Any person needing a social security card can get an application blank at his local Post Office. The blank should be completed and mailed to the Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas. In cases where the card has been lost, this same application form may be used to apply for a du-

This year, with the holiday consisting of four days for many persons, the toll could be even higher than the 351 traffic deaths reported during the four-day Christmas weekend last year, Mr. Dearborn warned.
