THE BLOOD PROJECT needs some 200 more signers of donor cards to be assured of success. When the Bloodmobile Unit comes to Cisco something like 18 months ago, a total of 225 people gave blood. Cisco led county cities in the program. It now appears that Cisco will trail county cities unless a lot more interest is shown and soon.

CISCO LOBOES WILL CONCLUDE 1952 SEASON IN FRIDAY GAME

The Cisco High School Lobos will wind up the 1952 season at Chesley Field Friday night when they meet the Stephenville Yellowjackets in a District 2A-10 game.

The Yellowjackets, figured at the beginning of the season to win the district crown easily, were disappointing in their 13-14 loss to Ranger Friday.

The Lobos came out of the game with Comanche Friday with few injuries and the overall physical condition of the team should be improved for the final contest. Bob Lloyd received a head injury but was expected to be ready for the Friday game. Bob Black, who has been out for the past two games, was improved but was not expected to be used much at his half-back position. Jim Reynolds, who was hampered last week by a knee injury, was showing improvement and was expected to be in better condition Friday. The remainder of the team was expected to be in almost top form.

The team will be strengthened this week by moving up two or three boys from the "B" squad. Harold (Cotton) Pippen will be given a suit and will probably be used some at half, and Edward Bernie will be used probably at a tackle post during part of the game. Joe Wayne Farrow will probably be moved up for the final game and may see action at guard.

Probably starters will be Bobby Qualls at center, Jim Reynolds and Sonny McCrea at guards, Sherwood Gaines, Bill Miller or Bennie Edwards at tackles, Jim Webb and Bill Smith at ends, Boy Gallagher, Bob Lloyd, Marcus Gallegos and Irv Brunkenhoefer at backs. Mack McCauley, Peanut Poyner, Gerald Bint, Fred Hayes, Andy Mosley, Arzell Hale and Sonny Bosworth will alternate with the starters in the game.

The Friday game will be the final for some 13 seniors who will graduate in the spring, or whose eligibility runs out at the end of the current season. Those who will don Lobo uniforms for the last time are Gerald Bint, Max Poyner, Irv Brunkenhoefer, Bob Lloyd, Boy Gallagher, Sonny Bosworth, and Bob Black, backs; Carl Ingram and Mack McCauley, guards; Andy Mosley, center; Sherwood Gaines, tackle; and Jim Webb, end.

Daniel Gray, a tackle, was lost for the season following the Ranger game. He will graduate in the spring.

In addition to the above lettermen the following will return next year: Jim Reynolds and Sonny McCrea, guards; Bob

Qualls and Fred Hayes, centers; Bill Miller, Arzell Hale and Benny Edwards, tackles; Bill Smith, end; Marcus Gallegos, back. Danny Louder and Monte Ingram were listed as possible lettermen at end positions. They will return next year.

In addition to the 11 returning members of the 1952 traveling squad who are returning, the 1953 team will be bolstered by several members of this year's "B" team who have shown a great deal of promise. The most promising boys on the "B" team, who are assured of places on the traveling squad next year, are Edward Bernie at tackle, Joe Wayne Farrow at guard, Ronnie Qualls at center, Tommy Reynolds at quarter, Buck Whitehead and Harold Pippen at halves and Kent Davis at full. Others expected to add to the team included Levere Adams and Don Meier at ends, Kenneth Penn at tackle, Tommy Collier and Buz Johnson at guards and Howard Hamilton at quarter.

Only six members of this year's traveling squad who will return next year will be seniors. They are Reynolds, McCrea, Bob Qualls, Benny Edwards, Monte Ingram and Danny Louder. The remaining members of the team will be composed of boys who have two and three years of eligibility with the exception of Kent Davis who is ineligible this year because of the transfer rule. Davis will be a senior next year.

The Friday game will also be the final for Coach Jack Everett who has announced his resignation at the end of the school year. He will retain his present duties for the remainder of the year and will coach track and other sports. He has not announced his plans for the future.
