americans would either be at a football game or out eating Mexican food.

I think the debates have done Dubya more harm than good. He obviously does not like for his decisions to be challenged. He doesn't like to be questioned. To tell you the truth I think he is getting a might scary. I'm tired of listening to him. Let's just go vote.

Some interesting races in this election. I picked up a sample ballot from County Clerk Colleen Stover's office this week. We will print it the week before the election and hope you will study it. It is good to go to Farwell and visit every now and then. There are some nice people in the courthouse.

I ran into County Attorney Jeff Atkinson in the District Clerk's office. Court was in session Tuesday so a lot of filed

to run against Aycock which is the main reason Kathryn Gurley did not file to run as an official candidate for County Attorney.

After Aycock and Actkinson had filed for election, Aycock resigned leaving Actkinson alone on the ballot so Gurley filed to run as a write-in candidate. Got all that? My last stop was at the jail. Actually I stopped in the Sheriff's office which is in the jail facility. Sheriff Randy Geries and Chief Deputy Wayne Gruben filled me in on a few details of the car chase last week that could have been a big disaster but it wasn't. The story is on page one this week.

Farwell Police Chief Robert Achtenberg was there too. Always good for a newspaper guy to get to know county and law enforcement officials face to face. Makes for better communications all around. The four of us ended up in a big discussion on the pros and cons of living in the mountains or on the flatland prairie.

There are some interesting choices on the ballot November 2. Bush vs. Kerry,

Neugebauer vs. Stenholm, Gurley vs. Actkinson. I believe it is our patriotic duty to get off the butt and go vote. American men and women are fighting a nasty war. People line up to vote in Afghanistan, and soon Iraq, under threat of death. Americans will stand in line to buy a 42 oz. fountain drink yet will not exert the effort to vote. I don't get it.

It is not just a right to vote. Not in today's atmosphere. I believe we each have an obligation to vote. If you gripe about the government but you don't vote then you shouldn't gripe about the government. That means local, state, and national.

It was a good week. The debates are over. Soon but not soon enough the election will be over too. Life is pretty good over here.

WIN ELEVENTH STRAIGHT

Chieftains Extend Streak Over 'Cats

BY BILL ELLIS

Last Friday night's win over the Bobcats at Dimmitt was the 11th straight win over Friona's longtime rival, and is the longest Friona "winning streak" since the two teams first met in 1930.

However, Friona will have to win their next TWELVE games against the Bobcats just to even the series, which now stands: Dimmitt 40 wins, Friona 28, and one tie through 69 games.

The current streak started in 1994 under James Morton, whose teams were 4-2 against Dimmitt. Mike Scott's teams were 4-0, and Bob Ferguson's Chiefs are now 3-0 vs their old rivals.

Dimmitt beat the Chieftains on the gridiron 14 straight games from 1944 through 1962. The 'Cats won those games by an average score of 35-5½. Included in their 14-game win streak were five shutouts and five other games where the Chieftains were held to a single touchdown.

Dimmitt has been played more than any other Chieftain rival, 69 times since the first meeting. The Muleshoe rivalry began earlier, in 1926, but the Mules have been played only 54 times.

The recent six-year hiatus from Friona and Dimmitt being district opponents was the first since 1944. The two teams didn't meet at all in 1951-52-53 and '55, the only breaks in the series from 1940 to the present.

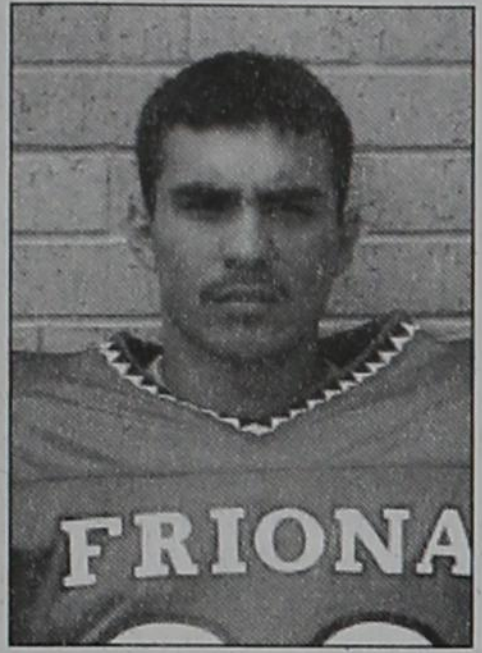

Dimmitt tried a fake punt late in the 3rd. It worked for a first down that turned into a touchdown, their only score of the second half. Neither team seemed to be focused in the third quarter as the referees declared it "yellow flag day". The Chiefs accumulated a season-high 135 yards on 15 penalties, many in the 3rd quarter. Dimmitt was penalized only 45 yards on 7 violations. Two consecutive 15-yard penalties for personal foul and face mask gave the Bobcat's 30 free yards and two first downs. They only made 7 first downs the entire game.

