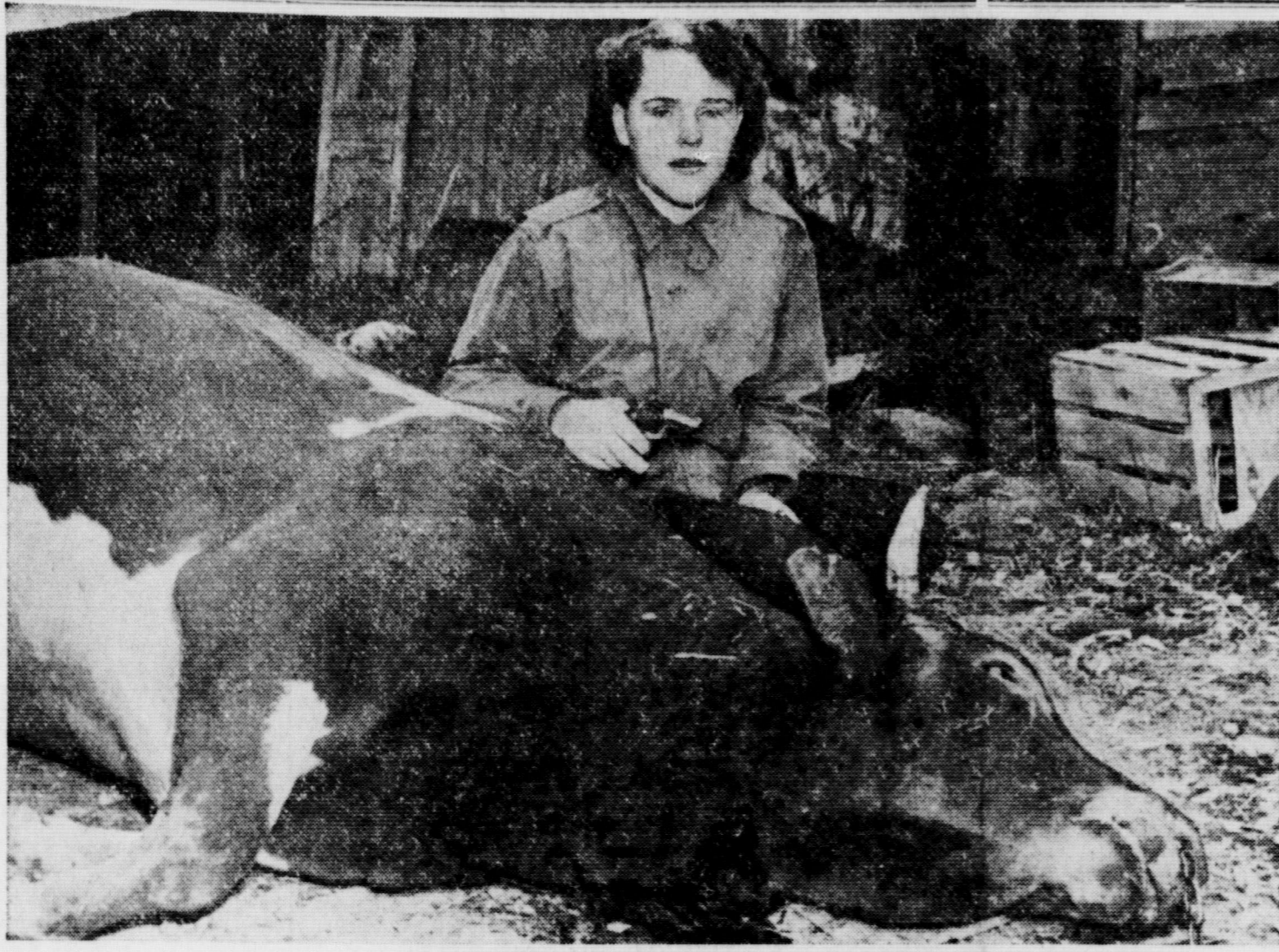

He talked to a rancher out Scranton and he reported that they didn't get their stock tanks full, but the ground got a better soaking than it has had in many months.

THE MAIL BRINGS us a recipe for Meat Pie with Corn Bread Topping that sounds good. Mr. Roy Huffmyer, the amateur chef, might want to try it and make a recommendation. It follows:

Filling: 1 cup cooked diced carrots; 1 cup cooked diced celery; 1 cup cooked diced potatoes; 1 cup cooked peas; 1 tablespoon grated onion; 3 cups diced leftover roast beef and 2 cups celery.

Topping: 3/4 cup corn meal, one-third cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 1/4 teaspoon baking powder, 1 egg yolk, two-thirds cup milk and 1 teaspoon melted butter or margarine.

Combine all filling ingredients in a 1 1/2-quart greased casserole. Mix together corn meal and other dry ingredients. Combine beaten milk, milk, and melted fat. Add dry ingredients, mixing only until moistened. Pour batter evenly over meat and vegetables in casserole. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes, until corn bread just starts to shrink from sides of casserole. Yield: 6 servings.

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Reports from J. S. Yeager, former editor of the Putnam News and former mayor of Putnam now in Dallas, are that his condition has not improved.

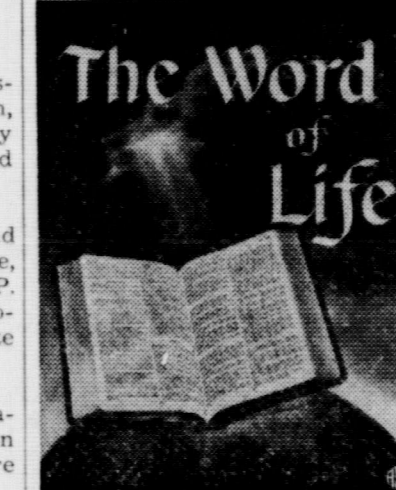

The church program will open with an organ prelude by Mrs. S. E. Hittson, followed by a hymn. The Rev. Sidney Spain, pastor of the First Christian Church, will give the invocation, and the Rev. Grady James, Presbyterian minister, will lead the responsive reading. Rev. Spain will give a Thanksgiving prayer, and an offering will be taken for the benefit of the Ministerial Association. Dr. Ward will deliver the Thanksgiving sermon and the benediction.

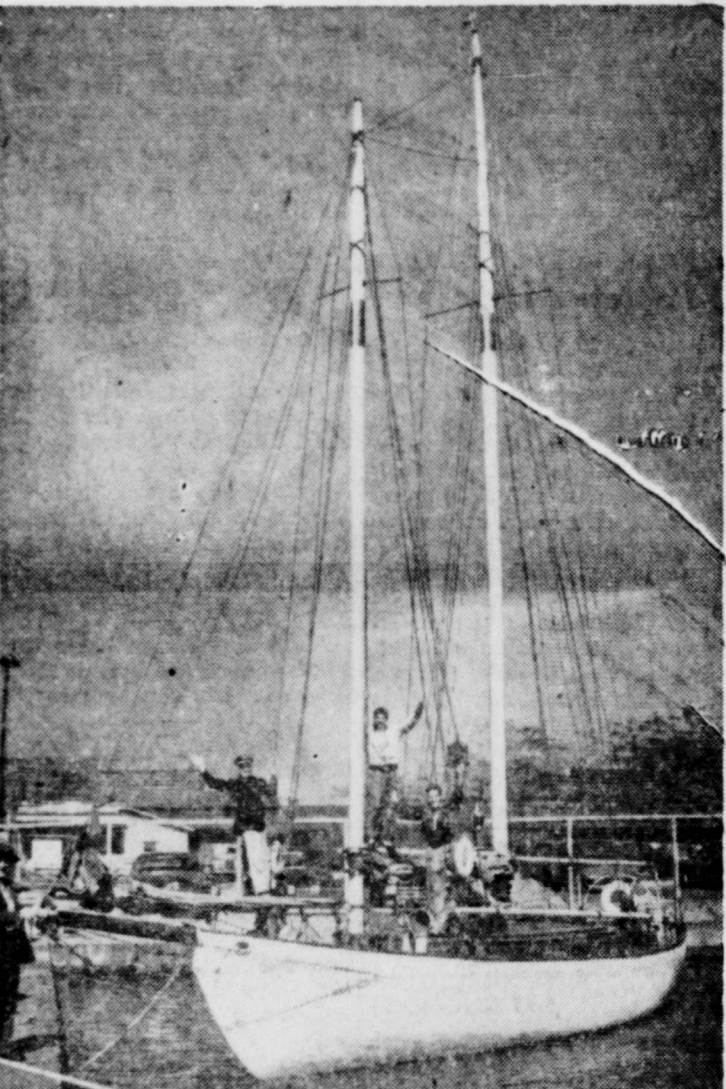