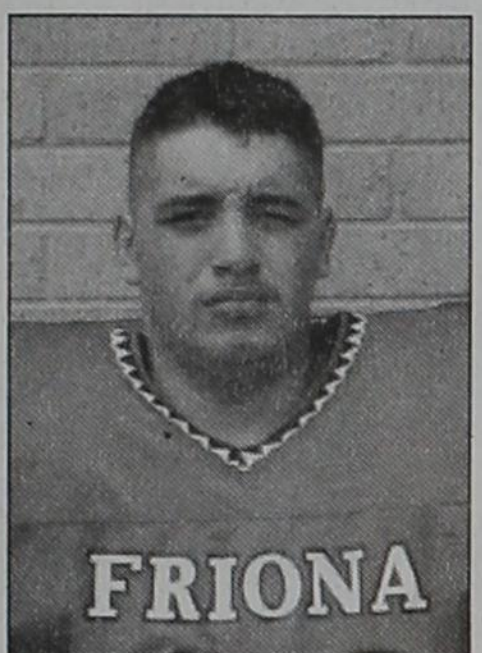

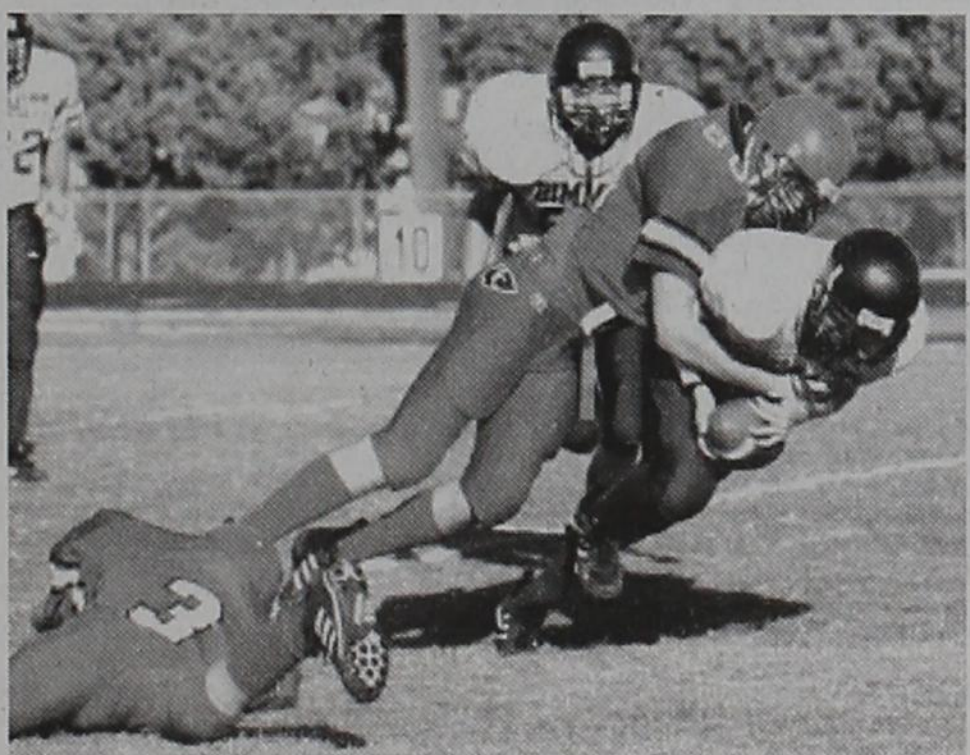

S-E put up 370 offensive yards, including 332 yards on 51 offensive snaps. The Mustangs managed 222 yards of total offense.

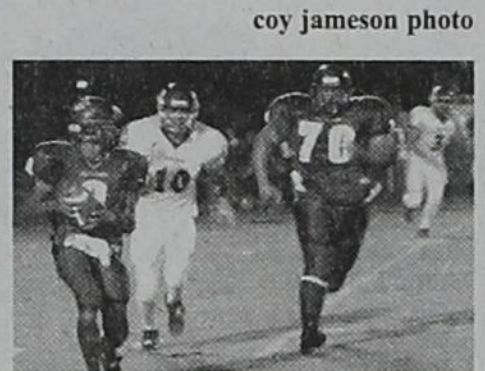

Common Costly Misconceptions About Carpet Cleaning

#3: One method of carpet cleaning is as good as another.

Singular Not Plural

BY REV. ALVIN PETTY, Calvary Baptist Church

In the Bible, the human problem is defined more as sin rather than sins. Sin is descriptive of our state of inner being (Rom. 7:17, 20, 23). Sins are our bad deeds or behavior. The church has usually focused on our sins and not on the state of our inner distorted sense that we are not okay (Dr. Thomas Harris, I'm OK, You're OK). It is deep-rooted discontent, insecurity, and shame with who and what we are. This inner lack and insecurity drives us to all kinds of sins so that we can pretend to be better than we feel we are.

Adam, in the creation story, tried to excuse his disobedience of God's command by blaming it on someone else because he felt bad about himself. He was ashamed and could not live with himself so he lied to cover up. This indwelling principle of sin is the factory that produces all our sins.

When we major on sins, to help the human problem, we tend to become a Christian moralistic religion, which often creates more sins than it absolves. Moralistic people centered upon bad deeds in their preaching of salvation tend to become legalistic, judgmental, exclusive, isolated, and self-righteous, among other things. This is what we find in the description of the Scribes and Pharisees of Jesus' day in the New Testament.

We can be very determined in our minds to be very good people but unless our inner brokenness with its sense of lack and insecurity is healed, it will continue to drive us towards bad behavior that is destructive of self, life, and relationships, in the long run.

The only thing that heals our inner brokenness is The Gospel of Grace, which is God's message that all people are accepted in love, as a gift, in spite of their sins, as if they were already perfect children of God. Accept by faith this loving acceptance, feed upon it constantly and you will begin to feel its empowerment helping you to overcome your sins with respect, reverence, and awe (Rom. 7:24-25; Phil. 2:12).

At a public board meeting Monday night, the Pioneer Museum board of directors decided on the official name for the museum. To avoid confusion with a local heritage society and to appeal to the entire county, the new name selected is the Parmer County Pioneer Museum. land in Friona. The museum's chief curator Wendy Carthel said, "We want the entire county to be represented in the museum. And this should be simpler and less confusing for everyone."

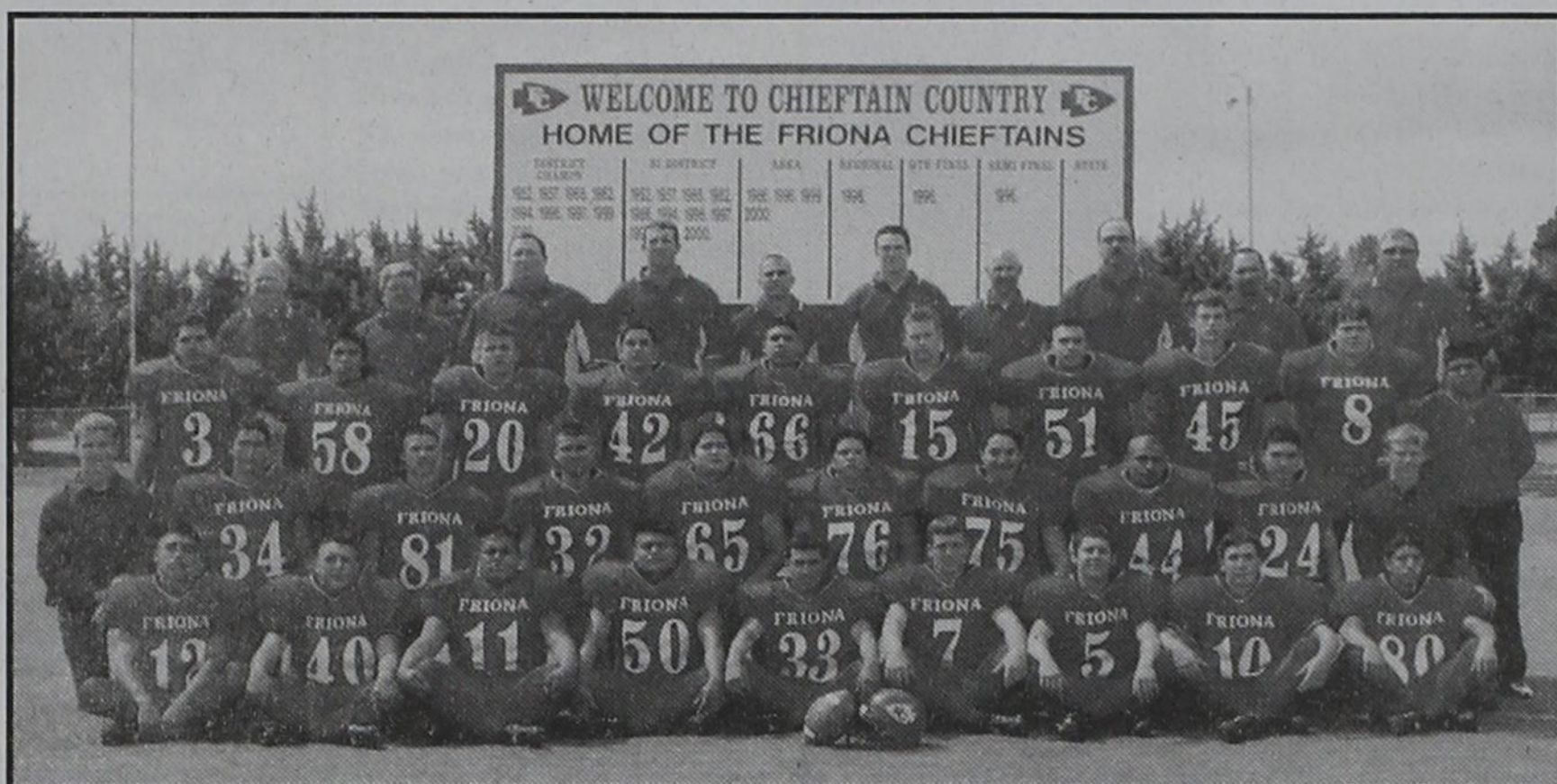
The board is planning a Christmas open house for Sunday December 5 and is seeking any school related memorabilia

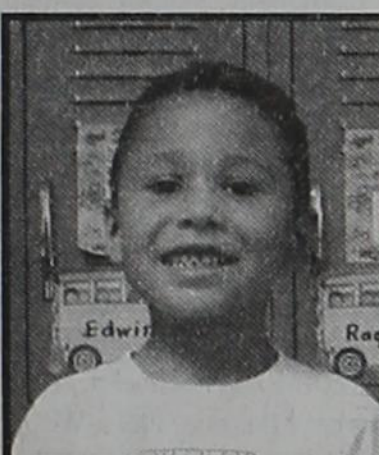

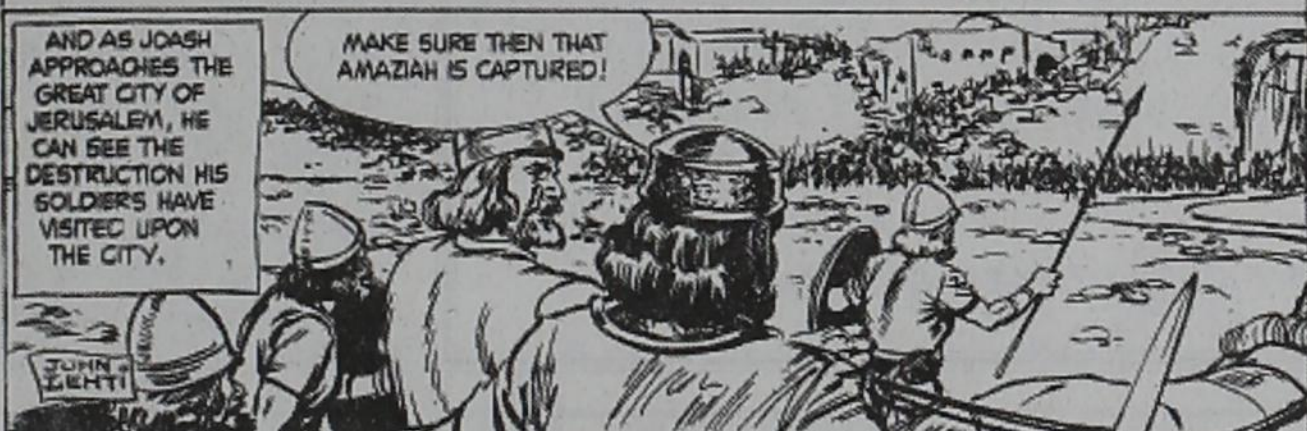

15 Yrs. Ago October 14, 1989

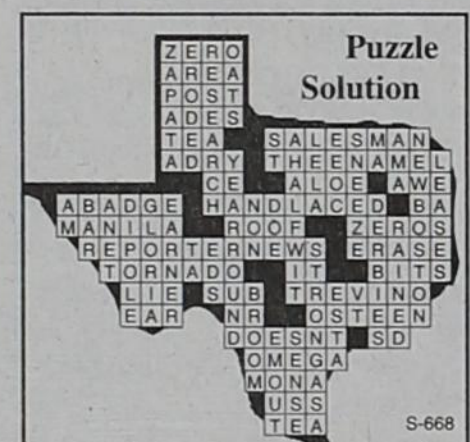

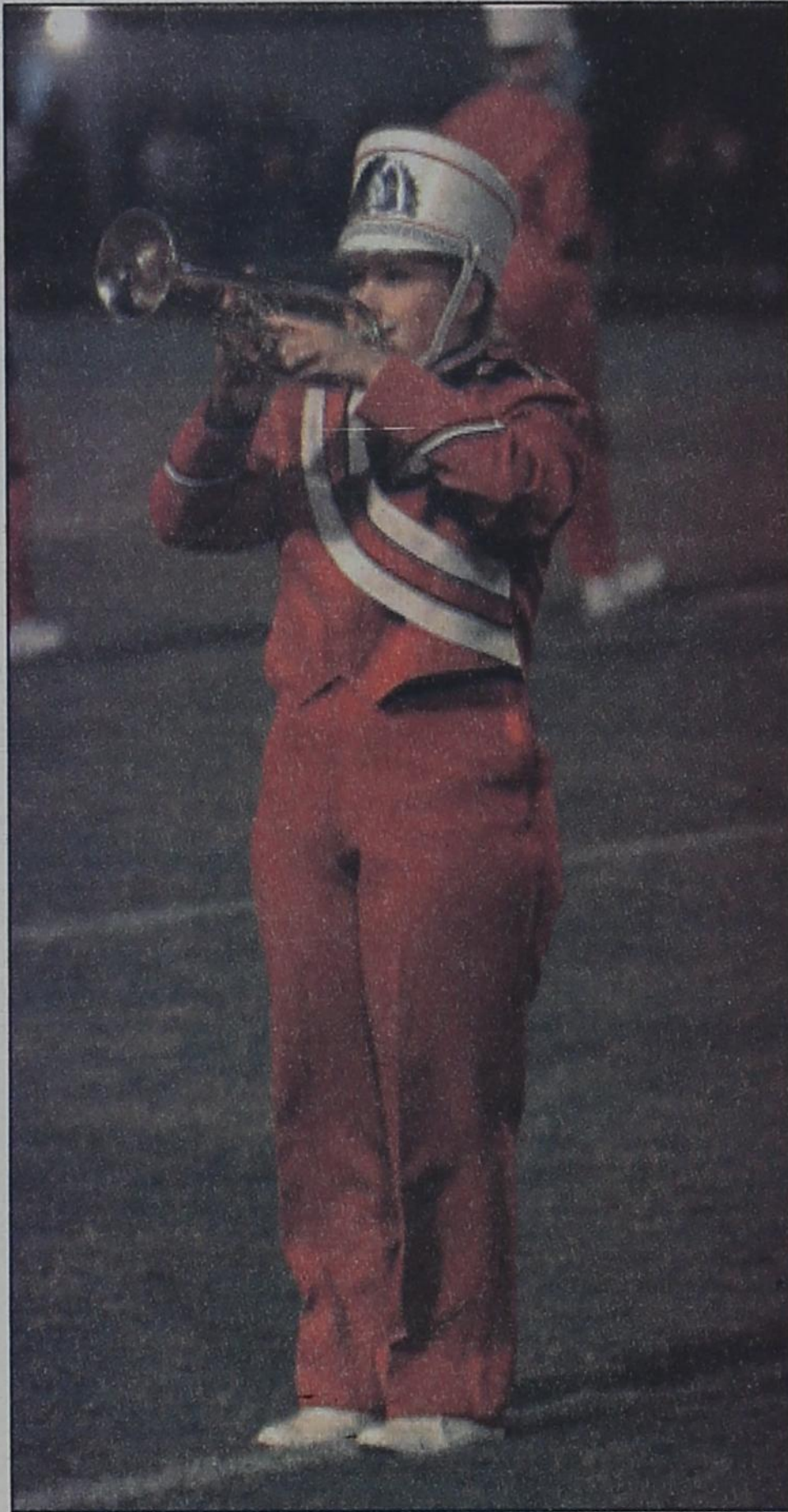
